### Elections, nominations, confirmations and appointments

## Election of six members of the Executive Board of the World Food Programme

### Note by the Secretary-General

1. The Executive Board of the World Food Programme is composed of 36 members, elected from among the States Members of the United Nations and the States members of the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO). In accordance with General Assembly resolution [65/266](#) and FAO Conference resolution [7/2011](#), the Economic and Social Council and the Council of FAO elect 18 members of the Executive Board each, according to the pattern set out in Assembly resolution [65/266](#).
2. The Economic and Social Council is to elect, at the management meeting to be held on 15 April 2020, six members of the Executive Board, for a three-year term beginning on 1 January 2021, to fill the vacancies that will occur on 31 December 2020 upon the expiration of the terms of the following members: China, Guatemala, Hungary, Japan, Lesotho and United Kingdom of Great Britain and Northern Ireland.
3. The members are to be elected according to the following pattern:<sup>1</sup>
  - (a) One member from the States included in List A;
  - (b) One member from the States included in List B;
  - (c) One member from the States included in List C;
  - (d) Two members from the States included in List D;
  - (e) One member from the States included in List E.
4. The 18 members of the Executive Board elected by the Economic and Social Council are listed in annex I to the present note. For the information of the Economic and Social Council, annex II lists the members of the Executive Board elected by the FAO Council. Annex III lists the States Members of the United Nations and the States members of FAO for election to the Executive Board.
