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ELIMINATION OF RACISM AND RACIAL DISCRIMINATION

Report of the Third Committee

Rapporteur: Ms. Victoria SANDRU (Romania)

I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 20 September 1996, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include in the agenda of its fifty-first session the item entitled, "Elimination of racism and racial discrimination" and to allocate it to the Third Committee.
- 2. The Committee considered the item jointly with item 109 at its 24th to 28th meetings, from 5 to 7 November 1996, and took action on the item at its 36th and 49th meetings, on 13 and 22 November. An account of the Committee's discussion is contained in the relevant summary records (A/C.3/51/SR.24-28, 36 and 49).
- 3. For its consideration of the item, the Committee had before it the following documents:

- 4. At the 24th meeting, on 5 November, the Assistant Secretary-General for Human Rights made an introductory statement. The Committee also heard a statement by the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related forms of intolerance (see A/C.3/51/SR.24).

II. CONSIDERATION OF PROPOSALS

A. <u>Draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.23 and Rev.1</u>

5. At the 36th meeting, on 13 November, the representative of <u>Costa Rica</u> (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China) and <u>Turkey</u>, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Measures to combat contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance (A/C.3/51/L.23), which read:

"The General Assembly,

"Recalling its resolution 50/135 of 21 December 1995 and Commission on Human Rights resolution 1996/21 of 19 April 1996, 3

"Bearing in mind the outcome of the World Conference on Human Rights, held at Vienna from 14 to 25 June 1993, and, in particular, the attention given in the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action⁴ to the elimination of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and other forms of intolerance,

"Aware that racism, being one of the exclusionist phenomena plaguing many societies, requires resolute action and cooperation for its eradication,

"<u>Having examined</u> the report of the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance, including his conclusions and recommendations,

"Deeply concerned that, despite continuing efforts, racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance, as well as acts of violence, continue to persist and even grow in magnitude, incessantly adopting new forms, including tendencies to establish policies based on racial, religious, ethnic, cultural and national superiority or exclusivity,

"Conscious of the fundamental difference between, on the one hand, racism and racial discrimination as governmental policy or resulting from official doctrines of racial superiority or exclusivity and, on the other hand, other manifestations of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance occurring in growing segments of many societies and perpetrated by individuals or groups, some of which are directed against migrant workers and members of their families,

"Affirming that, under international law, racism is not an opinion but an offence, and in this regard endorsing Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination general recommendation XV (42) of 17 March 1993 on article 4 of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, in which it is considered that the prohibition of the dissemination of ideas based upon racial superiority or racial hatred can be a lawful restriction to the rights to the freedoms of opinion,

expression and association as set forth in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and article 5 of the Convention, $^{\rm 6}$

"Conscious also that impunity for crimes motivated by racist and xenophobic attitudes plays a role in weakening the rule of law and tends to encourage the recurrence to such crimes,

"<u>Underlining</u> the importance of creating conditions which foster greater harmony and tolerance within societies,

- "1. <u>Takes note of</u> the report of the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance;⁵
- "2. <u>Requests</u> the Special Rapporteur to continue his exchange of views with Member States, relevant mechanisms, related United Nations organs and specialized agencies in order to further their effectiveness and mutual cooperation;
- "3. <u>Regrets</u> that the Special Rapporteur has continued to encounter difficulties in his effort to fulfil his mandate, owing to the lack of necessary resources;
- "4. <u>Endorses</u> the recommendation of the Special Rapporteur to convene without further delay a world conference on racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance, and to include the question of immigration and xenophobia in the agenda;⁷
- "5. Expresses its profound concern at and unequivocal condemnation of all forms of racism and all racist violence, including related acts of random and indiscriminate violence;
- "6. Expresses its deep concern at and condemnation of manifestations of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance against migrant workers and members of their families and other vulnerable groups in many societies;
- "7. Encourages all States, in accordance with the conclusions and recommendations of the Special Rapporteur in his report, to include in their educational curricula and social programmes, at all levels as appropriate, knowledge, tolerance and respect for foreign cultures, peoples and countries;
- "8. <u>Supports</u> the efforts of Governments to take measures aimed at the eradication of all forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance;

- "9. <u>Categorically condemns</u> any role played by some print, audiovisual or electronic media in inciting acts of violence motivated by racial hatred;
- "10. <u>Recognizes</u> that Governments should implement and enforce legislation to prevent acts of racism and racial discrimination;
- "11. <u>Calls upon</u> all Governments and intergovernmental organizations, with the assistance of non-governmental organizations, as appropriate, to continue to cooperate with and to supply relevant information to the Special Rapporteur;
- "12. <u>Commends</u> non-governmental organizations for their action against racism and racial discrimination and for their continuous support and assistance to the victims of racism and racial discrimination;
- "13. <u>Urges</u> all Governments to cooperate fully with the Special Rapporteur, with a view to enabling him to fulfil his mandate;
- "14. <u>Urges</u> the Centre for Human Rights of the Secretariat to expeditiously facilitate the work of the Special Rapporteur;
- "15. Requests once again the Secretary-General to provide, without any further delay, the Special Rapporteur with all the necessary human and financial assistance to carry out his mandate efficiently, effectively and expeditiously and to enable him to submit, in a timely manner, a report on this question to the General Assembly at its fifty-second session."
- 6. At its 49th meeting, on 22 November, the Committee had before it a revised draft resolution (A/C.3/51/L.23/Rev.1), submitted by the sponsors of draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.23.
- 7. At the same meeting, a statement was made by the representative of Costa Rica, on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China.
- 8. The Committee then adopted revised draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.23/Rev.1 without a vote (see para. 15, draft resolution I).

B. <u>Draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.24</u>

9. At the 35th meeting, on 13 November, the representative of Slovenia, on behalf of Austria, Australia, Bangladesh, Belgium, Bosnia and Herzegovina, Bulgaria, Canada, Costa Rica, Croatia, Cyprus, Denmark, Ecuador, Finland, France, Georgia, Germany, Greece, Guatemala, Hungary, Iceland, Ireland, Italy, Luxembourg, Micronesia (Federated States of), Morocco, the Netherlands, New Zealand, the Niger, Nigeria, Norway, Pakistan, Panama, Portugal, Romania, Slovakia, Slovenia, Solomon Islands, Spain, Sweden and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland introduced a draft resolution entitled "International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination" (A/C.3/51/L.24). Subsequently, Argentina, the Czech Republic,

the <u>Dominican Republic</u>, <u>El Salvador</u>, <u>Japan</u>, <u>Madagascar</u>, <u>Namibia</u>, <u>Peru</u>, <u>San Marino</u>, <u>South Africa</u>, <u>the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia</u>, <u>Togo</u> and <u>Zambia</u> joined in sponsoring the draft resolution.

10. At its 38th meeting, on 14 November, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.24 without a vote (see para. 15, draft resolution II).

C. Draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.27 and Rev.1

11. At the 35th meeting, on 13 November, the representative of Costa Rica, on behalf of the States members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and China, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination" (A/C.3/51/L.27), which read:

"The General Assembly,

"Reaffirming its objectives set forth in the Charter of the United Nations to achieve international cooperation in solving problems of an economic, social, cultural or humanitarian character and in promoting and encouraging respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion,

"Reaffirming also its firm determination and its commitment to eradicate totally and unconditionally racism, in all its forms, and racial discrimination,

"<u>Recalling</u> the Universal Declaration of Human Rights,⁸ the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination⁹ and the Convention against Discrimination in Education adopted by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization on 14 December 1960,¹⁰

"Recalling also the outcome of the two World Conferences to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, held at Geneva in 1978 and 1983,

"Welcoming the outcome of the World Conference on Human Rights, held at Vienna from 14 to 25 June 1993, and, in particular, the attention given in the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action¹¹ to the elimination of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and other forms of intolerance,

"<u>Stressing</u> the importance of the activities of the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance,

"Recalling its resolutions 48/91 of 20 December 1993 and 49/146 of 23 December 1994, by which it proclaimed the Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination and adopted the revised Programme of Action for the Third Decade,

"Noting with grave concern that, despite the efforts of the international community, the principal objectives of the two Decades for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination have not been attained and that millions of human beings continue to this day to be the victims of varied forms of racism and racial discrimination,

"Noting with great concern that, despite the efforts undertaken by the international community at various levels, racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia, ethnic antagonism and acts of violence resulting therefrom are on the increase,

"Noting with concern that technological developments in the field of communication, including computer networks such as the Internet, have been used for dissemination of racist and xenophobic propaganda all over the world,

"<u>Having considered</u> the reports submitted by the Secretary-General¹² within the framework of the implementation of the Programme of Action for the Third Decade,

"Firmly convinced of the need to take more effective and sustained measures at the national and international levels for the elimination of all forms of racism and racial discrimination,

"Recognizing the importance of strengthening national legislation and institutions for the promotion of racial harmony,

"Deeply concerned about the fact that the phenomenon of racism and racial discrimination against migrant workers continues to increase despite efforts undertaken by the international community to improve the protection of the human rights of migrant workers and members of their families,

"Recalling the adoption at its forty-fifth session of the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families, 13

"Acknowledging that indigenous people are at times victims of particular forms of racism and racial discrimination,

- "1. <u>Declares once again</u> that all forms of racism and racial discrimination, whether in their institutionalized form or resulting from official doctrine of racial superiority or exclusivity, such as ethnic cleansing, are among the most serious violations of human rights in the contemporary world and must be combated by all available means;
- "2. <u>Recalls with satisfaction</u> the proclamation of the Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, which began in 1993, and requests the Secretary-General to make a further review of the Programme of Action with a view to making it more effective and action-oriented;
- "3. <u>Calls upon</u> Governments to cooperate more closely with the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance to enable him to fulfil his mandate;
- "4. <u>Urges</u> all Governments to take all necessary measures to combat new forms of racism, in particular by adapting constantly the means provided to combat them, especially in the legislative, administrative, educational and information fields;
- "5. <u>Requests</u> the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights to give the highest priority in the Centre for Human Rights of the Secretariat to programmes and activities for combating racism and racial discrimination and to the follow-up of those programmes and activities;
- "6. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue to accord special attention to the situation of migrant workers and members of their families and to include regularly in his reports all information on such workers;
- "7. <u>Calls upon</u> all Member States to consider signing and ratifying or acceding to the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families as a matter of priority;
- "8. <u>Commends</u> all States which have ratified or acceded to the international instruments to combat racism and racial discrimination;
- "9. <u>Encourages</u> the mass media to promote ideas of tolerance and understanding among peoples and between different cultures;
- "10. Recommends that a seminar be organized by the Centre for Human Rights in cooperation with the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, the International Telecommunication Union and other relevant United Nations bodies, non-governmental organizations and Internet service providers, with a view to assessing the role of the Internet and to suggesting ways and means for its responsible use in the light of the provisions of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination;
- "11. Requests the Secretary-General to continue the study on the effects of racial discrimination on the children of minorities, in

particular those of migrant workers, in the fields of education, training and employment, and to submit, <u>inter alia</u>, specific recommendations for the implementation of measures to combat the effects of that discrimination;

- "12. <u>Urges</u> the Secretary-General, United Nations bodies, the specialized agencies, all Governments, intergovernmental organizations and relevant non-governmental organizations, in implementing the Programme of Action for the Third Decade, to pay particular attention to the situation of indigenous people;
- "13. <u>Requests</u> States to consider the relevant decisions of the Economic and Social Council on the integrated follow-up to previous world conferences and the need to make optimum use of all available mechanisms in the struggle against racism;
- "14. <u>Strongly underlines</u> the importance of education as a significant means of preventing and eradicating racism and racial discrimination and of creating awareness of principles of human rights, particularly among young people, and in this regard renews its invitation to the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization to expedite the preparation of teaching materials and teaching aids to promote teaching, training and educational activities on human rights and against racism and racial discrimination, with particular emphasis on activities at the primary and secondary levels of education;
- "15. <u>Considers</u> that all the parts of the Programme of Action for the Third Decade should be given equal attention in order to attain the objectives of the Decade;
- "16. Regrets the lack of interest, support and financial resources for the Third Decade and its related Programme of Action, which was reflected in the fact that the Centre for Human Rights was able to organize only one seminar since its adoption by the General Assembly in 1993;
- "17. <u>Considers</u> that voluntary contributions to the Trust Fund for the Programme for the Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination are indispensable for the implementation of the Programme;
- "18. Requests the Secretary-General to ensure that the necessary financial resources are provided for the implementation of the activities of the Third Decade during the biennium 1996-1997;
- "19. <u>Also requests</u> the Secretary-General to accord the highest priority to the activities of the Programme of Action for the Third Decade;
- "20. <u>Further requests</u> the Secretary-General to submit each year to the Economic and Social Council a detailed report on all activities of United Nations bodies and the specialized agencies, containing an analysis of information received on such activities to combat racism and racial discrimination;

- "21. <u>Invites</u> the Secretary-General to submit proposals to the General Assembly with a view to supplementing, if necessary, the Programme of Action for the Third Decade;
- "22. <u>Invites</u> all Governments, United Nations bodies, the specialized agencies and other intergovernmental organizations, as well as interested non-governmental organizations in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council, to participate fully in the Third Decade;
- "23. <u>Notes</u> that unless a supplementary financial effort is made very few of the activities planned for the period 1994-1997 will be carried out;
- "24. Strongly appeals to all Governments, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations and individuals in a position to do so to contribute generously to the Trust Fund for the Programme for the Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, and to this end requests the Secretary-General to continue to undertake appropriate contacts and initiatives to encourage contributions;
- "25. <u>Decides</u> to convene a world conference to combat racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance by the year 1999;
- "26. <u>Decides</u> to keep the item entitled 'Elimination of racism and racial discrimination' on its agenda and to consider it as a matter of the highest priority at its fifty-second session."
- 12. At its 49th meeting, on 22 November, the Committee had before it a revised draft resolution (A/C.3/51/L.27/Rev.1) submitted by the sponsor of draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.27 and $\underline{\text{Mexico}}$. Subsequently, the former Yugoslav Republic of Macedonia and Turkey joined in sponsoring the revised draft resolution.
- 13. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted revised draft resolution A/C.3/51/L.27/Rev.1 without a vote (see para. 15, draft resolution III).

D. Draft decision

14. At its 49th meeting, on 22 November, on the proposal of the Chairperson, the Committee adopted a draft decision, without a vote, by which the General Assembly would take note of the report of the Secretary-General on the status of the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid (A/51/427) (see para. 16).

- 11. <u>Commends</u> non-governmental organizations for their action against racism and racial discrimination and for their continuous support and assistance to the victims of racism and racial discrimination;
- 12. <u>Urges</u> all Governments to cooperate fully with the Special Rapporteur, with a view to enabling him to fulfil his mandate;
- 13. Requests once again the Secretary-General to provide, without any further delay, the Special Rapporteur, as in the case of other Special Rapporteurs, with all the necessary human and financial assistance to carry out his mandate efficiently, effectively and expeditiously and to enable him to submit, in a timely manner, an interim report on this question to the General Assembly at its fifty-second session.

DRAFT RESOLUTION II

International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination

The General Assembly,

Recalling its previous resolutions concerning the reports of the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination and its resolutions on the status of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, 20

<u>Reiterating</u> the importance of the Convention, which is one of the most widely accepted human rights instruments adopted under the auspices of the United Nations,

Reiterating once again the need to intensify the struggle for the elimination of all forms of racism and racial discrimination throughout the world, especially its most brutal forms,

<u>Aware</u> of the importance of the contributions of the Committee to the efforts of the United Nations to combat racism and all other forms of discrimination based on race, colour, descent or national or ethnic origin,

<u>Emphasizing</u> the obligation of all States parties to the Convention to take legislative, judicial and other measures to secure full implementation of the provisions of the Convention,

<u>Expressing its satisfaction</u> at the entry into force on 3 December 1982 of the competence of the Committee to receive and consider communications from individuals or groups of individuals under article 14 of the Convention,

Bearing in mind the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action, adopted by the World Conference on Human Rights on 25 June 1993, 21 in particular section II.B, relating to equality, dignity and tolerance, and General Assembly resolution 50/201 of 22 December 1995, in particular paragraph 9 thereof,

Recalling its resolution 47/111 of 16 December 1992, in which it welcomed the decision, taken on 15 January 1992 at the Fourteenth Meeting of States Parties to the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination, to amend paragraph 6 of article 8 of the Convention and to add a new paragraph, as paragraph 7 of article 8, with a view to providing for the financing of the Committee from the regular budget of the United Nations, and concerned that an amendment to the Convention has not yet entered into force,

<u>Welcoming</u> efforts of the Secretary-General to ensure interim financial arrangements for the financing of the expenses incurred by the Committee,

 $\underline{\text{Recalling}}$ the provisions of paragraph 4 of article 10 of the Convention regarding the location of the meetings of the Committee,

Stressing the importance of enabling the Committee to function smoothly and to have all necessary facilities for the effective performance of its functions under the Convention,

1. Takes note with appreciation of the report of the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination on the work of its forty-eighth and forty-ninth sessions; 22

- 2. <u>Commends</u> the Committee for its work with regard to the implementation of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination;
- 3. <u>Calls upon</u> States parties to fulfil their obligation, under paragraph 1 of article 9 of the Convention, to submit in due time their periodic reports on measures taken to implement the Convention;
- 4. <u>Commends</u> the Committee on its working methods, including its procedure for reviewing the implementation of the Convention in States whose initial and periodic reports are overdue and the formulating of concluding observations on reports of States parties to the Convention;
- 5. <u>Commends</u> the Committee for its contribution to the prevention of racial discrimination, including early warning measures and urgent procedures, and welcomes its relevant action thereon;
- 6. <u>Encourages</u> the Committee to contribute fully to the implementation of the Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination and its revised Programme of Action, including by the continued collaboration between the Committee and the Subcommission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities;
- 7. <u>Welcomes</u> the cooperation and exchange of information between the Committee and relevant structures and mechanisms of the United Nations, including the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights, as well as the process of establishing liaisons with other international organizations;

- 8. Takes note of the report of the Secretary-General on the financial situation of the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination; 23
- 9. Expresses its profound concern at the fact that a number of States parties to the Convention have still not fulfilled their financial obligations, as shown in the report of the Secretary-General, and strongly appeals to all States parties that are in arrears to fulfil their outstanding financial obligations under paragraph 6 of article 8 of the Convention;
- 10. <u>Urges</u> States parties to accelerate their domestic ratification procedures with regard to the amendment to the Convention regarding the financing of the Committee and expeditiously to notify the Secretary-General in writing of their agreement to the amendment, as decided upon at the Fourteenth Meeting of States Parties on 15 January 1992 and endorsed by the General Assembly in its resolution 47/111, and further reiterated at the Sixteenth Meeting of States Parties on 16 January 1996;

- 11. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue to ensure adequate financial arrangements and appropriate means to ensure the functioning of the Committee;
- 12. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to invite those States parties that are in arrears to pay the amounts in arrears, and to report thereon to the General Assembly at its fifty-second session;
- 13. <u>Decides</u> to consider at its fifty-second session, under the item entitled "Elimination of racism and racial discrimination", the report of the Secretary-General on the financial situation of the Committee and the report of the Committee;

Status of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination

- 14. $\underline{\text{Takes note}}$ of the report of the Secretary-General on the status of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination; 24
- 15. Expresses its satisfaction at the number of States that have ratified the Convention or acceded thereto;
- 16. Reaffirms once again its conviction that ratification of or accession to the Convention on a universal basis and implementation of its provisions are necessary for the realization of the objectives of the Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination and for action beyond the Decade;
- 17. Requests those States that have not yet become parties to the Convention to ratify it or accede thereto;
- 18. <u>Encourages</u> States to limit the extent of any reservation they lodge to the Convention and to formulate any reservation as precisely and as narrowly as possible while ensuring that no reservation is incompatible with the object and purpose of the Convention or otherwise contrary to international law;
- 19. <u>Requests</u> the States parties to the Convention that have not yet done so to consider the possibility of making the declaration provided for in article 14 of the Convention;
- 20. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to submit to the General Assembly at its fifty-third session a report concerning the status of the Convention, in accordance with Assembly resolution 2106 A (XX) of 21 December 1965.

DRAFT RESOLUTION III

Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination

The General Assembly,

<u>Reaffirming its objectives</u> set forth in the Charter of the United Nations to achieve international cooperation in solving problems of an economic, social, cultural or humanitarian character and in promoting and encouraging respect for human rights and fundamental freedoms for all without distinction as to race, sex, language or religion,

<u>Reaffirming also its firm determination and its commitment</u> to eradicate totally and unconditionally racism, in all its forms, and racial discrimination,

<u>Recalling</u> the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, ²⁵ the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination²⁶ and the Convention against Discrimination in Education adopted by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization on 14 December 1960, ²⁷

<u>Recalling also</u> the outcome of the two World Conferences to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, held at Geneva in 1978 and 1983,

<u>Welcoming</u> the outcome of the World Conference on Human Rights, held at Vienna from 14 to 25 June 1993, and, in particular, the attention given in the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action²⁸ to the elimination of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and other forms of intolerance,

<u>Stressing</u> the importance of the activities of the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolutions 48/91 of 20 December 1993 and 49/146 of 23 December 1994, by which it proclaimed the Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination and adopted the revised Programme of Action for the Third Decade,

Noting with grave concern that, despite the efforts of the international community, the principal objectives of the two Decades for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination have not been attained and that millions of human beings continue to this day to be the victims of varied forms of racism and racial discrimination,

Noting with great concern that, despite the efforts undertaken by the international community at various levels, racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related forms of intolerance, ethnic antagonism and acts of violence are showing signs of increase,

<u>Noting with concern</u> that technological developments in the field of communication, including computer networks such as the Internet, have been used for dissemination of racist and xenophobic propaganda throughout the world,

<u>Having considered</u> the reports submitted by the Secretary-General²⁹ within the framework of the implementation of the Programme of Action for the Third Decade,

<u>Firmly convinced</u> of the need to take more effective and sustained measures at the national and international levels for the elimination of all forms of racism and racial discrimination,

 $\underline{\text{Recognizing}}$ the importance of strengthening national legislation and institutions for the promotion of racial harmony,

<u>Deeply concerned</u> about the fact that the phenomenon of racism and racial discrimination against migrant workers continues to increase despite efforts undertaken by the international community to improve the protection of the human rights of migrant workers and members of their families,

 $\underline{\text{Recalling}}$ the adoption at its forty-fifth session of the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families, 30

 $\underline{\text{Acknowledging}}$ that indigenous people are at times victims of particular forms of racism and racial discrimination,

- 1. <u>Declares once again</u> that all forms of racism and racial discrimination, whether in their institutionalized form or resulting from official doctrine of racial superiority or exclusivity, such as ethnic cleansing, are among the most serious violations of human rights in the contemporary world and must be combated by all available means;
- 2. <u>Recalls with satisfaction</u> the proclamation of the Third Decade to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, which began in 1993, and requests the Secretary-General to make a further review of the Programme of Action with a view to making it more effective and action-oriented;
- 3. <u>Calls upon</u> Governments to cooperate more closely with the Special Rapporteur of the Commission on Human Rights on contemporary forms of racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and related intolerance to enable him to fulfil his mandate;

- 4. <u>Urges</u> all Governments to take all necessary measures to combat new forms of racism, in particular by adapting constantly the means provided to combat them, especially in the legislative, administrative, educational and information fields;
- 5. Requests the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights to give priority, through the Centre for Human Rights of the Secretariat, to the follow-up of programmes and activities for combating racism and racial discrimination;
- 6. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue to accord special attention to the situation of migrant workers and members of their families and to include regularly in his reports all information on such workers;
- 7. <u>Calls upon</u> all Member States to consider signing and ratifying or acceding to the International Convention on the Protection of the Rights of All Migrant Workers and Members of Their Families as a matter of priority;
- 8. <u>Commends</u> all States that have ratified or acceded to the international instruments to combat racism and racial discrimination;
- 9. <u>Encourages</u> the mass media to promote ideas of tolerance and understanding among peoples and between different cultures;
- 10. Recommends that a seminar be organized by the Centre for Human Rights in cooperation with the Committee on the Elimination of Racial Discrimination, the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization, the International Telecommunication Union and other relevant United Nations bodies, non-governmental organizations and Internet service providers, with a view to assessing the role of the Internet in the light of the provisions of the International Convention on the Elimination of All Forms of Racial Discrimination;
- 11. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue the study on the effects of racial discrimination on the children of minorities, in particular those of migrant workers, in the fields of education, training and employment, and to submit, <u>inter alia</u>, specific recommendations for the implementation of measures to combat the effects of that discrimination;
- 12. <u>Urges</u> the Secretary-General, United Nations bodies, the specialized agencies, all Governments, intergovernmental organizations and relevant non-governmental organizations, in implementing the Programme of Action for the Third Decade, to pay particular attention to the situation of indigenous people;
- 13. <u>Requests</u> States to consider the relevant decisions of the Economic and Social Council on the integrated follow-up to previous world conferences and the need to make optimum use of all available mechanisms in the struggle against racism;
- 14. <u>Strongly underlines</u> the importance of education as a significant means of preventing and eradicating racism and racial discrimination and of creating awareness of principles of human rights, particularly among young people, and in this regard renews its invitation to the United Nations Educational, Scientific

and Cultural Organization to expedite the preparation of teaching materials and teaching aids to promote teaching, training and educational activities on human rights and against racism and racial discrimination, with particular emphasis on activities at the primary and secondary levels of education;

- 15. <u>Considers</u> that all the parts of the Programme of Action for the Third Decade should be given equal attention in order to attain the objectives of the Decade;
- 16. Regrets the lack of interest, support and financial resources for the Third Decade and its related Programme of Action, which was reflected in the fact that the Centre for Human Rights was able to organize only one seminar since its adoption by the General Assembly in 1993, and notes that unless a supplementary financial effort is made very few of the activities planned for the period 1994-1997 will be carried out;
- 17. <u>Considers</u> that voluntary contributions to the Trust Fund for the Programme for the Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination are indispensable for the implementation of the Programme;
- 18. Requests the Secretary-General to ensure that the necessary financial resources are provided for the implementation of the activities of the Third Decade during the biennium 1996-1997;
- 19. <u>Also requests</u> the Secretary-General to accord the highest priority to the activities of the Programme of Action for the Third Decade;
- 20. <u>Further requests</u> the Secretary-General to submit each year to the Economic and Social Council a detailed report on all activities of United Nations bodies and the specialized agencies, containing an analysis of information received on such activities to combat racism and racial discrimination;
- 21. <u>Invites</u> the Secretary-General to submit proposals to the General Assembly with a view to supplementing, if necessary, the Programme of Action for the Third Decade;
- 22. <u>Invites</u> all Governments, United Nations bodies, the specialized agencies and other intergovernmental organizations, as well as interested non-governmental organizations in consultative status with the Economic and Social Council, to participate fully in the Third Decade;
- 23. <u>Strongly appeals</u> to all Governments, intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations and individuals in a position to do so to contribute generously to the Trust Fund for the Programme for the Decade for Action to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination, and to this end requests the Secretary-General to continue to undertake appropriate contacts and initiatives to encourage contributions;
- 24. <u>Invites</u> the Commission on Human Rights to consider at its fifty-third session as a matter of priority the question of a possible world conference to combat racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and other related contemporary

forms of intolerance, and to make appropriate recommendations through the Economic and Social Council to the General Assembly at its fifty-second session;

- 25. Requests once again the Secretary-General to consult Member States and intergovernmental, as well as non-governmental, organizations on the possibility of holding a world conference to combat racism, racial discrimination, xenophobia and other related contemporary forms of intolerance;
- 26. <u>Decides</u> to keep the item entitled "Elimination of racism and racial discrimination" on its agenda and to consider it as a matter of the highest priority at its fifty-second session.
- 16. The Third Committee also recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft decision:
