## ANNEX

## Telegram from the Minister for Foreign Affairs of the German Domcratic Republic to the Secretary-General

I welcome the unanimous adoption of Security Council resolution 503 (1982) calling for commuting the death sentences passed on the South African patriots Ncimbiti Johnson Lubisi, Petrus Tsepo Mashigo and Naphtali Manana. During its membership on the Security Council, the German Democratic Republic had always supported similar resolutions directed against the inhuman practices of the apartheid régime.

The people and the Government of the German Democratic Republic most strongly protest against the racist régime's murder plans. They demand most vigorously that the illegal death sentences be rescinded and that the three ANC members of the African National Congress be set free immediately.

I may assure you that the German Democratic Republic, in line with its policy of active solidarity with the South African people's struggle for freedom and human rights, will do all it can to save the lives of the freedom fighters.
