### Report of the Secretary-General

#### I. Introduction

1. The present report is submitted in response to General Assembly resolution 51/243 of 15 September 1997, in paragraph 6 of which the Secretary-General was requested to report on a quarterly basis on the acceptance of the gratis personnel referred to in paragraph 4 of the resolution, with a view to ensuring compliance with its provisions. In paragraph 12 of the same resolution, the Assembly requested the Secretary-General to report annually on the use of gratis personnel, indicating, *inter alia*, their nationality, the duration of their service and the functions performed.

2. The present report updates previous quarterly reports.<sup>1</sup> It also contains the annual report for the period 1 October 1997 to 30 September 1998 and updates the previous annual report (A/52/709).

#### United Nations Office at Nairobi

3. The present report includes data, which were submitted *ex post facto* by the United Nations Office at Nairobi in November 1998 and relate to type II gratis personnel who had been engaged by the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) and by the United Nations Centre for Human

Settlements (Habitat) in the past and whose engagements were not previously reported. The functions performed by UNEP/United Nations Centre for Human Settlements gratis personnel before 30 September 1998 are reflected in annexes II, III, IV, V and VIII to the present report. Annex VIII also shows that expiry dates of engagements for several gratis personnel exceed the 28 February 1999 deadline set by the General Assembly in its resolution 53/11 of 26 October 1998. Consequently, the Director-General of the United Nations Office at Nairobi has been instructed to phase out all proposed United Nations Centre for Human Settlements type II gratis personnel by the end of February 1999.

#### II. Quarterly report on the acceptance of gratis personnel

4. Paragraph 6 of resolution 51/243, in which a quarterly report was requested on the acceptance of type II gratis personnel (see A/51/688 and Corr.1, paras. 24–40), specified that the purpose of the report was to ensure compliance with the provisions of the resolution. The period covered in the present quarterly report starts on 1 July 1998 and ends on 30 September 1998.

5. Twenty-three new type II gratis personnel commenced service during the reference period, as shown in the table below. Of this total, six gratis personnel completed their duties within the reference period.

6. The Department of Political Affairs accepted gratis personnel for a six-member high level mission sent by the Secretary-General, at the invitation of the Algerian Government, to visit that country and to gather information. The mission was completed and the mission report delivered before the end of the reference period. The Department of Peacekeeping Operations accepted eight military officers to undertake the specialized military tasks indicated in the table below. The International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda accepted eight additional investigators to the Deputy Prosecutor's Office to provide specialized expertise that was not available in the Tribunal.

7. At the United Nations Office at Nairobi, the one gratis personnel engaged during the reporting period is the leader of an international team working on the revitalization of the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements. For reasons of objectivity, he was brought in from the outside. At the time of publication of the present report, no information is available beyond what is provided in the table below.

8. With the ongoing departure of type II gratis personnel from the Department of Peacekeeping Operations, the International Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia, the Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs and the United Nations Office at Nairobi, the total of type II gratis personnel decreased from 182 as of 30 June 1998 to 134 as of 30 September 1998.

### **International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda**

### **International Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia**

9. In section III.B, paragraph 26, of resolution 51/226 of 3 April 1997, the Secretary-General was requested to extend to personnel provided on a non-reimbursable basis the practice of barring such personnel from applying for or being appointed to posts in the Secretariat for a period of six months after the end of their service under non-reimbursable contracts. The International Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia experienced a sharp increase in its work volume owing to a sudden increase in the number of detainees and, at the time, employed a number of key gratis personnel, consisting of investigators and attorneys who had developed

unique knowledge about the cases being prepared. In the recruitment, the Tribunal requested that an exception be granted for the acceptance of applications without a waiting period. In all other respects, the Tribunal fully complied with United Nations recruitment regulations and all applicants, including those who had formerly served on a non-reimbursable loan basis, were treated as competitive candidates. This initial request by the Prosecutor has been extended for one gratis personnel serving in the International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda.

10. As indicated in the report of the Secretary-General on human resources management (A/53/342, paras. 91–94), the Secretary-General approved a total of 17 exceptions in the light of the special circumstances reported by the Tribunal, on the condition that the General Assembly be informed of those exceptions. The Tribunal has reported that, at the date of the present report, offers of employment were accepted by 12 of the subject personnel, one offer remains pending, one offer was withdrawn and three gratis personnel have declined acceptance.

## **III. Annual report on the use of gratis personnel**

11. In paragraph 12 of its resolution 51/243, the General Assembly requested the Secretary-General to report annually on the use of gratis personnel, indicating, *inter alia*, their nationality, the duration of their service and the functions performed.

### **Type I gratis personnel**

12. Annex I to the present report provides data on type I gratis personnel who serve under an established regime, including interns, associate experts, technical cooperation experts obtained by non-reimbursable loan and gratis personnel serving with the United Nations Special Commission (see A/51/688/Add.2, para. 4, and A/51/688/Add.3, para. 3). The total for each category as at 30 September 1998 is compared with the total as at 30 September 1997, 31 December 1997, 31 March 1998 and 30 June 1998, as shown in the quarterly reports of the Secretary-General to the General Assembly.

13. Data indicate increasing numbers for interns and associate experts between September 1997 and September 1998. The number of interns fluctuates over time, due to the fact that there are three separate internship programmes per year, each lasting for two to three months.

## **Type II gratis personnel**

14. Annex II provides information on type II gratis personnel in service as at 30 September 1998, by department or office, nationality and duration of service. The overall number stands at 134, with the Department of Peacekeeping Operations having the largest proportion (75 per cent) followed by the Tribunals (19 per cent). Thirty-four personnel (25 per cent) served for less than one year, 45 (34 per cent) served between one and two years and 55 (41 per cent) served for more than two years.

15. Annex III shows the evolution of the numbers of type II gratis personnel by department. The totals shown have been adjusted to reflect data on gratis personnel serving with UNEP and the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements which had not been reported and confirmed prior to November 1998. The adjusted total number of gratis personnel as at 30 September 1998 (134) shows a decrease compared with the adjusted total as at 30 September 1997 (295). The overall decrease since September 1997 has been 55 per cent. The number of receiving departments decreased from eight on 30 September 1997, to six on 30 September 1998.

16. Annex IV shows the distribution of type II gratis personnel by nationality and duration of service.

17. Annex V provides information on the nature of the functions performed by type II gratis personnel as at 30 September 1998 by department or office, except for the Department of Peacekeeping Operations, for which information is provided in annex VI.

18. Annex VII shows numbers of regular staff in the departments/offices where type II gratis personnel performed functions on 30 September 1998.

19. Annex VIII shows all type II gratis personnel reported *post facto* by the United Nations Office at Nairobi in November 1998. This includes information on functions performed by the Office's type II gratis personnel from September 1997 to September 1998 as well as three gratis personnel who reportedly were accepted during the month of October 1998.

## Annex V

### **Functions discharged by type II gratis personnel in service (as at 30 September 1998)**

#### **Office for the Coordination of Humanitarian Affairs (2)**

One gratis personnel provided policy advice and legal expertise on international humanitarian law. The person's field experience with the International Committee of the Red Cross, particularly in the Middle East, as well as his legal training (application of humanitarian law in Muslim countries) has provided vital expertise to the work of the Office. The person is the only legal expert in the United Nations system with field experience in humanitarian operations.

The second gratis personnel has organized and planned high-level seminars on international cooperation in the use of military and civil defence assets in disaster relief.

#### **Department of Peacekeeping Operations (100)**

See detailed annex VI.

#### **International Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia (14)**

One expert video analyst has viewed, indexed and analysed videotapes of material broadcast in the former Yugoslavia during the conflict, to enable investigation and prosecution teams to identify relevant evidence.

Six investigators have been responsible for the planning, organizing and conducting of sensitive field service investigations, using all appropriate and available investigative techniques and resources in accordance with applicable laws, policies and procedures.

Six legal advisers to the Prosecutor assist in the prosecution of persons, especially those in positions of authority and leadership, who were responsible for the most serious violations of international humanitarian law or mass killings.

One detention (security) guard has assisted the commanding officer of the Detention Unit in providing security services for detained persons.

#### **International Criminal Tribunal for Rwanda (12)**

Nine investigators have been responsible for the planning, organizing and conducting of sensitive field service investigations, using all appropriate and available investigative techniques and resources in accordance with applicable laws, policies and procedures.

Three legal officers (two legal officers and one senior legal officer) have provided legal advice and direction to the Target Development Unit regarding criminal law and procedure, the application of international humanitarian law and prosecutorial strategy.

#### **United Nations Office at Nairobi (5)**

For UNEP, one database analyst provided specialized technical assistance to the Water Branch, one was retained for the coordination of various activities and workshops, one provided specialized monitoring of developments in various environmental issues and one performed legal advisory functions. One person was accepted to develop recommendations for the revitalization of the United Nations Centre for Human Settlements (Habitat) as leader of a team of international experts.

**United Nations Office of the Iraq Programme (1)**

One high-level procurement specialist has provided the Programme with unique and highly specialized advice and counselling on purchasing and contracting large volumes of goods with very specific modes of delivery (chartering of aircraft and vessels, rations, petroleum, etc.).
