FINAL ACT OF THE UNITED NATIONS PLEDGING CONFERENCE FOR
THE UNITED NATIONS DISARMAMENT INFORMATION PROGRAMME

1. Pursuant to paragraph 7 of General Assembly resolution 48/76 D of 16 December 1993, in which the Assembly decided that, at its forty-ninth session, there should be a twelfth United Nations Pledging Conference for the United Nations Disarmament Information Programme and expressed the hope that "on that occasion all those Member States which have not yet announced any voluntary contributions will do so", the Secretary-General, by a note verbale dated 25 August 1994, informed Member States that he intended to convene, on 28 October 1994 at United Nations Headquarters, a Pledging Conference for that purpose.
2. The Conference met at United Nations Headquarters on 28 October 1994. It was attended by representatives of the Governments of the following States:
3. The Conference heard the announcement of pledges by a number of Governments contributing to the Voluntary Trust Fund for the United Nations Disarmament Information Programme as well as other statements regarding pledges.
4. In accordance with rule 21 of the rules of procedure of the Conference, the Secretary-General will maintain, for a specified period (until 31 March 1995), a list of pledges made or announced at the Conference; States invited to the Conference may enter on that list pledges in addition to those made or announced at the Conference. At the end of that period, the Secretary-General will issue that list as part of the records of the Conference (A/CONF.174/2).
5. IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the President of the Conference and the Secretary-General of the United Nations have signed the Final Act.

DONE at the United Nations, New York, this twenty-eighth day of October, one thousand nine hundred and ninety-four, in a single copy in the Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish languages, the six texts being equally authentic. The original text shall be deposited with the Secretary-General.
