NECESSITY OF ENDING THE ECONOMIC, COMMERCIAL AND FINANCIAL EMBARGO IMPOSED BY THE UNITED STATES OF AMERICA AGAINST CUBA

Cuba: draft resolution

The General Assembly,

<u>Determined</u> to encourage strict compliance with the purposes and principles enshrined in the Charter of the United Nations,

<u>Reaffirming</u>, among other principles, the sovereign equality of States, non-intervention and non-interference in their internal affairs and freedom of trade and international navigation, which are also enshrined in many international legal instruments,

<u>Taking note</u> of the statement of the Heads of State and Government at the third Ibero-American Summit, held in Salvador, Brazil, in July 1993, concerning the need to eliminate the unilateral application of economic and trade measures by one State against another for political purposes,

<u>Concerned</u> about the continued promulgation and application by Member States of laws and regulations whose extraterritorial effects affect the sovereignty of other States and the legitimate interests of entities or persons under their jurisdiction, as well as the freedom of trade and navigation,

Recalling its resolution 47/19 of 24 November 1992,

 $\underline{\text{Having learned}}$ that, since the adoption of resolution 47/19, further measures of that nature aimed at strengthening and extending the economic, commercial and financial embargo against Cuba have been promulgated and applied, and concerned about the adverse effects of those measures on the Cuban population,

- 1. Takes note of the report of the Secretary-General on the implementation of resolution 47/19; $\underline{1}/$
 - 2. <u>Calls for</u> the full implementation of its resolution 47/19;
- 3. <u>Reiterates</u> its call to all States to refrain from promulgating and applying laws and measures of the kind referred to in the preamble to the present resolution in conformity with their obligations under the Charter of the United Nations and international law which, <u>inter alia</u>, reaffirm the freedom of trade and navigation;
- 4. Once again urges States that have such laws or measures to take the necessary steps to repeal or invalidate them as soon as possible in accordance with their legal regime;
- 5. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General, in consultation with the organs and agencies of the United Nations system, to prepare a report on the implementation of the present resolution in the light of the purposes and principles of the Charter and international law, and to submit it to the General Assembly at its forty-ninth session;
- 6. <u>Decides</u> to include the item in the provisional agenda of its forty-ninth session.
