## PROPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1982-1983

REPORT OF THE <u>AD HOC</u> COMMITTEE ON THE DRAFTING OF AN INTERNATIONAL CONVENTION AGAINST THE RECRUITMENT, USE, FINANCING AND TRAINING OF MERCENARIES

Administrative and financial implication of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.8

## Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

1. The Sixth Committee, at its 57th meeting held on 24 November 1981, adopted the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.8. It had before it a statement of financial implications (A/C.6/36/L.9) and the observations by the Committee on Conferences (A/C.6/36/L.9/Add.1).

2. Under the terms of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.8, the General Assembly would:

(a) Decide that the <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee shall continue its work with the goal of drafting, at the earliest date, an international convention against the recruitment, use, financing and training of mercenaries;

(b) Request the Secretary-General to provide the <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee with any assistance and facilities it may require for the performance of its work.

3. Should the General Assembly adopt the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.8, financial implications would arise in respect of conference servicing costs only.

4. For the purpose of costing, the following assumptions have been used:

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(a) The <u>Ad Hoc</u> Committee would meet for four weeks in New York from 11 January to 5 February 1982 and hold two meetings daily;

(b) Services for pre-session, in-session and post-session documentation and interpretation would be provided in six languages (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian and Spanish).

5. On the basis of the above, conference servicing costs are estimated at \$613,100, as follows:
