Note by the Secretary-General

By letter dated 21 September 1971, Mr. Seymour M. Finger (United States of America) has tendered his resignation, effective 31 December 1971, as a member of the Committee on Contributions. The United States Government has proposed the election of Mr. David L. Stottlemeyer to the Committee on Contributions for the unexpired portion of Mr. Finger's term of office, i.e. until 31 December 1973. Mr. Stottlemeyer's curriculum vitae is annexed to this note.

BIOGRAPHIC SKETCH OF DAVID L. STOTTLEMYER

Mr. David L. Stottlemeyer of Waynesboro, Pennsylvania, was appointed on 12 July 1971 as an Adviser on International Organization Affairs with the United States Mission to the United Nations in New York.

Mr. Stottlemeyer came to the United States Mission from assignment with the Office of Management and Budget, Executive Office of the President, in Washington, D.C. From July 1969 to July 1971 he was seconded to the United Nations as a senior management officer on the staff of the Administrative Management Service.

Mr. Stottlemeyer is a specialist in program and budget analysis. While in the Office of Management and Budget he worked on financial and administrative matters of international organizations, human resources programs, and the United States space program.

He graduated from Miami University, Oxford, Ohio, in 1959 with an AB degree, and in 1964 received a degree of Master of Public and International Affairs from the University of Pittsburgh.

He served in the United States Army from 1953 to 1956. He did doctoral study in international affairs and public administration at the University of Pittsburgh as a Fellow in the National Defense Education Program.
