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AFRICAN NUCLEAR-WEAPON-FREE ZONE TREATY

Burundi*: draft resolution

The African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone Treaty (Treaty of Pelindaba)

The General Assembly,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 50/78 of 12 December 1995 and all its other relevant resolutions, as well as those of the Organization of African Unity,

Noting and welcoming with satisfaction the successful conclusion of the signing ceremony of the African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone Treaty (Treaty of Pelindaba)that took place in Cairo on 11 April 1996,

<u>Recalling</u> the Cairo Declaration adopted on that occasion which emphasized that nuclear-weapon-free zones, especially in regions of tension, such as the Middle East, enhance global peace and security,

<u>Noting with satisfaction</u> the statement made by the President of the Security Council on behalf of the members of the Council on 12 April 1996, $\underline{1}/$ which stated that the signature of the African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone Treaty constitutes an important contribution by the African countries to the maintenance of international peace and security,

<u>Considering</u> that the establishment of nuclear-weapon-free zones, especially in the Middle East, would enhance the security of Africa and the viability of the African nuclear-weapon-free zone,

<u>Bearing in mind</u> resolution CM/RES 1660 (LXIV) on expediting the process of ratification of the Treaty of Pelindaba, adopted by the Council of Ministers of the Organization of African Unity at is Sixty-fourth Ordinary Session, held at Yaoundé from 1 to 5 July 1996,

1. <u>Calls upon</u> African States to sign and ratify the African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone Treaty as soon as possible so that the Treaty can enter into force without delay;

2. <u>Expresses appreciation</u> to the international community and in particular to the nuclear-weapon States which have signed the Protocols that concern them, and calls upon them to ratify the Protocols as soon as possible;

3. <u>Calls upon</u> the States contemplated in Protocol III to the Treaty to take all necessary measures to ensure the speedy application of the Treaty to territories for which they are, <u>de jure</u> or de facto, internationally responsible and which lie within the limits of the geographical zone established in the Treaty;

4. <u>Also calls upon</u> the African States parties to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons which have not yet concluded comprehensive safeguards agreements with the International Atomic Energy Agency pursuant to the Non-Proliferation Treaty to do so, thereby satisfying the requirements of Article 9(<u>b</u>) and Annex II of the Treaty of Pelindaba when it enters into force;

5. <u>Expresses its profound gratitude</u> to the Secretary-General for the diligence with which he has rendered effective assistance to the signatories to the African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone Treaty in accordance with resolution 50/78 of 12 December 1995;

6. <u>Also expresses its gratitude</u> to the Secretary-General of the Organization of African Unity and the Director General of the International Atomic Energy Agency for the diligence with which they have rendered effective assistance to the signatories to the Treaty;

7. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue to extend assistance, within existing resources, to the signatories in 1997 in order to achieve the aims of the present resolution;

8. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its fifty-second session an item entitled "African Nuclear-Weapon-Free Zone Treaty".
