SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF
WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE
REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General wishes to submit hereunder the list of items of which the Security Council is currently seized, with references in parentheses to the previous summary statements that have been issued covering consideration of each item.

It will be recalled that in the interest of economy the Secretary-General reproduces only once annually the full, up-to-date list of items of which the Security Council is seized. In fulfilment of his responsibility under rule 11, an addendum to the basic list is issued weekly, making reference to those items on which further action has been taken by the Council during the week covered or indicating that there has been no change during that period.

The last full summary statement was issued on 7 January 1974 (S/11185).

In the course of 1974 three items listed in the last full summary statement (S/11185) and in previous summary statements were deleted from the list. These were the following:

(a) "Letter dated 26 December 1963 from the Permanent Representative of Cyprus to the President of the Security Council" (S/11185, item 58): at its 1810th meeting, held on 13 December 1974, the Security Council, after discussing the item "The situation in Cyprus", decided, at the suggestion of the President, to have the former item entitled "Letter dated 26 December 1963 from the Permanent Representative of Cyprus to the President of the Security Council" deleted from the list of items of which the Security Council is seized. Accordingly, the Secretary-General removed that item from the list.

(b) "Letter dated 18 December 1961 from the Permanent Representative of Portugal addressed to the President of the Security Council" (S/11185, item 50): following a request from the Permanent Representative of Portugal to the United Nations contained in a letter dated 19 December 1974 addressed to the Secretary-General, the Secretary-General, with the consent of the Security Council, removed that item from the list.

(c) "The question of Bahrain" (S/11185, item 81): following a request from the Permanent Representative of Bahrain to the United Nations contained in a

letter dated 20 December 1974 addressed to the Secretary-General, the Secretary-General, with the consent of the Security Council, removed that item from the list.
