SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE REACHED IN THE IR CONSIDERATION

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

The list of items of which the Security Council is seized is contained in document S/14840 of 19 January 1982, S/14840/Add.12 of 5 April 1982, S/14840/Add.13 of 12 April 1982, S/14840/Add.17 of 6 May 1982 and S/14840/Add.20 of 1 June 1982.

During the week ending 17 July 1982, the Security Council took action on the following item:

The situation between Iran and Iraq (see S/13737/Add.38, S/13737/Add.39, S/13737/Add.41, S/13737/Add.42 and S/13737/Add.43)

The Security Council resumed its consideration of the item at its 2383rd meeting, on 12 July 1982.

The President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representative of Irag, at his request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

The President called attention to a draft resolution (S/15285) which had been prepared in the course of the Council's consultations. The Security Council adopted that draft resolution as resolution 514 (1982) by 15 votes to none.

Resolution 514 (1982) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

Having considered again the guestion entitled "The situation between Iran and Irag",

> <u>Deeply concerned</u> about the prolongation of the conflict between the two countries, resulting in heavy losses of human lives and considerable material damage and endangering peace and security,

<u>Recalling</u> the provisions of Article 2 of the Charter of the United Nations, and that the establishment of peace and security in the region requires strict adherence to these provisions,

<u>Recalling</u> that by virtue of Article 24 of the Charter the Security Council has primary responsibility for maintenance of international peace and security,

<u>Recalling</u> its resolution 479 (1980), adopted unanimously on 28 September 1980, as well as the statement of its President of 5 November 1980 (S/14244),

<u>Taking note</u> of the efforts of mediation pursued notably by the Secretary-General of the United Nations and his representative, as well as by the Movement of Non-Aligned Countries and the Organization of the Islamic Conference,

<u>Calls</u> for a cease-fire and an immediate end to all military operations;

2. <u>Calls further</u> for a withdrawal of forces to internationally recognized boundaries;

3. <u>Decides</u> to dispatch a team of United Nations observers to verify, confirm and supervise the cease-fire and withdrawal, and requests the Secretary-General to submit to the Council a report on the arrangements required for that purpose;

4. <u>Urges</u> that the mediation efforts be continued in a co-ordinated manner through the Secretary-General with a view to achieving a comprehensive, just and honourable settlement acceptable to both sides of all the outstanding issues, on the basis of the principles of the Charter of the United Nations, including respect for sovereignty, independence, territorial integrity and non-interference in the internal affairs of States;

5. <u>Requests</u> all other States to abstain from all actions which could contribute to the continuation of the conflict and to facilitate the implementation of the present resolution;

6. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to report to the Security Council within three months on the implementation of this resolution.
