STRENGTHENING OF THE COORDINATION OF HUMANITARIAN AND DISASTER RELIEF ASSISTANCE OF THE UNITED NATIONS, INCLUDING SPECIAL ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE: SPECIAL ECONOMIC ASSISTANCE TO INDIVIDUAL COUNTRIES OR REGIONS

Burundi, Ethiopia and Sudan: draft resolution

Special emergency assistance for the economic recovery and reconstruction of Burundi

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolutions 48/17 of 3 November 1993, 49/7 of 25 October 1994 and 49/21 C of 2 December 1994,

<u>Having considered</u> the report of the Secretary-General, 1/2

<u>Considering</u> that Burundi continues to face a social and political crisis that has existed since October 1993 and whose adverse effects are endangering the national economy, as evidenced by the destruction of economic and social infrastructures, declining production and trade and, as a result, shrinking public revenue,

<u>Concerned</u> at the acts of sabotage perpetrated by armed bands with a view to stifling the national economy, in particular by paralysing the movement of persons, goods and services and by destroying energy infrastructures,

Recognizing that the coalition Government that emerged from the Convention on Governance $\underline{2}/$ is making efforts to redress the situation through its plan of action of March 1995,

<u>Convinced</u> that the country has the capacity to achieve appreciable economic results, particularly through its structural adjustment programme, and that an improved economic situation contributes to the consolidation of peace,

Bearing in mind, however, that, in view of Burundi's inadequate economic and financial resources, the continued and increased assistance of the international community is still essential for the implementation of the plans and programmes of the Government,

- 1. <u>Expresses its gratitude</u> to all States, United Nations institutions and intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations that responded favourably to the appeal made at the forty-ninth session;
- 2. <u>Invites once again</u> all States, United Nations institutions and intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations to continue to provide Burundi with economic, financial, material and technical assistance for economic recovery and for the reconstruction of the various infrastructures destroyed or damaged during the crisis;
- 3. <u>Encourages</u> the donor community, particularly those donors that still have reservations regarding tied aid, to make their contribution to the economic recovery and reconstruction of Burundi;
- 4. Requests the Secretary-General, in close cooperation with the Secretary-General of the Organization of African Unity, to coordinate the activities being implemented by the United Nations system to meet the needs of the people of Burundi adequately and to mobilize the assistance of the international community;
- 5. <u>Calls upon</u> the Secretary-General to report to the General Assembly at its fifty-first session on the implementation of the present resolution;
- 6. <u>Decides</u> to consider at its fifty-first session the question of special emergency assistance for the economic recovery and reconstruction of Burundi.
