(submitted by the High Commissioner)

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#### INTRODUCTION

1. Further progress towards an integration of the new Hungarian refugees was made during the six months from 1 July - 31 December 1959. Of the total of over 200,000 new Hungarian refugees, the following numbers still remain in countries of first asylum: 9,600 in Austria and 510 in Yugoslavia. All the others have either been resettled in countries of second asylum, or have voluntarily returned to Hungary. Tables I and II below give the overall movement and indicate the present residence of new Hungarian refugees. Section I describes the detailed situation of these refugees in Austria.

2. The Programme for new Hungarian refugees in Austria is described in Section II. Under this Programme, 2,125 have been firmly settled (an increase since the last report of 1,151). All new Hungarian refugees in Yugoslavia can be considered as firmly established.

3. Further needs of the remaining non-settled refugees in Austria, as well as proposals for the allocation of the funds still available, are presented in an addendum to this document.

#### SECTION I. SITUATION OF NEW HUNGARIAN REFUGEES IN AUSTRIA

4. Between 1 July and 31 December 1959 there was further reduction in the number of new Hungarian refugees, mainly attributable to the resettlement abroad of 1,924 persons. Sixty-five refugees have voluntarily repatriated during the same period. Taking into account the natural increase, new arrivals from Hungary (75 refugees) and refugees who returned to Austria from other countries for family reunion or other reasons, the number of new Hungarian refugees living in Austria on 31 December 1959 was reported as 9,605, compared with 11,471 on 30 June 1959. 2,216 new Hungarian refugees were living in Federal camps and institutions on 31 December 1959 while 969 were accommodated in homes run by voluntary agencies. These figures represent a reduction of 824 and 209 respectively for these groups compared with the situation on 30 June 1959.

5. The total number of new Hungarian refugees resettled from Austria as of 31 December 1959 amounted to 162,879, and the total number of voluntary repatriations to 8,277. The emigration from Austria during 1959 has been mainly due to the movement of refugees to the United States.

The impact of World Refugee Year has become evident through the special 6. resettlement schemes designed to benefit refugees in the handicapped categories which have been announced by the Governments of Canada, the United Kingdom, Sweden, Norway and New Zealand. Selection under certain of these schemes took place in the second half of 1959 and the movement of some of the refugees selected had already been made before 31 December 1959. On 31 December 1959, 683 new Hungarian refugees were being considered for resettlement to various European and overseas countries, and it may be expected that many of them will leave Austria during the first six months of 1960. The registration of the new Hungarian refugees remaining in Austria reveals that 1,450 of them, the majority of whom are living in camps, still wish to emigrate. Approximately 80% of these refugees have expressed a wish to emigrate to the United States, Australia and Canada, and the remaining 20% to various European and overseas countries. An appeal was made by the High Commissioner to all countries concerned asking them to give special consideration to this group of refugees.

7. Table III contains data concerning the movement of new Hungarian refugees into and from Austria.

#### SECTION II. PROGRAMME FOR NEW HUNGARIAN REFUGEES IN AUSTRIA

# General remarks

8. Considerable progress has been made in the implementation of the projects for permanent solutions. A total of 1,156 refugees of whom more than a half came from camps were firmly settled between 1 July and 31 December 1959, bringing the cumulative total to 2,126 refugees firmly established.

9. 438 housing units, including 59 under the "individual housing" projects, providing accommodation for 1,252 refugees have been completed and occupied during the second half of 1959, bringing the total of refugees housed to 1,898 (855 from camps).

10. Certain difficulties experienced in connection with the implementation of the housing projects in Austria under the Camp Clearance Programme have also affected the Programme for new Hungarian Refugees. As a result of fluctuations in the case-load and the movement of refugees within Austria, it proved necessary to introduce a procedure whereby housing units could be exchanged between the Programme for new Hungarian Refugees and the Camp Clearance Programme, in cases where the geographical distribution of the refugees called for such action. 22 housing units were thus exchanged.

11. During the second half of 1959, 70 new refugees have benefited from a total of 31 loans paid out under small loan projects. 66 new beneficiaries are recorded for the same period, under the projects to aid intellectuals. 47 new trainees underwent vocational training during the same period. Counselling and casework projects provided an additional 1,566 services.

12. Pending the results of the registration of new Hungarian refugees only a small number of new projects were put under implementation between 1 July 1959 and

15. Tables V and VI provide a summary by type of solution of beneficiaries of projects for permanent solutions and projects which promote but do not effect, permanent solutions, as of 31 December 1959.

16. Table VII shows the financial position of the implementation of the long-term and permanent solution projects as of 31 December 1959, indicating progress made between 30 June 1959 and the end of that year.

#### Small Loans

17. Project NUN/PS/50/AUS was completed on 31 December 1959. A total of 102 loans involving over \$ 92,000 were paid out. 67 refugees have so far started to make repayments which total over \$ 7,500. The rate of repayments under this project is slower than under loan projects in other programmes, and 15 cases are in arrears in the amount of \$ 1,900. It will be necessary to counteract rumours among beneficiaries that a conversion of these loans into grants is intended.

## Installation loans

18. Under project HU/AUS/E.1/59, providing loans for the purchase of furniture and equipment, two loans were paid out by 31 December 1959. As of 31 December 1959, 31 cases were pending. The interest for this type of assistance appears to be in need of stimulation through more intensive counselling services. Steps have been undertaken towards closer co-ordination between this type of project and the housing programme.

### Establishment in agriculture

19. No new applications were received for assistance under project HUN/PS/54 between 1 July 1959 and 31 December 1959. The project expired on 31 December 1959. It seems unlikely that sufficient applications will be received to justify a continuation of this project.

## Individual housing loans

20. Under this group of projects (HUN/PS/55, HU/AUS/H.1/59 and HU/AUS/H.4/59) funds for which were exhausted by 31 December 1959, loans were provided to Hungarian refugee families to enable them to obtain housing on the open market. 147 loans have been made and a further 42 applications have been approved for which the loans have not yet been paid out pending signature of the pertinent leases. Suitable accommodation within the limits of the loans (not exceeding \$ 1,500) is not easy to find. The co-operation of the implementing agency and other voluntary agencies have, however contributed to the success of this project, under which 147 families comprising 337 persons have found accommodation as of 31 December 1959, including 59 families comprising 151 persons during the second half of 1959.

21. Repayments totalling almost \$ 7,000 have so far been made by 111 beneficiaries. There continues to be a need for this type of assistance. <u>Housing settlement</u>

22. A total of 379 housing units has been completed between 1 July and 31 December 1959 while an additional. 77 housing units should be completed during the first three months of 1960. So far a total of 537 families comprising 1,561 refugees have benefited from projects for Housing Settlement. ## Aid to intellectuels

23. Under project HU/AUS/Y.2/59 scholarships not exceeding \$115 can be granted to refugees in the higher age groups who, in order to exercise their profession in Austria, needed to have their academic degrees recognized by Austrian universities. Assistance was granted only to persons who had undertaken their final examinations a few months earlier. Eleven cases benefited under this scheme. It will be possible in the next Progress Report to provide information regarding the establishment of these persons in their professions.

24. The Recreation Centre (HUN/PS/106/AUS) benefited 25 refugees between 1 July and 31 December 1959 for verying periods of time.

25. Under project MUN/FS/107 financial assistance not exceeding \$115 is given to refugee intellectuals if their integration possibilities can thereby be improved, either through vocational training courses or the provision of small items of equipment. 55 cases have been assisted between 1 July and 31 December 1959, bringing the total of beneficiaries to 528 cases, comprising 913 persons.

## Vocational training school - Hirtenberg (HUN/PS/89/AUS)

26. The extension of the Training School at Mirtenberg has been completed. 116 apprentices are provided with accomodation. 20 of them started their training during the second half of 1959. Most of them work in the school workshops where they are completing their training, others have already been placed with commercial firms where they can familiarise themselves with industrial working methods in Austria before taking their final examinations. The carpentry shop is now. completed (HUN/EA.17/AUS/Rev.1) and provides training opportunities for 23 epprentices. The Hirtenberg School is a most successful venture and is highly regarded, both by the educational authorities and employers, who are keenly interested to employ apprentices who graduate from Eirtenberg. So far, 164 refugee youth have benefited from this project.

27. Under the vocational training projects HUN/PS/31/AUS and HUN/PS/91/AUS operated by a voluntary agency, a further 27 trainees were admitted during the last 6 months, raising the cumulative total of beneficiaries under these projects to 74.

# Case-work and counselling

28. Efforts have been concentrated on counselling new Mungarian refugees living in camps. Under project HU/AUS/C.1/59 three integration counsellors are employed in the two main camps for new Mungarian refugees in the Vienna area. The counsellors give priority to the provision of suitable accommodation for the Mungarian refugees living in these camps and it is expected that the transfer from camp can be speeded up as soon as new projects are authorized and put into effect. Attempts have been made to advise Hungarian refugees living in camps in the Vienna area to move into UNHCR appartments in Steyr where there are not sufficient new Hungarian refugees to fill the apartments available.

29. Under this project, 118 cases comprising 337 persons (320 from camps) received counselling services.

30. In conformity with the policy of concentrating efforts on refugees in camps, the remaining counselling and casework projects which were not limited to operations in camps, were allowed to lapse as of 30 September 1959 (HUN/PS/52, 53, 83 and 84) and 31 December 1959 (HUN/PS/51) respectively. During the second half of 1959 they benefited 445 refugees, bringing the cumulative total of beneficiaries under this group of projects to 1,493.
