PROPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1982-1983

REPORT OF THE SPECIAL COMMITTEE ON ENHANCING THE EFFECTIVENESS OF THE PRINCIPLE OF NON-USE OF FORCE IN INTERNATIONAL RELATIONS

Administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.3/Rev.1

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

1. At its 27th meeting held on 21 October 1981, the Sixth Committee adopted the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.3/Rev.l. It had before it a statement of the administrative and financial implications (A/C.6/36/L.4) and the observations by the Committee on Conferences (A/C.6/36/L.4/Add.l).

2. Under the terms of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.6/36/L.3/Rev.1, the General Assembly would, inter alia, decide that the Special Committee should continue its work with the goal of drafting, at the earliest possible date, a world treaty on the non-use of force in international relations as well as the peaceful settlement of disputes or such other recommendations as the Committee deemed appropriate, and would invite the Special Committee to submit a report on its work to the General Assembly at its thirty-seventh session.

3. In order for the Special Committee to carry out its work under the terms of the draft resolution, the General Assembly would request the Secretary-General to provide the Special Committee with the necessary facilities and services.

4. Based on the assumption that the Committee would meet for four weeks in New York in 1982, from 29 March to 23 April 1982, that during the first week the Special Committee would hold one daily meeting and two daily meetings during the remaining three weeks, the related conference-servicing cost would amount to \$565,400. Meetings of the Special Committee would require the provision of interpretation in six languages (Arabic, Chinese, English, French, Russian, Spanish) and translation of pre-session, in-session and post-session documentation as follows:
