ELECTIONS, NOMINATIONS AND APPOINTMENTS

Election of 11 members of the Executive Board of the United
Nations Development Programme/United Nations Population Fund

Note by the Secretary-General

1. By resolution 48/162 of 20 December 1993, the General Assembly decided that the Governing Council of the United Nations Development Programme/United Nations Population Fund should be transformed into an Executive Board, and that the Executive Board should have 36 members, to be elected with due regard to equitable geographical representation and other relevant factors with a view to ensuring the most effective and broadest representation.
2. At its resumed organizational session for 1996, the Council will have to elect 11 members of the Executive Board from among States Members of the United Nations or members of the specialized agencies or of the International Atomic Energy Agency, for a three-year term beginning on 1 January 1997, to fill the vacancies that will occur on 31 December 1996 upon the expiration of the terms of the following members: Bangladesh, Belgium, Denmark, Japan, Morocco, Pakistan, Peru, Poland, Portugal, Sierra Leone, Trinidad and Tobago.
3. The 11 members will be elected on the following basis:
 - (a) Two members from African States;
 - (b) Two members from Asian States;
 - (c) One member from Eastern European States;

(d) Two members from Latin American and Caribbean States;

(e) Four members from Western European and other States.
