CALENDAR OF CONFERENCES AND MEETINGS: IMPROVED UTILIZATION
OF CONFERENCE-SERVICING RESOURCES: MEETING STATISTICS OF
UNITED NATIONS ORGANS

Report of the Secretary-General

1. Annex I to the present document contains statistical data on the planned and actual utilization of conference resources allocated to a core sample of bodies that met in 1994, compiled in accordance with the experimental methodology adopted as final by the Committee on Conferences at its 348th meeting, on 18 May 1993. The data include compliance and availability indices for assessing compliance with the deadlines for the submission of pre-session documentation and availability of such documentation for New York- and Vienna-based bodies, which were proposed by the Committee on Conferences at its substantive session of 1992. As the Documentation Records, Information and Tracking System (DRITS) has only recently been set up at Geneva, the data needed to compute the two indices for Geneva-based bodies will be available only for sessions beginning in 1995.
2. Annex II contains an analysis of the statistics, including the overall and average utilization factors, and a breakdown in terms of percentages of the meetings ratio and planning accuracy factor of the bodies in the sample.
3. It should be noted that, pursuant to a request made by the Committee at its 369th meeting, on 24 August 1994, the core sample has been expanded to include the Main Committees of the General Assembly and the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions. In general, the bodies in the sample meet on a regular basis, and it may be assumed that their performance is a reflection of United Nations organs as a whole. Clearly, however, such measures as the utilization factor can depend on particulars that do not apply to all United Nations bodies.



4. In accordance with decisions of the Committee on Conferences, the time utilized for informal meetings or consultations held before the start or after the adjournment of officially scheduled meetings is not included as time lost due to late starting or early ending of meetings.

5. An explanation of column headings that appear in the annexes follows:

- A Number of meetings planned by a given organ in a scheduled session, not including any additional meetings;
- B Number of additional meetings held during the session;
- C Number of meetings cancelled during the session;
- D Number of meetings actually held;
- E Number of unrelated reassignments;
- F Amount of time lost owing to late starting and early ending (hours/minutes);
- MR Meeting ratio, calculated as meetings held as a percentage of meetings available to a given body (D as a percentage of A);
- PAF Planning accuracy factor, calculated as meetings planned, minus additional meetings, minus cancellations, all as a percentage of meetings planned (A minus B minus C as a percentage of A);
- UF Utilization factor, the percentage of available conference resources actually used by the organ in question. The utilization factor is based on the following calculation:

$$\frac{(A+B) - (C-E) - F/3}{(A+B)} = UF$$

In the foregoing calculation, the total number of hours lost as a result of late starting and early ending is converted into the equivalent of meetings lost by dividing the total by three, as the standard meeting time is three hours. The number of unrelated assignments is subtracted from the number of cancelled meetings. The difference between the two and the number of meetings lost are then subtracted from the sum of meetings planned and additional meetings held. The result is expressed as a percentage of the sum of meetings planned and additional meetings held.

- CI Compliance index, calculated as the percentage of pre-session documentation issued in accordance with the six-week rule;
- AI Availability index, calculated as the actual rate of delivery presented on a week-by-week basis.

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6. Pursuant to a further request made by the Committee on Conferences at its 367th meeting, on 23 August 1994, annex III to the present report contains a synoptic table by sector of meetings held during the bienniums 1992-1993 and 1994-1995 (using estimates for 1995), including expenditures for conference services provided, as well as a breakdown of meeting services and documentation expenditures.

1. The overall utilization factor for 1994 was 82 per cent. It is computed by totalling the data in the six columns for all bodies in the three locations and treating them as if they reflected a single body, as follows:

2. The overall utilization factor for 1994 shows a loss of 2 per cent against the same factor for 1993 (84 per cent), as reported in paragraph 1 of document A/AC.172/157.

3. The average utilization factor for 1994 was 82 per cent. It is computed by totalling the utilization factors of each body under review at each session held during a given year and dividing that figure by the number of sessions held (i.e., in 1994, 6,204/76). The average utilization factors for the period from 1985 to 1993 were as follows:

4. The study indicates an upward trend in utilization over the past decade, with some exceptions from 1988 to 1990 and a slight loss in 1994. On the whole, the bodies under review are exceeding the benchmark figures of 75 per cent and 80 per cent utilization adopted by the Committee on Conferences in 1983 and 1993, respectively.

5. The utilization factors for the bodies in the sample for the period from 1992 to 1994 are presented below in tabular form for comparison purposes:

6. In 1992 and 1993, 10 per cent of the bodies in the sample fell in the lowest range of 0-54 per cent utilization. In 1994, only 2 per cent of the bodies fell in the lowest range of 0-49 per cent utilization. In 1992 and 1993, 20 per cent of the bodies used 55 to 74 per cent of their resources. In 1994, 36 per cent of the bodies used 50 to 79 per cent of their resources. As to compliance with the benchmark, in 1992 and 1993, 62 per cent and 77 per cent of the bodies, respectively, utilized 75 per cent or more of their conference-servicing resources; in 1994, 62 per cent of the bodies had a utilization factor of 80 per cent or higher.

9. Thus, in 1994, 7 per cent of the bodies in the sample had meeting ratios below 80 per cent; 93 per cent had meeting ratios above 80 per cent. Seventy-two per cent of the bodies had meeting ratios of 90 per cent or higher.

11. Thus, in 1994, 28 per cent of the bodies had planning accuracy factors below 80 per cent; 72 per cent had factors above 80 per cent. Fifty-eight per cent of the bodies had planning accuracy factors of 90 to 100 per cent.

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Annex III

SYNOPTIC REPORT ON MEETINGS HELD DURING
THE BIENNIUMS 1992-1993 AND 1994-1995

1. At its substantive session of 1994, the Committee on Conferences requested the Secretariat to submit to the General Assembly at its fiftieth session, through the Committee on Conferences, a synoptic table by sector of meetings held during the bienniums 1992-1993 and 1994-1995 (using projections for the second half of 1995), including the notional cost of conference services provided, as well as a breakdown of meeting services and documentation costs. 1/
2. The present annex is submitted in compliance with the aforementioned request. It contains actual data on conference services provided in New York for the years 1992, 1993 and 1994. Estimates for 1995 are also included; they comprise actual data for the first half of the year and projections for the second half. The projections are based on the assumption that, for each element in table 3 below, the proportion of the annual workload to be done in the second half of the current year will be the same as the proportion done in the second half of 1994.
3. The breakdown of the information by sector is based primarily on the principal organs of the United Nations, i.e., the General Assembly, the Security Council, the Economic and Social Council, the Trusteeship Council and the Secretariat, as follows:
 - (a) Sector A includes the General Assembly, its Main Committees and subsidiary bodies, except those related to disarmament, outer space affairs and decolonization;
 - (b) Sector B includes the Security Council and its subsidiary bodies, as well as bodies related to disarmament and outer space affairs;
 - (c) Sector C includes the Economic and Social Council, its functional commissions and subsidiary bodies, as well as other organs active in the economic and social fields, mainly the governing bodies of the United Nations Development Programme and the United Nations Children's Fund;
 - (d) Sector D includes the Trusteeship Council and the Special Committee on the Situation with regard to the Implementation of the Declaration on the Granting of Independence to Colonial Countries and Peoples;
 - (e) Sector E includes special conferences, their preparatory machinery and certain bodies established as a result of such conferences, like the Preparatory Commission for the International Seabed Authority and the International Tribunal for the Law of the Sea, as well as the International Seabed Authority itself. Services provided in connection with the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development, the Global Conference on the Sustainable Development of Small Island Developing States, the International Conference on Population and Development, the United Nations Conference on Straddling Fish Stocks and Highly Migratory Fish Stocks, the World Summit for Social Development

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and the Fourth World Conference on Women, for example, are included in this category;

(f) Sector F includes services provided as a result of standing mandates of the Secretariat or at its initiative. As far as meetings services are concerned, this category includes mainly meetings of representatives of countries contributing troops to peace-keeping operations and press conferences convened by the Secretary-General or the Department of Public Information. In the fields of translation, text-processing and reproduction, the highest volumes of work are accounted for by public information materials, administrative issuances, official correspondence, Dag Hammarskjöld Library publications, the Journal of the United Nations and treaties deposited with the Secretary-General;

(g) Sector G includes meetings of the regional groups and other intergovernmental meetings other than meetings of United Nations bodies, for example, meetings of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries and the Group of 77.

4. In tables 1, 2 and 3 below, the data on the number of meetings include those meetings, both formal and informal, that were provided with interpretation services. The other categories of services are self-explanatory. Services for which a sectoral breakdown is not available are excluded (central management, planning and control, reference and terminology, editing, copy preparation, proofreading and distribution).

5. In order to meet the request of the Committee on Conferences to be provided with a breakdown of meeting services and documentation costs, the actual expenditures incurred by Conference Services in New York during the biennium 1992-1993 and during 1994 were used. Total expenditures, covering all functions performed by the staff of Conference Services, including management, were broken down into two main categories: (a) meeting, interpretation and verbatim reporting services; and (b) documentation services. Expenditures under each category were then apportioned among the seven sectors (A-G), using the percentage distribution among sectors of the number of meetings, for category (a), and of the translation/revision workload, for category (b).

6. The resulting distribution of expenditures, therefore, gives an indication of the share of total resources claimed by each sector in all areas of conference servicing activities (see tables 4 and 5 below).
