Nota del Secretario General

Adición

1. De conformidad con las resoluciones pertinentes del Consejo Económico y Social, y en especial con la resolución 1986/35, la Comisión de Derechos Humanos ha de proceder, en su 52° período de sesiones, a la elección de la mitad de los miembros de la Subcomisión y de los correspondientes suplentes, si los hubiere, de conformidad con la siguiente distribución: cuatro miembros de Estados africanos, dos miembros de Estados asiáticos, dos miembros de Estados de Europa oriental, dos miembros de Estados de América Latina y tres miembros de Estados de Europa occidental y otros Estados.
2. En los documentos E/CN.4/1996/104 y Add.1, el Secretario General puso en conocimiento de la Comisión las candidaturas presentadas a la elección de miembros y suplentes de la Subcomisión, recibidas hasta el 10 de enero de 1996. Dichos documentos contenían también los datos biográficos de los miembros y de los suplentes propuestos que se habían recibido hasta la fecha.
3. Desde el 10 de enero de 1996 se han recibido nuevas candidaturas y datos biográficos así como otras comunicaciones.
4. El 8 de marzo de 1996, el Gobierno de Zimbabwe informó al Secretario General de que había decidido retirar sus candidaturas.

5. El presente documento contiene la lista actualizada de candidaturas para la elección de miembros de la Subcomisión recibidas hasta el 15 de marzo de 1996.

6. Las comunicaciones y candidaturas recibidas con posterioridad a la fecha del presente documento se reproducirán en otras adiciones.
