SUMMARY OF COMMUNICATIONS RECEIVED BY
THE SECRETARY-GENERAL

Note by the Secretary-General

The Secretary-General has the honour, in accordance with rule 24 of the rules of procedure for the Trusteeship Council, to call the following communications to the attention of the Trusteeship Council.

In accordance with the decision taken by the Council at the 29th meeting of its seventh session on 20 July 1950, it will be assumed that no action is called for on these communications if, at the end of the session, no question has been raised concerning them.

Tanganyika

1. Copy of a letter dated 30 January 1952 from M. Joseph Batema and 2 others addressed to the Governor of Tanganyika Territory protesting against the activities of the Bukoba Coffee Board.

Ruanda-Urundi

2. Copy of a letter dated 14 January 1952 from M. G. d'Adesky addressed to the Mwami of Ruanda concerning cattle marketing in Ruanda-Urundi and the establishment of stores for this purpose.

Somaliland under Italian administration

3. Twenty-three communications addressed to the United Nations Visiting Mission to Trust Territories in East Africa, 1951, and relating to the boundary between Somaliland under Italian administration and Ethiopia.
4. Ten communications addressed to the United Nations Advisory Council for the Trust Territory of Somaliland under Italian administration and relating to the boundary between Somaliland under Italian administration and Ethiopia.
5. Twenty-nine communications addressed to the Italian administration and

transmitted to the United Nations Advisory Council for the Trust Territory of Somaliland for information.

6. Letter dated 9 August 1951 from the Somali Youth League, Branch of Alula addressed to the Advisory Council complaining that it has had no peace since the departure of the Advisory Council from Alula.
7. Letter dated 3 September 1951 from Mr. Mohamed Sheikh Nur Mahadow addressed to the Advisory Council urging the United Nations to intervene in a case already raised in his previous petition (See petition T/PET.11/32 and Council resolution 358 (IX)).
8. Telegram dated 5 October 1951 from the Somali Youth League, Branch of Bender Kassim addressed to the Advisory Council stating that the Authorities confined "Committee Cossar Abdi" after the Mission's departure.
9. Letter dated 6 November 1951 from Mr. Mohamed Sheikh Hussein Abrar, Mogadiscio submitting a claim against a Mr. Ato' Tafarra' Warghu' which involves a property in Addis-Ababa.

Cameroons under British Administration

10. Letter dated 19 June 1951 from Mr. John E. Talbot protesting against the procedure followed by the British Administration in its re-examination of the case raised in his previous petition to the Trusteeship Council (See petition T/PET.4/60 and Council resolution 145 (VI)).
11. Copy of a letter dated 28 January 1952 from the Kamerun United National Congress addressed to the Commissioner of the Cameroons, Buea, complaining that the Congress has been ignored in the distribution of United Nations documents to non-governmental organizations of the Territory.

Cameroons under French administration

12. Letter dated 27 July 1951 from Mr. Abel Mimbiang setting forth a number of complaints in connexion with the case raised in his previous petition to the Trusteeship Council (see petition T/PET.5/91 and Add. 1, 2, and Council resolution 333 (VIII)) and requesting the Council's intervention on his behalf.
13. Letter dated 24 December 1951 from Mr. Alfred Bernard complaining that the competent courts have not yet examined the case raised in his previous petition (see petition T/PET.5/84 and Add. 1, and Council resolution 332 (VIII)) and requesting that a time-limit be set for its examination.

Cameroons under British administration and Cameroons under French administration

14. Letter dated 27 June 1951 from Mr. P.C. Mafiamba transmitting to the United Nations two "pamphlets" entitled "The Aftermath of the Cameroons Partition" and "Supplement".

15. Letter dated 17 December 1951 from Mr. P. C. Mafiamba transmitting a third "pamphlet" (see above) entitled "Extraordinary Report", and requesting that the Trusteeship Council inform him of its discussion on his pamphlets before the arrival of the next Visiting Mission in the Cameroons.

Togoland under British administration

16. Copies of two communications dated 17 April 1950 and 28 July 1951 from Chief Thomas Agbo Egblemesese addressed to the District Commissioner, Kpando, concerning a dispute between the Akposo and the Buem peoples.

17. Copy of a resolution adopted by the Divisional Chief of the Akpini State on 27 August 1951 concerning the constitution of the Akpini State.

18. Copy of a letter dated 27 August 1951 from Mr. Alechu and others concerning a dispute over the installation of the Fetish Priest of Balai.

19. Letter dated 1 September 1951 from the Liatl Youth Association requesting that the Trusteeship Council recognize the Association, and send to it unrestricted United Nations documents, publications and bulletins. Enclosed with the letter are a copy of the resolution establishing the Association and a statement of its aims and purposes.

20. Undated letter from Mr. Kluga K. William requesting self-government for Togoland.

21. Copy of a resolution adopted by the Chiefs and Elders of "Nawuri Land" on 1 October 1951 concerning the establishment and the composition of the Alfai Council.

22. Letter dated 28 November 1951 from the Southern Togoland Rally Organising Committee concerning the formation and the purposes of the Southern Togoland Rally.

23. Copy of a letter dated 16 January 1952 from Sub-Chief T. Kpetchwotse IV addressed to the President, the Alavanyo Youth Association concerning a proposal for the transfer of the Alavanyo Divisional Stool's allegiance from the Akpini Paramount Stool to the Yonkodo Council.

Togoland under French administration

24. Letter dated 2 October 1951 from the Assemblée Représentative du Togo concerning the transfer of freehold rights in connexion with the Lomé Aerodrome, a case raised in one of its previous petitions (See petition T/PET.7/123 and Council resolution 410 (IX)). Enclosed with the letter is an extract from the record of the discussion in the Assemblée Représentative on this subject.

25. Copy of a letter dated 18 January 1952 from Ausco Press and Publishing Company Ltd. addressed to Governor Y. Digo protesting against the banning of the "Ghana Daily Express" in French Togoland and requesting that the ban be lifted.

Togoland under British administration and Togoland under French administration

26. Copy of a petition dated 25 July 1951 submitted by Kwadzo Dei, Paramount Chief of the Peki State to King George VI requesting the return to the Stool of the Peki State of the whole of Togoland under British administration and a part of Togoland under French administration and their annexation to the Gold Coast.

General

27. Letter dated 26 July 1951 from the Proportional Representation Society, London, concerning systems of election in Non-Self-Governing Territories.

28. Letter dated 10 August 1951 from the National Federation of Amami Associations protesting against the provision contained in Article 3 of the Draft Japanese Peace Treaty that the islands of Amami and O-Shima should be placed under trusteeship and calling for the reunion of these Islands with Japan.

29. Letter dated 20 September 1951 from Mr. A. K. Chuke Jr., a Nigerian who requests a scholarship to enable him to study in the United States of America.
