DR. SALVADOR MARTINEZ DE ALVA

Dr. Salvador Martinez de Alva was born in Zacatecas, Mexico, in 1891.

He graduated from the School of Commerce and Administration and the National School of Jurisprudence of the National University of Mexico, as well as from the Catholic University of America in Washington, D.C. He has degrees in law and economics and a doctorate in letters.

He served in the Mexican Consular Corps from 1910 to 1915, and entered the Diplomatic Service in 1919, having occupied different positions in Asia, Europe and Central and South America.

From 1938 to 1960 he served successively as his country's Ambassador to Guatemala, Ecuador, Venezuela and Peru.

In addition to his diplomatic functions, he has taught economics and international law and relations in the National School of Jurisprudence of the National University of Mexico.

Last year he was a member of the Commission set up to investigate the death of Patrice Lumumba, in accordance with the Security Council resolution of 21 February 1961, and is presently Vice-Chairman of the Assembly's Special Committee on South West Africa.

DR. SALVADOR MARTINEZ DE ALVA

Dr. Salvador Martinez de Alva was born in Zacatecas, Mexico, in 1891.
