FETITIONS RECEIVED BY THE SECRETARY-GENERAL WHICH WERE CONSIDERED AS MANIFESTLY INCONSEQUENTIAL

(RULE 85 OF THE RULES OF PROCEDURE FOR THE TRUSTEESHIP COUNCIL)

In accordance with rule 85 of the rules of procedure for the Trusteeship Council, the Secretary-General communicates herewith to the members of the Council summaries of petitions received by him which were considered as manifestly inconsequential. The original documents are available to the Trusteeship Council for final disposition.

Ruanda-Urundi

1. An unsigned, unaddressed communication dated 4 December 1950, but received only on 24 April 1952, giving a vague account of an incident in which the writer claims he was beaten and suffered property losses. A letter in the Kinyaruanda language is annexed.

2. Letter dated 6 Mey 1952 from Ahmed Ishak, Kampala, Uganda, referring to his previous petition (T/PET.3/3 - Resolution 59 (IV)) and containing no new information. A further petition dated 4 April 1952 has been submitted on his behalf by his attorney and circulated to the Council as T/PET.3/58.

Cameroons under French Administration

3. Letter dated 14 March 1952 from Mbombo Zakari stating that he is awaiting the Visiting Mission and transmitting four letters from inhabitants of the Foumbot Subdivision containing complaints the subjects of which are not clear.

Somaliland under Italian Administration

4. Letter dated 1 February 1952 from Bered Farah to the United Nations Advisory Council requesting this body "to see for yourself our conditions, because all the conditions presented to you are not true, but all lies."

Letter dated 12 February 1952 from "the Women of Obbia" to the Chairman of the Advisory Council stating that the Italian Administration has not fulfilled its promises and asking that the United Nations should assist them. The major part of this communication, which is in Arabic, is unintelligible. 6. Letter dated 27 February 1952 from the Assistant Secretary of the Somali Youth League Committee, Branch of Bardera, to the Advisory Council the text of which is unintelligible.
