On the International Day of Solidarity with the Struggle of Women of South Africa and Namibia, I salute those valiant women of all races who gathered in Pretoria 25 years ago on this day to protest against the extension of the inhuman pass laws for African women. For us in India, August 9 is significant for another reason: it was on that day in 1942 that we launched the historic "Quit India" Movement against colonialism.

India was the first country to raise its voice in the United Nations General Assembly against the abhorrent policies of racial discrimination and apartheid practised by the South African régime. Ours was also the first country to boycott South Africa diplomatically, politically and economically.

We whole-heartedly support the brave people of South Africa and Namibia in their just and legitimate struggle to achieve their rights. We reaffirm our solidarity with the suffering peoples of South Africa and Namibia, and reiterate our unflinching support to them.

## II. MESSAGES FROM SPECIALIZED AGENCIES

#### INTERNATIONAL LABOUR ORGANISATION

On the occasion of the celebration of this historic event the International Labour Organisation wishes to reaffirm its strong commitment to the elimination of apartheid in South Africa and Namibia with special attention to the double oppression that apartheid imposes on women. This commitment is manifest in the activities which the International Labour Organisation has undertaken in favour of the peoples of southern Africa and their liberation movements, including programmes specially designed to assist women victims of apartheid.

The adoption this year by the International Labour Conference of an updated declaration concerning the policy of <u>apartheid</u> in South Africa gives renewed emphasis to the International Labour Organisation's firm commitment to eliminate <u>apartheid</u> and to promote social justice and equality of opportunity for women in South Africa. It strengthens the basis for International Labour Organisation action to accomplish this goal through an intensified programme of assistance to the peoples of southern Africa and their liberation movements.

## UNITED NATIONS EDUCATIONAL, SCIENTIFIC AND CULTURAL ORGANIZATION

### Mr. Amadou Mahtar M'Bow, Director-General

The present South African régime has elevated <u>apartheid</u> to the rank of official doctrine, and discrimination based on racial prejudices has thus made Africans, particularly women, pariahs in their own countries. Such prejudices have darkened contemporary history and continue to challenge the human conscience. Forty years ago, racist doctrines drew the world into a generalized war. Today, while their impact on men's minds has of course receded, the time must come for them to be totally eradicated in South Africa.

In the great struggle against racism and for human dignity, to which so many peoples have contributed in their turn, it is the peoples of southern Africa who today bear the heaviest burden. However, responsibility for storming the last bastion of institutionalized racism lies with all peoples committed to justice and to peace, and in this struggle African women have a decisive role to play.

They have taken part in all forms of popular resistance in the same way as men, and the date of 9 August will remain engraved in Africa's collective memory as one of the brightest moments of this resistance. UNESCO, whose mission is to defend respect for the individual against intolerance and injustice everywhere, was one of the first international organizations systematically to denounce the policy

of <u>apartheid</u> and to support, from the outset, all the means which the people of the continent used to combat it. To the women, and to the men, who continue to map out the path of African emancipation, UNESCO wishes to reiterate its admiration, gratitude and unfailing solidarity.

I would like to express the hope that all the women of the world will closely associate themselves with their African sisters in more actively denouncing and more forcefully combating the régime of <u>apartheid</u> and all forms of racism. I am sure that they can make an effective contribution to the total elimination of racism and <u>apartheid</u>.

The WIDF Bureau sharply condemns the escalation of the vicious crimes of the apartheid régime, the arrest of more than a thousand Africans in the Crossroads Ghetto, the continued torture and murder of imprisoned patriots, and the continuation of the illegal occupation of Namibia. It charges the apartheid régime with crimes against humanity, claiming countless women and children as their victims and threatening peace on the African continent and in the world.

On behalf of millions of women of all continents united in the ranks of the WIDF, the Bureau members express the hope that the work of your Committee will be a major contribution to the convening of a special session of the United Nations to apply universally effective sanctions against the <u>apartheid</u> régime and the implementation of the United Nations resolutions, especially the International Convention on the Suppression and Punishment of the Crime of Apartheid.

#### WORLD PEACE COUNCIL

The World Peace Council, and the millions of people from all the continents supporting it, join and extend fraternal greetings to the African National Congress, the South West African People's Organization (SWAPO) and the heroic peoples of South Africa and Namibia on the occasion of the twenty-fifth anniversary of 9 August - the International Day of Solidarity with the Struggle of Women in South Africa and Namibia. On this day, 25 years ago, women of all races in South Africa marched to the Union Buildings of the <u>apartheid</u> régime to protest against the pass laws. Twenty thousand women who stormed the Union Buildings were led by Lylian Ngoyi, Helen Joseph, Lily Diedricks, Rahima Noosa and others.

In subsequent years the women in South Africa and Namibia have staged demonstrations and protests against the pass laws and waged consistent struggle against the entire system of <u>apartheid</u>. Many outstanding women like Dorothy Nyembe, Florence Matomela, Mary Moodley, Gertrude Kandanga, Ida Jimmy and others have given their lives, are either in exile or imprisoned for their role in the liberation struggle of their peoples.

As we commemorate the twenty-fifth anniversary of the historic march to the Union Buildings by women of all races from all parts of South Africa, our thoughts go to those gallant women fighters of Winburg, Sharpeville, Soweto, Windhoek, Oshakati and many other parts of South Africa and Namibia. Black women are daily forced to join the ranks of the unemployed through the pass laws, many are imprisoned every year, some with their babies, for failure to produce the hated pass-book, and thousands have been forcibly removed from the urban areas to the Bantustans. Their sacrifice, heroism and courage serve as an inspiration to others and to all peace-loving people everywhere.

The open declaration by the administration of the United States to support the South African racist régime, makes it an accomplice in the crime of apartheid. In the apartheid system, which oppresses and discriminates against the Black people, Black women are oppressed more on account of race, sex and class and are denied the basic human right - the right to live a decent family life. The terrorist and repressive régime does not spare even children, who are killed and maimed. Many people including women are arrested and held in detention without trial. But the struggle against the Pretoria régime continues. The repression by the racists has not dampened the spirit to resist apartheid.
