Administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.2/35/L.53/Rev.1

# Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

1. At its 46th meeting on 20 November 1980, the Second Committee adopted the draft resolution contained in document A/C.2/35/L.53/Rev.1. It had before it a statement of administrative and financial implications in document A/C.2/35/L.122.

2. Under the terms of paragraph 6 of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.2/35/L.53/Rev.1, the General Assembly would decide to reconvene the United Nations Conference on an International Code of Conduct on the Transfer of Technology from 23 March to 10 April 1981. It is assumed that the Conference would be held at Geneva, would be serviced in six languages and would require six conference rooms and 250 pages of documentation. In addition, summary records would be provided for a maximum of seven plenary meetings. Based on these assumptions, conference servicing costs, calculated on a full-cost basis, are estimated to be \$535,100 as shown in the annex to this document. These conference servicing costs will be considered in the context of the General Assembly, in which the Secretary-General will report on the level of additional conference resources to be requested in the light of the pattern of conferences for the year 1981 as approved by the General Assembly.
