SUMMARY STATEMENT BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL ON MATTERS OF WHICH THE SECURITY COUNCIL IS SEIZED AND ON THE STAGE REACHED IN THEIR CONSIDERATION

Addendum

Pursuant to rule 11 of the provisional rules of procedure of the Security Council, the Secretary-General is submitting the following summary statement.

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In a letter dated 16 September 1982, addressed to the President of the Security Council (S/15392), the representative of Lebanon requested an urgent meeting of the Security Council to consider the situation in Lebanon, in light of the latest Israeli incursion into Beirut.

The Security Council continued its consideration of the item at its 2394th meeting, held on 16 September 1982, on the basis of the request from Lebanon. The Council continued its discussion at its 2395th and 2396th meetings, held on 17 and 18 September 1982.

At the 2394th meeting, in addition to the representatives invited previously, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Kuwait and the Syrian Arab Republic, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

At the 2395th meeting, the representative of Jordan introduced the text of a draft resolution (S/15394/Rev.l) sponsored by his delegation and orally revised it.

The Security Council then voted on the revised draft resolution (S/15394/Rev.1), as further revised orally, and adopted it unanimously by 15 votes to none, as resolution 520 (1982).

Resolution 520 (1982) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

<u>Having considered</u> the report of the Secretary-General of 15 September 1982 (S/15382/Add.1),

<u>Condemning</u> the murder of Bashir Gemayel, Lebanon's constitutionally selected President-elect, and every effort to disrupt by violence the resolution of a strong, stable government in Lebanon,

Having listened to the statement by the Permanent Representative of Lebanon,

Taking note of Lebanon's determination to ensure the withdrawal of all non-Lebanese forces from Lebanon,

1. <u>Reaffirms</u> its resolutions 508 (1982), 509 (1982) and 516 (1982) in all their components;

2. <u>Condemns</u> the recent Israeli incursions into Beirut in violation of the cease-fire agreements and of Security Council resolutions;

3. <u>Demands</u> an immediate return to the positions occupied by Israel before 15 September 1982, as a first step towards the full implementation of Security Council resolutions;

4. <u>Calls again</u> for the strict respect for Lebanon's sovereignty, territorial integrity, unity and political independence under the sole and exclusive authority of the Lebanese Government through the Lebanese Army throughout Lebanon;

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5. <u>Reaffirms</u> its resolutions 512 (1982) and 513 (1982) which call for respect for the rights of the civilian populations without any discrimination and repudiates all acts of violence against those populations;

6. <u>Supports</u> the efforts of the Secretary-General to implement Security Council resolution 516 (1982) concerning the deployment of United Nations observers to monitor the situation in and around Beirut and requests all the parties concerned to co-operate fully in the application of that resolution;

7. <u>Decides</u> to remain seized of the question and asks the Secretary-General to keep the Council informed on developments as soon as possible and not later than twenty-four hours.

At the Security Council's 2396th meeting, on 18 September 1982, which the President stated was convened in response to an urgent request made to him that day by the representative of Jordan, the President, with the consent of the Council, invited the representatives of Algeria, Democratic Yemen and Greece, at their request, to participate in the discussion without the right to vote.

Following a suspension of the meeting, the President called attention to document S/15400, which contained the report of the Secretary-General in pursuance of Security Council resolution 520 (1982). The Council then voted on a draft resolution (S/15402) that had been prepared in the course of consultations among members and adopted it unanimously as resolution 521 (1982).

Resolution 521 (1982) reads as follows:

The Security Council,

Appalled at the massacre of Palestinian civilians in Beirut,

Having heard the report of the Secretary-General (S/15400),

Noting that the Government of Lebanon has agreed to the dispatch of United Nations observers to the sites of greatest human suffering and losses in and around that city,

1. Condemns the criminal massacre of Palestinian civilians in Beirut;

2. <u>Reaffirms</u> once again its resolutions 512 (1982) and 513 (1982) which call for respect for the rights of the civilian population without any discrimination and repudiates all acts of violence against that population;

3. <u>Authorizes</u> the Secretary-General as an immediate step to increase the number of United Nations observers in and around Beirut from 10 to 50 and insists that there shall be no interference with the deployment of the observers and that they shall have full freedom of movement;

4. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General, in consultation with the Government of Lebanon, to ensure the rapid deployment of those observers in order that they may

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contribute in every way possible within their mandate, to the effort to ensure full protection for the civilian population;

5. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General as a matter of urgency to initiate appropriate consultations and in particular consultations with the Government of Lebanon on additional steps which the Council might take, including the possible deployment of United Nations forces, to assist that Government in ensuring full protection for the civilian population in and around Beirut and requests him to report to the Council within forty-eight hours;

6. <u>Insists</u> that all concerned must permit United Nations observers and forces established by the Security Council in Lebanon to be deployed and to discharge their mandates and in this connexion solemnly calls attention to the obligation on all Member States under Article 25 of the Charter to accept and carry out the decisions of the Council in accordance with the Charter;

7. <u>Requests</u> the Secretary-General to keep the Council informed on an urgent and continuing basis.
