77. From 1990-1992, two consecutive droughts plunged the greater part of the country into an acute famine and escalated the civil war, completely disrupting the already fragile infrastructure in the country. In 1992, a short-duration country programme for the period 1992-1994 was approved by the Executive Board, with an allocation of \$7,590,000 in general resources and \$49,962,000 in supplementary funds (E/ICEF/1992/P/L.40).

78. In 1993, a United Nations 100-day Action Programme for Accelerated Humanitarian Assistance was launched. The UNICEF emergency budget for 1993 was \$50 million, \$33 million of which was raised. Another short-duration country programme for the period 1994-1995 was approved by the Executive Board at its second regular session of 1994, with an allocation of \$5,200,000 in general resources and \$49,962,000 in supplementary funds (E/ICEF/1994/P/L.19). In 1994, the general resources planning level was increased from \$2,600,000 to \$3,000,000 per year. Thus, an additional amount of \$400,000 in general resources for 1995 is being requested to bring the level of general resources the approved amount of \$3,000,000 for 1995 in order to continue with humanitarian assistance.
