ENVIRONMENT AND SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT: IMPLEMENTATION OF THE CONVENTION ON BIOLOGICAL DIVERSITY

Report of the Second Committee (Part IV)*

I. INTRODUCTION

1. The Second Committee held a substantive debate on agenda item 97 (see A/51/605, para. 2). Action on sub-item (c) was taken at the 22nd and 37th meetings, on 30 October and 2 December 1996. An account of the Committee's consideration of the item is contained in the relevant summary records (A/C.2/51/SR.22 and 37).

II. CONSIDERATION OF DRAFT RESOLUTIONS A/C.2/51/L.5 AND L.31

2. At the 22nd meeting, on 30 October, the representative of <u>Costa Rica</u> (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Group of 77 and <u>China</u>) and <u>Colombia</u> (on behalf of the States Members of the United Nations that are members of the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries) introduced a draft resolution (A/C.2/51/L.5) entitled "Convention on Biological Diversity", which read:

"The General Assembly,

"<u>Reaffirming</u> its resolutions 49/117 of 19 December 1994 and 50/111 of 20 December 1995 on the Convention on Biological Diversity and resolution

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49/119 of 19 December 1994 on the International Day for Biological Diversity,

"Recalling the provisions of the Convention on Biological Diversity,

"<u>Recalling also</u> Agenda 21, particularly its chapter 15, on the conservation of biological diversity, and related chapters,

"<u>Recalling further</u> the recommendations made at the third session of the Commission on Sustainable Development on the review of chapter 15 of Agenda 21 on the conservation of biological diversity,

"Deeply concerned by the continuing loss of the world's biological diversity and, on the basis of the provisions of the Convention, reaffirming the commitment to the conservation of biological diversity, the sustainable use of its components, the provision of financial resources, technology transfer, respect for each country's intellectual property rights, and the fair and equitable sharing of benefits arising from the use of genetic resources, in particular for the developing countries,

"<u>Emphasizing</u> that the Convention is an instrument aimed at achieving sustainable development, and taking into account its three objectives,

"<u>Noting with satisfaction</u> that most States Members of the United Nations and one regional economic integration organization have ratified or acceded to the Convention on Biological Diversity, and calling upon those States that are not parties to take appropriate action to that end,

"<u>Taking note with appreciation</u> of the generous offer of the Government of Argentina to host the third session of the Conference of the Parties at Buenos Aires from 4 to 15 November 1996,

"Encouraged by the work carried out to date under the Convention,

"1. <u>Welcomes</u> the results of the second meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, held at Jakarta from 6 to 17 November 1995, as reflected in the report of the Executive Secretary of the Convention, submitted in accordance with paragraph 5 of General Assembly resolution 50/111, and takes note of the Jakarta Mandate on Marine and Coastal Biological Diversity, which proposes a framework for global action;

"2. <u>Takes note</u> of the results of the second meeting of the Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice, held at the headquarters of the secretariat of the Convention at Montreal from 2 to 6 September 1996, and of the work carried out at the first meeting of the Open-ended Ad Hoc Working Group on Biosafety, held at Aarhus, Denmark from 22 to 26 July 1996;

"3. <u>Calls upon</u> those States that have not yet ratified the Convention to expedite their internal procedures of ratification, acceptance or approval;

"4. <u>Also calls upon</u> the international community, including multilateral mechanisms and existing funds and programmes, to provide adequate and additional resources, in an expeditious manner, for activities related to the Convention on Biological Diversity, taking into account the three objectives of the Convention;

"5. <u>Welcomes</u> the work being carried out under the Convention aimed at enhancing cooperation with the Commission on Sustainable Development, conventions related to biological diversity and other international agreements, institutions and processes of relevance, and invites the Conference of the Parties to the Convention, at its fourth meeting, to consider ways of promoting closer cooperation between the Conference of the Parties and the General Assembly with respect to aspects of sustainable development that are related to biological diversity;

"6. <u>Requests</u> the Conference of the Parties to submit to the General Assembly at its special session in 1997, a report considering, <u>inter alia</u>, progress made and problems encountered, and the effectiveness of inter-agency arrangements established to follow-up the United Nations Conference on Environment and Development and suggesting, on the basis of experience gained under the Convention, ways of promoting effective and efficient support in the area of sustainable development throughout the United Nations system for the period after 1997;

"7. <u>Invites</u> the Executive Secretary of the Convention on Biological Diversity to report to the General Assembly on a regular basis, including at its fifty-second session, on the results of future meetings of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention;

"8. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its fifty-second session an item entitled 'Convention on Biological Diversity'".

3. At the 37th meeting, on 2 December, the Vice-Chairman of the Committee, Mr. Mohammad Reza Hadji Karim Djabbary (Islamic Republic of Iran), introduced a draft resolution (A/C.2/51/L.31), submitted on the basis of informal consultations held on draft resolution A/C.2/51/L.5.

4. At the same meeting, the Committee adopted draft resolution A/C.2/51/L.31 (see para. 7).

5. After the adoption of the draft resolution, the representative of the Marshall Islands made a statement (see A/C.2/51/SR.37).

6. In the light of the adoption of draft resolution A/C.2/51/L.31, draft resolution A/C.2/51/L.5 was withdrawn by its sponsors.

III. RECOMMENDATION OF THE SECOND COMMITTEE

7. The Second Committee recommends to the General Assembly the adoption of the following draft resolution:

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Convention on biological diversity

The General Assembly,

<u>Reaffirming</u> its resolutions 49/117 of 19 December 1994 and 50/111 of 20 December 1995 on the Convention on Biological Diversity, and resolution 49/119 of 19 December 1994 on the International Day for Biological Diversity,

<u>Recalling</u> the provisions of the Convention on Biological Diversity,¹

<u>Also recalling</u> Agenda 21,² particularly its chapter 15, on the conservation of biological diversity, and related chapters,

<u>Further recalling</u> the recommendations made at the third session of the Commission on Sustainable Development on the review of chapter 15 of Agenda 21 on the conservation of biological diversity,³

<u>Deeply concerned</u> by the continued loss of the world's biological diversity and, on the basis of the provisions of the Convention, reaffirming the commitment to the conservation of biological diversity, the sustainable use of its components, and the fair and equitable sharing of benefits arising out of the utilization of genetic resources,

Emphasizing that the Convention on Biological Diversity is an important instrument for achieving sustainable development, taking into account its three objectives,

<u>Notes with satisfaction</u> that most States and one regional economic integration organization have ratified or acceded to the Convention,

<u>Taking note with appreciation</u> of the generous offer of the Government of Argentina to host the third session of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention at Buenos Aires from 4 to 15 November 1996,

Encouraged by the work carried out to date under the Convention,

1. <u>Welcomes</u> the results of the second meeting of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention on Biological Diversity, held in Jakarta, Indonesia

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from 6 to 17 November 1995, as reflected in the report of the meetings,⁴ submitted in accordance with General Assembly resolution 50/111, and in that context reaffirms the need to take concrete action to fulfil the three objectives of the Convention, and takes note of the Jakarta Mandate on Marine and Coastal Biological Diversity, which proposes a framework for global action;⁵

2. <u>Takes note</u> of the results of the second meeting of the Convention's Subsidiary Body on Scientific, Technical and Technological Advice, held at the seat of the secretariat of the Convention in Montreal from 2 to 6 September 1996, and of the work carried out at the first meeting of the Openended Ad Hoc Working Group on Biosafety, held in Aarhus, Denmark from 22 to 26 July 1996;

3. <u>Encourages</u> those States that have not yet ratified the Convention to do so;

4. <u>Recognizes</u> that States Parties have agreed to provide financial resources for the implementation of the Convention in accordance with article 20, paragraphs 1 and 2, of the Convention;

5. <u>Invites</u> the Executive Secretary of the Convention to provide to the General Assembly at its special session in 1997, <u>inter alia</u>, information on experience gained under the Convention to date, and information on effective arrangements for the coordination of activities related to the objectives of the Convention;

6. <u>Welcomes</u> the work being carried out under the Convention to enhance cooperation with the Commission on Sustainable Development and biodiversityrelated conventions, and invites the Conference of the Parties to the Convention to take into account the outcome of the 1997 special session at its fourth meeting, when considering ways of promoting greater cooperation with the United Nations system and the international community in relation to activities relevant to the objectives of the Convention;

7. <u>Invites</u> the Executive Secretary of the Convention on Biological Diversity to report to the General Assembly at its fifty-second session, and pending the outcome of the 1997 special session, to report to the Assembly on the results of future meetings of the Conference of the Parties to the Convention;

8. <u>Decides</u> to include in the provisional agenda of its fifty-second session the item entitled "Convention on Biological Diversity".
