# Resolutions and Decisions adopted by the General Assembly during its seventy-third session

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#### NOTE

The resolutions and decisions of the General Assembly are identified as follows:

#### **Regular sessions**

Until the thirtieth regular session, the resolutions of the General Assembly were identified by an arabic numeral followed by a roman numeral in parentheses indicating the session (for example: resolution 3363 (XXX)). When several resolutions were adopted under the same number, each of them was identified by a capital letter placed between the two numerals (for example: resolution 3367 A (XXX), resolutions 3411 A and B (XXX), resolutions 3419 A to D (XXX)). The decisions were not numbered.

Since the thirty-first session, as part of the new system adopted for symbols of General Assembly documents, resolutions and decisions have been identified by an arabic numeral, indicating the session, followed by an oblique stroke and another arabic numeral (for example: resolution 31/1, decision 31/301). When several resolutions or decisions were adopted under the same number, each of them has been identified by a capital letter placed after the two numerals (for example: resolution 31/16 A, resolutions 31/6 A and B, decisions 31/406 A to E).

#### Special sessions

Until the seventh special session, the resolutions of the General Assembly were identified by an arabic numeral followed, in parentheses, by the letter "S" and a roman numeral indicating the session (for example: resolution 3362 (S-VII)). The decisions were not numbered.

Since the eighth special session, resolutions and decisions have been identified by the letter "S" and an arabic numeral indicating the session, followed by an oblique stroke and another arabic numeral (for example: resolution S-8/1, decision S-8/11).

#### **Emergency special sessions**

Until the fifth emergency special session, the resolutions of the General Assembly were identified by an arabic numeral followed, in parentheses, by the letters "ES" and a roman numeral indicating the session (for example: resolution 2252 (ES-V)). The decisions were not numbered.

Since the sixth emergency special session, resolutions and decisions have been identified by the letters "ES" and an arabic numeral indicating the session, followed by an oblique stroke and another arabic numeral (for example: resolution ES-6/1, decision ES-6/11).

In each of the series described above, the numbering follows the order of adoption.

The present volume contains the decisions adopted by the General Assembly from 18 September to 22 December 2018. Resolutions adopted by the Assembly during that period appear in volume I, together with information on the allocation of agenda items. Resolutions and decisions adopted subsequently during the seventy-third session will be published in volume III.

At its 52nd plenary meeting, on 13 December 2018, the General Assembly, at the request of the Chair of the Fifth Committee, decided to extend the work of the Committee until Friday, 21 December 2018.

At its 65th plenary meeting, on 21 December 2018, the General Assembly, on the proposal of its President, decided to further postpone the date of recess of the seventy-third session from Friday, 21 December 2018, to Saturday, 22 December 2018.

At the same meeting, the General Assembly, at the request of the Chair of the Fifth Committee, decided to extend the work of the Committee until Saturday, 22 December 2018.

#### 73/503. General debate of the seventy-third session of the General Assembly

#### 73/504. Adoption of the agenda and allocation of agenda items

Also at the same meeting, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee as set forth in its first report,<sup>29</sup> decided to defer consideration of the item entitled "Question of the Malagasy islands of Glorieuses, Juan de Nova, Europa and Bassas da India" and to include it in the provisional agenda of its seventy-fourth session.

Also at the same meeting, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee as set forth in its first report,<sup>30</sup> by a recorded vote of 68 to 13, with 48 abstentions,<sup>31</sup> decided to include in the agenda of its seventy-third session an item entitled "The situation in the temporarily occupied territories of Ukraine" under heading B (Maintenance of international peace and security).

Also at the same meeting, the General Assembly, on the recommendation of the General Committee as set forth in its first report,<sup>32</sup> by a recorded vote of 93 to 16, with 17 abstentions,<sup>33</sup> decided to include in the agenda of its seventy-third session an item entitled "The responsibility to protect and the prevention of genocide, war crimes, ethnic cleansing and crimes against humanity" under heading I (Organizational, administrative and other matters).

(a) Decided to hold the award ceremony for the United Nations prize in the field of human rights at the plenary meeting of the General Assembly on 18 December 2018, immediately after the commemorative meeting on the occasion of the seventieth anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and of the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action;

(b) Decided also that the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights would address the plenary meeting.

#### 73/522. High-level meetings of the General Assembly in September 2019

(a) That the general debate of the seventy-fourth session of the General Assembly would be held from Tuesday, 24 September, to Saturday, 28 September, and on Monday, 30 September 2019;

(b) To hold the high-level meeting on universal health coverage on Monday, 23 September 2019, from 9 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 6 p.m., in accordance with resolution 72/139;

(c) To hold the high-level political forum on sustainable development under the auspices of the General Assembly on Tuesday, 24 September, from 3 to 6 p.m., and on Wednesday, 25 September 2019, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 6 p.m.;

(d) To hold the High-level Dialogue on Financing for Development of the General Assembly on Thursday, 26 September 2019, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 6 p.m., and to hold on the same day the high-level meeting to commemorate and promote the International Day for the Total Elimination of Nuclear Weapons, from 11 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 6 p.m., in accordance with resolution 72/251;

(e) To hold the high-level meeting to review progress made in addressing the priorities of small island developing States through the implementation of the SIDS Accelerated Modalities of Action (SAMOA) Pathway on Friday, 27 September 2019, from 10 a.m. to 1 p.m. and from 3 to 6 p.m., in accordance with resolution 71/225;

(f) That each high-level meeting would not have any parallel meetings, subject to the provisions of resolution 73/131 of 13 December 2018 on the scope, modalities, format and organization of the high-level meeting on universal health coverage.

# 73/530. Commemorative meeting to mark the seventieth anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights and the twenty-fifth anniversary of the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action

#### 73/512. Further practical measures for the prevention of an arms race in outer space

# 73/546. Convening a conference on the establishment of a Middle East zone free of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction

At its 65th plenary meeting, on 22 December 2018, the General Assembly, by a recorded vote of 88 to 4, with 75 abstentions,<sup>53</sup> on the recommendation of the First Committee,<sup>54</sup> decided:

(a) To entrust to the Secretary-General the convening, no later than 2019 for a duration of one week at United Nations Headquarters, of a conference on the establishment of a Middle East zone free of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction, to which all States of the Middle East,<sup>55</sup> the three co-sponsors of the resolution on the Middle East adopted by the 1995 Review and Extension Conference of the Parties to the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons,<sup>56</sup> in the light of their responsibility for the implementation of that resolution, the other two nuclear-weapon States and the relevant international organizations shall be invited, provided that:

(i) The conference shall take as its terms of reference the resolution on the Middle East adopted by the 1995 Review and Extension Conference;

(ii) The conference shall aim at elaborating a legally binding treaty establishing a Middle East zone free of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction, on the basis of arrangements freely arrived at by the States of the region;

(iii) All decisions emanating from the conference shall be taken by consensus by the States of the region;

(b) To affirm the special responsibility of the three co-sponsors of the resolution on the Middle East adopted by the 1995 Review and Extension Conference, as the depository States of the Treaty on the Non-Proliferation of Nuclear Weapons,<sup>57</sup> and to call upon them to fulfil their relevant obligations in accordance with the agreed outcomes of the 1995, 2000 and 2010 Review Conferences;

(c) To request the International Atomic Energy Agency, the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons and the Biological Weapons Convention Implementation Support Unit to prepare the background documents necessary for the conference;

(d) To request the Secretary-General to convene annual sessions of the conference for a duration of one week at United Nations Headquarters until the conference concludes the elaboration of a legally binding treaty establishing a Middle East zone free of nuclear weapons and other weapons of mass destruction;

(e) To also request the Secretary-General to report annually to the General Assembly on developments in this regard.
