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IMPLEMENTATION OF THE DECLARATION ON THE DENUCLEARIZATION OF AFRICA

Establishment of a nuclear-weapon-free zone in Africa

 $\frac{\text{Programme budget implications of draft resolution}}{\text{A/C.1/48/L.19}}$

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

A. Requests contained in the draft resolution

1. Under the terms of operative paragraph 7 of draft resolution A/C.1/48/L.19, the General Assembly would request the Secretary-General, in consultation with the Organization of African Unity (OAU), to take appropriate action to enable the Group of Experts designated by the United Nations in cooperation with OAU to meet during 1994 at Windhoek and Addis Ababa, in order to finalize the drafting of a treaty on a nuclear-weapon-free zone in Africa, and to submit the text of the treaty to the General Assembly at its forty-ninth session under an agenda item entitled, "Final text of a treaty on an African nuclear-weapon-free zone".

B. Relationship of the request to the approved programme of work

2. The above request is related to major programme I, Maintenance of peace and security, disarmament and decolonization, programme 7, Disarmament, of the revised medium-term plan for the period 1992-1997, $\underline{1}$ / and subsection 3 (Department of Political Affairs), of section 3 (Political Affairs), of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1994-1995. 2/

C. Activities by which the request would be implemented

- 3. Should the General Assembly adopt the draft resolution, the Secretary-General would organize a two-week session in February 1994 in Windhoek, and a five-day session in April/May 1994 in Addis Ababa, for the group of 12 experts. In endorsing recommendation 4 of the Group of High-level Intergovernmental Experts to Review the Efficiency of the Administrative and Financial Functioning of the United Nations 3/ the General Assembly in its resolution 41/213 of 19 December 1986 reaffirmed the existing principle that United Nations bodies should meet at their respective established headquarters. In the present case, both meetings should normally have been convened at Addis Ababa, as the regional headquarters of the United Nations; therefore an exception to this principle would be required in respect of the meeting to be convened at Windhoek.
- 4. It is the understanding of the Secretary-General that the Office of Conference Services would not be requested to provide conference services directly, but that the regular budget of the United Nations would bear all costs related to the convening of the two sessions, namely, conference-servicing, travel and daily subsistence for the experts and appropriate substantive support services to the Group of Experts.

D. $\frac{\text{Modifications required in the proposed programme of}}{\text{work for 1994-1995}}$

- 5. The submission of the report to the General Assembly called for by the draft resolution would fall under activity 2 (a), "Parliamentary documentation", of subprogramme 1 of subsection 3B, programme of work "Disarmament", of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1994-1995. With regard to the substantive servicing of the Group of Experts, it would be necessary to add the following citation under activity 2 (b) "Substantive services" of subprogramme 1 of programme of work "Disarmament", of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1994-1995:
 - "(v) Group of Experts designated in 1991 by the United Nations in cooperation with OAU within the framework of the implementation of General Assembly resolution 45/56 A (two sessions in 1994)."

E. Additional requirements at full cost

6. The requirements related to the activities described in paragraphs 3 and 4 above are estimated at full cost as follows.

F. Potential for absorption

7. The Centre for Disarmament Affairs of the Department of Political Affairs would make use of its resources under ad hoc expert groups (\$84,700), travel of staff (\$24,000) and general operating expenses (\$26,900) to provide the necessary services to the meetings. No additional appropriation would therefore be required.

G. <u>Indication of additional requirements</u>

8. Accordingly, should the General Assembly adopt draft resolution A/C.1/48/L.19, no additional requirements would arise under section 3B of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1994-1995. The General Assembly would, however, need to grant an exception to its principle to hold United Nations meetings at its established headquarters in respect of the meetings to be convened at Windhoek.
