ENCOURAGEMENT OF UNIVERSAL ACCEPTANCE OF HUMAN RIGHTS INSTRUMENTS

Note by the Secretary-General

- 1. At its thirty-second session, the Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities adopted its resolution 1 B (XXXII) of 5 September 1979, by which it decided to establish each year a sessional working group composed of five members of the Sub-Commission, with due regard to equitable geographical distribution, to consider ways and means of encouraging Governments which had not yet done so to ratify or accede to international human rights instruments.
- 2. In the same resolution, the Sub-Commission requested the Secretary-General, well before the annual sessions of the Sub-Commission, to write to Governments which had not yet accepted major human rights instruments requesting them to inform the Sub-Commission of the circumstances which so far had not yet enabled them to ratify or accede to those instruments and to explain any particular difficulties they might face, in respect of which the United Nations could offer any assistance; invited the sessional Working Group of the Sub-Commission to examine the replies received from Governments; and requested the Working Group to consider, in appropriate cases, what forms of assistance could be provided to Governments by the United Nations, with a view to assisting them to ratify or adhere to the human rights conventions as speedily as possible.

- 3. In its resolution 1984/36 of 30 August 1984 the Sub-Commission decided to suspend the work of the Working Group on the Encouragement of Universal Acceptance of Human Rights Instruments and to request the Chairman of the Sub-Commission to appoint one of its members to report to it at its thirty-eighth session on information received under the resolution. This request was repeated at its thirty-eighth (resolution 1985/5), fortieth (resolution 1988/30) and forty-second (resolution 1990/24) sessions.
- 4. At its forty-fourth session, the Sub-Commission, by resolution 1992/1 of 14 August 1992, again requested its Chairman to appoint one of its members to report to it at its forty-sixth session on the subject of the encouragement of universal acceptance of human rights instruments. In the same resolution, the Sub-Commission requested the Secretary-General to update the table containing a country-by-country record of developments relating to ratification of, or accession to, the human rights instruments included in the terms of reference of the Sub-Commission.
- 5. Since the adoption of Sub-Commission resolution 1992/1, it is of interest to note that in the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action adopted by the World Conference on Human Rights on 25 June 1993, it was stated, inter alia, that "the World Conference strongly recommends that a concerted effort be made to encourage and facilitate the ratification of and accession or succession to international human rights treaties and protocols adopted within the framework of the United Nations system with the aim of universal acceptance", and that "special attention should be paid to assessing the progress towards the goal of universal ratification of international human rights and protocols adopted within the framework of the United Nations system".
- 6. In the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action it was also stated that measures should be taken to achieve universal ratification of the Convention on the Rights of the Child by 1995 and that the United Nations should encourage the goal of universal ratification of the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women by the year 2000. As at 16 June 1994, there were 161 States parties to the Convention on the Rights of the Child and 133 States parties to the Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Discrimination against Women.
- 7. At its forty-eighth session, the General Assembly adopted resolution 48/141 by which it decided to create the post of High Commissioner for Human Rights. One element of the High Commissioner's mandate is to promote the universal respect for and observance of all human rights.
- 8. With respect to the implementation of the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action adopted by the World Conference on Human Rights, activities are being carried out to achieve universal ratification of the major international human rights instruments. In this connection, on the occasion of official contacts with Member States which have not yet ratified or acceded to the various instruments mentioned in the Sub-Commission resolutions, the Secretary-General, the High Commissioner for Human Rights and the Assistant Secretary-General for Human Rights have repeatedly urged States to do so and have offered the assistance of the United Nations in overcoming any special difficulties in that regard.

- 9. Moreover, the representatives of States not yet parties to international human rights instruments who have attended the various regional and subregional human rights seminars and training courses organized by the Centre and other United Nations organs and agencies, have been strongly encouraged to promote ratification of or accession to those instruments by their Governments.
- 10. Pursuant to resolution 1992/1 of the Sub-Commission, the Secretary-General submits, in the annex to the present note, a table containing a record of developments which have taken place in connection with the ratification of or accession or succession to human rights instruments since the submission of the previous note by the Secretary-General on Encouragement of universal acceptance of human rights instruments (E/CN.4/Sub.2/1992/27) to the forty-second session of the Sub-Commission.
