OF ARGENTINA ADDRESSED TO THE SECRETARIAT OF THE CONFERENCE ON
DISARMAMENT TRANSMITTING A POSITION PAPER OF THE ARGENTINE
REPUBLIC ON THE COMPREHENSIVE NUCLEAR-TEST-BAN TREATY

The Permanent Mission of the Argentine Republic to the international organizations in Geneva presents its compliments to the secretariat of the Conference on Disarmament and has the honour to request that the following position paper of the Argentine Republic on the comprehensive nuclear-test-ban treaty, which has been circulated as a document of the General Assembly, should be distributed as an official document of the Conference on Disarmament.

"Position paper of the Argentine Republic

"With the end of the cold war, non-proliferation, disarmament and arms control have acquired renewed importance in the 'Agenda for Peace', and there is now a unique opportunity to ensure that multilateral efforts are not frustrated.

"The Argentine Republic has taken an active part in the negotiation of the comprehensive nuclear-test-ban treaty, because it firmly believes that the conclusion of such a treaty not only would help to prevent nuclear proliferation, but also would expedite the process of nuclear disarmament.

"The Argentine Republic strongly supports the adoption of the comprehensive nuclear-test-ban treaty at the fiftieth session of the General Assembly. That calls for a genuine political will and a firm commitment on the part of all the members of the international community.

"In this regard, the Argentine Republic has decided to co-sponsor the draft resolution on this item submitted by Australia, and urges States which have not yet done so to join this initiative as soon as possible.

"The Argentine Republic is convinced that the conclusion of the comprehensive nuclear-test-ban treaty would be a crucial event in fostering international trust, because it would strengthen the growing conviction that nuclear weapons are of no use for the security of nations, and would facilitate the future agenda and the negotiation of other multilateral measures regarding disarmament, non-proliferation and arms control."
