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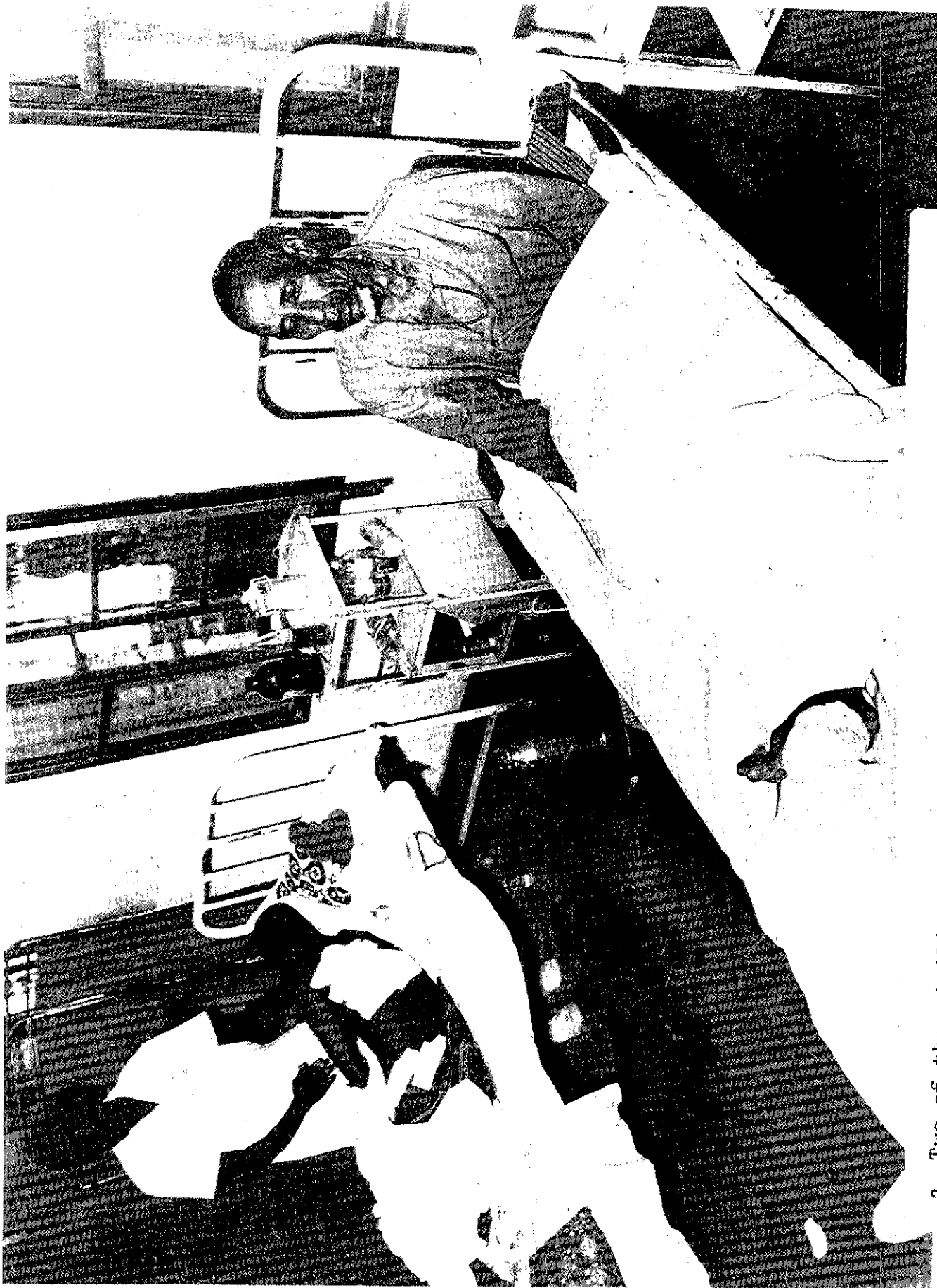

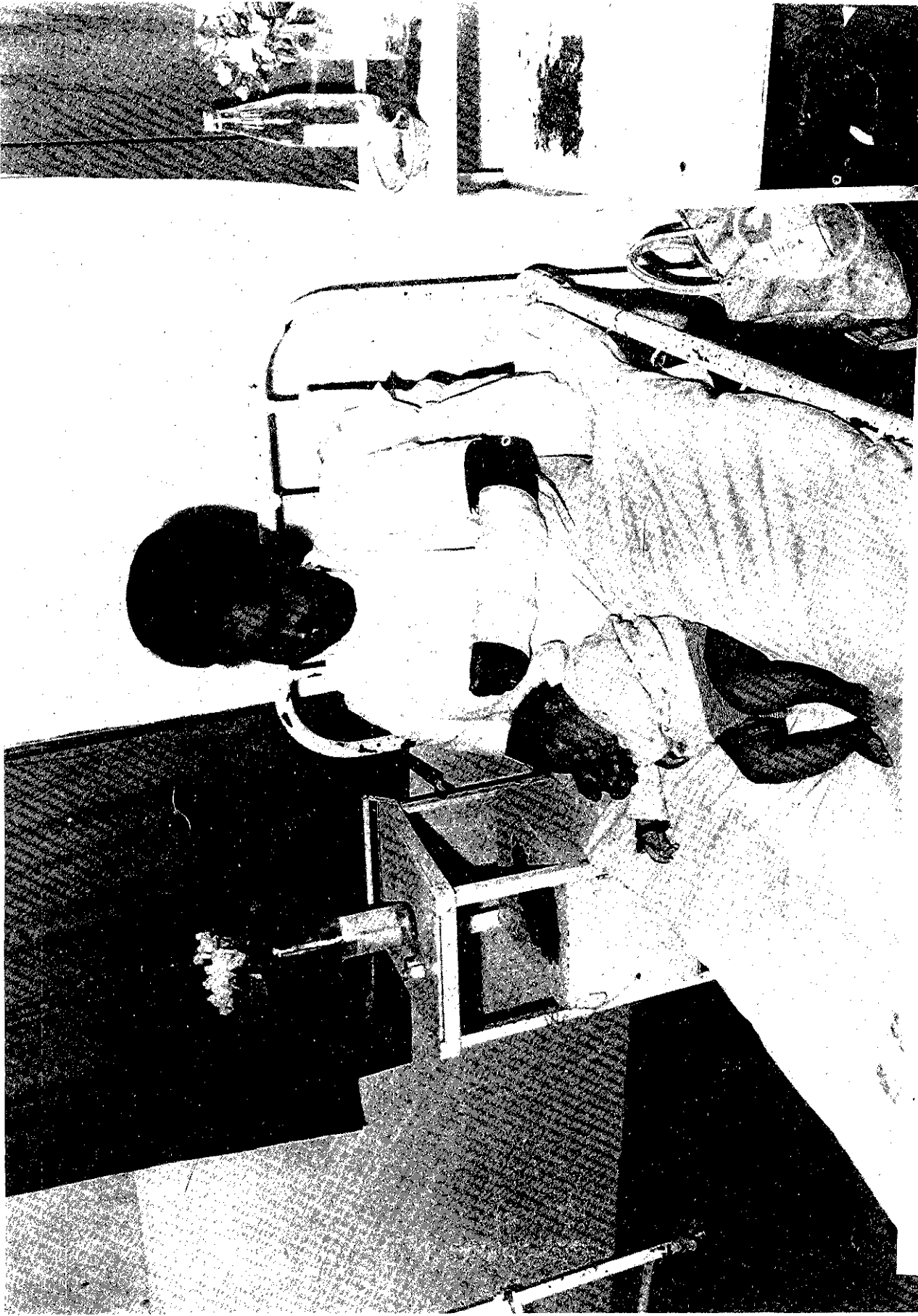
1. A picture of the only Government-owned vehicle of the Loyada Control Post severely damaged by the French armed attack.

3. One of the Somali children wounded by French troops in the village of Loyada.

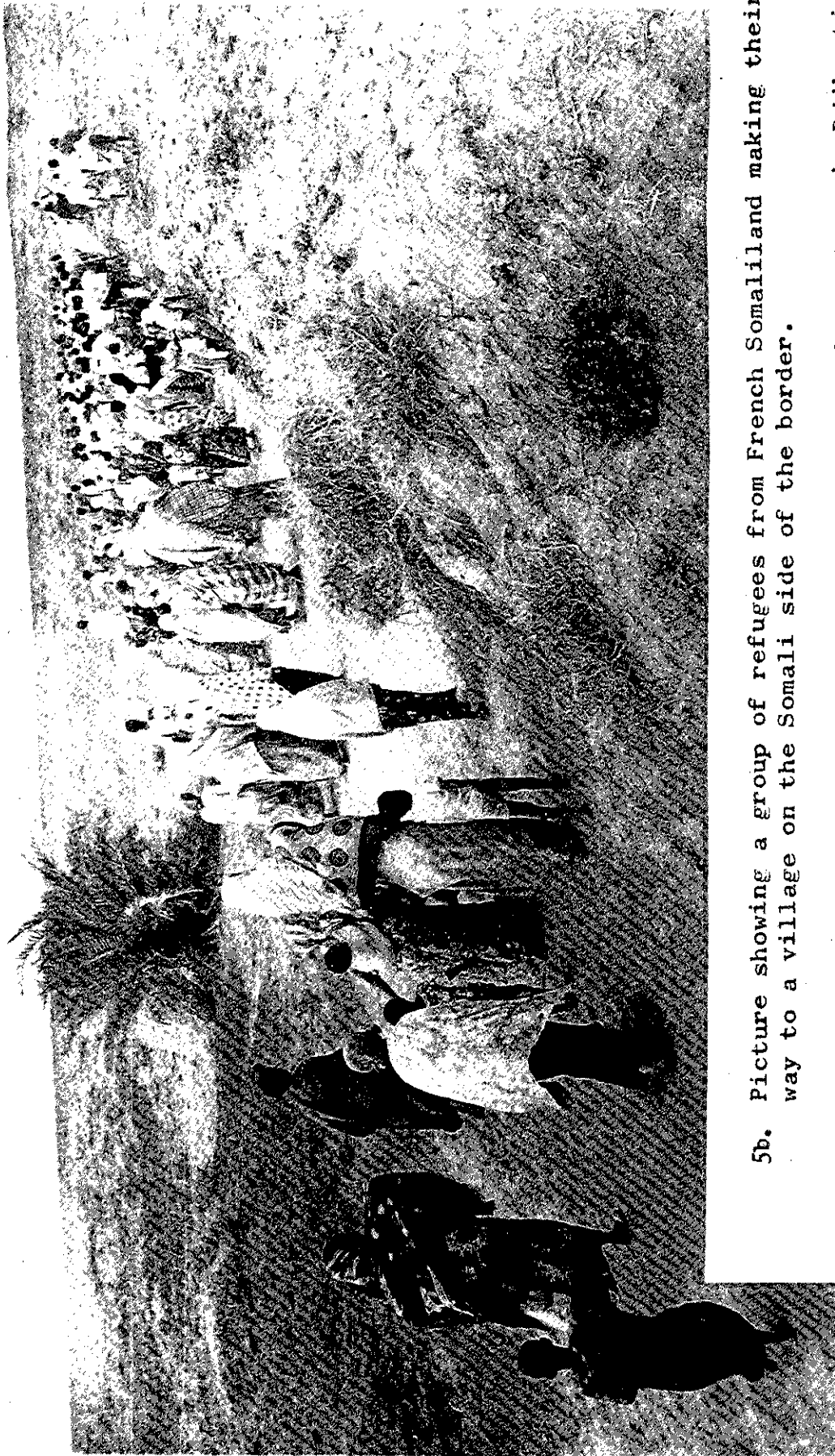


4. A mother wounded by French rifle fire during the attack on Loyada. The child fortunately was not hit.



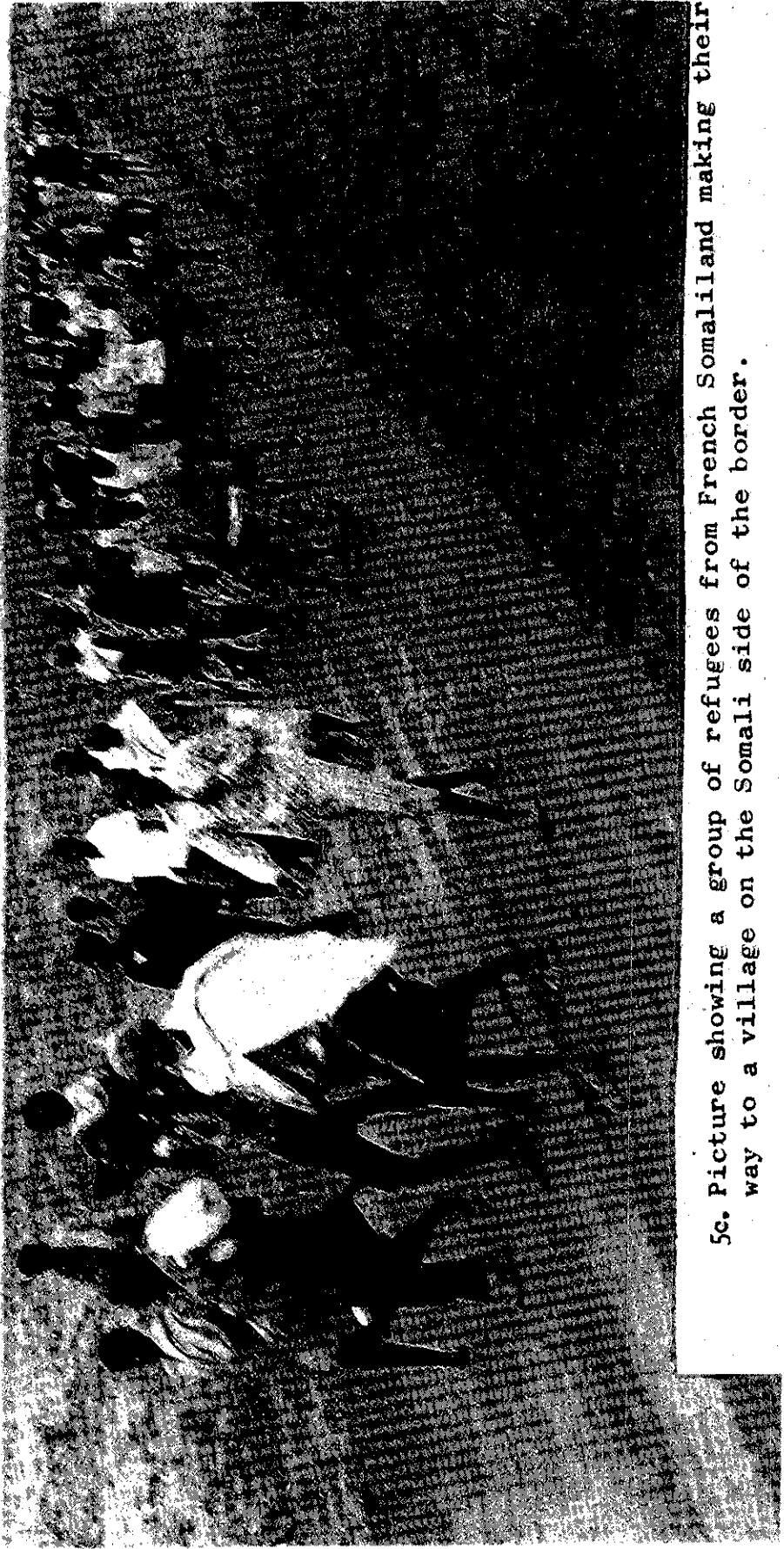
5a. Picture showing a group of refugees from French Somaliland making their way to a village on the Somali side of the border.

5b. Picture showing a group of refugees from French Somaliland making their way to a village on the Somali side of the border.

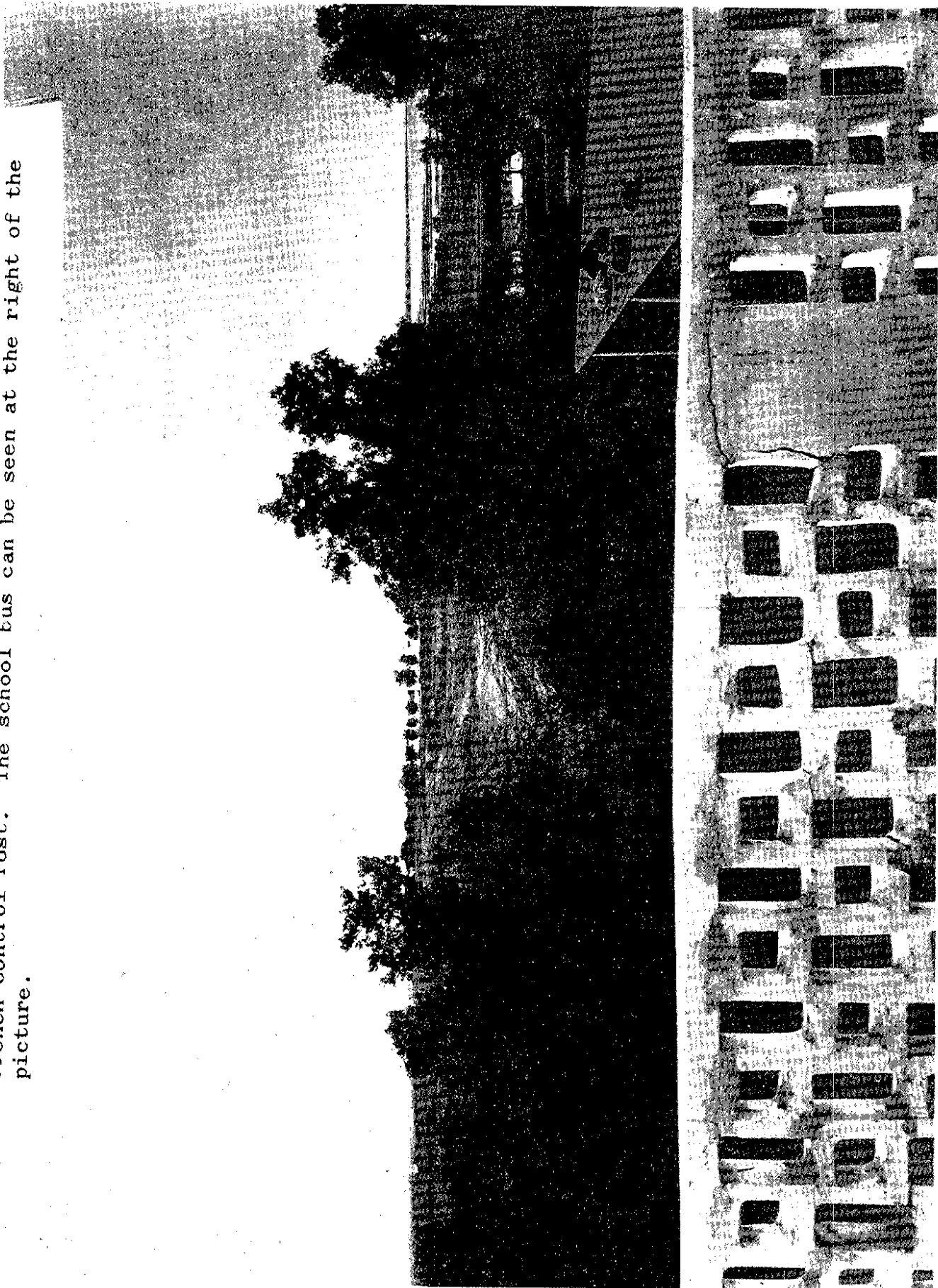
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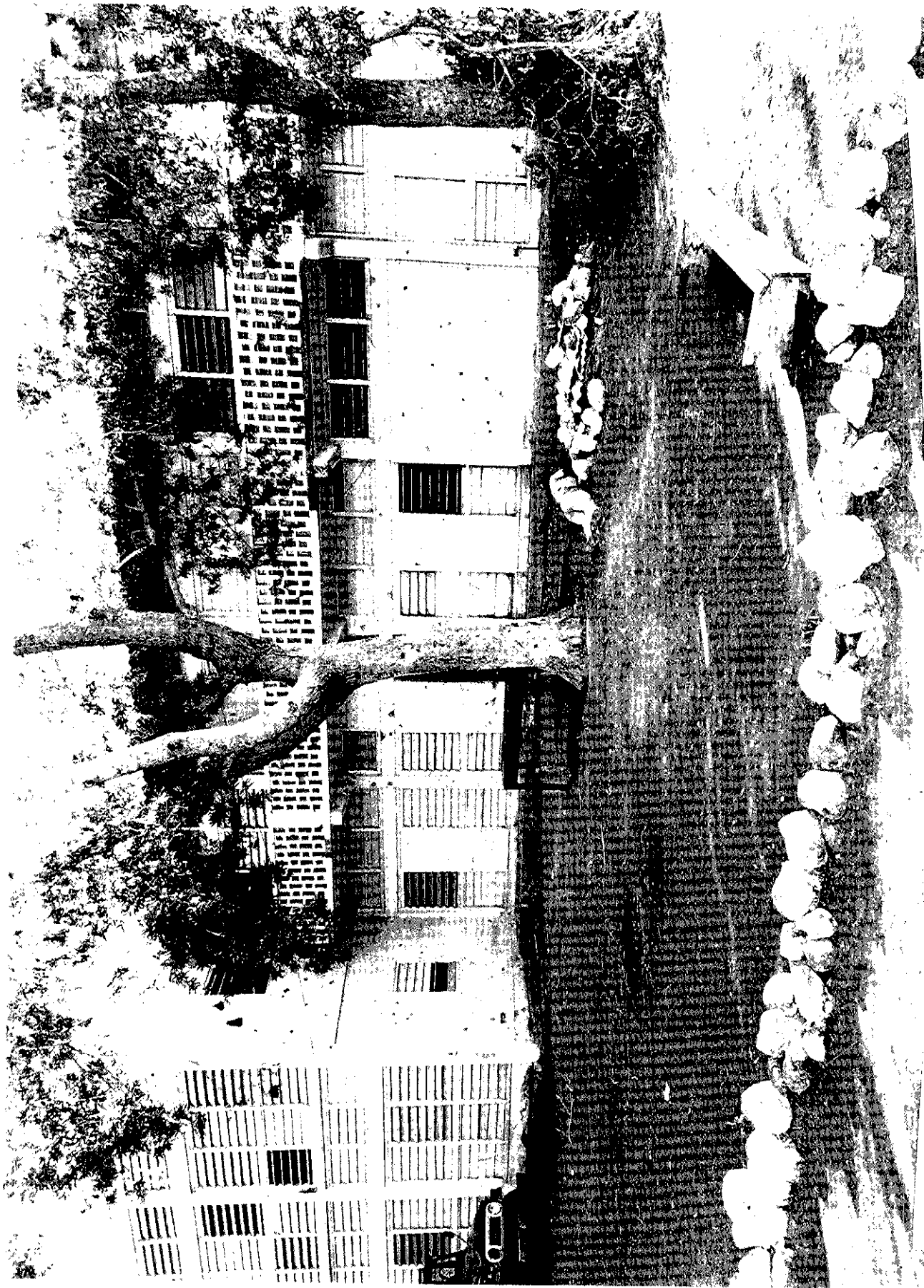


5c. Picture showing a group of refugees from French Somaliland making their way to a village on the Somali side of the border.

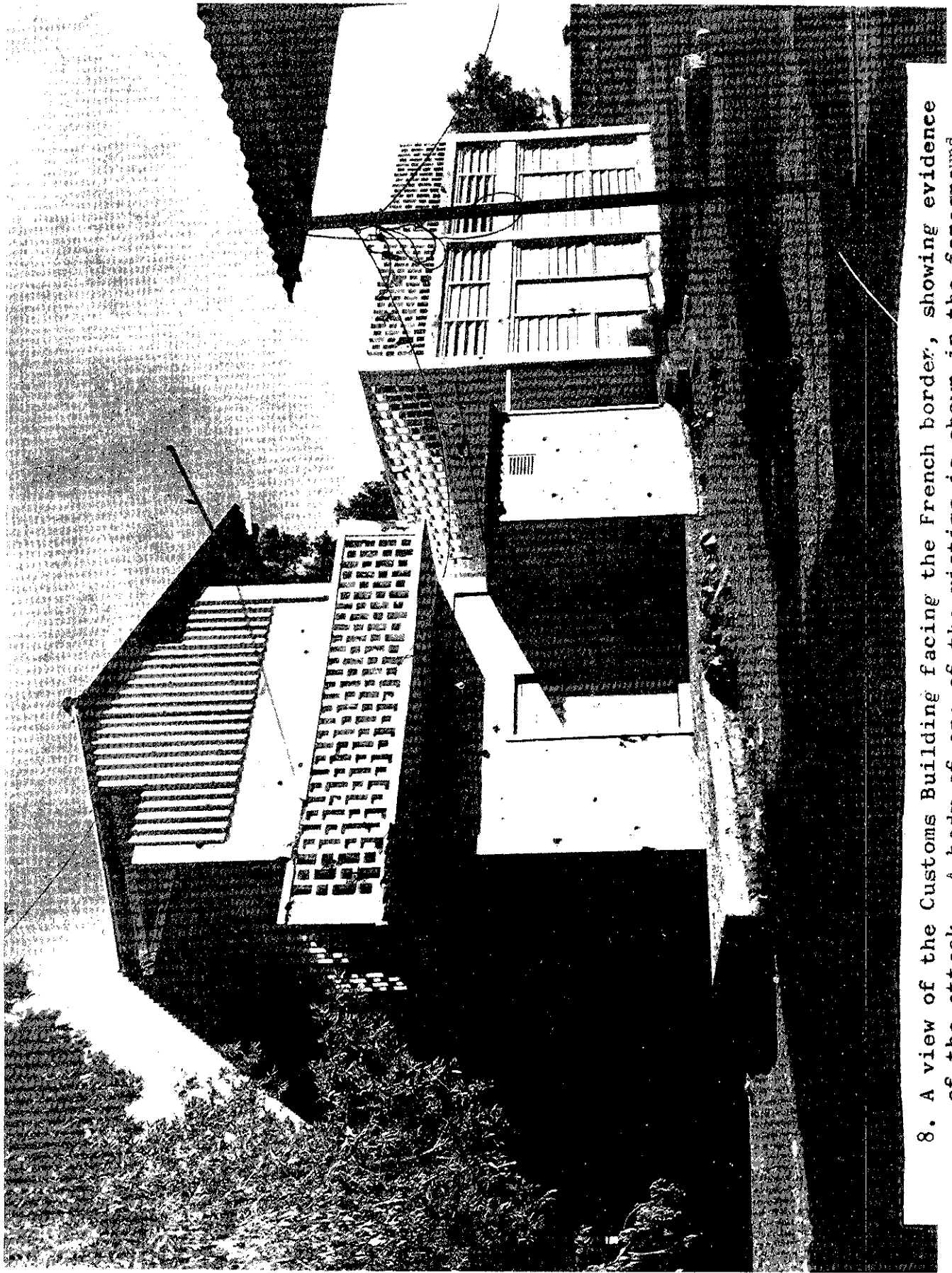

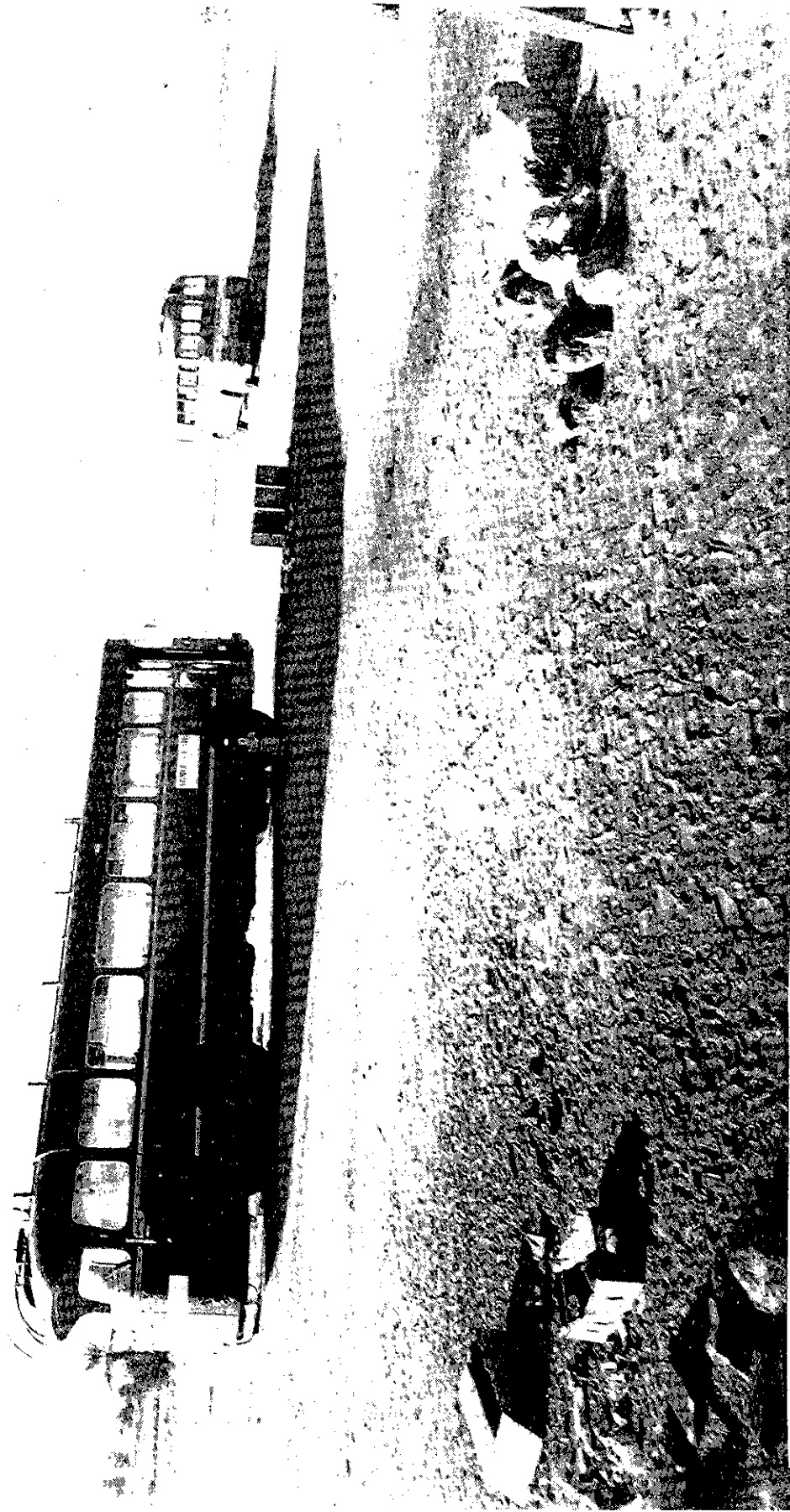
7. A side view of the Customs building showing damage by French bullets and the body of one of the victims.
