Election of members of the International Narcotics Control Board under the provisions of article 9, paragraph 1 (b), of the Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs, 1961, as amended by the 1972 Protocol

Note by the Secretary-General

Election of five members from candidates nominated by Governments

- 1. The Secretary-General informed the Economic and Social Council, at its organizational session for 1996, of the conditions under which the forthcoming election of members to the International Narcotics Control Board would be held. The present note contains information on candidates nominated by Governments. Information on candidates nominated by the World Health Organization is contained in document E/1996/54.
- 2. In accordance with established procedure, the Secretary-General, in a note dated 7 August 1995 (NAR/CL.18/1995), invited States Members of the United Nations and those States parties to the Single Convention on Narcotic Drugs of 1961 as amended by the 1972 Protocol 1/ which were not members of the United Nations to propose candidates with a view to filling the five posts which would become vacant on 1 March 1997 on the expiration of the term of office of five members of the International Narcotics Control Board who had originally been nominated by Governments. The five posts are currently occupied by Dil Jan Khan (Pakistan), Gottfried Machata (Austria), Bunsom Martin (Thailand), Herbert S. Okun (United States) and Manuel Quijano (Mexico).
