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COMPREHENSIVE REVIEW OF THE WHOLE QUESTION OF PEACEKEEPING OPERATIONS IN ALL THEIR ASPECTS

Report of the Special Political and Decolonization Committee (Fourth Committee)

Rapporteur: Mr. El Walid DOUDECH (Tunisia)

I. INTRODUCTION

- 1. At its 3rd plenary meeting, on 20 September 1996, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee, decided to include in the agenda of its fifty-first session the item entitled "Comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects" and to allocate it to the Special Political and Decolonization Committee (Fourth Committee).
- 2. The Fourth Committee considered the item at its 15th to 18th and 22nd meetings, from 18 to 20 and on 27 November 1996 (see A/C.4/51/SR.15-18 and 22). The general debate on the item took place at the 15th to 18th meetings, from 18 to 20 November.
- 3. For its consideration of the item, the Committee had before it the following documents:
 - (a) Report of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations (A/51/130);
- (b) Letter dated 11 April 1996 from the Permanent Representative of the Democratic People's Republic of Korea to the United Nations addressed to the Secretary-General (A/51/98-S/1996/270).
- 4. At the 15th meeting, on 18 November, the representative of Egypt, in his capacity as Rapporteur of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations, introduced the report of that Committee.

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5. At the same meeting, the Under-Secretary-General for Peacekeeping Operations made a statement.

II. CONSIDERATION OF PROPOSALS

A. Draft resolution A/C.4/50/L.9

- 6. At the 18th meeting, on 20 November, the representative of Canada, on behalf of <u>Argentina</u>, <u>Canada</u>, <u>Egypt</u>, <u>Japan</u>, <u>Nigeria</u> and <u>Poland</u>, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects" (A/C.4/51/L.9).
- 7. The Secretary of the Committee read out a statement prepared by the Department of Peacekeeping Operations on the programme budget implications of the draft resolution.
- 8. After hearing statements by the representatives of the United States of America and Ireland (see A/C.4/51/SR.18), the Committee decided to postpone action on the draft resolution to a later meeting, to allow time for consideration of the programme budget implications.
- 9. At the 22nd meeting, on 27 November, the Chairman drew the attention of the Committee to a statement of the programme budget implications of the draft resolution (A/C.4/51/L.24).
- 10. At the same meeting, the representative of China proposed an oral amendment to the draft resolution, by which operative paragraph 4 would be deleted.
- 11. At its 22nd meeting, on 27 November, the Committee adopted the oral amendment to the draft resolution by a recorded vote of 125 to $3.^1\,$ The voting was as follows:

B. Draft resolution A/C.4/51/L.10

- 13. At the 18th meeting, on 20 November, the representative of Ukraine, on behalf of Australia, Bangladesh, Belgium, Bolivia, Brazil, Denmark, Fiji, Finland, France, Germany, Haiti, Honduras, Italy, Japan, Kyrgyzstan, Liechtenstein, Malta, New Zealand, Norway, Panama, the Philippines, Poland, Portugal, Romania, Samoa, Sierra Leone, Singapore, Slovakia, Sweden, Togo, Tunisia, Ukraine, the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the United States of America, Uruguay and Uzbekistan, introduced a draft resolution entitled "Convention on the Safety of United Nations and Associated Personnel" (A/C.4/51/L.10), and orally revised operative paragraph 3 by replacing the words "within existing resources" with the words "to continue" before the words "to take steps".
- 14. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.4/51/L.10, as orally revised, without a vote (see para. 15, draft resolution II).
 - III. RECOMMENDATIONS OF THE SPECIAL POLITICAL AND DECOLONIZATION COMMITTEE (FOURTH COMMITTEE)
- 15. The Special Political and Decolonization Committee (Fourth Committee) recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolutions:

DRAFT RESOLUTION I

<u>Comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects</u>

The General Assembly,

 $\underline{\text{Recalling}}$ its resolution 2006 (XIX) of 18 February 1965 and all other relevant resolutions,

Recalling in particular its resolution 50/30 of 6 December 1995,

 $\underline{\text{Taking note}}$ of the report of the Secretary-General on the work of the Organization, 3

<u>Welcoming</u> the statement of 28 March 1996 by the President of the Security Council on the arrangements for improved consultation and exchange of information with troop-contributing countries, 4

Affirming that the efforts of the United Nations in the peaceful settlement of disputes, including through its peacekeeping operations, are indispensable,

<u>Convinced</u> of the need for the United Nations to continue to improve its capabilities in the field of peacekeeping and to enhance the effective and efficient deployment of its peacekeeping missions,

<u>Considering</u> the contribution that all Members of the Organization make to peacekeeping,

<u>Taking note</u> of the widespread interest in contributing to the work of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations expressed by many Member States, including troop-contributing countries,

Bearing in mind the continuous necessity of preserving the efficiency and strengthening the effectiveness of the work of the Special Committee,

- 1. $\underline{\text{Welcomes}}$ the report of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations; 5
- 2. <u>Endorses</u> the proposals, recommendations and conclusions of the Special Committee contained in paragraphs 29 to 85 of its report;
- 3. <u>Urges</u> Member States, the Secretariat and relevant organs of the United Nations to take all necessary steps to implement the proposals, recommendations and conclusions of the Special Committee;
- 4. <u>Decides</u> to expand the membership of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations in accordance with the provisions of its report; those Member States which are past or present personnel contributors to United Nations peacekeeping operations and those which were observers at the 1996 session of the Special Committee shall, upon request in writing to the Chairman of the Committee, become members at its 1997 session;
- 5. <u>Decides also</u> that those Member States which become personnel contributors to United Nations peacekeeping operations in years to come or participate in the future in the Special Committee for three consecutive years as observers shall, upon request in writing to the Chairman of the Committee, become members at the following session of the Committee;
- 6. <u>Decides further</u> that the Special Committee, in accordance with its mandate, should continue its efforts for a comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects, and should review the

implementation of its previous proposals and consider new proposals so as to enhance the capacity of the United Nations to fulfil its responsibilities in this field;

- 7. Requests the Special Committee to submit a report on its work to the General Assembly at its fifty-second session;
- 8. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its fifty-second session the item entitled "Comprehensive review of the whole question of peacekeeping operations in all their aspects".

DRAFT RESOLUTION II

<u>Convention on the Safety of United Nations and</u> Associated Personnel

The General Assembly,

Recalling its resolution 49/59 of 9 December 1994, by which it adopted the Convention on the Safety of United Nations and Associated Personnel,

<u>Gravely concerned</u> by the continuing attacks and acts of violence against United Nations and associated personnel that have caused death or serious injury,

<u>Conscious</u> of the need effectively to promote and protect the safety and security of the personnel who act on behalf of the United Nations, attacks against whom are unjustifiable and unacceptable,

<u>Recognizing</u> that United Nations and associated personnel, while carrying out their activities in support of the fulfilment of the mandate of a United Nations operation, are acting in the common interests of the international community,

 $\underline{\text{Considering}}$ that the entry into force of the Convention would strengthen arrangements for the protection of personnel who act on behalf of the United Nations,

 $\underline{\text{Noting}}$, however, that only a small number of States have become parties to the Convention,

<u>Recalling</u> the report of the Special Committee on Peacekeeping Operations,⁵ in which, in particular, the Committee called upon Member States to ratify the Convention so as to ensure its early entry into force,

1. <u>Welcomes</u> all signatures, ratifications, acceptances, approvals and accessions to the Convention on the Safety of United Nations and Associated Personnel;

- 2. <u>Urges</u> all States that have not yet done so to consider ratifying, accepting, approving or acceding to the Convention, to bring about the entry into force of the Convention at the earliest possible date;
- 3. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue to take the necessary steps to facilitate the dissemination of information relating to the Convention and to promote its wider appreciation;
- 4. <u>Also requests</u> the Secretary-General to inform the General Assembly at its fifty-third session on the status of the Convention and on the steps taken pursuant to paragraph 3 above.
