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SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF
WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE
REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

The list of items of which the Security Council is seized is contained in documents S/1994/20 of 20 January 1994 and S/1994/20/Add.3 of 3 February 1994.

During the week ending 19 February 1994, the Security Council took action on the following items:

By a letter dated 5 February 1994 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/1994/124), the Permanent Representative of Bosnia and Herzegovina to the United Nations transmitted a letter of the same date from the Prime Minister of the Republic of Bosnia and Herzegovina to the President of the Security Council, requesting that the Security Council convene an emergency meeting to determine why the existing mandate, under Security Council resolution 836 (1993), to "deter attacks against the safe areas" by using "all necessary measures, through the use of air power" had not been utilized to confront those

who had attacked the United Nations designated "safe area" of Sarajevo and had committed the terrorist act by shelling a crowded market on 5 February 1994.

By a letter dated 8 February 1994 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/1994/135), the Permanent Representative of Pakistan to the United Nations, on behalf of the States members of the Organization of the Islamic Conference (OIC) Contact Group on Bosnia and Herzegovina, comprising Egypt, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Malaysia, Pakistan, Saudi Arabia, Senegal and Turkey, requested an urgent meeting of the Security Council "to consider the extremely grave situation resulting from the massacre of over 66 civilians by the Serbian gunners in Sarajevo on 5 February 1994".

By a letter dated 10 February 1994 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/1994/152), the Permanent Representative of the Russian Federation to the United Nations transmitted a statement of the same date by the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of the Russian Federation, requesting an urgent meeting of the Security Council to "consider practical ways to demilitarize Sarajevo and to introduce there a United Nations administration".

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 3336th meeting, held on 14 and 15 February 1994 in response to the above requests. There were three suspensions and three resumptions of the meeting.

At the beginning of the meeting, on 14 February 1994, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Afghanistan, Albania, Algeria, Austria, Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Canada, Colombia, Croatia, Denmark, Egypt, Finland, Germany, Indonesia, the Islamic Republic of Iran, Ireland, Italy, Japan, Jordan, Luxembourg, Malaysia, Morocco, the Netherlands, Norway, Portugal, Saudi Arabia, Senegal, Slovenia, the Sudan, Sweden, Tunisia, Turkey, Ukraine and the United Arab Emirates, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited Ambassador Dragomir Djokic, at his request, to address the Council in the course of the discussion of the item before it.

Upon the first resumption of the meeting (S/PV.3336 (Resumption 1)), on 14 February 1994, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Brunei Darussalam, Estonia, Greece and Kuwait, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

Also, in response to the request contained in a letter dated 14 February 1994 from the Acting Permanent Representative of Pakistan to the United Nations, on behalf of the members of the OIC Contact Group on Bosnia and Herzegovina (S/1994/170), the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Mr. Mohammad Peyrovi, Deputy Permanent Observer of OIC to the United Nations.

On 15 February 1994, upon the second resumption of the meeting for that day (S/PV.3336 (Resumption 3)), the President, with the consent of the Council,

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invited the representative of Lithuania, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

In response to the request contained in the letter dated 15 February 1994 from the Acting Permanent Representative of Pakistan to the United Nations, on behalf of the members of the OIC Contact Group on Bosnia and Herzegovina (S/1994/174), the President, with the consent of the Council, also extended an invitation under rule 39 of the Council's provisional rules of procedure to Mr. Ahmet Engin Ansay, Permanent Observer of OIC to the United Nations.

The situation concerning Rwanda (see S/25070/Add.10, S/25070/Add.25, S/25070/Add.36, S/25070/Add.40, S/25070/Add.51 and S/1994/20)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 3337th meeting, held on 17 February 1994 in accordance with the understanding reached in its prior consultations.

The President of the Security Council stated that, following consultations among members of the Council, he had been authorized to make a statement on behalf of the Council and read out the text of that statement (for the full text, see S/PRST/1994/8; to be issued in Official Records of the Security Council, Forty-ninth Year, Resolutions and decisions of the Security Council, 1994).
