PROPOSED PROGRAMME BUDGET FOR THE BIENNIUM 1982-1983

Measures to improve the situation and ensure the human rights and dignity of all migrant workers

Administrative and financial implications of the draft resolution contained in document A/C.3/36/L.68

Statement submitted by the Secretary-General in accordance with rule 153 of the rules of procedure of the General Assembly

- 1. At its 66th meeting on 30 November 1981, the Third Committee adopted the draft resolution contained in A/C.3/36/L.68. It had before it a statement of administrative and financial implications (A/C.3/36/L.83).
- 2. By the draft resolution contained in document A/C.3/36/L.68, the General Assembly, recalling its resolution 35/198 in which it renewed the mandate of the open-ended working group to elaborate an international convention on the protection of the rights of all migrant workers and their families and requested it to continue its work, would decide that:
- (a) The working group should hold an intersessional meeting of two weeks' duration in New York in May 1982, immediately after the first regular session of the Economic and Social Council, to enable it to complete its task as soon as possible (para. 2 of the draft resolution); and
- (b) The working group should meet during the thirty-seventh session of the General Assembly in order to continue and, if possible, complete the elaboration of an international convention on the protection of the rights of all migrant workers and their families (para. 5 of the draft resolution).

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- 3. The financial implications of the draft resolution are estimated as follows:
  - A. Intersessional meeting of the working group on an international convention on the protection of the rights of all migrant workers and their families
- 4. The conference servicing requirements, estimated on a full-cost basis, for a two-week session in New York, in May 1982, would amount to \$296,000. A breakdown of these requirements is provided in table A.1 of the annex to the present document.
- 5. In addition, \$5,400 would be required for travel and subsistence of two substantive officers of the Division of Human Rights who would be responsible for servicing the working group. The Secretary-General would make every effort to meet this requirement from existing appropriations under section 23 (Human Rights) of the programme budget for the biennium 1982-1983.
- 6. The attention of the Fifth Committee is drawn to the fact that the decision to hold the intersessional meeting of the working group in New York would constitute an exception to the provision of General Assembly resolution 31/140, according to which "United Nations bodies shall plan to meet at their respective established headquarters". Since the substantive secretariat for this meeting is located in Geneva, the established headquarters of the working group during its intersessional meeting would be Geneva and, therefore, such a meeting should be held there. For the information of the Committee, the conference servicing requirements for holding the meeting in Geneva would amount to \$228,700. A breakdown of these requirements is provided in table A.2 of the annex to the present document.
- 7. The Fifth Committee may also wish to note that the Committee on Conferences, after reviewing the draft resolution in accordance with paragraph 6 of General Assembly resolution 35/10 A, recommends to the General Assembly in paragraph 3 of document A/C.3/36/L.83/Add.1 that the arrangements outlined in document A/C.3/36/L.68 should be approved.
- 8. Should the General Assembly decide to hold the intersessional meeting of the working group in New York, the Secretary-General wishes to suggest that the meeting be held from 10 May to 21 May 1981 when a suitable conference room will be available.
  - B. Sessional meeting of the working group on an international convention on the protection of the rights of all migrant workers and their families
- 9. On the assumption that the working group would meet twice a week for eight weeks during the thirty seventh session of the General Assembly and that pre- and post-session documentation would be processed at Geneva, the conference servicing requirements, estimated on a full-cost basis, would amount to \$273,800. A breakdown of these requirements is provided in table B of the annex to the present document.

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10. In summary, should the General Assembly adopt the draft resolution contained in document A/C.3/36/L.68, potential conference servicing costs totalling \$569,800 would arise (\$296,000 for the intersessional meeting of the working group in New York and \$273,800 for the sessional meeting during the thirty-seventh session of the General Assembly). These costs would be considered in the context of the consolidated statement of total conference servicing costs to be submitted to the General Assembly towards the end of its current session.
