PROPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1982-1983

International Code of Conduct on the Transfer of Technology

Administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C. 2/36/L.108

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

- 1. At its 42nd meeting, held on 10 November 1981, the Second Committee adopted the draft resolution contained in document A/C.2/36/L.108. At the same meeting, the Secretary of the Committee made a statement on the administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution. That statement is reflected in document A/C.2/36/L.109.
- 2. Under the terms of operative paragraphs 3 and 4 of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.2/36/L.108, the General Assembly would decide to establish an interim committee of the United Nations Conference on an International Code of Conduct on the Transfer of Technology which should meet as necessary within the four weeks allocated to it. In operative paragraph 5, the Secretary-General of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) would be requested to convene the interim committee in the first quarter of 1982 and to submit to the Committee all appropriate documentation to assist it in its work.
- 3. It is assumed that the interim committee would be convened at Geneva in 1982 and would require up to four weeks of meetings to carry out its task "to consider and seek solutions to the outstanding issues and make proposals thereon to the Conference at its fifth session" (A/C.2/36/L.108, para. 3). On this basis, and

assuming that the interim committee would require three conference rooms for each week of meetings, would need to be serviced in six languages and would require a total of 380 pages of documentation, the conference-servicing costs are estimated at \$590,900.

- 4. The Secretary-General of UNCTAD would also be invited, under the terms of operative paragraph 6 of the draft resolution, to convene the fifth session of the United Nations Conference on an International Code of Conduct on the Transfer of Technology in the last guarter of 1982 or in the first guarter of 1983.
- 5. It is assumed that the fifth session of the Conference would be convened at Geneva in 1982 for a period of three weeks and would require six conference rooms, would be serviced in six languages and would require 250 pages of documentation. In addition, summary records would be provided for a maximum of seven plenary meetings. Based on these assumptions, the conference-servicing costs of the fifth session of the Conference are estimated at \$772,700. However, should the Conference be convened in 1983, instead of in 1982, the conference-servicing costs are estimated at \$810,700.
- 6. The conference-servicing costs in this submission are presented on a full-cost basis, that is, as if none of the requirements can be provided out of the resources requested under the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1982-1983. No additional appropriation is requested since the requirements for 1982 will be considered in the context of the consolidated statement to be submitted towards the end of the thirty-sixth session of the General Assembly, in which the Secretary-General will report on the level of additional conference resources to be requested in the light of the pattern of conferences for the year 1982 as approved by the General Assembly. Should the fifth session of the Conference be convened in 1983 instead of 1982, it will be included in the consolidated statement to be submitted to the General Assembly at its thirty-seventh session.
- 7. Details of estimated costs for four weeks of meetings of the interim committee and for a three-week Conference are given in the annex to this document.
