## Existing conference resources, facilities and services within the United Nations

#### Report of the Secretary-General

#### I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. At its substantive session of 1993, the Committee on Conferences took note of the information presented in the report of the Secretary-General on existing conference resources, services and facilities within the United Nations system (A/AC.172/152). It requested the Secretariat to provide further analysis, including data on the level of the staff posts listed in the report, the nature of the meetings convened, capacity utilization and comparative costs of meetings in New York, Geneva and Vienna and further information on facilities provided free of charge by Governments or organizations within and outside the United Nations system. The information contained in the present report and its annex was prepared in response to that request. It was drawn from the replies received from the secretariats at United Nations offices, including the regional commissions, and the secretariats of the specialized agencies of the United Nations. Information received after the publication of the present report will be issued in an addendum.
- 2. Moreover, in paragraph 16 of its resolution 48/222 A, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General, as Chairman of the Administrative Committee on Coordination (ACC), through the established mechanism of the Inter-Agency Meeting on Language Arrangements, Documentation and Publications (IAMLADP), to enhance system-wide coordination of conference activities, including coordination of meeting schedules, with a view to optimizing the use of available conference services, resources and facilities, with due regard to

quality, and making possible the effective participation of Member States, and to report on the results achieved to the Assembly at its fiftieth session, through the Committee on Conferences. The information requested by the Assembly in the aforementioned resolution is also contained in the present report.

#### II. CONFERENCE FACILITIES AT UNITED NATIONS OFFICES

#### A. <u>Headquarters</u>, New York

3. As the data in the annex indicate, facilities at Headquarters comprise 15 rooms equipped for simultaneous interpretation, and 5 rooms without interpretation facilities. Six large conference rooms have sufficient capacity to accommodate meetings of the full membership of the United Nations (General Assembly Hall, Trusteeship Council Chamber and conference rooms 1, 2, 3 and 4). The remaining rooms, conference rooms 5, 6, 5/6, 7, 8, 9, 10, the Economic and Social Council Chamber and the Security Council Chamber and Consultation Room, can accommodate from 17 to 130 representatives at table. Under Article 28 of the Charter of the United Nations, the "Security Council shall be so organized as to be able to function continuously". The Security Council Chamber and Consultation Room are consequently at the disposal of the Security Council alone.

#### B. <u>United Nations Office at Geneva</u>

- 4. The United Nations Office at Geneva has 21 conference rooms equipped for simultaneous interpretation, including 10 rooms in the old Palais and 11 in the new wing. Six of those rooms have sufficient capacity to accommodate full-membership meetings. In addition, there are four rooms without interpretation facilities.
- 5. In general, meetings whose secretariat is located in the old Palais and that can be accommodated in smaller conference rooms are assigned to conference rooms in the old Palais. Meetings whose size and nature are such that the Council Chamber, adjacent caucus rooms and offices provide ideal facilities from operational and security points of view, are similarly assigned to the old Palais. Lastly, the old Palais is the venue for conferences requiring the Assembly Hall (the largest room) and a number of smaller rooms, including caucus rooms without interpretation facilities, and whose methods of work require large servicing secretariats and numerous servicing offices immediately around the Assembly Hall.

#### C. <u>United Nations Office at Vienna</u>

6. The Vienna International Centre has five conference rooms equipped for simultaneous interpretation and two rooms without interpretation facilities. The Boardroom, which is the largest conference room at the Centre, and Conference Rooms I and II, are equipped with flexible seating that makes it possible to adjust from lecture to other configurations. Moreover, it is possible to arrange the seating in the Boardroom to accommodate full-membership

meetings with up to 200 representatives at table. In that case, however, there is no provision for advisers.

7. There is no permanent seating configuration at the Austria Conference Centre (see sect. VI.B below), which makes it possible to accommodate nearly a dozen full-membership meetings with simultaneous interpretation.

#### D. <u>United Nations Office at Nairobi</u>

8. The United Nations Office at Nairobi has at its disposal seven conference rooms equipped for simultaneous interpretation and one room without interpretation facilities. The seating in rooms 1, 2 and 3/4 is sufficient to accommodate full-membership meetings.

#### E. Economic Commission for Africa

9. The Plenary Hall and four Committee Rooms at the Economic Commission for Africa (ECA) can accommodate from 40 to 84 representatives at table and are equipped for simultaneous interpretation. While the facilities are not currently adequate for the convening of full-membership meetings, the construction of new facilities at the Commission should make it possible to do so by 1996.

#### F. <u>Economic Commission for Europe</u>

10. The conference-servicing requirements of the Economic Commission for Europe (ECE) are met by the common services of the United Nations Office at Geneva.

#### G. Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean

11. The Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) has three conference rooms equipped for simultaneous interpretation, with a total capacity of up to 691 seats. None of the rooms, however, has sufficient capacity for full-membership meetings.

#### H. Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific

12. The Economic and Social Commission for Asia and the Pacific (ESCAP) has five conference rooms equipped for simultaneous interpretation, with a total capacity of 1,856 seats. ESCAP Hall, which can accommodate 208 representatives at table, has sufficient capacity for full-membership meetings.

#### I. Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia

13. Pending relocation to Beirut, the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA) has been convening meetings in hotels in Amman or elsewhere in the region.

#### III. LEVEL OF STAFF POSTS

14. Information on the number of permanent conference staff by category, including the level of staff posts, is contained in the annex to the present report.

#### IV. NATURE OF THE MEETINGS CONVENED

- 15. In broad terms, meetings within the United Nations system consist primarily of intergovernmental, legislatively mandated bodies and expert groups. Meetings of regional groups and other informal meetings convened by Member States, as well as consultations among non-governmental organizations (NGOs), too account for considerable utilization of conference rooms, although in most instances such meetings and consultations are not provided with conference services. Moreover, the secretariats within the system hold meetings under their programmes of work, including lectures, workshops, seminars, symposiums, training courses, examinations, press conferences and meetings concerning daily operations.
- 16. In addition, facilities are used for technical meetings organized by government institutions, external agencies and universities, study groups and international congresses. Lastly, in some cases, the premises are used for fund-raising events, concerts and other cultural events, films and video presentations and community activities.

#### V. CAPACITY UTILIZATION

#### A. Meeting rooms

- 17. The following methodology was used to compute capacity utilization of meeting rooms in New York, Geneva, Vienna and Nairobi in 1994. First, the number of conference rooms was multiplied by two (i.e. 2 meetings a day). Secondly, the product was multiplied by five (i.e. 5 days a week). Thirdly, the resulting product was multiplied by 52 (i.e. 52 weeks a year). The final product represents the notional capacity of the location in question. Lastly, the total number of official and unofficial meetings held in 1994 was divided by the notional capacity figure. The result is the office's actual capacity utilization expressed as a percentage.
- 18. The number of meeting rooms used to compute capacity utilization in New York was 18 rather than 20, as the Security Council Chamber and Consultation Room are reserved for meetings of that organ. The capacity utilization figure of 109 per cent for 1994 was calculated as follows:

- (1) 18 x 2 = 36
- (2) 36 x 5 = 180
- (3)  $180 \times 52 = 9,360/year$  (notional capacity)
- (4) 10,188/9,360 = 109% (actual capacity utilization in New York)
- 19. With regard to Geneva, the capacity utilization figure of 56 per cent for 1994 was calculated as follows:
  - (1) 25 x 2 = 50
  - (2) 50 x 5 = 250
  - (3)  $250 \times 52 = 13,000 \text{ (notional capacity)}$
  - (4) 7,284/13,000 = 56% (actual capacity utilization at Geneva)
- 20. For Vienna, the capacity utilization figure of 36 per cent for 1994 was calculated as follows:
  - (1) 7 x 2 = 14
  - (2) 14 x 5 = 70
  - (3)  $70 \times 52 = 3,640$  (notional capacity)
  - (4) 1,312/3,640 = 36% (actual capacity utilization at Vienna)
- 21. Regarding Nairobi, the capacity utilization figure of 4 per cent for 1994 was calculated as follows:
  - (1) 8 x 2 = 16
  - (2) 16 x 5 = 80
  - (3)  $80 \times 52 = 4,160$  (notional capacity)
  - (4) 182/4,160 = 4% (actual capacity utilization at Nairobi)

#### B. Translation

- 22. The annual translation capacity of the permanent staff of the six translation services in New York can be calculated by using the following variables:
- (a) Average number of pages of revised translation produced per staff member;
  - (b) Number of staff (translators and revisers);
- (c) Time spent on activities other than translation, such as préciswriting and terminological research.
- 23. The number of permanent translators/revisers in the services is 302, and on the basis of statistics covering the period from 1992 to 1994, the other variables are estimated as follows:

- (a) Daily average number of pages of revised translation per staff member: 4.6;
  - (b) Time spent on non-translation activities: 18 per cent.
- 24. It should be noted that the above-mentioned overall productivity rate of 4.6 pages assumes that 60 per cent of the work is being done on a self-revision basis, and reflects the following current productivity rates by specific activity:
- (a) Productivity of translators doing self-revision: 5.25 pages a day (as compared to the workload standard of 4.25);
- (b) Translators doing translation only, subject to subsequent revision:5.4 pages a day (as compared to the workload standard of 5 pages);
- (c) Revisers: 15.2 pages a day (as compared with the workload standard of 15 pages).
- 25. On that basis, the annual capacity of the permanent staff in the six language services can be calculated as follows:
  - 4.6 pages x 302 staff x 210 working days  $\underline{a}$  / x 82% time spent on translation = 239,200 pages

#### C. <u>Interpretation</u>

27. The following methodology was used to compute capacity utilization of interpretation in New York. Given that there are 120 permanent staff interpreters, there is an ideal notional capacity of 70 meetings a week, assuming that all interpreters are present, which is not usually the case, owing to authorized staff leaves. In order to take account of such absences, the ideal notional weekly capacity was multiplied by 42. The product represents the notional annual capacity of interpretation resources in New York. Then, the actual number of meetings held in 1994 was divided by the notional annual

That figure stands against an actual translation output of 338,400 pages recorded in 1994. The difference, or 41,100 pages, representing 13.8 per cent of the established capacity, corresponds to the estimated output of temporary assistance staff in 1994.

capacity. The result is the actual capacity utilization for interpretation at Headquarters expressed as a percentage.

- 28. The capacity utilization figure of 127 per cent for 1994 was calculated as follows:
  - (1) 70 x 42 = 2,940 (Notional annual interpretation capacity)
  - (2) 3,730/2,940 = 127%
- 29. It should be noted that the notional annual interpretation capacity of 2,940 meetings assumes an even distribution of meetings over the year. In practice, however, there are some weeks when no sessions are scheduled, such as the last week of December and the first week of January, and other weeks when the number of meetings scheduled may be as high as 100. The actual proportion of temporary assistance is thus higher than the figure of 27 per cent shown.
- 30. If the Committee deems it to be useful, the same methodologies could be applied to determine interpretation and translation capacity at Geneva and Vienna.

#### VI. FACILITIES PROVIDED FREE OF CHARGE

#### A. <u>Switzerland</u>

- 31. On 9 December 1978, the Permanent Observer of Switzerland to the United Nations informed the Fifth Committee that the Government of Switzerland had decided, subject to parliamentary approval, to put the Geneva International Conference Centre at the disposal of the United Nations and the specialized agencies free of charge (see A/C.5/33/SR.65, para.16). Subsequently, in a letter dated 1 April 1980, the Permanent Observer of Switzerland informed the Secretary-General that, having obtained the approval of the Swiss Parliament, the Swiss Federal authorities had decided that the offer should become effective as from 1 April 1980 until further notice. The offer pertains to the use of the Centre and its facilities, including a certain number of parking places, as well as to costs incurred in connection with the normal use of the facilities, such as utilities, heating, air-conditioning and maintenance (see A/AC.172/INF.3). Users will, however, be expected to pay any additional costs, including printing, office supplies and the hiring of secretariat personnel, including interpreters.
- 32. The Geneva International Conference Centre is administered by the Foundation for the Premises of International Organizations (FIPOI), which was set up by the Confederation and the Canton of Geneva. In order to provide the most effective service possible to the users of the Centre and to facilitate management of the Centre, FIPOI regularly convenes, under its own auspices, a Coordination and Liaison Committee comprising those beneficiaries that are permanently entitled to use the Centre free of charge. The assignment of conference rooms, which is the responsibility of FIPOI alone, is carried out in the light of the discussions of the said Committee and with due regard for the

order of priority laid down by the Swiss authorities and the order in which requests are received.

#### B. <u>Austria</u>

In a note verbale dated 23 October 1985 addressed to the United Nations Office at Vienna, the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA) and the United Nations Industrial Development Organization (UNIDO), the Federal Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Austria stated that the Austrian Government had decided to place at the disposal of the international organizations based at the Vienna International Centre, i.e. the United Nations, IAEA and UNIDO, conference facilities at the Austria Conference Centre free of charge for meetings that cannot be accommodated in the conference facilities of the Vienna International Centre. That offer includes personnel required for the technical operation of the Austria Conference Centre facilities, as well as the cost of heating, normal cleaning and electricity. It is based on the assumption that the international organizations will plan and service their meetings primarily at and from the Vienna International Centre, and use Austria Conference Centre facilities only to the extent that additional conference rooms or facilities are required. That note verbale was transmitted to the Secretary-General in a note verbale dated 11 November 1985 from the Permanent Representative of Austria to the United Nations (see A/AC.172/INF/6).

#### C. Organizations within and outside the United Nations system

34. At the present time, facilities are not provided free of charge by any other organizations within or outside the United Nations system.

#### VII. SYSTEM-WIDE COORDINATION OF CONFERENCE ACTIVITIES

- 35. In accordance with paragraph 4 (f) of General Assembly resolution 43/222 B of 21 December 1988 on the status of the Committee on Conferences, the terms of reference of the Committee include making "recommendations, as appropriate, to the General Assembly on means to ensure an improved coordination of conferences within the United Nations system, including conference services and facilities, and to conduct the appropriate consultations in that regard".
- 36. The Committee examined the method of work to be followed in order to implement the particular component of its mandate at its substantive session in August 1989. It decided to request the Secretary-General, in his capacity as Chairman of ACC, to provide comments on the subject, as well as information on present or envisaged practical arrangements in the area.
- 37. In October 1989, the Organizational Committee of ACC decided to refer the matter to IAMLADP. On the basis of these two decisions, since 1989 IAMLADP has been the forum where questions relating to the system-wide coordination of conferences have been discussed at the secretariat level.

- 38. IAMLADP dealt with this subject in 1990, 1991, 1992 and 1994, and the Committee on Conferences in 1991 and 1993. The information contained in the present report brings to the attention of the Committee and the Assembly the results of the discussion on the subject by IAMLADP in 1994.
- 39. The objectives spelled out by the General Assembly in its resolution 48/222 A, i.e. (a) enhancing system-wide coordination, (b) optimizing the use of services, resources and facilities, with due regard to quality and (c) making possible the effective participation of Member States, were brought to the attention of IAMLADP in 1994.
- 40. In connection with the enhancement of system-wide coordination, participants reiterated the view already expressed on previous occasions that, in the field of meetings planning and scheduling, even if greater coordination could in theory be a highly desirable goal, since it could, for instance, alleviate problems of recruitment of temporary staff, it was very difficult to change the traditional meeting dates and patterns of each organization, the determination of which each governing body considered to be its exclusive prerogative. Reporting requirements between subsidiary and principal organs within each organization were also relevant considerations.
- 41. A higher degree of coordination in that field could therefore only take the form of a more complete and rapid exchange among agencies of information on the decisions taken by their respective governing bodies. In that connection, in September 1995, IAMLADP will consider the establishment and updating of a system-wide calendar of conferences using electronic communications facilities that would supplement the existing conventional systems, under which detailed information exchange is a standard procedure among agencies that are located in the same city and which frequently share physical facilities and staff resources. Once operational, the new system-wide calendar would as a matter of course be available to Member States.
- 42. A significant development at the 1994 IAMLADP was the fact that two agencies the International Labour Organization (ILO) and the World Health Organization (WHO) reported that the sessions of their governing bodies had been shortened, and that a third agency, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), indicated that it was in the process of reviewing the duration of all its main meetings, with a view to shortening them.
- 43. The note by the Secretariat submitted to the Committee on Conferences in 1993 (A/AC.172/1993/CRP.3) contained information on the coordination already well established at the local level at Geneva, Vienna, Rome and Washington, in connection with both the scheduling of important meetings and the arrangements for cost-effective sharing of conference staff. In 1994, the representative of ECA informed IAMLADP that the same coordination aimed at the most economical use of staff resources was in place between ECA and the Organization of African Unity (OAU) and the African Development Bank (AfDB).
- 44. In connection with the question of ensuring optimum use of services, resources and facilities, participants in IAMLADP, in 1994 and in previous years, have discussed in detail and endeavoured to improve the arrangements that have long been in place for the sharing of physical facilities and staff,

depending on the fluctuations in demand for services in different organizations. These arrangements were brought to the attention of the Committee on Conferences when it last considered the question of system-wide coordination in 1993 (A/AC.172/1993/CRP.3).

- 45. The arrangements in question have been used quite routinely among organizations located in the same city. In addition, loans and other exchanges of permanent staff on a reimbursable basis, even among organizations not located in the same duty station, mostly of interpreters, have continued to take place, when capacity has been available and when it has not been feasible to resort to such other more cost-effective measures as the recruitment of local free-lance staff. None the less, at certain times of the year organizations of the United Nations system must compete among themselves and with other international organizations to secure the services of qualified free-lance staff, in particular interpreters, to be recruited on a temporary-assistance basis. This situation, however, has not prevented the servicing of meetings on the dates selected by governing bodies, although it has strained the permanent and temporary staff.
- 46. Also with the aim of promoting optimum use of services and resources, the organizations participating in IAMLADP have agreed that the exchanges of workload in all areas of documentation-processing (editing, translation, text-processing and reproduction) already taking place among duty stations within the United Nations should be undertaken system-wide, if at any time in the future spare capacity is available in any organization.
- 47. An inter-agency working group is considering methods to improve practices in the translation process, including training, means for measuring productivity and use of contractual services. Specific recommendations have been addressed to all participating organizations on the promotion and advertizing of publications produced in the system. Common guidelines and criteria are being developed for the selection of material for dissemination on electronic media, including questions of pricing and copyright policies. The use of new technologies for assigning interpreters to meeting, and in the fields of translation, desktop publishing, reproduction and distribution is promoted and relevant experience is exchanged.
- 48. Discussions in IAMLADP have not brought to light any instances in which the effective participation of Member States in meetings of bodies of the United Nations system has been prevented by problems that could have been solved through system-wide coordination measures at the secretariat level. Although difficulties have been experienced in this connection, they seem to be more the result of the total number of meetings that Member States decide to hold than of gaps in coordination.
- 49. In view of the value placed by Member States on conference services as a means of intergovernmental communication and of the considerable amount of resources devoted to such services by the organizations of the United Nations system, the continued existence of a satisfactory degree of system-wide coordination seems essential. At the secretariat level, it is intended to continue using the IAMLADP mechanism for this purpose.

50. If the Committee so decides, the system-wide coordination of conferences could be taken up on a biennial basis. In addition to any specific subject the Committee may wish to discuss, the activities of IAMLADP would be brought to its

#### IX. ECONOMIC AND SOCIAL COMMISSION FOR WESTERN ASIA

#### A. Conference facilities and equipment

While the Government of Iraq is the present host of the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA), the Government of Jordan has been hosting ESCWA on a temporary basis since August 1991. The conferences and meetings of the Commission have been convened in hotels in Amman or elsewhere in the region.

In its resolution 1993/3 of 2 February 1993 the Economic and Social Council requested the Executive Secretary of the Commission to take the necessary measures to study the requests submitted by the Government of Lebanon and the Government of Jordan, as well as any other request that might be received from any State member of the Commission regarding the transfer and hosting of the permanent headquarters of the Commission.

Taking into account the report of the Executive Secretary submitted to the Commission at its seventeenth session held in Amman from 29 to 31 May 1994, and pursuant to resolution 192 (XVI) as well as the debate conducted and procedures followed in the closed meeting of the heads of delegation for the selection of the host country of the permanent headquarters, ESCWA, having considered and subsequently accepted the offer of the Government of Lebanon, decided to recommend to the Economic and Social Council that the permanent headquarters of the Commission be relocated to Beirut.
