NOTE

The present volume contains the resolutions adopted by the General Assembly during the period from 16 September to 13 December 1958. By resolution 1281 (XIII) of 5 December 1958, the General Assembly decided to resume its thirteenth session on 20 February 1959 to consider exclusively the question of the future of the Trust Territories of the Cameroons under French administration and the Cameroons under United Kingdom administration.

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Symbols of United Nations documents are composed of capital letters combined with figures. Mention of such a symbol indicates a reference to a United Nations document.

The arabic and roman numerals identifying each resolution indicate, respectively, the number of the resolution and the number of the session at which it was adopted.

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED ON THE REPORTS OF THE FIRST COMMITTEE

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1252 (XIII). Question of disarmament; the discontinuance of atomic and hydrogen weapons tests; the reduction of the military budgets of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the United States of America, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and France by 10 to 15 per cent and the use of part of the savings so effected for assistance to the under-developed countries

A

The General Assembly,

Reaffirming the continuing interest and responsibility of the United Nations in the field of disarmament, which have found expression in the Charter of the United Nations and in previous resolutions of the General Assembly,

Welcoming the agreement which has been achieved in the Conference of Experts to Study the Possibility of Detecting Violations of a Possible Agreement on the Suspension of Nuclear Tests,

Noting that negotiations on the suspension of nuclear weapons tests and on the actual establishment of an international control system on the basis of the report of the Conference of Experts¹ began on 31 October 1958,

Noting further that qualified persons are expected to meet soon to study the technical aspects of measures against the possibility of surprise attack,

Recognizing that these developments are encouraging steps in the direction of progressive openness of information concerning technologies and armaments, which may assist in promoting the fundamental aims of the United Nations in the field of disarmament,

I

1. *Urges* that in the negotiations between States that have tested nuclear weapons the parties make every

effort to reach early agreement on the suspension of nuclear weapons tests under effective international control;

2. *Urges* the parties involved in these negotiations not to undertake further testing of nuclear weapons while these negotiations are in progress;

II

3. *Calls attention* to the importance and urgency of achieving the widest possible measure of agreement in the forthcoming study of the technical aspects of measures against the possibility of surprise attack;

III

4. *Expresses determination* that the trend of the recent encouraging initiatives, including the technical approach, should continue with a view to contributing to a balanced and effectively controlled world-wide system of disarmament;

IV

5. *Invites* the conferences on nuclear weapons tests and on surprise attack to avail themselves of the assistance and services of the Secretary-General and requests them to keep the United Nations informed;

6. *Invites* the Secretary-General, in consultation with the Governments concerned, to render whatever advice and assistance may seem appropriate to facilitate current developments or any further initiatives related to problems of disarmament;

7. *Requests* that the records of the meetings of the First Committee at which various aspects of disarmament were discussed be transmitted by the Secretary-General to the participants in the conferences on nuclear weapons tests and on surprise attack;

8. *Reiterates* to the States concerned the invitation, made in General Assembly resolution 1148 (XII) of 14 November 1957, to devote, out of the funds made avail-

able as a result of disarmament, as and when sufficient progress is made, additional resources to the improvement of living conditions throughout the world and especially in the less developed countries.

The General Assembly,

Welcoming the report of the Conference of Experts to Study the Possibility of Detecting Violations of a Possible Agreement on the Suspension of Nuclear Tests,¹

Welcoming further the decision of the States which have tested nuclear weapons to meet in a conference at Geneva, commencing 31 October 1958, concerning the question of nuclear weapons tests,

- 1. Expresses the hope that the conference will be successful and lead to an agreement acceptable to all;*
- 2. Requests the parties concerned to report to the General Assembly the agreement that may be the result of their negotiations;*
- 3. Requests the Secretary-General to render such assistance and provide such services as may be asked for by the conference commencing at Geneva on 31 October 1958.*

The General Assembly,

Noting the agreement among certain States to meet to study the technical aspects of measures against the possibility of surprise attack,

- 1. Expresses the hope that the widest possible measure of agreement will be achieved in the forthcoming study;*
- 2. Requests the Secretary-General to render such assistance and provide such services as may be asked for and required by this conference;*
- 3. Requests the States participating in the study to inform the United Nations of the progress achieved.*

The General Assembly,

Having regard to the universal desire for the establishment of genuinely peaceful conditions in the world and therefore for taking steps to avoid the destruction that would result from a major armed conflict,

Reaffirming the responsibility of the United Nations for seeking a solution of the disarmament problem,

Expressing its determination that all Members of the United Nations should be in a position to contribute to a solution of this problem on a continuing basis,

- 1. Decides that the Disarmament Commission shall, for 1959 and on an ad hoc basis, be composed of all the Members of the United Nations;*
- 2. Transmits to the Disarmament Commission all the documents, proposals and records of discussions relating to disarmament at the thirteenth session of the General Assembly;*

3. Requests the Disarmament Commission to convene as appropriate and to submit to the Security Council and to the General Assembly, at a special session if necessary, constructive proposals and recommendations in the field of disarmament;

4. Decides that the first meeting of the Disarmament Commission shall be convened by the Secretary-General after consultation with the Member States and that the Commission, having begun its activities under rule 162 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly and taking that rule into account, shall adopt its own rules of procedure.

1264 (XIII). The Korean question

The General Assembly,

Having received the report of the United Nations Commission for the Unification and Rehabilitation of Korea,²

Reaffirming its resolutions 112 (II) of 14 November 1947, 195 (III) of 12 December 1948, 293 (IV) of 21 October 1949, 376 (V) of 7 October 1950, 811 (IX) of 11 December 1954, 910 A (X) of 29 November 1955, 1010 (XI) of 11 January 1957 and 1180 (XII) of 29 November 1957,

Noting the exchange of correspondence between the communist authorities and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland on behalf of the Governments of countries which have contributed forces to the United Nations Command in Korea, in which these Governments expressed their wish to see a genuine settlement of the Korean question in accordance with United Nations resolutions and their willingness at all times to further the consideration of measures designed to effect reunification on this basis, and stated that, in accordance with the existing recommendations of the General Assembly of the United Nations, the Governments concerned are prepared to withdraw their forces from Korea when the conditions for a lasting settlement laid down by the General Assembly have been fulfilled,³

Noting further that in this exchange the Governments concerned, observing that the greater part of the forces sent to Korea in accordance with resolutions of the United Nations have already been withdrawn, welcomed the announcement that the Chinese communist troops were also to be withdrawn from North Korea,

1. Calls to the attention of the communist authorities concerned the continued determination of the United Nations to bring about by peaceful means the establishment of a unified, independent and democratic Korea under a representative form of government, and the full restoration of international peace and security in the area;

2. Calls upon these authorities to accept the established United Nations objectives in order to achieve a settlement in Korea based on the fundamental principles for unification set forth by the nations participating on behalf of the United Nations in the Korean Political Conference held at Geneva in 1954, and reaffirmed by the General Assembly;

3. *Urges* these authorities to agree at an early date on the holding of genuinely free elections in accordance with the principles endorsed by the General Assembly;

4. *Requests* the United Nations Commission for the Unification and Rehabilitation of Korea to continue its work in accordance with the relevant resolutions of the General Assembly;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to place the Korean question on the provisional agenda of the fourteenth session of the General Assembly.

1287 (XIII). Question of Cyprus⁴

The General Assembly,

Having considered the question of Cyprus,

Recalling its resolution 1013 (XI) of 26 February 1957,

Expresses its confidence that continued efforts will be made by the parties to reach a peaceful, democratic and just solution in accordance with the Charter of the United Nations.

1347 (XIII). Effects of atomic radiation

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 913 (X) of 3 December 1955,

Noting with satisfaction the unanimously adopted report of the United Nations Scientific Committee on the Effects of Atomic Radiation,⁵

Recalling also its resolution 1147 (XII) of 14 November 1957 which requested the Secretary-General in consultation with the Committee to consider the question of the strengthening and widening of scientific activities in this field,

Taking note of the Secretary-General's report⁶ prepared in response to the above-mentioned resolution,

1. *Commends* the United Nations Scientific Committee on the Effects of Atomic Radiation for its work and for the valuable report which it has presented;

2. *Expresses its appreciation* to the United Nations agencies, to the international non-governmental and the national scientific organizations, and to the individual scientists who have assisted the Committee in its work;

3. *Urges* all concerned to take note of the suggestions made and the views expressed in the report of the Committee;

4. *Decides* to request the Committee to continue its useful work, and to report to the General Assembly as appropriate;

5. *Requests* the Committee to consult with the other agencies and organizations concerned on projects within its sphere of activities so as to avoid the duplication of work and ensure effective co-ordination;

6. *Calls upon* all concerned to assist the Committee by making available to it reports and studies relating to the short-term and long-term effects of ionizing radiation upon man and his environment and radiological data collected by them, and by pursuing such investigations as may broaden world scientific knowledge in this sphere and by transmitting their results to the Committee;

7. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue to provide the Committee with the assistance necessary for the conduct of its work.

1348 (XIII). Question of the peaceful use of outer space

The General Assembly,

Recognizing the common interest of mankind in outer space and recognizing that it is the common aim that outer space should be used for peaceful purposes only,

Bearing in mind the provision of Article 2, paragraph 1, of the Charter of the United Nations, which states that the Organization is based on the principle of the sovereign equality of all its Members,

Wishing to avoid the extension of present national rivalries into this new field,

Desiring to promote energetically the fullest exploration and exploitation of outer space for the benefit of mankind,

Conscious that recent developments in respect of outer space have added a new dimension to man's existence and opened new possibilities for the increase of his knowledge and the improvement of his life,

Noting the success of the scientific co-operative programme of the International Geophysical Year in the exploration of outer space and the decision to continue and expand this type of co-operation,

Recognizing the great importance of international co-operation in the study and utilization of outer space for peaceful purposes,

Considering that such co-operation will promote mutual understanding and the strengthening of friendly relations among peoples,

Believing that the development of programmes of international and scientific co-operation in the peaceful uses of outer space should be vigorously pursued,

Believing that progress in this field will materially help to achieve the aim that outer space should be used for peaceful purposes only,

Considering that an important contribution can be made by the establishment within the framework of the United Nations of an appropriate international body for co-operation in the study of outer space for peaceful purposes,

Desiring to obtain the fullest information on the many problems relating to the peaceful uses of outer space before recommending specific programmes of international co-operation in this field,

1. Establishes an *ad hoc* Committee on the Peaceful Uses of Outer Space composed of the representatives of Argentina, Australia, Belgium, Brazil, Canada, Czechoslovakia, France, India, Iran, Italy, Japan, Mexico, Poland, Sweden, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the United Arab Republic, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland and the United States of America, and requests it to report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session on the following:

(a) The activities and resources of the United Nations, of its specialized agencies and of other international bodies relating to the peaceful uses of outer space;

(b) The area of international co-operation and programmes in the peaceful uses of outer space which could appropriately be undertaken under United Nations auspices to the benefit of States irrespective of the state of their economic or scientific development, taking into account the following proposals, *inter alia*:

(i) Continuation on a permanent basis of the outer space research now being carried on within the framework of the International Geophysical Year;

(ii) Organization of the mutual exchange and dissemination of information on outer space research;

(iii) Co-ordination of national research programmes for the study of outer space, and the rendering of all possible assistance and help towards their realization;

(c) The future organizational arrangements to facilitate international co-operation in this field within the framework of the United Nations;

(d) The nature of legal problems which may arise in the carrying out of programmes to explore outer space;

2. Requests the Secretary-General to render appropriate assistance to the above-named Committee and to recommend any other steps that might be taken within the existing United Nations framework to encourage the fullest international co-operation for the peaceful uses of outer space.

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1248 (XIII). Question of race conflict in South Africa resulting from the policies of *apartheid* of the Government of the Union of South Africa

The General Assembly,

Recalling its previous consideration of the question of race conflict in South Africa resulting from the policies of *apartheid* of the Government of the Union of South Africa,

Recalling in particular paragraph 6 of its resolution 917 (X) of 6 December 1955 calling upon the Government of the Union of South Africa to observe its obligations under the Charter of the United Nations,

1. *Declares again* that, in a multiracial society, harmony and respect for human rights and freedoms and the peaceful development of a unified community are best assured when patterns of legislation and practice are directed towards ensuring equality before the law of all persons regardless of race, creed or colour, and when the economic, social, cultural and political participation of all racial groups is on a basis of equality;

2. *Affirms* that governmental policies of Member States which are not directed towards these goals, but

which are designed to perpetuate or increase discrimination, are inconsistent with the pledges of the Members under Article 56 of the Charter of the United Nations;

3. *Solemnly calls upon* all Member States to bring their policies into conformity with their obligation under the Charter to promote the observance of human rights and fundamental freedoms;

4. *Expresses its regret and concern* that the Government of the Union of South Africa has not yet responded to appeals of the General Assembly that it reconsider governmental policies which impair the right of all racial groups to enjoy the same rights and fundamental freedoms.

Realising that such amendments to the Charter require a larger area of agreement than prevails at present,

1. *Decides* to postpone until its fourteenth session the consideration of items 21, 22 and 23 of the agenda of the thirteenth session;

2. *Decides* that these items should be placed on the provisional agenda of its fourteenth session.

Noting Economic and Social Council resolution 690 B (XXVI) of 31 July 1958,

1. *Recognizes* that, in view of the increase in the membership of the United Nations since its establishment, an increase in the membership of the Economic and Social Council is desirable in order to achieve a wider representation and thus to make the Council a more effective organ for carrying out the obligations

1301 (XIII). Measures aimed at the implementation and promotion of peaceful and neighbourly relations among States

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1236 (XII) of 14 December 1957,

Considering the paramount importance of ensuring international peace and security,

Realizing the urgent need of finding solutions to contemporary problems which stand in the way of the promotion of friendly and neighbourly relations among States,

Welcoming the trends towards greater interchange among Member States in various fields,

Recognizing that the United Nations plays an increasingly important part in international co-operation, negotiation and conciliation,

Recognizing furthermore that in the observance of the purposes and principles of the United Nations lies the best basis of ensuring the conditions essential for the nations and peoples of the world to live and to assist each other in mutual tolerance and understanding for the benefit of all,

1. *Reaffirms* the purposes and principles of the United Nations;

2. *Calls upon* Member States to live together within the letter and spirit of the Charter of the United Nations;

3. *Urges* all Member States, while making full use of Article 33 of the Charter, to resort to the Organization for the peaceful solution of problems which interfere with friendly and neighbourly relations among States or threaten international peace;

4. *Calls upon* Member States to take effective steps towards the implementation of principles of peaceful and neighbourly relations;

5. *Recommends* that all Member States should take practical measures or make arrangements in conjunction with and not inconsistent with the programmes of the United Nations and its specialized agencies to foster open, free and friendly co-operation and understanding in the fields of economy, culture, science, technology and communications;

6. *Welcomes with satisfaction* agreements between Member States which are working or will work towards the attainment of the aims envisaged in the present resolution.

1302 (XIII). Treatment of people of Indian origin in the Union of South Africa

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1179 (XII) of 26 November 1957,

Having considered the reports of the Governments of India³ and Pakistan,⁴

1. *Notes* that the Governments of both India and Pakistan have reiterated their readiness to enter into negotiations with the Government of the Union of South Africa in accordance with the expressed desires of the United Nations, and with the express declaration that such negotiations would not in any way prejudice their own position or the position taken by the Government of the Union of South Africa regarding their respective juridical stands in the dispute;

2. *Regrets* that the Government of the Union of South Africa has not replied to the communications sent by the Governments of India and Pakistan on this subject and has not yet agreed to confer with those Governments with a view to arriving at a solution of this problem in accordance with the purposes and principles of the United Nations Charter and the Universal Declaration of Human Rights;

3. *Appeals* to the Government of the Union of South Africa to enter into negotiations to that end with the Governments of India and Pakistan without prejudice to the position taken by the Union of South Africa regarding its juridical stand on the issue;

4. *Invites* Member States to use their good offices, as appropriate, to bring about negotiations in accordance with the desires expressed by the General Assembly at previous sessions;

5. *Invites* the parties concerned to report to the General Assembly as appropriate, jointly or separately, regarding any progress which may be made.

1315 (XIII). Report of the Director of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolutions 194 (III) of 11 December 1948, 302 (IV) of 8 December 1949, 393 (V) of 2 December 1950, 513 (VI) of 26 January 1952, 614 (VII) of 6 November 1952, 720 (VIII) of 27 November 1953, 818 (IX) of 4 December 1954, 916 (X) of 3 December 1955, 1018 (XI) of 28 February 1957 and 1191 (XII) of 12 December 1957,

Noting the annual report of the Director of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East,⁵ and in particular the observations relating to the expiration of the Agency's mandate on 30 June 1960, and noting the report of the Advisory Commission of the Agency,⁶

Noting with regret that repatriation or compensation of the refugees, as provided for in paragraph 11 of General Assembly resolution 194 (III), has not been effected, that no substantial progress has been made in the programme endorsed in paragraph 2 of Assembly resolution 513 (VI) for the reintegration of refugees and that, therefore, the situation of the refugees continues to be a matter of serious concern,

Having reviewed the budget prepared by the Director and having noted the endorsement thereof by the Advisory Commission of the Agency,

Noting with grave concern that contributions to the budget are not yet sufficient and that the financial situation of the Agency remains serious,

Recalling that the Agency is a subsidiary organ of the United Nations,

1. *Draws the attention* of Governments to the precarious financial position of the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East and urges them to consider to what extent they can contribute or increase their contributions in order that the Agency may carry out relief and rehabilitation programmes for the welfare of the refugees;

2. *Requests* the Secretary-General, in view of the serious financial position of the Agency, to continue, as a matter of urgent concern, his special efforts to secure the additional financial assistance needed to meet the Agency's budget and to provide adequate working capital;

3. *Directs* the Agency to pursue its programme for refugees bearing in mind the response to paragraphs 1 and 2 above;

4. *Requests* the Director of the Agency, without prejudice to paragraph 11 of General Assembly resolution 194 (III), to plan and carry out projects capable of supporting substantial numbers of refugees and, in particular, programmes relating to education and vocational training;

5. *Requests* the host Governments to co-operate fully with the Agency and with its personnel and to extend to the Agency every appropriate assistance in carrying out its functions;

6. *Requests* the Agency to continue its consultations with the United Nations Conciliation Commission for Palestine in the best interests of their respective tasks, with particular reference to paragraph 11 of resolution 194 (III);

7. *Expresses its thanks* to Mr. Henry R. Labouisse, Director of the Agency, for the devoted attention he has given to the affairs of the Agency and to the welfare of the refugees for the four years of his incumbency, to the staff of the Agency for their continued faithful efforts to carry out its mandate, and to the specialized agencies and the many private organizations for their valuable and continuing work in assisting the refugees;

8. *Requests* the Director of the Agency to continue to submit the reports referred to in paragraph 21 of General Assembly resolution 302 (IV), as modified by paragraph 11 of Assembly resolution 1018 (XI).

RESOLUTIONS ADOPTED ON THE REPORTS OF THE SECOND COMMITTEE

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1240 (XIII). Establishment of the Special Fund

The General Assembly,

In conformity with the determination of the United Nations, as expressed in its Charter, to promote social progress and better standards of life in larger freedom and, for these ends, to employ international machinery for the promotion of the economic and social advancement of all peoples,

Conscious of the particular needs of the less developed countries for international aid in achieving accelerated development of their economic and social infrastructure,

Recalling its resolution 1219 (XII) of 14 December 1957,

Further recalling previous resolutions on the establishment of an international fund for economic development within the framework of the United Nations,

Noting the recommendations contained in Economic and Social Council resolution 692 (XXVI) of 31 July 1958,

Part A

1. *Commends* the Preparatory Committee on its work;
2. *Establishes* a Special Fund in accordance with the provisions set forth in part B below;

Part B

I. GUIDING PRINCIPLES AND CRITERIA

1. Pursuant to the provisions of General Assembly resolution 1219 (XII) and pending a review by the Assembly of the scope and future activities of the Special Fund, as envisaged in section III of that resolution, the Special Fund shall:

(a) Be a separate fund;

(b) Provide systematic and sustained assistance in fields essential to the integrated technical, economic and social development of the less developed countries;

(c) In view of the resources prospectively available at this time, which are not likely to exceed \$100 million annually, direct

its operations towards enlarging the scope of the United Nations programmes of technical assistance so as to include special projects in certain basic fields as outlined hereunder.

The Special Fund is thus envisaged as a constructive advance in United Nations assistance to the less developed countries which should be of immediate significance in accelerating their economic development by, *inter alia*, facilitating new capital investments of all types by creating conditions which would make such investments either feasible or more effective.

2. In establishing programmes, the Managing Director and the Governing Council of the Special Fund shall be guided by the following principles and criteria:

(a) The Special Fund shall concentrate, as far as practicable, on relatively large projects and avoid allocation of its resources over a great number of small projects;

(b) Due consideration shall be given to the urgency of the needs of the requesting countries;

(c) Projects shall be undertaken which will lead to early results and have the widest possible impact in advancing the economic, social or technical development of the country or countries concerned, in particular by facilitating new capital investment;

(d) Due consideration shall be given to a wide geographical distribution in allocations over a period of years;

(e) Due consideration shall be given to technical, organizational and financial problems likely to be encountered in executing a proposed project;

(f) Due consideration shall be given to the arrangements made for the integration of projects into national development programmes and for effective co-ordination of the project with other multilateral and bilateral programmes;

(g) In accordance with the principles of the Charter of the United Nations, the assistance furnished by the Special Fund shall not be a means of foreign economic and political interference in the internal affairs of the country or countries concerned and shall not be accompanied by any conditions of a political nature;

(h) Projects shall be devised in such a way as to facilitate transfer, as soon as practicable, of the responsibilities of the Special Fund to assisted countries or to organizations designated by them.

3. Projects may be for one country or a group of countries or a region.

4. Projects may be approved for the period of time needed for their execution, even if more than one year.

II. BASIC FIELDS OF ASSISTANCE AND TYPES OF PROJECT

5. The Special Fund shall assist projects in the fields of resources, including the assessment and development of manpower, industry, including handicrafts and cottage industries, agriculture, transport and communications, building and housing, health, education, statistics and public administration.

6. In view of the resources prospectively available at the time of the initial period of the Special Fund's operations, projects to be assisted by the Fund might be in one or a combination of the following forms: surveys; research and training; demonstration, including pilot projects. These may be implemented by the provision of staff, experts, equipment, supplies and services, as well as the establishment of institutes, demonstration centres, plants or works, and other appropriate means, including fellowships, in so far as they are integral parts of a specific project financed by the Fund, in such proportions as are judged necessary by the Managing Director for each project, taking into account the type of assistance requested by Governments.

III. PARTICIPATION IN THE SPECIAL FUND

7. Participation in the Special Fund shall be open to any States Members of the United Nations or members of the specialized agencies or of the International Atomic Energy Agency.

IV. ORGANIZATION AND MANAGEMENT

8. There are established as organs of the Special Fund: a Governing Council, a Managing Director and his staff, and a consultative board. The Special Fund shall be an organ of the United Nations administered under the authority of the Economic and Social Council and of the General Assembly, which will exercise in respect of the Fund their powers under the Charter.

9. The Economic and Social Council shall be responsible for the formulation of the general rules and principles which will govern the administration and operations of the Special Fund; the review of the operations of the Fund on the basis of the annual reports to be submitted by the Governing Council; and the consideration of the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and of the Special Fund in relation to each other.

10. The Economic and Social Council shall transmit the report of the Governing Council, together with its own comments, to the General Assembly. The Assembly will review the progress and operations of the Special Fund as a separate subject of its agenda and make any appropriate recommendations.

Governing Council

11. The immediate inter-governmental control of the policies and operations of the Special Fund shall be exercised by a Governing Council which will consist of representatives of eighteen States.

12. The Governing Council shall provide general policy guidance on the administration and operations of the Special Fund. It shall have final authority for the approval of the projects and programmes recommended by the Managing Director. It shall review the administration and the execution of the Fund's approved projects, and shall submit reports and recommendations to the Economic and Social Council, including such recommendations as the Governing Council may deem appropriate in the light of the relevant provisions of General Assembly resolution 1219 (XII).

13. The States members of the Governing Council shall be elected by the Economic and Social Council from among Members of the United Nations or members of the specialized agencies or of the International Atomic Energy Agency.

14. There shall be equal representation on the Governing Council of economically more developed countries, on the one hand, having due regard to their contributions to the Special Fund, and of less developed countries, on the other hand, taking into account the need for equitable geographical distribution among the latter members.

15. States members of the Governing Council shall be elected for a term of three years, provided, however, that of the members elected at the first election, the terms of six members shall expire at the end of one year and the terms of six other members at the end of two years. Retiring members shall be eligible for re-election.

16. Decisions of the Governing Council on important questions shall be made by a two-thirds majority of the members present and voting. These questions shall include questions of policy, the approval of projects and the allocation of funds. Decisions of the Governing Council on other questions shall be made by a majority of the members present and voting.

17. The Governing Council shall adopt its own rules of procedure, including the method of selecting its officers.

18. The Governing Council shall normally meet twice a year and on such occasions as may be necessary, in conformity with its rules of procedure.

19. The Managing Director of the Special Fund shall participate without vote in the deliberations of the Governing Council.

20. The Governing Council shall make appropriate arrangements in its rules of procedure for the representation of the specialized agencies, the International Atomic Energy Agency and the Executive Chairman of the Technical Assistance Board. To this end, it shall take due account of the practice followed by the Economic and Social Council.

Managing Director

21. The Special Fund shall be administered by a Managing Director under the policy guidance of the Governing Council. The Managing Director shall have the over-all responsibility for the operations of the Fund, with sole authority to recommend to the Governing Council projects submitted by Governments.

22. After having consulted the Governing Council, the Secretary-General will appoint the Managing Director, subject to confirmation by the General Assembly.

23. The Managing Director shall be appointed for a term of four years, or for a shorter period. He shall be eligible for reappointment.

24. Appropriate arrangements shall be made for the participation of the Managing Director in the Technical Assistance Board.

25. The Managing Director shall establish and maintain close and continuing working relationships with the specialized agencies concerned with those fields of activity in which the Special Fund will operate, and with the International Atomic Energy Agency. He may also establish appropriate contacts with other organizations which may be concerned with the activities of the Fund.

Consultative Board

26. A Consultative Board shall be established to advise the Managing Director. The function of the Board shall be to assist the Managing Director with advice in the examination and appraisal of project requests and proposed programmes of the Special Fund. The Board shall be composed of the Secretary-General of the United Nations, the Executive Chairman of the Technical Assistance Board and the President of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development or their designated representatives.

27. The Managing Director shall make, as appropriate, arrangements for representatives of the specialized agencies and of the International Atomic Energy Agency to be invited to the deliberations of the Consultative Board when projects falling mainly within their fields of activity are considered.

Staff

28. The Managing Director shall be assisted by a small group of officials to be selected by him or in consultation with him, on the basis of their special competence.

29. For other services, the Managing Director shall rely as far as possible on the existing facilities of the United Nations, the specialized agencies, the International Atomic Energy Agency, and the Technical Assistance Board. These facilities should be made available to the Special Fund without charge except when clearly identifiable additional expenses are involved. The Managing Director may also, as required, engage expert consultants.

30. To facilitate the field co-ordination between the Special Fund and the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance

in the countries seeking assistance, the Managing Director shall enter into an agreement with the Executive Chairman of the Technical Assistance Board concerning the role of the resident representatives in the work of the Fund.

V. PROCEDURES

Sources and formulation of requests

31. Projects shall be undertaken only at the request of a Government or group of Governments eligible to participate in the Special Fund.

32. Governments shall present their requests for assistance in a form indicated by the Managing Director. Requests shall include all possible information on the intended use and benefits expected to be derived from the Special Fund's assistance, evidence of a technical nature regarding the projects for which assistance is requested, data bearing upon the economic appraisal of such projects, and statements concerning the part of costs which the Government itself would be ready to assume. The Special Fund, the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance, the United Nations, the specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency should be ready to assist and advise Governments, at their request, in the preparation of their applications for assistance.

33. The Special Fund shall utilize only the official channel designated by each Government for the submission of requests.

Evaluation and approval of requests

34. The Managing Director shall be responsible for the evaluation of project requests. In this evaluation, he will normally be expected to rely upon the assistance of existing services within the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance, the United Nations, the specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency. He shall also be authorized to contract the services of other agencies, private firms or individual experts for this purpose, in case the services of the United Nations, the specialized agencies or the International Atomic Energy Agency are wholly or partly unavailable or inadequate.

35. On the basis of the evaluation of project requests, the Managing Director shall periodically develop programmes for submission to the Governing Council. In developing his recommendations to the Governing Council, he shall consult the Consultative Board.

36. The Managing Director shall, at the request of the Government or Governments which have submitted such projects, submit to the Governing Council for its consideration a report on project requests which he has been unable to include in his programme.

37. The Governing Council shall examine the programmes and projects submitted by the Managing Director. Each project shall be accompanied by:

(a) An evaluation of the benefits expected to be derived by the requesting country or countries;

(b) A summary of its technical evaluation;

(c) A proposed budget showing the financial implications of the project in their entirety, including a statement on the costs which would be borne by the recipient Governments;

(d) A draft agreement with the requesting Government or Governments;

(e) When appropriate, a draft agreement with the agent or agents responsible for the execution of the project.

38. The Governing Council shall take final decision on the projects and programmes recommended by the Managing Director and authorize him to conclude the appropriate agreements.

Execution of projects

39. Projects shall be executed, whenever possible, by the United Nations, by the specialized agencies concerned, or by the International Atomic Energy Agency, it being understood that the Managing Director shall also be authorized to contract for the services of other agencies, private firms or individual experts in the cases mentioned in paragraph 34 above.

40. Arrangements for the execution of projects shall be subject to the approval of the requesting Government or Governments, and shall be specified in an agreement with these Governments. Such arrangements shall contain provisions regarding the cost, including any local costs, which the requesting Government will assume and those facilities and services which it will provide.

41. Where requests for assistance fall within the sphere of two or more organizations, arrangements shall be made for joint execution by the organizations concerned and for proper co-ordination.

42. The Managing Director shall make appropriate arrangements to follow the execution of projects.

43. The Managing Director shall report to the Governing Council on the status of projects and the financial position of the projects and programmes.

44. The Managing Director and the Governing Council shall take appropriate measures to ensure an objective evaluation of the results of projects and programmes.

VI. FINANCES

45. The financial resources of the Special Fund shall be derived from voluntary contributions by Governments of States Members of the United Nations or members of the specialized agencies or of the International Atomic Energy Agency. The Fund is also authorized to receive donations from non-governmental sources. It is recommended that contributions by Governments should be paid as early in each year as possible. Furthermore, while contributions will normally be on an annual basis, it is recommended, in view of the expected longer term of many of the Fund's projects, that contributions be pledged or indicated, whenever possible, for a number of years.

46. The Secretary-General is requested to convene annually a pledging conference at which Governments would announce their contributions to the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and to the Special Fund respectively. If a Government pledges an initial lump sum, it should, within a reasonably short period, indicate the division of its contribution between the two programmes.

47. Contributions shall be made by Governments in currency readily usable by the Special Fund consistent with the need for efficiency and economy of the Fund's operations, or shall be transferable to the greatest possible extent into currency readily usable by the Fund. To this end, Governments are urged to make available as large a percentage as they may find possible of their contributions in such currency or currencies as the Managing Director may indicate are required for the execution of the Fund's programme. The Managing Director should, consistent with the criteria set forth respecting the nature and utilization of contributions, endeavour to make the fullest possible use of available currencies.

48. The Managing Director shall, at the end of the first year of the operations of the Special Fund and subsequently as he deems necessary, report to the Governing Council for its consideration on the extent to which restrictions which may have been maintained on contributions have affected the flexibility, efficiency and economy of the Fund's operations. The Governing Council shall also consider what action may be necessary with respect to currency found not readily usable in order to facilitate the Fund's operations. Any action in this respect

shall be subject to review by the Economic and Social Council and the General Assembly.

49. Contributions shall be made without limitation as to use by a specific agency or in a specific recipient country or for a specific project.

50. To the end that the multilateral character of the Special Fund shall be strictly respected, no contributing country should receive special treatment with respect to its contribution nor should negotiations for the use of currencies take place between contributing and receiving countries.

51. Since programmes shall be developed on a project basis, there should be no *a priori* allocation of funds on a country basis or among basic fields of assistance.

52. Recipient Governments shall be expected to finance part of the costs of projects, at least that part payable in local currency. This general rule may, however, be waived in the case of countries deemed financially unable to make even a local currency payment.

53. The Special Fund shall be governed by financial regulations consistent with the financial regulations and policies of the United Nations. The financial regulations for the Fund shall be drafted by the Secretary-General of the United Nations, in consultation with the Managing Director, for approval by the Governing Council, after review by the Advisory Committee for Administrative and Budgetary Questions. In the preparation of these regulations, account shall be taken of the special requirements of the Fund's operations; in particular, appropriate provision shall be made to permit the approval of projects of more than one year's duration and for an exchange of currencies between the Fund and the Special Account for the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance. Provision should also exist under which the Managing Director is authorized in consultation with the Governing Council to establish appropriate financial rules and procedures.

54. The administrative budget prepared by the Managing Director with the assistance of the Secretary-General of the United Nations shall be submitted for approval to the Governing Council with the comments, if any, of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions. It shall be submitted to the General Assembly at the same time as the annual report of the Governing Council with the comments of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions.

55. The Special Fund shall be authorized to build up gradually a reserve fund by earmarking a specific percentage of the total contributions of each year up to an amount to be determined by the Governing Council on the recommendation of the Managing Director.

56. The Governing Council shall be authorized to consider allocating part of the resources of the Special Fund for assistance on a refundable basis at the request of Governments for projects within the terms of reference of the Fund.

Part C

Reaffirms the conditions set forth in section III of General Assembly resolution 1219 (XII) under which the Assembly shall review the scope and future activities of the Special Fund and take such action as it may deem appropriate.

The General Assembly,

Having considered Economic and Social Council resolution 701 (XXVI) of 31 July 1958,

Sharing the belief expressed in that resolution that a continued gradual expansion in the activities of the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and its financial resources is desirable,

Noting with appreciation the fact that, at the Pledging Conference of 16 October 1958 and subsequently, seventy-eight Governments made definite pledges to contribute to the Expanded Programme in 1959, fourteen of which represent increases over the 1958 pledges,

Concerned however over the possibility that these pledges and those which may still be forthcoming may be insufficient to allow for an increase in the Expanded Programme in 1959,

Bearing in mind the desirability of making the best possible use of all available resources,

Noting with appreciation that efforts are being made in that direction,

Noting with satisfaction that the General Conference of the International Atomic Energy Agency decided, at its second session, that the Agency shall seek to participate in the Expanded Programme,

Welcoming the decision of the Economic and Social Council to amend its resolution 222 (IX) of 14 and 15 August 1949 to enable the International Atomic Energy Agency to participate in the Expanded Programme, and recognizing that the demands on the Programme's resources may consequently increase,

1. *Expresses the hope* that the resources prospectively available to the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance will permit a moderately higher level of operations in 1959;

2. *Invites* Governments to continue to contribute to the Expanded Programme in amounts that will provide for the gradual expansion of the Programme;

3. *Requests* the Secretary-General to transmit the present resolution to the Governments of States Members of the United Nations and members of the specialized agencies and of the International Atomic Energy Agency.

Recognizing that further technical training of qualified personnel in industry, agriculture, transport and other fields could be achieved by taking advantage to the maximum possible extent of the middle-level technical training facilities existing in many countries,

Requests the Technical Assistance Board to continue to consult participating countries where middle-level training facilities are available as to the possibility of taking further advantage, under the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance, of these facilities for the training of personnel of the less developed countries, and to report on this matter to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-eighth session.

Considering that for this reason, and also because of the limited resources at the disposal of the United Nations regular programme of technical assistance and the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance, a con-

siderable portion of the available resources should be devoted to programmes which make possible the training of high-level national personnel capable of replacing international technical assistance as soon as possible,

Bearing in mind that the Economic and Social Council, in its resolution 699 (XXVI) of 31 July 1958, noted with regret that there had been a certain decrease in technical assistance activities in connexion with fellowships in 1956 and again in 1957,

Recognizing that, under the country-programming procedure, the decisions of the recipient Governments determine the distribution of funds by types of assistance,

Recalling the advantages which Governments benefiting by the United Nations technical assistance programmes could obtain by making wider use of the fellowship facilities afforded them under those programmes,

Believing that the training of high-level national personnel would be greatly facilitated if the countries in the process of development could, with the help of international co-operation, have at their disposal a greater number of national or regional centres for the training in the country or region concerned of the qualified specialists needed in economic development,

1. *Expresses its conviction* that the award of fellowships is one of the most effective means of training high-level national personnel capable, *inter alia*, of continuing and developing the work accomplished by experts;

2. *Draws the attention* of Governments to the desirability, for countries in the process of development, of establishing or developing national or regional centres for the training of the qualified specialists needed in economic development;

3. *Requests* the various services responsible for the administration of technical assistance programmes to give due attention to requests for projects relating to fellowships and to the establishment or development of such national or regional centres.

1256 (XIII). United Nations technical assistance in public administration

The General Assembly,

Recognizing the important role of public administration in the implementation of programmes of economic and social development,

Noting the memorandum of the Secretary-General³ and the report of the Economic and Social Council on the technical assistance programmes of the United Nations,⁴ as well as Council resolution 681 (XXVI) of 16 July 1958,

Noting further that a number of Governments have expressed their desire to obtain temporary assistance from or through the United Nations to fill executive or operational posts in their administrative machinery,

1. *Takes note with satisfaction* of the results already achieved by the United Nations technical assistance programmes in the field of public administration;

2. *Authorizes* the Secretary-General to supplement these programmes with a view to:

(a) Assisting Governments participating in these programmes, at their request, to secure on a temporary basis the services of well qualified persons to perform duties of an executive or operational character as may be defined by the requesting Governments, and as servants of such Governments, it being understood that such duties shall normally include the training of nationals to assume as early as possible the responsibilities temporarily assigned to these internationally recruited experts;

(b) Assisting the interested Governments, as necessary, to meet the expenses which the employment of these experts will involve;

3. *Decides* that any Government requesting such assistance should contribute towards the total cost of employment of each expert an amount not less than the total emoluments of one of its nationals performing similar duties;

4. *Authorizes* the Secretary-General to negotiate agreements defining the relationship to be established between the United Nations, the experts and the Governments concerned, including the terms and conditions of employment of the experts;

5. *Recommends further* that, whenever requests for assistance fall within the competence of a specialized agency, no action shall be taken without prior consultation and agreement with that agency;

6. *Decides* that this assistance shall be provided on a modest scale and on an experimental basis, using the existing machinery of the United Nations Secretariat and without any increase in administrative costs;

7. *Invites* the Secretary-General to report in detail, to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-eighth session and to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session, on the progress of this experiment.

1303 (XIII). Question of assistance to Libya

The General Assembly,

Recalling the part played by the United Nations in the creation of the independent State of the United Kingdom of Libya, in accordance with General Assembly resolution 289 A (IV) of 21 November 1949 recommending that Libya should be constituted as an independent and sovereign State, and recalling that this independence was achieved on 24 December 1951, in accordance with that resolution,

Recalling its resolution 515 (VI) of 1 February 1952, by which it requested the Economic and Social Council

to study, in consultation with the Government of the United Kingdom of Libya, ways and means by which the United Nations, with the co-operation of all Governments and the competent specialized agencies, and upon the request of the Government of Libya, could furnish additional assistance to the United Kingdom of Libya with a view to financing its fundamental and urgent programmes of economic and social development, giving consideration to the possibility of opening a special account of voluntary contributions to that end, and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its seventh session,

Recalling further its resolution 529 (VI) of 29 January 1952 on the problem of war damages in Libya,

Recalling its resolution 398 (V) of 17 November 1950 which recognizes the special responsibility assumed by the United Nations for the future of Libya, and its resolution 924 (X) of 9 December 1955,

Having noted the communication dated 17 September 1958 from the Prime Minister of Libya⁵ addressed to the Secretary-General,

Having noted the report of the Secretary-General⁶ on the question of assistance to Libya,

Noting with satisfaction the technical assistance given to Libya under the United Nations technical assistance programmes, in accordance with General Assembly resolutions 726 (VIII) of 8 December 1953 and 924 (X) of 9 December 1955,

1. *Invites anew* all Governments willing and in a position to do so to provide financial assistance to the United Kingdom of Libya through the appropriate mechanisms available within the United Nations for receiving voluntary contributions, in order to assist Libya in the financing of its fundamental and urgent programmes of reconstruction and of economic and social development;

2. *Recommends* that, if and when further means become available for assisting in the financing of the development of under-developed areas and for expanding technical assistance to them, the United Nations and the specialized agencies should give due consideration to the specific development needs of Libya;

3. *Requests* the Secretary-General, the Technical Assistance Board, and the specialized agencies concerned to continue to waive local costs and to give all possible favourable consideration to the requests of Libya for technical assistance, taking into account the special needs of Libya and the principles of the technical assistance programmes of the United Nations and of the specialized agencies enumerated in Economic and Social Council resolution 222 (IX) of 15 August 1949;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General to draw the attention of the Managing Director of the Special Fund to the communication of the Prime Minister of Libya dated 17 September 1958 and to the recommendations contained in paragraph 2 above;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to bring the present resolution to the attention of the Governments of

Member States and to take the necessary measures to facilitate the implementation of paragraph 1 above;

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolutions 410 (V) of 1 December 1950, 701 (VII) of 11 March 1953, 725 (VIII) of 7 December 1953, 828 (IX) of 14 December 1954, 920 (X) of 25 October 1955, 1020 (XI) of 7 December 1956 and 1159 (XII) of 26 November 1957,

Taking note of:

(a) The report of the Agent General of the United Nations Korean Reconstruction Agency on the work of the Agency for the period 1 July 1957 to 30 June 1958,⁷ and of the comments thereon by the United Nations Commission for the Unification and Rehabilitation of Korea,⁸

(b) The progress report of the Administrator for Residual Affairs of the Agency covering the period from 1 July to 30 September 1958,⁹

Recognizing the especial importance of the Agency's programme for the relief and rehabilitation of the Republic of Korea,

1. *Commends* the Agent General of the United Nations Korean Reconstruction Agency for the excellent work performed by the Agency in pursuing its mission of assisting the Korean people to relieve the sufferings and repair the devastation caused by aggression;

2. *Expresses its conviction* that the work of the Agency will have long-lasting and significant effects upon the economy of Korea and upon the well-being of the Korean people;

3. *Expresses its appreciation* for the valuable assistance given to the Agency by specialized agencies of the United Nations and by voluntary non-governmental organizations;

4. *Decides* that any funds remaining in residual accounts when the Administrator for Residual Affairs of the Agency has completed his task should be used in conformity with General Assembly resolution 410 (V) entitled "Relief and rehabilitation of Korea";

5. *Reaffirms* the action taken at its twelfth session regarding the arrangements and procedures for the completion of the residual responsibilities of the Agency and the liquidation of its accounts.

1316 (XIII). International co-operation for economic development of under-developed countries

The General Assembly,

Recalling the pledge of all Member States, contained in Article 56 of the Charter of the United Nations, to take joint and separate action in co-operation with the United Nations for the achievement, *inter alia*, of higher standards of living and conditions of economic and social progress and development,

Recognizing that significant efforts have been made by both the less developed and the more developed countries to achieve these ends,

Considering however the continuing need for greater efforts to accelerate the economic development of the less developed countries,

Noting with satisfaction the initiatives which have been taken looking towards an increase in the capital of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development and the quotas of the International Monetary Fund, and the increasing attention being given by these agencies to the less developed countries,

1. Calls upon Member States to undertake a review of accomplishments to date and, in the light of this review, to chart their future courses of co-operative action

relating to both the public and private sectors for the purpose of giving further impetus to the economic development of the less developed countries;

2. Invites Member States, having in mind General Assembly resolution 1260 (XIII) of 14 November 1958, to explore further the possibility of enlisting the aid of their universities and scientific institutions for the purpose of accelerating, in co-operation with similar institutions in other Member States, the solution of scientific and technological problems of particular concern to the less developed countries;

3. Invites Member States in a position to assist the economic development of under-developed countries to inform the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-eighth session and the General Assembly at its fourteenth session, through the Secretary-General, of measures which they have taken or may contemplate taking in accordance with paragraphs 1 and 2 above, such information to be additional to the information which they are now called upon to submit, in accordance with General Assembly resolutions 824 (IX) of 11 December 1954 and 1034 (XI) of 26 February 1957, concerning what they are now doing in this field;

4. Invites the less developed countries similarly to inform the Economic and Social Council and the General Assembly of any measures which they may decide

to take in order to advance their economic and social progress;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to compile the information received pursuant to the above paragraphs in the form of an interim report for submission to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-eighth session and a final report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session for consideration under the item entitled "Economic development of under-developed countries", including a review of the financing of the economic development of the under-developed countries;

6. *Requests* the Economic and Social Council, during its review of the consolidated report of the five-year appraisal of the scope, trend and cost of the economic and social programmes of the United Nations, the International Labour Organisation, the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, the World Health Organization and the World Meteorological Organization, called for in Council resolutions 665 C (XXIV) of 1 August 1957 and 694 D (XXVI) of 31 July 1958, to give special consideration to the development needs of the less developed countries and to ways in which such programmes can be more effectively organized to help meet these needs.

1317 (XIII). United Nations capital development fund

The General Assembly,

Bearing in mind the obligations assumed by the Governments of Member States under Articles 55 and 56 of the Charter of the United Nations,

Recalling previous resolutions of the General Assembly and of the Economic and Social Council on the establishment of a United Nations Fund for financing the economic development of the less developed countries,

Noting with satisfaction the establishment of the Special Fund,

Noting however that the Preparatory Committee for the Special Fund expressed the hope that for the year 1959 an amount of at least \$100 million would be available for the operations envisaged in General Assembly resolution 1219 (XII) of 14 December 1957,¹⁰

Taking into account bilateral, regional and multi-lateral efforts to advance international co-operation in the field of financial assistance for the economic development of the less developed countries,

Recognizing that financing the economic development of the less developed countries is one of the main world economic problems,

Conscious of the urgent need to furnish financial assistance for the economic development of the less developed countries,

1. *Calls upon* Member States to consider appropriate contributions to the Special Fund in order to achieve the volume of resources envisaged by General Assembly resolution 1219 (XII);

2. *Urges* Member States to continue working for the establishment of a United Nations capital development fund;

3. *Decides* to continue to review, as a separate subject of its agenda, progress in the field of financing the economic development of the less developed countries, particularly progress towards the establishment of a United Nations capital development fund.

1318 (XIII). Promotion of the international flow of private capital

The General Assembly,

Reaffirming the need for a higher level of capital formation for the economic and social progress of the under-developed countries,

Taking note of the expanding bilateral and multi-lateral arrangements in the field of capital investment, particularly the establishment of the International Finance Corporation and the prospective increase in the resources of the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development,

Confident that such arrangements contribute to a general improvement in the conditions necessary for an expanding flow of private capital for investment beneficial to under-developed countries,

Taking into account its resolution 824 (IX) of 11 December 1954 on the international flow of private capital for the economic development of under-developed countries, and section B of Economic and Social Council resolution 368 (XIII) of 22 August 1951 concerning the objective of achieving an expansion and steadier flow of private foreign capital,

Welcoming the fact that a growing number of countries have become increasingly conscious of the need to improve the international climate in relation to both existing and prospective private investment,

Stressing the need for increased knowledge and better understanding of the conditions of and opportunities for international investment,

1. *Requests* the Secretary-General to consult as appropriate and obtain the views of qualified persons, drawn from both capital-exporting and capital-importing countries, regarding:

(a) The fields of activity in which foreign private investment is needed and sought by under-developed countries and the volume and forms in which such investment would be acceptable;

(b) The types of projects—including, where possible, specific examples—which private foreign investors may be interested in financing or undertaking in under-developed countries in suitable circumstances;

2. *Further requests* the Secretary-General, drawing on the views of the qualified persons concerned and taking into account other available information, to prepare a report concerning measures in operation or contemplated, both in capital-exporting and capital-importing countries, for the channelling of an increasing flow of private capital investment into the development of under-developed countries under mutually satisfactory arrangements;

3. *Invites* the Secretary-General to submit his report to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-ninth session for transmission, with the Council's recommendations, to the General Assembly for consideration at its fifteenth session.

The General Assembly,

Considering that more effective use of the natural resources of the under-developed countries is important for their economic development,

Recalling that in December 1958 a symposium on the development of petroleum resources of Asia and the Far East is taking place at New Delhi under the auspices of the Economic Commission for Asia and the Far East,

Invites the Secretary-General to transmit the report on the proceedings of the above-mentioned symposium to the Economic and Social Council for appropriate consideration and for possible transmission to other appropriate United Nations organs and bodies.

Considering that ready and easy access to a common pool of qualified technicians who are easy to find would enable countries in the process of development to make more rational and complete use of scientific and technical personnel in and outside their country of origin and to benefit from the experience of other countries which are passing through similar stages, thus increasing the effectiveness of international co-operation,

1. *Invites* the Economic and Social Council to examine at its twenty-eighth session the desirability and feasibility of establishing and maintaining, under the auspices of the United Nations, rosters of scientific and technical personnel of the less developed countries, whose services might also be utilized outside their respective countries;

2. *Requests* the Secretary-General to transmit the present resolution to the specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency and to ask them to state their views on this subject at the twenty-eighth session of the Economic and Social Council.

Requests the Secretary-General:

(a) To ask the Governments of Member States for their views on the desirability of formulating, in the light of the provisions of the Charter of the United Nations and of the resolutions contained in the above-mentioned compendium and of any other international declarations that may be relevant, a statement of the economic objectives of the United Nations and of the means of international co-operation that may serve to attain those objectives in an atmosphere of harmony and understanding;

The General Assembly,

Having regard to the fact that continuous development of international trade is important for economic and social progress in the world,

Bearing in mind the difficulties which hamper the development of international trade in general and trade among less developed countries and industrially developed countries in particular,

Realizing the desirability of utilizing most effectively all means at the disposal of the Economic and Social Council and its regional economic commissions with a view to promoting and expanding trade and to furthering international co-operation aimed at the promotion of international trade,

Recalling its resolution 1158 (XII) of 26 November 1957 on activities of the regional economic commissions,

1. *Expresses its confidence* that the Economic and Social Council and its regional economic commissions will continue to pay due attention to the needs of the development of international trade;

2. *Invites* the Economic and Social Council to continue the consideration of all practical steps that can be initiated within the Council and its regional economic commissions and their trade committees toward the improvement of co-operation and toward co-ordination of efforts in the field of the development of trade, particu-

larly with the less developed countries, including joint studies on trade among various regions, on the lines of those already made, such as studies on possibilities of the expansion of international trade with a view to assisting the economic development of the less developed countries;

3. *Requests* the Economic and Social Council to include in its next annual report to the General Assembly the results produced by the studies and research undertaken pursuant to paragraph 2 above.

1323 (XIII). Questions relating to the promotion of international trade and to assistance in the development of less developed countries

The General Assembly,

Bearing in mind the main economic objectives of the United Nations, which consist in promoting higher standards of living, full employment and conditions of economic and social progress and development,

Aware of the lack of balance shown in the trend of economic growth in the different parts of the world during the last decades,

Conscious of the highly detrimental effect that an uneven trend of development may, in some cases, exercise on the economies of the less developed countries and, thereby, on the degree of gainful employment and on the level of standards of living existing in these countries,

Noting the keen interest shown by the delegations in international economic problems during the general debate in the Assembly,

Convinced that the United Nations should show a still greater interest in the factors of world economy influencing the rate of economic development of the less developed countries,

Requests the Secretary-General, on the basis of the records of the work of United Nations economic bodies during recent years and other appropriate materials, including information to be received from Governments in response to General Assembly resolution 1316 (XIII) of 12 December 1958:

(a) To prepare an analytical summary of various means of accelerating economic growth in less developed countries through international action;

(b) To present the above-mentioned analytical summary to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-eighth session for discussion, and for submission to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session of such comments on the matter as the Council deems necessary.

1324 (XIII). International commodity problems

The General Assembly,

Having in mind the importance of export earnings to the economic development of many countries, in particular the less developed countries, and bearing in mind

the fact that changes in the terms of trade have consequences on the economic development of many countries,

Appreciating that a more rapid rate of expansion in the export trade of the less developed countries is of major importance for their soundly based economic development,

Considering the serious problems both of a short-term and a long-term nature which confront many countries, particularly the less developed countries, as a result of excessive fluctuations in the prices of many primary products and of the impact on international trade in such products of protectionism in its varied forms,

Realizing therefore the urgent need for continuing efforts to bring about more assured conditions for commodity trade and a mitigation of the difficulties at present facing many producers of both agricultural and mineral commodities,

Noting Economic and Social Council resolution, 691 A (XXVI) of 31 July 1958 reconstituting the Commission on International Commodity Trade,

Recognizing that, as stated in that resolution, the development of specific proposals for possible action by Governments with respect to particular commodities continues to be the responsibility mainly of inter-governmental commodity study groups,

Expressing the hope that the Commission on International Commodity Trade will be able to make a greater contribution to the establishment of more assured conditions for international commodity trade,

Recognizing the increasing attention which Governments are giving to commodity problems as evidenced by the work of the Committee on Commodity Problems of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations and such developments as the recent establishment of a coffee study group, the meetings on copper, lead and zinc recently convened by the United Nations, the recent renegotiations of the International Sugar Agreement, the discussions taking place toward the renegotiation of the International Wheat Agreement, and the consideration currently being given by the contracting parties to the General Agreement on Tariffs and Trade to the commodity aspects of international trade,

Recognizing further that, for the most part, effective action with respect to given commodities will require the active co-operation of both major producing and major consuming countries in their mutual interests,

Noting with satisfaction the growing tendency of Governments to broaden the scope of international study and discussion of commodity problems to cover not only price instability as such but also its underlying causes, economic effects and possible means of dealing with them,

1. *Urges* Governments of Member States to continue to examine, on a commodity-by-commodity basis, the question what measures may be desirable and feasible in offering solutions to particular commodity problems;

2. *Supports* the action taken by the Economic and Social Council under resolution 691 (XXVI) for the purpose of making the Commission on International

Commodity Trade more effective, and its decision to convene the Commission early in 1959;

3. *Recommends* that the principal producing and consuming countries give careful consideration to the possibility of becoming parties to or actively co-operating with existing international trading arrangements dealing with the problems of commodity trade;

4. *Expresses the hope* that countries which do not participate in or co-operate with established international trading arrangements will refrain from the use of trade practices generally considered to be unfair

which would impede or prevent the satisfactory working of those arrangements;

5. *Appeals* to the Governments of all Member States to increase their efforts to promote conditions favourable to the expansion of international trade and, in relation to their commercial policies and trade practices, to take into account any possible harmful repercussions which they might have, particularly on the trade of under-developed countries.

1. Expresses the hope that all Governments will contribute to the United Nations Children's Fund as generously as possible;

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 1161 (XII) of 26 November 1957 on balanced and integrated economic and social progress,

Noting with satisfaction the increased attention given by the Economic and Social Council to the social aspects of economic development in the terms of reference of the Economic Commission for Africa, and the Council's decision to ask the other regional economic commissions to consider and give advice on this question,

Recognizing the special problems of countries with insufficiently developed resources in ensuring balanced economic and social development,

Recognizing that the promotion of higher standards of living, full employment and conditions of economic and social progress and development, called for in Article 55 of the Charter of the United Nations, requires not only a general rise in the national production of the countries concerned but also the raising of family levels of living by, *inter alia*, appropriate use of national income,

Realizing the close interdependence of economic development and social development,

Requests the Economic and Social Council, in collaboration with the specialized agencies concerned, to consider as early as possible what social programmes and policies would be best designed to:

(a) Accelerate economic growth through increases in the national production by, *inter alia*, instituting appropriate health and education programmes;

(b) Promote social services to meet the problems which result from economic and technological change and from rapid urbanization;

(c) Raise family levels of living by, *inter alia*, avoid-ing an inequitable distribution of national income.

1259 (XIII). Technical assistance to Afghanistan

The General Assembly,

Having considered Economic and Social Council reso-lution 689 H (XXVI) of 28 July 1958,

Welcoming the adoption by Afghanistan, which was formerly an important opium-producing country, of the law of Kaus 2, 1336 (24 November 1957) prohibiting opium cultivation in Afghanistan,

Believing that technical assistance in the field of eco-nomic and social development is necessary for the full execution of the policy incorporated in the above-men-tioned law and for minimizing serious economic and social consequences,

Recognizing that the success of Afghanistan in this field requires international co-operation,

1. *Expresses its appreciation* of the policy adopted by Afghanistan;

2. *Requests* the relevant technical assistance organs of the United Nations and the specialized agencies con-cerned to pay due attention to requests from the Gov-ernment of Afghanistan for technical assistance in this field.

The General Assembly,

Noting the remarkable advances made in recent years in the natural sciences, pure and applied,

Believing that the United Nations and the specialized agencies should stimulate and encourage further the general direction of scientific research toward the peace-ful ends of economic progress and human welfare, and in the interest of peace and international co-operation,

Recalling its resolution 1164 (XII) of 26 November 1957 on the development of international co-operation in the fields of science, culture and education, and Eco-nomic and Social Council resolution 695 (XXVI) of 31 July 1958 on the survey which is to be prepared on international relations and exchanges in the fields of education, science and culture,

Recognizing the responsibility of the United Nations for co-ordinating the activities of its organs and those of the specialized agencies in accordance with Articles 58 and 63 of the Charter of the United Nations, and noting that the Economic and Social Council has re-quested the United Nations and five of the specialized agencies to undertake appraisals of their activities and programmes for the period 1959 to 1964,

1. *Requests* the Secretary-General, in co-operation with the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and the other specialized agencies concerned with the peaceful application of science, as well as the International Atomic Energy Agency, to arrange for a survey to be made on the main trends of

inquiry in the field of the natural sciences and the dis-semination and application for peaceful ends of such scientific knowledge, and on the steps which might be taken by the United Nations, the specialized agencies and the International Atomic Energy Agency towards encouraging the concentration of such efforts upon the most urgent problems, having regard to the needs of the various countries; and requests the Secretary-General, in arranging for such a survey, to take into account the report of the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization to be prepared in response to Economic and Social Council resolution 695 (XXVI);

2. *Invites* the above-mentioned organizations to co-operate with the Secretary-General in this connexion;

3. *Further requests* the Secretary-General to submit this survey to the Economic and Social Council at its thirtieth session for comment and any appropriate rec-ommendations;

4. *Requests* the Economic and Social Council to transmit this survey to the General Assembly, together with its comments and recommendations.

1261 (XIII). Advisory services in the field of human rights

The General Assembly,

Taking note of chapter VII, section X, of the report of the Economic and Social Council,¹

Recalling its resolution 926 (X) of 14 December 1955 requesting the Economic and Social Council to submit to the General Assembly at its thirteenth session an evaluation of the projects carried out under the pro-gramme of advisory services in the field of human rights and recommendations concerning the future of the pro-gramme,

Recalling also its resolution 1163 (XII) of 26 No-vember 1957, in which the General Assembly noted with satisfaction the success of the seminar held in August 1957 at Bangkok (Thailand) and expressed the hope that seminars on the status of women would be held as frequently as possible in the future under the pro-gramme of advisory services in the field of human rights,

Noting with satisfaction the important results achieved at the two seminars held during 1958 under the programme of advisory services in the field of human rights,

Having considered the plan presented by the Secre-tary-General to the Economic and Social Council for holding seminars in the year 1959,² and Council resolu-tion 684 (XXVI) of 21 July 1958 approving this plan,

1. *Expresses its satisfaction* at the manner in which the projects have been carried out under the programme of advisory services in the field of human rights;

2. *Approves* the plan presented by the Secretary-General to the Economic and Social Council for holding seminars in the year 1959 and recommends that, if possible, three seminars should be held in 1959, taking

1283 (XIII). International Health and Medical Research Year

The General Assembly,

Considering that active international co-operation and the exchange of knowledge and experience in the field of health and medical research are important factors in improving the health and welfare of mankind,

Desiring to encourage further practical steps to combat widely prevalent diseases, such as malaria, tuberculosis, smallpox, cholera, cancer, cardiovascular ailments, leprosy and poliomyelitis, which still represent a serious threat to the health of the people,

Believing that these aims could be greatly furthered by the organization of an International Health and Medical Research Year,

1. *Invites* the World Health Organization to consider, in accordance with article IV of the Agreement between the United Nations and the World Health Organization,³ the recommendation to organize, primarily on a national basis, an International Health and Medical Research Year, preferably in 1961, and to adopt methods for intensifying international co-operation in this field with a view to, *inter alia*:

(a) Disseminating the knowledge gained from experience in combating these diseases;

(b) Substantially expanding, co-ordinating and organizing joint scientific research in the prevention and treatment of these diseases and in the rehabilitation of patients;

(c) Exchanging experience in the use of atomic energy in medicine;

(d) Organizing popular health education on a broad scale;

(e) Providing assistance to under-developed countries, including equipment, medicine, special literature and qualified specialists;

2. *Further invites* the World Health Organization to transmit its views on this matter to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-eighth session and to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session.

1284 (XIII). Report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees

The General Assembly,

Having taken note of the report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees,⁴

Bearing in mind that a substantial international effort still needs to be made in order to achieve solutions for

1. *Welcomes* the recommendation of the Executive Committee of the United Nations Refugee Fund that the protection activities of the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees should be increased;

2. *Takes note* of the programme recommended for 1959 by the Executive Committee of the United Nations Refugee Fund;

3. *Notes* that the High Commissioner has been authorized by the Executive Committee of the United Nations Refugee Fund to appeal for the funds required for the programme;

4. *Appeals* to Governments of States Members of the United Nations and members of the specialized agencies to support the High Commissioner's programme, either through financial contributions or through offers of resettlement or both.

1285 (XIII). World Refugee Year

The General Assembly,

Having considered the report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees,⁴ together with the resolution adopted by the Executive Committee of the United Nations Refugee Fund at its ninth (special) session on 26 September 1958,⁶

Convinced of the need to make a further world-wide effort to help resolve the world refugee problem,

Having considered the proposal for a World Refugee Year to begin in June 1959,

Noting that this proposal has two aims, namely:

(a) To focus interest on the refugee problem and to encourage additional financial contributions from Governments, voluntary agencies and the general public for its solution,

(b) To encourage additional opportunities for permanent refugee solutions, through voluntary repatriation, resettlement or integration, on a purely humanitarian basis and in accordance with the freely expressed wishes of the refugees themselves,

1. *Urges* States Members of the United Nations and members of the specialized agencies to co-operate, in accordance with the national wishes and needs of each country and from a humanitarian point of view, in promoting a World Refugee Year as a practical means of securing increased assistance for refugees throughout the world;

2. *Requests* the Secretary-General to take such steps as he may think fit to assist in the promotion of a World Refugee Year in accordance with the present resolution.

The General Assembly,

Having examined the report of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees,⁴ and in particular chapter II,

Considering the efforts made by the United Nations Refugee Fund to assist refugees,

Noting the action taken in 1958 by the High Commissioner on behalf of refugees from Algeria in Tunisia,

Considering that a similar problem exists in Morocco,

Recommends the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees to continue his action on behalf of the refugees in Tunisia on a substantial scale and to undertake similar action in Morocco.

The General Assembly,

Noting that the Commission on Human Rights at its fourteenth session requested the Economic and Social Council and, through it, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization and other specialized agencies concerned to initiate action to consider and implement the suggestions of the Committee on Freedom of Information concerning under-developed countries wherever possible and as expeditiously as possible, with the object of assisting them to build up adequate media of information which could facilitate the free flow of accurate and undistorted news and information within these countries and throughout the membership of the United Nations,⁷

Noting that the Commission on Human Rights will give further consideration at its fifteenth session to the suggestions of the Committee on Freedom of Information and that the Economic and Social Council has requested the Commission on Human Rights to complete its recommendations on freedom of information,

1. *Expresses the hope* that the Economic and Social Council, on the basis of the analysis to be prepared by the Secretary-General in response to Council resolutions 574 D (XIX) of 26 May 1955 and 643 (XXIII) of 25 April 1957, and taking into account recommendations of the Commission on Human Rights to be submitted in response to Council resolution 683 C (XXVI) of 21 July 1958, will formulate at its twenty-eighth session a programme of concrete action and measures on the international plane which could be undertaken for the development of information enterprises in under-developed countries, with an evaluation of the material, financial and professional requirements and resources for the implementation of this programme;

2. *Invites* the Economic and Social Council to request the Commission on Human Rights to give particular attention to procedures by which constant review of the problems of providing technical assistance to under-developed countries in the field of information

may be assured, and to report regularly to the Council on progress in this field;

Realizing that in view of the importance of the draft Convention it is desirable that additional opportunity be given Member States to crystallize their views thereon,

Desirous however of formulating promptly a widely acceptable final text of the draft Convention with a view to opening it for signature as soon as possible,

Decides:

1. To proceed, at its fourteenth session, to a discussion of the text of the draft Convention as formulated by the Committee on the Draft Convention on Freedom of Information,⁹ established by the General Assembly in its resolution 426 (V) of 14 December 1950, giving special consideration to any new proposals that may be made;

2. To request the Secretary-General, in the light of the discussion in the Third Committee on this matter, to invite the Governments of States with which he communicated pursuant to General Assembly resolution 1189 A (XII) to transmit to him any comments, observations, suggestions, proposals or amendments concerning the text of the draft Convention on Freedom of Information and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session.

The General Assembly,

Noting that the right of peoples and nations to self-determination as affirmed in the two draft Covenants

Believing it necessary to have full information at its disposal regarding the actual extent and character of this sovereignty,

1. *Decides* to establish a Commission composed of Afghanistan, Chile, Guatemala, the Netherlands, the Philippines, Sweden, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics, the United Arab Republic and the United States of America to conduct a full survey of the status of this basic constituent of the right to self-determination, with recommendations, where necessary, for its strengthening, and further decides that, in the conduct of the full survey of the status of the permanent sovereignty of peoples and nations over their natural wealth and resources, due regard shall be paid to the rights and duties of States under international law and to the importance of encouraging international co-operation in the economic development of under-developed countries;

2. *Invites* the regional economic commissions and the specialized agencies to co-operate with the Commission in its task;

3. *Requests* the Commission to report to the Economic and Social Council at its twenty-ninth session;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General to provide the Commission with the necessary staff and facilities.

Having considered, with appreciation of the difficulties of the task, the report of the Good Offices Committee on South West Africa² established under General Assembly resolution 1143 (XII) of 25 October 1957,

1. *Decides* not to accept the suggestions contained in the report of the Good Offices Committee on South West Africa that envisage partition and annexation of any part of the Territory as a basis for the solution of the question of South West Africa;

2. *Invites* the Committee to renew discussions with the Government of the Union of South Africa in order to find a basis for an agreement which would continue to accord to the Mandated Territory of South West Africa as a whole an international status, and which would be in conformity with the purposes and principles of the United Nations;

3. *Requests* the Committee, in the conduct of its work, to bear fully in mind the discussions held at the thirteenth session of the General Assembly;

4. *Requests* the Committee to submit a further report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue to provide the Committee with all necessary staff and facilities.

1246 (XIII). Status of the Territory of South West Africa

The General Assembly,

Having recommended, by its resolutions 65 (I) of 14 December 1946, 141 (II) of 1 November 1947, 227 (III) of 26 November 1948, 337 (IV) of 6 December 1949, 449 B (V) of 13 December 1950, 570 B (VI) of 19 January 1952, 749 B (VIII) of 28 November 1953, 852 (IX) of 23 November 1954, 940 (X) of 3 December 1955, 1055 (XI) of 26 February 1957 and 1141 (XII) of 25 October 1957, that the Mandated Territory of South West Africa be placed under the International Trusteeship System, and having repeatedly invited the Government of the Union of South Africa to propose, for the consideration of the General Assembly, a trusteeship agreement for South West Africa,

Having accepted, by its resolution 449 A (V) of 13 December 1950, the advisory opinion of 11 July 1950 of the International Court of Justice on the question of South West Africa,³

Considering that, in accordance with Chapter XII of the Charter of the United Nations, all Mandated Territories which have not achieved independence have been brought under the International Trusteeship System, with the sole exception of the Territory of South West Africa,

1. *Reiterates* its resolutions 65 (I) of 14 December 1946, 141 (II) of 1 November 1947, 227 (III) of 26 November 1948, 337 (IV) of 6 December 1949, 449 B (V) of 13 December 1950, 570 B (VI) of 19 January 1952, 749 B (VIII) of 28 November 1953, 852 (IX) of 23 November 1954, 940 (X) of 3 December 1955, 1055 (XI) of 26 February 1957 and 1141 (XII) of 25 October 1957, to the effect that the Territory of South West Africa be placed under the International Trusteeship System;

2. *Asserts* that, in the present conditions of political and economic development of South West Africa, the normal way of modifying the international status of the Territory is to place it under the International Trusteeship System by means of a trusteeship agreement in accordance with the provisions of Chapter XII of the Charter of the United Nations.

Taking note of the report of the United Nations Commissioner for the Supervision of the Elections in the Trust Territory of Togoland under French Administration⁸ on the organization, conduct and results of the elections which took place on 27 April 1958 in the Territory,

Taking note of Trusteeship Council resolution 1921 (S-VIII) of 17 October 1958,

Taking note of the statements made by the representative of France and the Prime Minister of the Republic of Togoland during the thirteenth session of the General Assembly,⁹

Noting further the resolution adopted by the Chamber of Deputies of the Republic of Togoland on 23 October 1958,¹⁰

1. *Notes* that the Governments of France and of the Republic of Togoland have decided, by mutual agreement, that Togoland shall attain independence in 1960, in accordance with the wishes of the Chamber of Deputies of Togoland;

2. *Expresses its high appreciation* of the work of the United Nations Commissioner and his staff;

3. *Congratulates* France and the authorities and people of Togoland on their achievements in Togoland, which enable the basic objectives of the International Trusteeship System to be attained;

4. *Resolves accordingly*, in agreement with the Administering Authority, that on the day which will be agreed upon between the Government of France and the Government of Togoland, and on which the Republic of Togoland becomes independent in 1960, the Trusteeship Agreement approved by the General Assembly on 13 December 1946 shall cease to be in force, in accordance with Article 76 b of the Charter of the United Nations.

1. *Notes* that by the measures already taken or to be taken by some Administering Authorities in consultation with the United Nations and the peoples of the Territories concerned, Togoland under French administration, the Cameroons under United Kingdom administration, the Cameroons under French administration, Somaliland under Italian administration and Western Samoa under New Zealand administration, are expected to achieve in 1960 the objective of the Trusteeship System laid down in Article 76 b of the Charter of the United Nations;

2. *Invites* the Administering Authorities concerned to formulate, in respect of the remaining Trust Territories, early successive intermediate targets and dates in the fields of political, economic, social and educational development of these Territories so as to create, as soon as possible, the pre-conditions for the attainment of self-government or independence;

3. *Reaffirms* its resolutions 558 (VI) of 18 January 1952, 1064 (XI) of 26 February 1957, 1207 (XII) of 13 December 1957 and other pertinent resolutions on the same subject, and once again urges the Administering Authorities to implement the terms of those resolutions;

4. *Requests* the Trusteeship Council to report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session on the progress made in implementing the present resolution.

1. *Considers* that the task of dissemination of information on the United Nations and on the International Trusteeship System could be substantially facilitated by the establishment of United Nations information centres in or near the Trust Territories;

2. *Requests* the Secretary-General, taking into account the report of the Committee of Experts on United Nations Public Information¹³ and the decision, if any,

1. *Takes note* of chapter VII, section C, of part I of the report of the Trusteeship Council and of the report of the Secretary-General on offers by Member States of study and training facilities for inhabitants of Trust Territories;

2. *Reaffirms* its resolution 1209 (XII) of 13 December 1957, and once again invites the Administering Authorities to take all necessary measures consistent with the interests and needs of the Territories and their peoples to ensure that scholarships and training facilities offered by Member States may be utilized by inhabitants of the Trust Territories, and to render every assistance to those persons who have applied for or have been granted scholarships or fellowships, particularly with regard to facilitating their travel formalities;

3. *Requests* the Member States offering scholarships to take into account, whenever possible, the need to provide travel funds to prospective students;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General to give such assistance as is possible, and as may be sought by the Member States concerned and by the applicants, within the framework of the procedures laid down by the Trusteeship Council;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to include, in his future reports to the Trusteeship Council, detailed information concerning the actual use of scholarships and training facilities offered by Member States for the education of inhabitants of the Trust Territories;

6. *Requests* the Trusteeship Council to resume, at its sessions held in 1959, the consideration of this question

Noting the special report made to the Trusteeship Council by the Administering Authority on the extent of the assistance which will be necessary, and the estimate made therein of an annual budget deficit of \$5 million,¹⁶

Bearing in mind the encouraging trends in the economic development of the Territory, and the statement of the Government of Somalia¹⁷ that these trends may mean that external financial assistance will be required for a period considerably less than the twenty years forecast by the International Bank for Reconstruction and Development,

1. *Notes* from the report of the Trusteeship Council that the Administering Authority and the Government of Somalia are continuing to explore possible sources of financial aid for the Territory after 1960, and that they will inform the Trusteeship Council, when conditions in the Territory are next considered, regarding the results of these consultations;

2. *Welcomes* the statement of the representative of Italy⁹ in regard to the various sources from which assistance has been secured or is in prospect, thus indicating that the problem is progressing satisfactorily towards its solution;

3. *Expresses the hope* that, at the appropriate time, the authorities of the Special Fund, already established under General Assembly resolution 1240 (XIII) of 14 October 1958, the Secretary-General, the specialized agencies concerned and the Technical Assistance Board will give sympathetic consideration to the requests for assistance made on behalf of the Government of Somalia, taking into account the needs of the country and the principles of the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance, in accordance with the request made by the Economic and Social Council in its resolution 660 (XXIV) of 30 July 1957;

4. *Requests* the Trusteeship Council at its twenty-fourth session to consider the prospects of further assistance from the Special Fund, from the Expanded Programme of Technical Assistance and from the specialized agencies, and to report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session so that the Assembly may have a complete picture of the economic prospects of Somalia when that Territory achieves independence in 1960.

Considering that the terms of reference contained in Economic and Social Council resolution 671 A (XXV) of 29 April 1958 establishing an Economic Commission for Africa take fully into account measures to be taken towards the economic advancement of Non-Self-Governing and Trust Territories in Africa, including its social aspects, these measures lying within the scope of the Commission's activities,

Considering that many Territories on which information is transmitted by the Administering Members concerned under Article 73 e of the Charter and a majority of Trust Territories are in Africa, and that the terms of reference of the Economic Commission for Africa provide for such Territories to become associate members of the Commission,

1. *Welcomes* the establishment of the Economic Commission for Africa as an important step towards the further raising of the levels of living in Non-Self-Governing and Trust Territories in Africa;

2. *Expresses the hope* that all African Territories will apply for associate membership in the Economic Commission for Africa through the Member States responsible for their administration;

3. *Requests* the Member States concerned to encourage and expedite such applications for associate membership;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General to transmit the present resolution to the Economic and Social Council and to the Economic Commission for Africa at their forthcoming session.

2. *Urges* all Members responsible for the administration of Non-Self-Governing Territories to pay special and constant attention in the future to the implementation of the terms of its resolution 644 (VII);

3. *Invites* the Administering Members to include in the annual reports submitted under Article 73 e of the Charter of the United Nations information on the measures taken by them for the implementation of the present resolution.

"Should such a staff member be granted a probationary or permanent appointment, or complete five years of qualifying service and remain on a contract providing for further service of at least one year, or remain in employment for more than one year thereafter, he shall lose entitlement to the service benefit."

4. *Decides*, as a special measure, to make a grant of \$32,700 to the School towards meeting the expected deficit in respect of the academic year 1958-1959;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue to use his good offices to assist the Board of Trustees of the School in finding suitable permanent accommodation for the School in the immediate vicinity of United Nations Headquarters, in developing plans for a building, and in pursuing its efforts to raise funds from private sources for the construction of the building, and, if necessary, for the acquisition of a site therefor;

ANNEX

Article XVIII, paragraph 1 (amended text)

In addition to the contributions deducted from the remuneration of the participant as provided in article XVI, any participant may, subject to the approval of the Joint Staff Pension Board and under such conditions as the Board may prescribe, deposit in the Pension Fund, in a lump sum or sums and/or by an increased rate of contribution, an amount computed to be sufficient to purchase an additional retirement benefit which, together with his prospective regular retirement benefit as provided herein, will provide for him a total retirement benefit not to exceed 60 per cent of his final average remuneration at the age of retirement. Interest at such rates as may be set from time to time by the Board shall be allowed on such contributions.

Article XXII, paragraph 1 (amended text)

The Joint Staff Pension Board shall consist of eighteen members:

(a) Six members appointed by the United Nations Staff Pension Committee, two from the members elected by the General Assembly, two from the members appointed by the Secretary-General and two from the members elected by the participants;

(b) Twelve members appointed by the staff pension committees of the other member organizations in accordance with a table fixed by the administrative rules of the Fund which shall provide for equal representation of the three groups referred to in article XX.

Article XLII (new text)

FORFEITURE OF THE RIGHT TO A BENEFIT

1. The right to a lump-sum benefit shall be forfeit if, for two years after the date on which payment would have been due, the person entitled has lodged no claim and has failed to submit payment instructions or has refused to accept payment.

2. The right to a pension or life annuity shall be forfeit if, for five consecutive years, the person entitled has lodged no claim and has failed to submit payment instructions or has refused to accept arrears.

3. The right to unpaid instalments of a pension or life annuity shall be forfeit if, for two years after payment would

have been due, the person entitled has lodged no claim and has failed to submit instructions or has refused to accept payment.

4. The provisions of paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this article shall not affect any right to a benefit which has not been exercised for reasons beyond the beneficiary's control.

5. Forfeitures as described above shall be reported to the Board. Where the right to a benefit has been forfeited pursuant to paragraphs 1, 2 and 3 of this article and information subsequently received shows that such forfeiture would have been contrary to the provisions of paragraph 4 if the facts of the case had been known in time, the Board shall restore the right to a benefit.

6. The Board may reinstate the right to a benefit when it has been satisfied that exceptional circumstances exist which warrant such action.

1310 (XIII). Pensionable remuneration of the staff

The General Assembly,

Having considered the annual report of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Board²¹ and the report of the Secretary-General on the pensionable remuneration of the staff,²⁴

1. *Decides* that a comprehensive review of the system of benefits and their present and future adequacy, of the methods by which pensionable remuneration could be revised and of the financial and technical bases of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund shall be undertaken in the light of the observations and suggestions made on this subject in the Fifth Committee;

2. *Requests* the Secretary-General, in consultation with the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Board and the Administrative Committee on Co-ordination, to appoint such experts as may be required to accomplish this comprehensive review;

4. *Decides* that, for the purposes of contributions to and benefits payable from the Joint Staff Pension Fund, the pensionable remuneration of the professional category and higher salary levels shall be increased, with effect from 1 January 1959, by 5 per cent of the pensionable remuneration otherwise in force at that time;

5. *Authorizes* the Joint Staff Pension Board to supplement, with effect from 1 January 1959 and pending the outcome of the comprehensive review requested above, the pensions and life annuities paid under articles IV, V, VII and X.1 (d) of the Regulations of the Joint Staff Pension Fund, the amount of the supplement to be 5 per cent of the regular benefit;

6. *Authorizes* the Secretary-General to advance the necessary funds to the Joint Staff Pension Fund for supplementary payments made under paragraph 5 above, such advances to be repaid by the Fund after the next meeting of the Joint Staff Pension Board;

7. *Invites the attention* of the member organizations participating in the Joint Staff Pension Fund to the decisions set out above.

Believing that, consistent with this policy, the Secretary-General should give priority to the use of all media of information which ensure the maximum of effectiveness at the lowest possible cost,

Considering that the Secretary-General should place greater emphasis than heretofore upon enlisting the cooperation of Governments of Member States, privately-owned mass media of information, private institutions, non-governmental organizations, and educators in the programme of informing the peoples of the world of the United Nations and its activities,

Considering that greater emphasis should be placed upon the operations and effectiveness of information centres in relation to the Office of Public Information at Headquarters, without impairing the over-all central direction of the United Nations information programme or the present facilities for the representatives of media of mass communication,

Decides to request the Secretary-General:

1. To give effect in 1959 in so far as practicable to those recommendations made by the Committee of Experts on United Nations Public Information and to any other means which, in the opinion of the Secretary-General, will further the objectives set out in the preamble of the present resolution with the maximum of effectiveness at the lowest possible cost;

2. To consult the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions concerning the financial implications of the action consequent upon his implementing the recommendations in operative paragraph 1 above;

3. To report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session concerning the progress he has made in implementing the present resolution.

2. The appropriations voted by paragraph 1 shall be financed by contributions from Member States after adjustment in accordance with regulation 5.2 of the Financial Regulations of the United Nations; for this purpose, income for the financial year 1959 other than staff assessment is estimated at \$5,317,880 and income from staff assessment at \$6,123,000;

3. The Secretary-General is authorized:

(a) To administer as a unit the provisions under sections 1, 6 and 8 in a total amount of \$99,800 relating to the permanent Central Opium Board and the Drug Supervisory Body;

(b) To transfer credits between sections of the budget, with the prior concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions;

4. The appropriations under sections 1, 6, 7 and 8 in a total amount of \$155,200 relating to the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Board and the United Nations Staff Pension Committee shall be administered in accordance with article XXVII of the Regulations of the United Nations Joint Staff Pension Fund;

5. In addition to the appropriations voted by paragraph 1 above, an amount of \$15,000 is hereby appropriated from the income of the Library Endowment Fund for the purchase of books, periodicals, maps and library equipment and for such other expenses as are in accordance with the objects and provisions of the endowment;

6. The Secretary-General is authorized, in accordance with the Financial Regulations, to charge against the income derived from the United Nations Postal Administration, the Visitors Service (Headquarters), the sale of publications, the catering services, souvenir and gift sales, and the Visitors Service (Geneva), the direct expenses of those activities; income in excess of those expenses shall be treated as miscellaneous income under the terms of article VII of the Financial Regulations, and of paragraph 2 above.

1339 (XIII). Unforeseen and extraordinary expenses for the financial year 1959

The General Assembly

Resolves that, for the financial year 1959:

1. The Secretary-General, with the prior concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and subject to the Financial Regulations of the United Nations, is authorized to enter into commitments to meet unforeseen and extraordinary expenses, provided that the concurrence of the Advisory Committee shall not be necessary for:

(a) Such commitments, not exceeding a total of \$2 million, as the Secretary-General certifies relate to the maintenance of peace and security or to urgent economic rehabilitation;

(b) Such commitments as the President of the International Court of Justice certifies relate to expenses occasioned by:

- (i) The designation of *ad hoc* judges (Statute, Article 31), not exceeding a total of \$36,000;
- (ii) The appointment of assessors (Statute, Article 30) or the calling of witnesses and the appointment of experts (Statute, Article 50), not exceeding a total of \$25,000;
- (iii) The holding of sessions of the Court away from The Hague (Statute, Article 22), not exceeding a total of \$75,000;

(c) Such commitments not exceeding a total of \$45,000 as may be authorized by the Secretary-General in accordance with paragraph 4 of General Assembly resolution 1202 (XII) of 13 December 1957 relating to the pattern of conferences;

2. The Secretary-General shall report to the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions and to the General Assembly, at its fourteenth session, all commitments made under the provisions of the present resolution, together with the circumstances relating thereto, and shall submit supplementary estimates to the General Assembly in respect of such commitments.

1340 (XIII). Working Capital Fund for the financial year 1959

The General Assembly

Resolves that:

1. The Working Capital Fund shall be established for the year ending 31 December 1959 at an amount of \$US23.5 million, to be derived:

(a) As to \$22,948,830, from cash advances by Members in accordance with the provisions of paragraphs 2 and 3 of the present resolution;

(b) As to \$551,170, by transfer of the balance of surplus account as at 31 December 1957 not already applied against Members' assessments for 1958;

2. Members shall make cash advances to the Working Capital Fund as required under paragraph 1 (a) above in accordance with the scale adopted by the General Assembly for contributions of Members to the fourteenth annual budget;

3. There shall be set off against this new allocation of advances the amounts paid by Members to the Working Capital Fund for the financial year 1958 under General Assembly resolution 1232 (XII) of 14 December 1957, provided that, should such advance paid by any Member to the Working Capital Fund for the financial year 1958 exceed the amount of that Member's advance under the provisions of paragraph 2 above, the excess shall be set off against the amount of contributions payable by that Member in respect of the fourteenth annual budget, or any previous budget;

4. The Secretary-General is authorized to advance from the Working Capital Fund:

(a) Such sums as may be necessary to finance budgetary appropriations pending receipt of contributions; sums so advanced shall be reimbursed as soon as receipts from contributions are available for the purpose;

(b) Such sums as may be necessary to finance commitments which may be duly authorized under the provisions of General Assembly resolution 1339 (XIII) of 13 December 1958, relating to unforeseen and extraordinary expenses; the Secretary-General shall make provision in the budget estimates for reimbursing the Working Capital Fund;

(c) Such sums as, together with net sums outstanding for the same purposes, do not exceed \$125,000, to continue the revolving fund to finance miscellaneous self-liquidating purchases and activities; advances in excess of the total \$125,000 may be made with the prior concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions; the Secretary-General shall submit with the annual accounts an explanation of the outstanding balance of the revolving fund at the end of each year;

(d) Loans to specialized agencies and preparatory commissions of agencies to be established by intergovernmental agreement under the auspices of the United Nations to finance their work, pending receipt by the agencies concerned of sufficient contributions under their own budgets; such loans shall normally be repayable within two years, and the Secretary-General shall obtain the prior concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions for any cash issues which would increase the aggregate balance outstanding (including amounts previously advanced and outstanding) at any one time to an amount in excess of \$250,000;

(e) Such sums not exceeding \$35,000 as may be required to finance payments of advance insurance premiums where the period of insurance extends beyond the end of the financial year in which payment is made; this amount may be increased with the prior concurrence of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions; the Secretary-General shall make provision in the budget estimates of each year, during the life of the related policies, to cover the charges applicable to each such year;

(f) Such sums as may be necessary to finance supplementary payments made to the United Nations Joint

Staff Pension Fund in accordance with paragraph 5 of General Assembly resolution 1310 (XIII) of 10 December 1958 dealing with the pensionable remuneration of the staff;

(g) Such sums as may be necessary to enable the Tax Equalization Fund to meet current commitments pending accumulation of credits; such advances shall be repaid as soon as credits are available in the Tax Equalization Fund.

The General Assembly,

Having noted the report of the Secretary-General³⁶ referring to the dangerous cash situation which arises during the early part of each year as a consequence of the delay in the payment of the contributions of some Member States,

Having noted also the report of the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions on the same subject,³⁷

Keeping in mind regulation 5.4 of the Financial Regulations of the United Nations, according to which the contributions of Member States are considered due and payable in full within thirty days after the payment has been requested by the Secretary-General,

1. *Urges* the Member States concerned to give attention to the payment of the outstanding arrears of their contributions;

2. *Requests* the Secretary-General to continue his efforts to obtain earlier payment of contributions;

3. *Decides* to increase the level of the Working Capital Fund from \$22 million to \$23.5 million in 1959, by the transfer to the Fund of the balance on surplus account still available for credit to Members as at 31 December 1957 (\$551,170) and by direct additional cash advances in the amount of \$948,830;

4. *Authorizes* the Secretary-General, in the event of urgent need in 1959 and subject to the conditions set out in paragraph 8 of his report, to borrow, on payment of normal current rates of interest, cash from special funds and accounts in his custody, for purposes which normally relate to the Working Capital Fund.

ANNEX

SUPPLEMENTARY AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE UNITED NATIONS AND THE CARNEGIE FOUNDATION CONCERNING THE USE OF THE PEACE PALACE AT THE HAGUE

1. The United Nations and the Carnegie Foundation hereby agree that article II of the Agreement between the United Nations and the Carnegie Foundation concerning the use of the premises of the Peace Palace at The Hague as contained in annex A to General Assembly resolution 84 (I) of 11 December 1946, as amended by the Supplementary Agreement contained in the annex to Assembly resolution 586 (VI) of 21 December 1951, shall be amended to read as follows:

"Article II

"The annual contribution payable by the International Court of Justice in respect of the use of the Peace Palace is hereby fixed at 100,000 Netherlands florins net."

2. This Supplementary Agreement shall enter into force with effect from 1 January 1959.

3. *Brings* the draft articles on arbitral procedure contained in the report of the International Law Commission to the attention of Member States for their consideration and use, in such cases and to such extent as they consider appropriate, in drawing up treaties of arbitration or *compromis*;

4. *Invites* Governments to send to the Secretary-General any comments they may wish to make on the draft, and in particular on their experience in the draw-

ing up of arbitral agreements and the conduct of arbitral procedure, with a view to facilitating a review of the matter by the United Nations at an appropriate time.

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to arrange for the necessary staff and facilities which would be required for the conference, and to present to the conference recommendations concerning its methods of work and procedures, and other questions of an administrative nature;

6. *Refers* to the conference for its information the relevant records of the United Nations Conference on the Law of the Sea held in 1958.

Having considered the report of the Secretary-General⁸ on the Second United Nations International Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy held in Geneva from 1 to 13 September 1958,

Noting therein the need stated by the Secretary-General for the continuing expert assistance of the Advisory Committee with broader terms of reference,

Recognizing the helpfulness of a thorough evaluation of the Second Conference in considering the need, nature and timing of similar conferences in this field,

1. *Records its satisfaction* with the contribution made by the Second United Nations International Conference on the Peaceful Uses of Atomic Energy to the free international exchange of scientific and technical information and to expanded international co-operation in the field of peaceful uses of atomic energy;

2. *Expresses its appreciation* to the Secretary-General, the Advisory Committee, the Secretary-General of the Conference and the participants in the Conference for their co-operation in the planning, organizing and successful conduct of the Conference;

3. *Decides* that the Advisory Committee established in paragraph 5 of section B of resolution 810 (IX) and continued under paragraph 7 of section I of resolution 912 (X), as now constituted, shall be extended as the United Nations Scientific Advisory Committee, and that henceforth it shall advise and assist the Secretary-General, at his request, on all matters relating to the peaceful uses of atomic energy with which the United Nations may be concerned;

4. *Requests* the Secretary-General and the United Nations Scientific Advisory Committee, in consultation with the International Atomic Energy Agency and the interested specialized agencies, to undertake a thorough evaluation of the Second Conference in relation to the need, nature and timing of similar conferences in this field;

5. *Requests* the Secretary-General to submit an interim report to the General Assembly at its fourteenth session and a report on the results of such study at the fifteenth session.
