REPORT OF THE SUB-COMMISSION ON PREVENTION OF DISCRIMINATION AND PROTECTION OF MINORITIES ON ITS FORTY-SEVENTH SESSION

1996/... Minimum humanitarian standards

The Commission on Human Rights,

<u>Gravely concerned</u> at the large number of situations where internal violence causes extensive suffering and breaches of the principles of humanity and undermines the protection of human rights,

<u>Gravely concerned also</u> at the conduct of groups and individuals who resort to violence, thereby contributing to the suffering of innocent people in such situations,

<u>Conscious</u> of the need to reaffirm principles governing the behaviour of all persons, groups and public authorities in situations of public emergency,

<u>Having taken note</u> of the work undertaken by the Special Rapporteur of the Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities on the question of human rights and states of emergency,

<u>Emphasizing</u>, in this regard, the need to identify and implement measures to prevent violations and abuses of human rights and fundamental freedoms, in particular the right to life and integrity of the individual,

<u>Taking note</u> of resolution 1994/26 of 26 August 1994 of the Sub-Commission on Prevention of Discrimination and Protection of Minorities and its own resolution 1995/29 of 3 March 1995,

- 1. <u>Recognizes</u> the need to address principles applicable to situations of internal and related violence, disturbance, tension and public emergency in a manner consistent with international law and the Charter of the United Nations;
- 2. <u>Also recognizes</u> in this regard the vital importance of the existence in each country of appropriate national legislation for dealing with such situations in a manner consistent with the rule of law;
- 3. <u>Invites</u> all States to consider reviewing their national legislation relevant to situations of public emergency with a view to ensuring that it meets the requirements of the rule of law and that it does not involve discrimination on the grounds of race, colour, sex, language, religion or social origin;
- 4. <u>Welcomes</u> the offer by Denmark, Finland, Iceland, Norway and Sweden to organize, in cooperation with the International Committee of the Red Cross, a workshop to which governmental and non-governmental experts from all regions will be invited to consider this issue and to report to the Commission on Human Rights at its fifty-third session;
- 5. Requests the Secretary-General to transmit the text of the present resolution to Governments and intergovernmental and non-governmental organizations for their comments and to submit a report on this matter to the Commission on Human Rights at its fifty-third session.
