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SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

## Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

The list of items of which the Security Council is seized is contained in document S/14840 of 19 January 1982.

During the week ending 27 February 1982, the Security Council took action on the following item:

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In a letter dated 16 February 1982 addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/14875), the representative of Lebanon recalled paragraphs 7 and 10 of Security Council resolution 498 (1981) of 18 December 1981, as well as paragraphs 6 and 7 of the special report of the Secretary-General (S/14869) on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL), and confirmed his Government's requests concerning UNIFIL, which had been presented in a memorandum to the Secretary-General on 14 December 1981, and which were annexed to his letter.

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 2331st meeting, on 23 February 1982, having before it the special report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (S/14869), and on the basis of its resolutin 498 (1981) of 18 December 1981 as well as the letter from Lebanon. The Council continued its discussion of the item at its 2332nd meeting, held on 24 February 1982.

In the course of the discussion, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Israel, Lebanon and the Syrian Arab Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote. At the 2331st meeting, in accordance with the request dated 23 February 1982 from Jordan (S/14883), the Security Council extended an invitation under rule 39 of its provisional rules of procedure to His Excellency, Mr. Clovis Maksoud.

The President drew attention to the request contained in the letter dated 5 January 1982 from the representative of Jordan (S/14878) that the representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization be invited to participate in the debate. He said that that proposal was not formulated under rule 37 or rule 39 of the Security Council's provisional rules of procedure but that if it was adopted by the Council, the invitation would confer on the Palestine Liberation Organization the same rights of participation as were conferred on Member States invited pursuant to rule 37.

Following discussion, the Security Council adopted the proposal by a vote of ll in favour to l against (the United States of America), with 3 abstentions (France Japan and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland).

At the 2332nd meeting, the President called attention to the text of a draft resolution contained in document S/14890 which had been prepared in the course of the Council's consultations.

The Security Council then voted on the draft resolution, S/14890, and adopted it by a vote of 13 votes in favour, none against, with 2 abstentions (Poland and the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics), as resolution 501 (1982).

Resolution 501 (1982) reads as follows:

## The Security Council,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolutions 425 (1978), 426 (1978), 427 (1978), 434 (1978), 444 (1979), 450 (1979), 459 (1979), 467 (1980), 474 (1980), 483 (1980), 488 (1981), 490 (1981) and 498 (1981),

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Acting in accordance with its resolution 498 (1981), and in particular paragraph 10 of that resolution in which it decided to review the situation as a whole,

Having studied the special report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (S/14869),

Noting the letter of the Permanent Representative of Lehanon to the President of the Security Council (S/14875),

Having reviewed the situation as a whole in the light of the Secretary-General's report and of the letter of the Lebanese Permanent Representative,

Taking note from the Secretary-General's report that it is the strong recommendation of UNIFIL's Force Commander, and also the wish of the Lebanese Government, that the ceiling for UNIFIL troops should be increased; and that the Secretary-General fully supports the recommendation for an increase by 1,000 of the troop strength of UNIFIL,

1. Reaffirms its resolution 425 (1978) which reads:

The Security Council,

Taking note of the letters of the Permanent Representative of Lebanon (S/12600 and S/12606) and the Permanent Representative of Israel (S/12607),

Having heard the statements of the Permanent Representatives of Lebanon and Israel,

<u>Gravely concerned</u> at the deterioration of the situation in the Middle East, and its consequences to the Maintenance of International peace,

<u>Convinced</u> that the present situation impedes the achievement of a just peace in the Middle East,

1. <u>Calls for</u> strict respect for the territorial integrity, sovereignty and political independence of Lebanon within its internationally recognized boundaries;

2. <u>Calls upon</u> Israel immediately to cease its military action against Lebanese territorial integrity and withdraw forthwith its forces from all Lebanese territory;

3. <u>Decides</u>, in the light of the request of the Government of Lebanon, to establish immediately under its authority, a United Nations interim force for southern Lebanon for the purpose of confirming the withdrawal of Israeli forces, restoring international peace and security and assisting the Government of Lebanon in ensuring the return of its effective authority in the area, the force to be composed of personnel drawn from States Members of the United Nations;

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4. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Council within twenty-four hours on the implementation of this resolution.

2. <u>Decides</u> to approve the immediate increase in the strength of the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon recommended by the Secretary-General (in para. 6 of document S/14869) from approximately 6,000 to approximately 7,000 troops to reinforce present operations as well as to-make further deployment possible on the lines of resolution 425 (1978);

3. <u>Re-emphasizes</u> the terms of reference and general guidelines of UNIFIL, as stated in the report of the Secretary-General of 19 March 1978 (S/12611) confirmed by resolution 426 (1978), and particularly

(a) That "the Force must be able to function as an integrated and efficient military unit";

(b) That "the Force must enjoy the freedom of movement and communication and other facilities that are necessary to the performance of its tasks";

(c) That the Force "shall not use force except in self-defence";

(d) That "self-defence would include resistance to attempts by forceful means to prevent it from discharging its duties under the mandate of the Security Council";

4. <u>Calls upon</u> the Secretary-General to renew his efforts to reactivate the General Armistice Agreement between Lebanon and Israel of 23 March 1949, and in particular to convene an early meeting of the Mixed Armistice Commission;

5. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue his discussions with the Government of Lebanon and the parties concerned with a view to submitting a report by 10 June 1982 on the necessary requirements for achieving further progress in a phased programme of activities with the Government of Lebanon;

6. <u>Decides</u> to remain seized of the question and invites the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council on the situation as a whole within two months.

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
