<u>Strengthening international organizations in the area</u> <u>of multilateral trade</u>

The General Assembly,

<u>Reaffirming</u> the importance and continued validity of the Declaration on International Economic Cooperation, in particular the Revitalization of Economic Growth and Development of the Developing Countries, <u>1</u>/ the International Development Strategy for the Fourth United Nations Development Decade, <u>2</u>/ the United Nations New Agenda for the Development of Africa in the 1990s, <u>3</u>/ the Programme of Action for the Least Developed Countries for the 1990s, <u>4</u>/ A

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New Partnership for Development: the Cartagena Commitment, 5/ and the various agreements, in particular Agenda 21, 6/ that provide an overall framework for developing cooperative action to address the development challenges of the 1990s,

Recalling its resolutions 45/201 of 21 December 1990, 46/207 of 20 December 1991 and 47/184 of 22 December 1992,

<u>Welcoming</u> the progress made by the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development in the implementation of the outcome of its eighth session, in particular the organization's institutional reforms,

<u>Taking note</u> of the progress report by the Secretary-General concerning institutional developments related to the strengthening of international organizations in the area of multilateral trade,  $\underline{7}/$ 

<u>Deeply concerned</u> by the repeated delays in concluding the Uruguay Round of multilateral trade negotiations, largely as a result of the inability of the major developed countries to resolve their differences,

<u>Stressing</u> the urgent need for the Uruguay Round to be concluded in a balanced manner, taking into account all issues of interest to developing countries and their development,

1. <u>Once again urges</u> all Governments and the executive heads of the specialized agencies and other organizations and programmes of the United Nations system to endeavour to present their views to the Secretary-General on this matter;

2. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to prepare, for submission to the General Assembly at its forty-ninth session, an updated report taking into account the positive institutional outcome and implementation of the results of the eighth session of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development and the developments in the Uruguay Round of multilateral trade negotiations.
