INTRODUCTION

- 1. At its twenty-seventh session, the Committee for Programme and Co-ordination (CPC) recommended, in paragraph 138 of its report, 1/ that the Secretary-General should prepare a report for submission to the General Assembly at its forty-second session, giving information on the measures he intended to take in the context of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989, to ensure that due consideration was given to the priority he had assigned to the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development.
- 2. Pursuant to the above recommendation, a report entitled "Implementation of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development 1986-1990" 2/ was submitted to the forty-second session of the General Assembly and considered by the Fifth Committee in conjunction with its review of Section 13, Economic Commission for Africa (ECA), of the proposed programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989.
- 3. At its 50th meeting on 1 December 1987, the Fifth Committee, taking note of the report and the intention of the Secretary-General to give priority to Africa in the 1988-1989 programme budget, requested that a new report be presented to the forty-third session of the General Assembly through the Committee for Programme and Co-ordination. The report should clearly identify in the related sections of the programme budget, those activities (subprogrammes, programme elements, outputs) and related resources which constitute contributions by the United Nations towards the implementation of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development. The report should also contain proposals by the Secretary-General for the effective solution to the persistently high vacancy rate in ECA.
- 4. In paragraph 24 of its report, the Committee further requested that, pending consideration by the General Assembly of that report, the Secretary-General, in consultation with the Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions (ACABQ), should ensure that, as recommended in paragraph 137 of the report of CPC, 1/ adequate resources were made available to ECA for the full implementation of its work programme and priorities. 3/
- 5. The present document supplements the previous report of the Secretary-General 2/ and responds to two of the three requests stated above, namely, the identification of activities and resources within the 1988-1989 programme budget which contribute towards the implementation of the Programme of Action, and the provision of adequate resources to ECA. The request concerning proposals for the effective solution to the persistently high vacancy rate in ECA is being addressed in the context of the revised estimates. 4/
- 6. It should be noted that the inventory of activities and resources outlined in the present report is only a part of a broad range of measures and efforts taken or being taken to implement the priority assigned by the Secretary-General to the Programme of Action. It should be noted further that the estimated costs of regular budget resources have been arrived at on the basis of the initial appropriation, i.e. before the impact of the resources transfer being proposed by

the Secretary-General. 5/ Aside from the activities of United Nations entities such as the Office of the United Nations Disaster Relief Co-ordinator (UNDRO) and the Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees (UNHCR) which are not directly related to African economic recovery and development and those of the United Nations specialized agencies which are excluded from the present report, other significant measures are being taken outside the context of the programmo budget of the United Nations.

- 7. One example of such measures illustrates the continuing efforts being made to monitor the implementation of the Programme and to make necessary adjustments. By early 1987, when it became clear that efforts for economic recovery in many African countries were being undermined by the deteriorating financial situation, the Secretary-General initiated action to prevent further economic decline. After consultation with interested Governments and the management of the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the Secretary-General constituted an advisory group of eminent persons with particular competence in the area of international financial flows and asked them to propose practical recommendations, within agreed programmes, for alleviating the financial burdens of the affected African countries. The group reported its findings to the Secretary-General in February 1988 and those findings are being pursued. Owing to their importance, they have been published in full by the Department of Public Information in a pamphlet entitled "Financing Africa's Recovery Report and Recommendations of the Advisory Group on Financial Flows for Africa".
- 8. As far as the United Nations Development Programme (UNDP) is concerned, the basic difference in its resource programming vis-à-vis the other entities covered in the present report, on the one hand, and the possible overlapping with activities covered by other United Nations entities, on the other hand, made it difficult to present its contribution in support of the Programme of Action in a detailed manner. However, for indicative purposes, a succinct presentation of the magnitude of resources devoted by UNDP to projects related to the Programme of Action is given in the annex to the present report. It should be noted in this connection that a detailed report on the role of UNDP in the Programme of Action (DP/1988/24) is under preparation for submission to the UNDP Governing Council session of June 1988.
- 9. While every effort has been made to identify output and resources included in the 1988-1989 programme budget that are directly related to the Programme of Action, there are a number of cases where this was not possible because the information available varied in terms of detail reflecting the special characteristics of the entity concerned and the nature of its operations. None the less, the report presents a fair indication of activities and related resources accorded to the Programme of Action within the context of the 1988-1989 programme budget.

I. IDENTIFICATION OF ACTIVITIES AND RESOURCES

- A. Department of International Economic and Social Affairs (Sect. 6A)
- 10. In its global coverage, the Department of International Economic and Social Affairs has reoriented a number of its planned activities to provide more in-depth studies and information on the African region and has taken into consideration the critical economic situation in Africa. The estimated resources relating to activities being or to be undertaken may be understated because in a number of instances, owing to difficulties in collectir— data and information about Africa, more work-months and resources may be needed than planned. Also, in addition to the detailed activities, the Department continues to perform ad hoc activities requested by intergovernmental organs and member States in the African region.
- 11. Activities and related resources under Section 6A of the programme budget, Department of International Economic and Social Affairs, are presented in table 1 below.

D. Horld Food Council (Sect. 1A.6)

- 14. The World Food Council (WFC) is a policy-making body and not an operational organization. Its activities are included under the programme "World food issues" in section 1A.6 of the programme budget. Given the world-wide interrelationship of food and the agriculture issues, all of the programmed outputs of WFC have a bearing on the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development.
- 15. Table 6 below reflects how extensively WFC is involved in supporting the Programme of Action.

- E. <u>Department of Special Political Questions</u>, <u>Regional Co-operation</u>, <u>Decolonization and Trusteeship</u> (Sect. 3)
- 16. The Unit for Emergencies and Special Relief has taken over all African emergency activities previously discharged by the Unit for Special Economic Masistance Programmes. The resources of the Unit consist of one D-1, two P-5 and two General Service posts. In addition to these regular budget resources, the Unit administers the carry-over balance of the African Emergency Trust Fund which had an opening balance of \$434,400 as at 1 January 1988. Of this amount, \$139,800 has already been allocated for various relief projects in 1988. For all practical purposes, all the activities undertaken by the Unit and the resources appropriated to it could be considered a contribution towards the implementation of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development.

F. Centre for Social Development and Humanitarian Affairs (Sect. 6B)

- 17. The work of the Centre falls under the programme "Global social development issues" appearing in document A/42/6 (Sect. 6). Issues of special concern to Africa have received appropriate attention within the global orientation of the outputs planned for the 1988-1989 biennium. Thus, all subprogrammes in one way or another address two critical areas of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development, namely: human resources development, planning and utilisation; and participation of the people in development.
- 18. In view of the global orientation of the outputs, the resources devoted to issues relating directly to the Programme of Actic 1 could be estimated at the subprogramme levels only as indicated in table 7 below:

G. Centre on Transpational Corporations (Sect. 9)

- 19. The Centre on Transnational Corporations (CTC) is putting together a total of \$3,540,000 in support of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development. This amount is mainly from extrabudgetary sources and most of the activities are of a technical co-operation nature and fall under subprogramme 3 of the Centre's programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989 entitled "Strengthening the capability of host developing countries in dealing with matters related to transnational cortorations".
- 20. Provided hereunder is a brief outline of the financial mobilization efforts relating to the Programme of Action, along with the proposed corresponding activities grouped under four headings reflecting the objective to be achieved:
 - (a) Improving management of the economy in Africa (\$2,150,000)
 - (i) During 1988-1989, CTC expects to implement an estimated total of 35 projects in African countries on foreign investment activities, including policy formulation and legislative arrangements. The estimatel cost of these projects is \$1.7 million;
 - (ii) An entrepressional pand intermational business programme has been launched by CTC and emphasis will be given to the development of and assistance to the private sector in African countries. About \$150,000 is earmarked for this programme in 1988-1989;
 - (iii) At the request of the Conference of African Ministers of Tourism in the context of the Recovery Programme, CTC has formulated a joint CTC/ECA regional project of technical assistance to improve contractual arrangements. This is the key sector through which an

immediate increase in earnings by African countries is feasible within their limited infrastructural facilities. An amount of \$300,000 of extrabudgetary resources has been earmarked in 1988-1989 for implementation of the initial programme;

- (b) <u>Human resources development</u> (\$760,000). A total of 10 high-level training workshops in various sectors of African economies, principally the natural resources, service and manufacturing sectors, will be organized for African countries during 1988-1989. This training programme is estimated to cost \$560,000. In addition, CTC will continue with the training of trainers in issues related to transmational corporations and the provision of expertise for curriculum development in the institutes in Africa. In the course of 1988-1989, \$200,000 will be spent on the project;
- (\$230,000). A major CTC activity for Africa in 1988-1989 in this sector is a high-level seminar on acquisition of technology which will focus on agricultural machinery and farm implements, among other areas. An additional programme in the seminar will be technology advisory services which will provide on-the-spot advisory assistance to interested African entrepreneurs. An estimated sum of \$230,000 will be spent on this programme;
- (d) <u>Subregional co-operation</u> (\$400,000). During 1988-1989, an estimated \$200,000 will be spent by CTC on technical co-operation to countries members of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) in development of computerized packages in the petroleum and mining sectors and in fishing arrangements involving foreign participation and training of key officials from the relevant sectors. The Preferential Trade Area of Eastern and Southern Africa (PTA) will also continue to receive CTC assistance during 1988-1989 at an estimated cost of \$200,000. The actilities will include the establishment of a PTA multinational charter and the narmonization of foreign investment codes of PTA member States under their economic integration process for a common market.
- 21. The total cost of activities proposed by CTC is: \$3,540,000.
 - H. International drug control (Sect. 20)
 - 1. Division of Narcotic Drugs (\$150,300)
- 22. The outputs figuring in the programme budget for the biennium 1988-1989 which could be related to services or assistance to African countries are presented in table 8 below.

United Nations Fund for Drug Abuse Control (\$2,700,000 for 1988)

23. The United Nations Fund for Drug Abuse Control (UNFDAC) has considerably increased the scope of its activities in Africa. This increase has taken place as a result of an alarming growth in illicit trafficking of drugs into and through the African region, involving in many cases the use of nationals of African countries as couriers. Of particular concern has been the recent appearance in Africa of a significant volume of traffic in heroin and cocaine. UNFDAC has made a provision of \$2.7 million for African programmes in 1988 and projects a significant increase in 1989, following intensive project design work being undertaken in 1988. The UNFDAC projects target not only measures aimed at interrupting the illicit transit traffic, but also provide support for national programmes in the education and health fields which are designed to prevent the outbreak of drug addiction within Africa likely to occur as a side effect of the illicit traffic.

I. United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (Sect. 15)

24. Following the adoption of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development, an inter-divisional Task Force was established within the secretariat of the United Nations Conference on Trade and Development (UNCTAD) to keep under review relevant activities in UNCTAD's regular work programme and to recommend changes, reorientations and additional activities, as appropriate, to ensure an effective contribution by UNCTAD to the implementation

of the Programme of Action. The Task Force is supported by a unit charged with the functions of identifying, co-ordinating and monitoring actions required for the implementation of the Programme and to advise the Secretary-General accordingly.

- 25. Under the aegis of the Task Force, an intersectoral work programme specifically tailored to supporting the implementation of the Programme has been established within UNCTAD for the period 1988-1989. This intersectoral work programme, as endorsed by the Trade and Development Board, involves the following activities:
 - (a) Studies on financial flows to Africa, debt and recovery;
- (b) Studies on the external environment as it affects the implementation of the Programme of Action, including developments in the field of trade and commodities, etc.:
- (c) Reports to the Trade and Development Board on UNCTAD's contribution to the implementation of the Programme of Action, including technical assistance activities.
- 26. In table 9 below, an indication is given by subprogramme of estimated resource requirements of items in the regular work programme of direct relevance to the Programme of Action.

27. In addition to the above, it is estimated that about \$17 million of UNCTAD's regular budget, as set out in the initial appropriation for 1988-1989, is for activities relating to African issues. Furthermore, it is estimated that some \$10 million in operational expenditures will be devoted to African countries during the biennium 1988-1989.

J. <u>International Trade Centre</u> (Sect. 16)

- 28. The International Trade Centre (ITC) is heavily engaged in technical co-operation activities in African countries which contribute to alleviating the critical economic situation in Africa under medium- and long-term aspects. In the 1988-1989 biennium, ITC envisages to devote \$14 million or 27 per cent of its operational activities to Africa. In addition, a proportion of 32 per cent of its regular budget resources will be devoted to Africa, i.e. \$3.9 million.
- 29. The activities proposed touch on practically all the programme elements figuring under ITC's eight subprogrammes and relate to the strengthening of the infrastructure for trade promotion and export development; human resources development, including development of skills among women entrepreneurs; export marketing development and, in particular, trade information services. Also envisaged are the provision of specialized services and assistance in import operations and techniques with a view to reducing foreign exchange losses, enhancing the impact of assistance at the country level and contributing directly to the promotion of regional economic co-operation and integration.
- 30. Furthermore, issues pertaining to Africa will be covered by the various technical publications and advisory services planned under the different subprogrammes. These would address themselves basically to developing measures to increase intra-African trade, including the analysis of existing supply and demand, the identification of intra-African trade opportunities and the organization of

trade generating events. In view of the operational nature of most activities, it was not possible to relate the projects proposed to specific outputs and corresponding resources.

31. The total cost of activities proposed by ITC is \$17,900,000.

K. Centre for Science and Technology for Development (Sect. 17)

32. The Centre's contribution in support of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development during the 1988-1989 biennium is presented in table 10 hereunder.

33. In addition to the above, a series of technical co-operation activities are contemplated during the biennium in support of the Programme of Action. They are to be funded from extrabudgetary resources totalling \$675,000 for which the Centre is expecting contributions from donors. The activities fall within the purview of programme element 1.1 (\$380,000), programme element 1.2 (\$105,000) and programme element 4.3 (\$190,000) of the Centre's programme of work.

L. <u>United Nations Environment Programme</u> (Sect. 18)

34. The activities of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) in support of the United Nations Programme of Action for African Economic Recovery and Development will be undertaken mostly within the framework of the African Ministerial Conference on the Environment (Cairo Programme). In view of the advisory, as well as technical co-operation nature of these activities, it was not possible to relate specific outputs or projects to their corresponding resources in the 1988-1989 biennium. Accordingly, the resources and activities are presented in table 11 below at the programme element level. Only those activities to be supported from UNEP's Environment Fund are presented. Project proposals for support to the Programme of Action to be financed from extrabudgetary resources, and for which the UNEP Clearing-House is seeking assistance from bilateral and multilateral organizations, are not included.

II. ISSUE OF ADEQUATE RESOURCES FOR THE ECONOMIC COMMISSION FOR AFRICA

- 38. As indicated in paragraph 5 above, the second issue addressed in this report is the request that the Secretary-General, in consultation with ACABQ, should ensure that, as recommended in paragraph 137 of the report of CPC, 1/ adequate resources are made available to the Commission for the full implementation of its work programme and priorities.
- 39. It will be noted from the proposed post reduction by budget sections presented in the Secretary-General's report on revised estimates, 5/ that the special situation in Africa has had an influence on the posts proposed for reduction in ECA, where the percentage of those posts is one of the lowest in the Secretariat (6.7 per cent). Consequently, an additional amount of \$2,784,400 would be made available to ECA, as reflected in the proposed redistribution of resources given in the table on pages 16 to 18 of the revised estimates.
- 40. To ensure the implementation of the work programme and priorities of ECA, special measures were authorized by the Secretary-General. These measures consisted of introducing flexibility to the tight recruitment management policy by authorizing external recruitment whenever an essential post could not be filled internally through vacancy management and by authorizing recruitment of candidates for durations up to 11 months pending completion of the procedure for a longer-term filling of the post.
- 41. As a result of the above measures, 5 posts were filled by ECA as an exception to the recruitment freeze and 20 additional posts are being filled through a combination of internal redeployment and external recruitment. To ensure that posts are filled as soon as possible, ECA is initially offering six-month appointments to a number of external candidates. Accordingly, 6 posts would be filled immediately.

Annex

UNITED NATIONS DEVELOPMENT PROGRAMME

- 1. UNDP does not have any biennial budget as such for 1988-1989. However, within the overall funding available for its fourth cycle (1987-1991), UNDP has pursued the implementation of the Programme of Action through a variety of actions. What follows is a highlight of the many facets of the implementation of the Programme of Action by UNDP, at least concerning those for which the costs are easily quantifiable.
- 2. Specifically, UNDP resources totalling \$1.287 billion are being allocated under country and intercountry programmes to projects and programmes in countries of sub-Saharan Africa during the fourth programming cycle (1987-1991).

Country programmes

3. Of the \$1.287 billion in UNDP resources allocated to sub-Saharan Africa in the fourth cycle, over \$1 billion, including carry-over, is for the implementation of 42 country programmes. Thirty-one country programmes for Africa with indicative planning figure (IPF) resources of \$768.6 million were approved by the Governing Council in 1986 and 1987. These funds will contribute to the implementation of the sectoral priorities identified in the Programme of Action. In this respect, it is noteworthy that not less than 45.2 per cent of the UNDP resources allocated to africa goes to food and agriculture (including the development of water resources) and about 15 per cent each to human resources development and economic planning and administration, whose importance for the implementation of the Programme of Action can hardly be ove stressed.

Intercountry programmes

4. The total of all resources available under UNDP intercountry programmes for Africa in the fourth cycle amounts to \$211.95 million. Of this, \$195.75 million is core or IPF resources, while \$16.2 million represents Special Programme Resources, third-party cost-sharing and UNDP trust funds. Here again, it is worth pointing out, by way of illustration, that such key areas for the inplementation of the Programme of Action as research and development for food production, on the one hand, and productivity and management for production of goods and services, on the other, account respectively for almost 17 per cent and 38 per cent of overall resources.

UNDP-administered funds

5. Other resources under the responsibility of the Administrator also focus on the priority themes of the Programme of Action and the activities of UNDF-associated funds are being increasingly harmonized. These associated resources encompass those designated by donors for (a) drought and desertification - United Nations Sudano-Sahelian Office (UNSO); (b) small- and medium-scale capital assistance projects - United Nations Capital Development

Fund (UNCDF); (c) women in development - United Nations Development Fund for Women (UNIFEM); (d) science and technology - United Nations Fund for Science and Technology for Development (UNFSTD); and (e) volunteer assistance - United Nations Volunteers (UNV). Resources available to UNSO increased from \$39 million in 1986 to about \$44.2 million in 1987, while the share of UNCDF general resources directed to the last developed countries in Africa increased from 52 per cent in 1985 to 58 per and in 1986 and to more than 70 per cent in 1987; and resources available to UNIFEM have grown from \$12.9 million in 1986 to \$20.2 million in 1987.

Special initiatives

6. A number of special initiatives have also been taken in direct support of the Programme of Action. These include the Special Action Programme for Administration and Management in Africa (SAPAM), the main emphasis of which is the strengthening of policy analysis capabilities of the Governments of sub-Saharan countries, and which is benefiting from financing in excess of \$5 million. Furthermore, UNDP, either alone or in co-operation with other institutions, is financing no less than seven regional structural adjustment projects in Africa. We UNDP contribution to these projects amounts to \$8 million.

Steering Committee

7. UNDP is providing direct support to the Steering Committee established by the Secretary-General by not only having the UNDP Assistant Administrator and Regional Director for Africa serve as Secretary of the Committee, and be a focal point at headquarters for activities relating to the implementation of the Programme of Action, but also by providing staffing and financial support to the secretariat established to service the Committee and a special support to the information activities amounting to \$354,000 for 1987-1988.
