Note by the Secretary-General

Addendum

1. In accordance with relevant Economic and Social Council resolutions and in particular resolution 1986/35, the Commission on Human Rights, at its fifty-second session, is called upon to elect half of the Sub-Commission membership and the corresponding alternates, if any, in accordance with the following pattern: four members from African States; two members from Asian States; two members from Eastern European States; two members from Latin American States and three members from Western European and other States.
2. The Secretary-General, in documents E/CN.4/1996/104 and Add.1, informed the Commission of the nominations of candidates and alternates for election to the Sub-Commission received as at 10 January 1996. Those documents also contained the biographical data of candidates and alternates which had been received.
3. Additional nominations and biographical data as well as other communications have been received since 10 January 1996.
4. On 8 March 1996, the Government of Zimbabwe informed the Secretary-General that it had decided to withdraw its nominations.

5. The present document contains the updated list of nominations for membership of the Sub-Commission as at 15 March 1996.

6. Communications and nominations received subsequent to the date of the present document will be reproduced in further addenda.
