Election of members of the functional commissions of the Economic and Social Council

Note by the Secretary-General

- 1. Pursuant to section V of Economic and Social Council resolution 557 C (XVIII), as amended by the Council in its decision of 19 December 1968, information on the forthcoming vacancies in the functional commissions to be filled by the Council is set out in the annex to the present note. Elections for these vacancies will be conducted by the Council at its management meetings, to be held on 20 April 2021.
- 2. Under the terms of Economic and Social Council resolution 1147 (XLI), in 2021 the members of the Statistical Commission, the Commission on Population and Development, the Commission for Social Development, the Commission on the Status of Women, the Commission on Narcotic Drugs, the Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal Justice and the Commission on Science and Technology for Development are to be elected on the basis of equitable geographical distribution according to a specified pattern. The pattern applicable to each functional commission is indicated in the annex, together with the current membership.

In accordance with Council resolution 1991/49, one seat rotates between Asia-Pacific States and Latin American and Caribbean States every four years. In 2019, the rotating seat was allocated to Asia-Pacific States for a four-year term beginning on 1 January 2020, giving Asia-Pacific States 12 seats and Latin American and Caribbean States 10 seats.
