Information note from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Georgia

Tbilisi, 18 September 1999

On 23 July 1999, an antenna-reflector made at the Institute of Constructions in Outer Space of Georgia was successfully mounted on the Russian space station “Mir” and launched into outer space.

These developments are significant, as they mark Georgia’s increasing contribution to the peaceful uses of outer space, in cooperation with the Russian Federation.

There is wide-held consensus amongst international experts that the reflector, by all parameters, is more advanced than that of its antecedents, paving the way for an entirely new generation of telecommunications instruments.
