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SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

The list of items of which the Security Council is seized is contained in document S/14840 of 19 Janaury 1982, S/14840/Add.12 of 5 April 1982, S/14840/Add.13 of 12 April 1982, S/14840/Add.17 of 6 May 1982 and S/14840/Add.20 of 1 June 1982.

During the week ending 19 June 1982, the Security Council took action on the following items:

At its 2378th meeting, held on 15 June 1982, the Security Council resumed its consideration of the question on the basis of the report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations operation in Cyprus for the period 1 December 1981 to 31 May 1982 (S/15149 and Add.1). The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Cyprus, Greece and Turkey, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote. In accordance with the agreement reached in the course of the Council's consultations, the President, with the consent of the Council, extended an invitation under rule 39 of the provisional rules of procedure to Mr. Nail Atalay.

The President called attention to a draft resolution (S/15216) which had been prepared in the course of consultations among the members of the Council. The Council then proceeded to vote on the draft resolution and adopted it, by 15 votes to none, as resolution 510 (1982).

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Resolution 510 (1982) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

Noting the report by the Secretary-General on the United Nations operation in Cyprus of 1 June 1982 (S/15149 and Corr.1 and Add.1),

Noting also the concurrence of the parties concerned in the recommendation by the Secretary-General that the Security Council extend the stationing of the United Nations Peace-keeping Force in Cyprus for a further period of six months,

Noting further that the Government of Cyprus has agreed that in view of the prevailing conditions in the island it is necessary to keep the Force in Cyprus beyond 15 June 1982,

<u>Reaffirming</u> the provisions of resolution 186 (1964) of 4 March 1964 and other relevant resolutions,

<u>Reiterating</u> its support of the ten-point agreement for the resumption of the intercommunal talks which was worked out at the high-level meeting on 18 and 19 May 1979 at Nicosia under the auspices of the Secretary-General,

1. <u>Extends once more</u> the stationing in Cyprus of the United Nations Peace-keeping Force established under resolution 186 (1964) for a further period ending 15 December 1982;

2. Notes with satisfaction that the parties have resumed the intercommunal talks within the framework of the ten-point agreement and urges them to pursue these talks in a continuing, sustained and result-oriented manner, avoiding any delay:

3. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to continue his mission of good offices, to keep the Security Council informed of the progress made and to submit a report on the implementation of the present resolution by 30 November 1982.

At its 2379th meeting, on 18 June 1982, the Security Council resumed its consideration of the item, having before it the report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) for the period 11 December 1981 to 3 June 1982 (S/15194 and Add.1 and 2).

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Israel, Lebanon, the Netherlands, Sweden and the Syrian Arab Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote. In accordance with the request dated 18 June 1982 from Jordan (S/15239), the Council extended an invitation under rule 39 of its provisional rules of procedure to His Excellency Mr. Clovis Maksoud.

The President drew attention to the request contained in the letter dated 18 June 1982 from the representative of Jordan (S/15238) that the representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization be invited to participate in the debate. He said that the proposal was not formulated under rule 37 or rule 39 of the Security Council's provisional rules of procedure but that if it was adopted by the Council, the invitation would confer on the Palestine Liberation Organization the same rights of participation as were conferred on Member States invited pursuant to rule 37.

Following discussion, the Security Council adopted the proposal by 11 votes in favour to 1 against (the United States of America), with 3 abstentions (France, Japan and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland).

The President called attention to the draft resolution, S/15235, which had been prepared in the course of consultations by the Council.

The Security Council then voted on the draft resolution and adopted it, by 13 votes in favour, none against, with 2 abstentions (Poland, the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics), as resolution 511 (1982).

Resolution 511 (1982) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 425 (1978), 426 (1978), 427 (1978), 434 (1978), 444 (1979), 450 (1979), 459 (1979), 467 (1980), 483 (1980), 488 (1981), 490 (1981), 498 (1981), and 501 (1982),

Reaffirming its resolutions 508 (1982) and 509 (1982),

Having studied the report of the Secretary-General on the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (S/15194 and Add.1 and 2) and taking note of the conclusions and recommendations expressed therein,

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Bearing in mind the need to avoid any developments which could further aggravate the situation and the need, pending an examination of the situation by the Council in all its aspects, to preserve in place the capacity of the United Nations to assist in the restoration of the peace,

1. <u>Decides</u> as an interim measures, to extend the present mandate of the Force for a period of two months, that is, until 19 August 1982;

2. <u>Authorizes</u> the Force during that period, to carry out, in addition, the interim tasks referred to in paragraph 17 of the Secretary-General's report (S/15194/Add.2);

3. <u>Calls on all concerned to extend full co-operation to the Force in</u> the discharge of its tasks:

4. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to keep the Security Council regularly informed of the implementation of resolutions 508 (1982) and 509 (1982) and the present resolution.

At its 2380th meeting, held on 19 June 1982, the Security Council continued its consideration of the item, on the basis of the request dated 4 June 1982 from Lebanon (S/15162).

The President called attention to the draft resolution, S/15240, sponsored by France.

The Security Council then voted on the draft resolution and adopted it, by 15 votes to none, as resolution 512 (1982).

Resolution 512 (1982) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

Deeply concerned at the sufferings of the Lebanese and Palestinian civilian populations,

Referring to the humanitarian principles of the Geneva Conventions of 1949 and to the obligations arising from the regulations annexed to The Hague Convention of 1907,

Reaffirming its resolutions 508 (1982) and 509 (1982),

1. <u>Calls upon</u> all the parties to the conflict to respect the rights of the civilian populations, to refrain from all acts of violence against those populations and to take all appropriate measures to alleviate the suffering caused by the conflict, in particular, by facilitating the dispatch and distribution of aid provided by United Nations agencies and by non-governmental organizations, in particular, the International Committee of the Red Cross;

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2. <u>Appeals</u> to Member States to continue to provide the most extensive humanitarian aid possible;

3. <u>Stresses</u> the particular humanitarian responsibilities of the United Nations and its agencies, including the United Nations Relief and Works Agency for Palestine Refugees in the Near East, towards civilian populations and calls upon all the parties to the conflict not to hamper the exercise of those responsibilities and to assist in humanitarian efforts;

4. <u>Takes note</u> of the measures taken by the Secretary-General to co-ordinate the activities of the international agencies in this field and requests him to make every effort to ensure the implementation of and compliance with the present resolution and to report on these efforts to the Council as soon as possible.

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
