OFFERS BY MEMBER STATES OF STUDY AND TRAINING FACILITIES
FOR INHABITANTS OF NON-SELF-GOVERNING TERRITORIES

Report of the Secretary-General

Addendum

1. Subsequent to the issuance of document A/36/580, the Governments of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics and the Federal Republic of Germany transmitted the following information on offers of scholarships to inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories in response to General Assembly resolution 845 (IX) of 22 November 1954 and other relevant resolutions adopted in recent years.

Union of Soviet Socialist Republics

2. In a note dated 22 October 1981, the Permanent Mission of the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics to the United Nations informed the Secretary-General that at 1 January 1981, 75 students from Namibia and 2 from Belize were studying in the Soviet Union.

Germany, Federal Republic of

3. In a note dated 30 November 1981, the Permanent Representative of the Federal Republic of Germany to the United Nations informed the Secretary-General that in 1980, the Otto Benecke Foundation, at the behest of the Federal Ministry of Economic Co-operation, had offered study and training facilities to 219 Namibians (6 under the University Assistance Programme, 59 under the Special Programme for Southern Africa and 154 under the Special Programme for Southern Africa sur place).

4. Early in 1981, 150 new scholarships for Namibian refugees had been pledged through the South West Africa People's Organization (SWAPO). In addition, about 80 Namibian refugees had received training scholarships through the Botswana Council of Refugees. The Federal Government had also maintained its offer of five scholarships for those inhabitants of Non-Self-Governing Territories who applied through the United Nations Secretariat in 1981.

5. At 7 August 1981, 136 Namibians were covered by scholarship programmes of the Federal Republic of Germany, as follows: 6 under the University Assistance Programme; 2 under the Technical University Assistance Programme; 58 under the Special Programme for Southern Africa, and 70 under the Special Programme for Southern Africa sur place.
