of so-called municipal elections and the speeding up of community development in the larger cities - as though that were what is needed to achieve the independence and unification of our country!

Having no legal arguments to explain away the Chad reinforcements, the blocking of postal communications and the warrants for the seizure of personal correspondence, the French colonialists - through the Council of Ministers which has no jurisdiction in the Cameroons, a Territory under United Nations Trusteeship - have taken an empty, unfounded decision to dissolve the UPC, JDC, CGT and UDETEC, by virtue of one of their decrees prohibiting armed association of organizations throughout the French territory. It must be borne in mind, however, that the Camercons is under United Nations International Trusteeship; it is not a French territory and is not concerned in these matters. The UPC is not an armed association; it is a Cameroonian movement for national liberation that is supported by the parties mentioned above. We would respectfully point out to all States Members of the United Nations that no valid solution for any Cameroonian problem would be achieved in the absence of these progressive associations that the French colonialists claim to have dissolved, nor could the Visiting Mission carry out its inquiry to any useful purpose.

In the belief that the precise aim of this manoeuvre is to frustrate the work of the Visiting Mission which is shortly to arrive in the Cameroons and the chief tasks of which are:

- (A) to investigate the freely expressed desires of the people comprising the two Cameroons with respect to the INDEPENDENCE AND IMPEDIATE UNIFICATION OF THE CAMEROONS; and
- (B) to carry out a serious investigation into the damage caused by the recent war in the Cameroons;

WE ACCORDINGLY REQUEST:

1. that, as a preliminary, the Secretary-General intervene with the French Covernment to secure the release of persons arbitrarily imprisoned and the total cessation of illegal judicial action directed against the officers, leaders and active members of progressive organizations.

2. We disavow all the manoeuvres started by the French colonialists following upon the bloody events in the Cameroons, i.e., the organization of municipal elections, Africanization of Government personnel, Government councils, projected or otherwise. Our desire is to achieve the INDEPENDENCE and IMMEDIATE UNIFICATION OF THE CAMEROONS and to improve our system of government.
