## I. Introduction

1. The Advisory Committee on Administrative and Budgetary Questions has considered the report of the Secretary-General on the revised estimates resulting from resolutions and decisions adopted by the Human Rights Council at its fortieth, forty-first and forty-second sessions (A/74/529). During its consideration of the report, the Advisory Committee met with representatives of the Secretary-General, who provided additional information and clarification, concluding with written responses received on 29 November 2019.

# II. Financial implications arising from the resolutions and decisions adopted by the Human Rights Council

2. In his report, the Secretary-General states that the estimated resource requirements arising from 65 resolutions adopted by the Human Rights Council at its fortieth to forty-second sessions amounts to \$67,907,000, comprising: (a) \$32,177,700 relating to activities of a perennial nature, which have already been included in the programme budget for the biennium 2018–2019 and the proposed programme budget for 2020; and (b) \$35,729,300 relating to new requirements under the programme budget for the biennium 2018–2019 (\$13,181,000) and the proposed programme budget for 2020 (\$22,548,300) (ibid., summary and para. 4).





- 3. With respect to the new requirements for the biennium 2018–2019 in the amount of \$13,181,000, an estimated amount of \$7,501,100 will be considered in the context of the second performance report, taking into account actual expenditure against total commitment authorities of \$10,597,000 approved by the Advisory Committee in 2019 under General Assembly resolution 72/264 on unforeseen and extraordinary expenses for the biennium. It is proposed that \$1,435,300, for which no commitment authorities were sought, be accommodated within the approved appropriations for the biennium 2018–2019 (ibid., para. 5).
- 4. The new requirements for 2020 of \$22,548,300 would comprise: (a) \$1,884,800 under section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management; (b) \$20,583,000 under section 24, Human rights; and (c) \$80,500 under section 29E, Administration, Geneva. The Secretary-General proposes that the amount of \$22,548,300 be appropriated, representing a charge against the contingency fund for 2020 (ibid., para. 6).
- 5. It is also proposed that, effective 1 January 2020, 18 posts be established under section 24, Human rights, of the proposed programme budget for 2020, comprising 6 posts to support the activities mandated by the Human Rights Council in its resolutions 40/13, 42/20, 42/22 and 42/23 and 12 posts for the establishment of the country office in the Sudan, as mandated in its resolution 42/35 (ibid., para. 7).
- 6. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was provided with the table below, which sets out the number of Human Rights Council resolutions from 2015 to 2019, the related resource requirements and the nature of the mandates.

7. The Advisory Committee recommends that the General Assembly request the Secretary-General to include in future reports on the revised estimates resulting from Human Rights Council resolutions and decisions information on whether each mandate is perennial, new or an expansion of existing mandates, as well as an indication of the time period for which resources are being requested.

# Proposed new requirements for 2020

Expenditure patterns

8. In annex I to his report, the Secretary-General summarizes the proposed new requirements related to the Human Rights Council's resolutions. These include those resolutions under which the Advisory Committee has previously approved commitment authorities in 2019: resolution 40/2, Promotion and protection of human rights in Nicaragua; resolution 40/4, The negative impact of the non-repatriation of

funds of illicit origin to the countries of origin on the enjoyment of human rights, and the importance of improving international cooperation; resolution 40/13, Ensuring accountability and justice for all violations of international law in the Occupied Palestinian Territory, including East Jerusalem; resolution 40/17, The human rights situation in the Syrian Arab Republic; resolution 40/19, Situation of human rights in South Sudan; resolution 40/20, Situation of human rights in the Democratic People's Republic of Korea; resolution 41/2, Promotion and protection of human rights in the Philippines; and resolution 41/26, Renewal of the mandate of the team of international experts on the situation in Kasai.

- 9. Upon enquiry, the Advisory Committee was provided with information on current and projected expenditure under section 24, Human rights, for 2019 against these commitment authorities (see annex I below). The Committee notes that the expenditure information shows underexpenditure against these commitment authorities, as follows: Human Rights Council resolution 40/2 (\$1,179); resolution 40/4 (\$5,669); resolution 40/13 (\$196,200); resolution 40/17 (\$610,766); resolution 40/19 (\$1,137,000); resolution 40/20 (\$101,834); resolution 41/2 (\$49,800); and resolution 41/26 (\$1,033,268). The Committee further notes that the underexpenditure is mainly attributable to delays in recruitment under other staff costs. The Committee was also provided upon enquiry with information on actual expenditures under section 24, Human rights, against commitment authorities approved in previous periods (see annex II below). The Committee notes that actual expenditures in 2017 and 2018 also reflect underexpenditure or no expenditure and include unspent balances carried over from previous Council resolutions.
- 10. The Advisory Committee notes that the expenditure information reflects a consistent trend of underexpenditure against commitment authorities over the past three years. The Committee recommends that the General Assembly request the Secretary-General to strengthen efforts to ensure that future requests for commitment authorities and budget submissions are more accurate and are based on realistic budgeting assumptions. The Committee also recommends that the General Assembly request the Secretary-General to include in future reports actual and projected expenditure information by resolution or decision of the Human Rights Council, broken down by object of expenditure.

#### General temporary assistance positions

- 11. Upon enquiry as to general temporary assistance positions, the Advisory Committee was provided with a table setting out, by Human Rights Council resolution, the number and level of such positions requested and their duration for 2019 to 2022 (see annex III below). The Committee notes that, for a number of resolutions, the proposed positions for 2020 represent an increase from the number of positions in 2019.
- 12. The Advisory Committee further notes that certain positions related to the following Human Rights Council resolutions are proposed to be funded for 12 months: 40/1; 40/13; 40/18; 40/20; 40/26; 41/1; 41/8; 41/12; 41/22; and 42/36. In line with the Advisory Committee's observations in the context of its concurrence with the request for commitment authority in relation to Council resolution 40/17, the Committee reiterates that, as the mandates are of a temporary nature and their continuance is subject to the decision of the Human Rights Council, the proposed 12-month duration of general temporary assistance positions is not justified.
- 13. The Advisory Committee was also provided upon enquiry with a table setting out the status of incumbency of the positions related to commitment authorities for 2017, 2018 and 2019 (see annex IV below). The Committee notes that the incumbency information reflects underutilization, or no utilization, of the general temporary

assistance resources, which mirrors expenditure patterns, as reflected in paragraph 9 above. Given the status of incumbency of general temporary assistance positions for commitment authorities and its view on the budgeting of those positions for a full 12 months, the Advisory Committee is not convinced that the proposed level of resources for 2020 for general temporary assistance positions is justified. The Committee recommends that the General Assembly request the Secretary-General to set out clearly in future budget proposals, by resolution or decision, the number of general temporary assistance positions requested and related resources, their duration and any relevant incumbency information.

- 14. The Advisory Committee was also informed upon enquiry that the new requirements for 2020 included a provision in the amount of \$72,100 for the equivalent of 5.5 months of a P-3 general temporary assistance position to support the establishment of an independent international fact-finding mission in the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela (Human Rights Council resolution 42/25), the extension of the mandate of the Commission of Inquiry on Burundi (resolution 42/26) and the renewal of the mandate of the Independent Expert on the situation of human rights in the Sudan (resolution 42/35). The Committee was further informed that the proposed position, to be based in Geneva, would ensure the necessary surge capacity to provide human resources backstopping, support the fast-tracking of recruitment and onboarding of staff and other related administrative actions.
- 15. The Advisory Committee recalls that, in both the contexts of its concurrence with requests for commitment authorities and of the revised estimates resulting from Human Rights Council resolutions and decisions, it has previously recommended against the general temporary assistance resources for Human Resources Officer positions for recruitment and onboarding under relevant resolutions, given the existing capacity within the United Nations Office at Geneva (see A/72/7/Add.35, para. 12).

#### Inconsistencies in budget presentation

- 16. With respect to the documentation to be provided in future sessions of the Human Rights Council, the Advisory Committee was informed upon enquiry of the documentation submission guidelines. These stipulate that documents should be submitted by the client office 10 weeks prior to a meeting, as processing and translation would take 4 weeks and issuance would take place 6 weeks before the meeting. The Committee was informed that, therefore, the summary report requested under Human Rights Council resolution 41/21 for the forty-sixth session of the Council, which would take place during the last week of February 2021, would be submitted for processing in December 2020.
- 17. Taking these guidelines into account, the Advisory Committee notes that, with respect to the forty-third session of the Council, which will take place from 24 February to 20 March 2020, documentation should be submitted in December 2019. However, the Committee notes that, under Human Rights Council resolutions 40/1, 40/13, 40/17, 40/18, 40/19, 40/25, 40/26, 40/27 and 40/29, related resources for documentation for the forty-third session have been proposed for 2020 instead. The Advisory Committee considers that, in line with documentation submission guidelines, the resources related to documentation for the forty-third session of the Human Rights Council under Council resolutions 40/1, 40/13, 40/17, 40/19, 40/25 and 40/27 should have been included in the programme budget for the biennium 2018–2019, and not in the proposed programme budget for 2020.

Proposed requirements relating to Human Rights Council resolution 42/35

- 18. By its resolution 42/35, the Human Rights Council, inter alia, decided to renew the mandate of the Independent Expert on the situation of human rights in the Sudan for a period of one year, while recognizing the intention to phase out the mandate, and requested the Secretary-General to provide all the resources necessary to establish and operate a country office, including a field presence. In his report, the Secretary-General indicates that the establishment of a country office would give rise to requirements in 2020 in the amount of \$1,375,700, comprising \$1,356,000 under section 24, Human rights, and \$19,700 under section 29E, Administration, Geneva (A/74/529, paras. 239 and 244). The proposed resources include a provision for 12 new posts for 12 months (1 D-1, 2 P-4, 3 P-3, 4 National Professional Officers and 2 Local level staff) (ibid., para. 243). The Committee notes the recruitment delays under section 24, Human rights, leading to related underexpenditures cited in paragraph 9 above, and the delayed deployment during the start-up phase of operations.
- 19. Taking into consideration its comments and recommendations in paragraphs 8 to 18 above, on patterns of expenditure, duration and incumbency of general temporary assistance positions, inconsistencies in budget presentation and delayed deployment at the start-up phase in relation to Human Rights Council resolution 42/35, the Advisory Committee considers that the proposed level of resources for 2020 in the amount of \$22,548,300 is not fully justified, and recommends a reduction in the amount of \$2,350,000.

# **III.** Conclusion

- 20. The Secretary-General's proposed actions to be taken by the General Assembly are set out in paragraph 253 of his report. Subject to its recommendations and observations above, the Advisory Committee recommends that the General Assembly:
- (a) Approve an additional appropriation, representing a charge against the contingency fund for 2020, in the amount of \$20,198,300 (of which \$17,938,100 are non-recurrent), comprising: (i) \$1,701,200 (of which \$1,523,700 is non-recurrent) under section 2, General Assembly and Economic and Social Council affairs and conference management; (ii) \$18,488,700 (of which \$16,408,100 is non-recurrent) under section 24, Human rights; and (iii) \$8,400 (of which \$6,300 are non-recurrent) under section 29E, Administration, Geneva, of the proposed programme budget for 2020;
- (b) Approve the establishment, effective from 1 January 2020, of 18 posts under section 24, Human rights, of the programme budget for 2020, comprising 6 posts to support the activities mandated by the Human Rights Council in its resolutions 40/13, 42/20, 42/22 and 42/23 and 12 posts for the establishment of the country office in the Sudan, as mandated in resolution 42/35, as detailed in table 73 of the report of the Secretary-General;
- (c) Approve an additional appropriation in the amount of \$866,000 under section 36, Staff assessment, of the proposed programme budget for 2020, to be offset by an equivalent amount under income section 1, Income from staff assessment.
