
Policies on Population Ageing

Population ageing is occurring throughout the world


Percentage point change in the proportion aged 65 or over in the total population, 2015 to 2030





The dotted line represents approximately the Line of Control in Jammu and Kashmir agreed upon by India and Pakistan. The final status of Jammu and Kashmir has not yet been agreed upon by the parties. Chagos Archipelago/Diego Garcia appears without prejudice to the question of sovereignty. A dispute exists between the Governments of Argentina and the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland concerning sovereignty over the Falkland Islands (Malvinas). Final boundary between the Republic of the Sudan and the Republic of South Sudan has not yet been determined. Final status of the Abyei area is not yet determined.



Developing regions comprise Africa, Asia (excluding Japan), Latin America and the Caribbean, Melanesia, Micronesia and Polynesia; developed regions comprise Europe, North America, Japan, Australia and New Zealand. The designations "developed" and "developing" are intended for statistical convenience and do not necessarily express a judgement about the stage reached by a particular country or area in the development process. Data on pension coverage are available for 178 countries. Data on barriers to health-care services among those aged 60+ refer to the average for 70 countries in the period 2002-2004. Data on level of concern about population ageing are available for 186 countries and refer to 2015. Data on Government measures to address **population ageing** are available for 61 countries and refer to measures adopted in the period 2010-2015.
