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PREFACE

The *2013 International Trade Statistics Yearbook* (2013 ITSY) is the sixty-second edition of this yearbook. Its objective is to inform about the detailed merchandise and services imports and exports of individual countries (areas) by commodity and service category and by partner country (volume I), the world trade in individual commodities (3-digit SITC groups) (volume II) and total world merchandise trade - up to the year 2013. The two volumes are prepared at different points in time during 2014: *Volume I - Trade by Country* is made electronically available in June, and *Volume II - Trade by Commodity*, in December, as the preparation of the tables in Volume II requires additional country data which, normally, become available later in the year.

Beginning with 2013 edition, trade in services data was introduced to the *International Trade Statistics Yearbook: Volume I - Trade by Country*. Therefore, the content and format of the yearbook were redesigned to take into account new additions of graphs/tables and analytical text. The data used in the tables and graphs in both volumes of the yearbook are taken at a specific time (June 2014) from the publicly available UN Comtrade (<http://comtrade.un.org>) and UN Service Trade (<http://unstats.un.org/unsd/servicetrade>) databases. Users are advised to visit these databases for additional and more current information as they are continuously updated.

The *International Trade Statistics Yearbook* is prepared by the Trade Statistics Branch of the Statistics Division, Department of Economic and Social Affairs of the United Nations Secretariat. Under the general supervision of the Chief of Branch, Ronald Jansen, the programme manager is Markie Muryawan and the chief editor is Habibur Rahman Khan, assisted by Marjorie Imperial-Damaso. Bekuretsion Amdemariam has the leading role in the processing of the data for UN Comtrade and Htu Aung for UN Service Trade. Habibur Rahman Khan, Kenneth Iversen, Nancy Snyder, Luis Gonzalez Morales, Michael Behrman and Markie Muryawan provided valuable contribution to the inclusion of trade in services data and the improvement of production processes. However, all staffs of the branch are involved in the generation of the data and the review/validation of the yearbook. Markie Muryawan, Salomon Cameo and Luis Gonzalez Morales developed the original software which is maintained by Michael Behrman and Daniel Eshetie. Matthias Reister and Nelna Kountingue made very substantial contributions to earlier redesigned yearbook as its first programme manager and first chief editor of 2008 edition, respectively.

INTRODUCTION

1. The *International Trade Statistics Yearbook: Volume I - Trade by Country*, provides an overview of the latest trends of trade in goods and services of most countries and areas in the world. The publication is aimed at both specialist trade data users and common audience at large. The presented data, charts and analyses will benefit policy makers, government agencies, non-government organizations, civil society organizations, journalists, academics, researchers, students, businesses and anyone who is interested in trade issues.
2. The main content of the yearbook is divided into two parts. Part 1 consists of two detailed world data tables on merchandise trade. One presents total merchandise imports and exports by countries, areas and regions in a time series up to the latest year, the other shows world merchandise exports by group of commodity and by provenance and destination in many smaller time series sub-tables. Part 2 contains the country trade profiles for most countries and areas in the world. The profiles offer an insight into the merchandise and services trade performance of individual countries and areas by means of brief descriptive text, concise data tables and charts using latest available data. For further information on data availability, please see the sources section of this Introduction.
3. The yearbook is also made available online at the publications repository of the UN Statistics Division (<http://unstats.un.org/unsd/pubs>). For more detailed and latest available data, please consult UN Comtrade (<http://comtrade.un.org>) and UN ServiceTrade (<http://unstats.un.org/unsd/servicetrade>), which are the sources of the information presented in the yearbook, and which are continuously updated.

Concepts and definitions of International Merchandise Trade Statistics

4. The merchandise trade data in this Yearbook have been compiled by national statistical authorities largely complying with the United Nations recommended *International Merchandise Trade Statistics, Concepts and Definitions 2010* (IMTS 2010).¹ The main elements of the concepts and definitions are:

i. **Coverage:** As a general guideline, it is recommended that international merchandise trade statistics record all goods which add to or subtract from the stock of material resources of a country by entering (imports) or leaving (exports) its economic territory. The general guideline is subject to the clarifications provided in IMTS 2010, in particular, to the specific guidelines in chapter 1 concerning the inclusion or exclusion of certain categories of goods.

ii. **Time of recording:** As a general guideline, it is recommended that goods be recorded at the time when they enter or leave the economic territory of a country.

iii. **Statistical territory:** The statistical territory of a country is the territory with respect to which trade data are being compiled. The definition of the statistical territory may or may not coincide with the economic territory of a country or its customs territory, depending on the availability of data sources and other considerations. It follows that when the statistical territory of a country and its economic territory differ, international merchandise trade statistics do not provide a complete record of inward and outward flows of goods.

iv. **Trade systems:** Depending on what parts of the economic territory are included in the statistical territory, the trade data-compilation system adopted by a country (its trade system) may be referred to as general or special.

- a) The general trade system is in use when the statistical territory coincides with the economic territory. Consequently, it is recommended that the statistical territory of a country applying the general trade system comprises all applicable territorial elements. In this case, imports include goods entering the free circulation area, premises for inward processing, industrial free zones, premises for customs warehousing or commercial free zones and exports include goods leaving those territorial elements;
- b) The special trade system is in use when the statistical territory comprises only a particular part of the economic territory, so that certain flows of goods which are in the scope of IMTS 2010 are not included in either import or export statistics of the compiling country. The strict definition of the special trade system is in use when the statistical territory comprises only the free circulation area, that is, the part within which goods “may be

disposed of without customs restriction". Consequently, in such a case, imports include only goods entering the free circulation area of a compiling country and exports include only goods leaving the free circulation area of a compiling country.

- c) The relaxed definition of the special trade system is in use when (a) goods that enter a country for, or leave it after, inward processing, as well as (b) goods that enter or leave an industrial free zone, are also recorded and included in international merchandise trade statistics

v. Classification: It is recommended that countries use the *Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System* (HS) for the collection, compilation and dissemination of international merchandise trade statistics as suggested by the Statistical Commission at its twenty-seventh session (22 February to 3 March 1993).² The Harmonized System was adopted by the Customs Co-operation Council in June 1983, and the International Convention on the Harmonized System (HS Convention) entered into force on 1 January 1988 (HS 1988).³ In accordance with the preamble to the HS Convention, which recognized the importance of ensuring that the HS be kept up to date in the light of changes in technology or in patterns of international trade, the HS is regularly reviewed and revised. The fifth edition, HS 2012, came into effect 1 January 2012.⁴ The *Standard International Trade Classification (SITC)*⁵ which was in the past used by countries in data compilation and reporting has been recognized for its continued use in analysis.⁶

vi. Valuation: At its fifteenth session, in 1953, the Economic and Social Council, taking the view that trade statistics must reflect economic realities, recommended that the Governments of Member States of the United Nations, wherever possible, use transaction values in the compilation of their national statistics of external trade or, when national practices are based on other values, endeavour to provide supplementary statistical data based on transaction values (Economic and Social Council resolution 469 B (XV)). To promote the comparability of international merchandise trade statistics and taking into account the commercial and data reporting practices of the majority of countries, it is recommended that: (a) The statistical value of imported goods be a CIF-type value; (b) The statistical value of exported goods be an FOB-type value; however, countries are encouraged to compile FOB-type value of imported goods as supplementary information. FOB-type values include the transaction value of the goods and the value of services performed to deliver goods to the border of the exporting country. CIF-type values include the transaction value of the goods, the value of services performed to deliver goods to the border of the exporting country and the value of the

services performed to deliver the goods from the border of the exporting country to the border of the importing country.

vii. Partner country: It is recommended that in the case of imports, the country of origin be recorded; and that in the case of exports, the country of last known destination be recorded. The country of origin of a good (for imports) is determined by rules of origin established by each country. The country of last known destination is the last country - as far as it is known at the time of exportation - to which goods are to be delivered, irrespective of where they have been initially dispatched to and whether or not, on their way to that last country, they are subject to any commercial transactions or other operations which change their legal status. Further, it is recommended that country of consignment be recorded for imports as the second partner country attribution, alongside country of origin; the compilation of export statistics on the country of consignment basis is only encouraged, depending on a country's needs and circumstances.

5. The pages containing the country profiles (Part 2 of this publication) indicate the trade system, valuation and partner attribution each country is following. For more detailed information on national practices in the compilation and dissemination of international merchandise trade data please go to http://unstats.un.org/unsd/tradereport/introduction_MM.asp.

Concepts and definitions of Statistics of International Trade in Services

6. The trade in services data in this Yearbook have been compiled by national statistical authorities or central banks largely complying with the *Manual on Statistics of International Trade in Services 2010* (MSITS 2010).⁷

7. The main elements of the concepts and definitions of MSITS 2010 are:

i. Definitions: In general, MSITS 2010 respects the 2008 SNA use of the term services, which is defined as follows (2008 SNA, para. 6.17):

- a) Services are the result of a production activity that changes the conditions of the consuming units, or facilitates the exchange of products or financial assets. These types of service may be described as change-effecting services and margin services, respectively. Change-effecting services are outputs produced to order and typically consist of changes in the conditions of the consuming units realized by the activities of producers at the demand of the consumers. They can also be referred to as "transformation services". Change-effecting services are not separate entities over which ownership rights can be established. They cannot be traded separately from their

production. By the time their production is completed, they must have been provided to the consumers.

- b) MSITS 2010 defines “international trade in services” as trade in services between residents and non-residents of an economy, as well as the supply of services through foreign affiliates established abroad and the supply of services through the presence of foreign individuals, either as foreign service suppliers themselves or as employees of a foreign service supplier.

Importantly, the services data included in this Yearbook only reflect trade in services between residents and non-residents.

ii. **Concept and definition of residence**: The residence of an institutional unit is the economic territory with which it has the strongest connection, constituting its centre of predominant economic interest. Each institutional unit is a resident of one and only one economic territory, as determined by its centre of predominant economic interest. An institutional unit is resident in an economic territory when there exists, within the economic territory, some location, dwelling, place of production, or other premises on which or from which the unit engages and intends to continue engaging, either indefinitely or over a finite but long period of time, in economic activities and transactions on a significant scale. The location need not be fixed as long as it remains within the economic territory. Actual or intended location for one year or more is used as an operational criterion. While the choice of one year as a specific period is somewhat arbitrary, it is adopted to eliminate uncertainty and facilitate international consistency. More specific criteria for determining residence are given in the MSITS 2010.

iii. **Valuation**: The market price is used as the basis for valuation of transactions in international trade in services. Market prices for transactions are defined as amounts of money that willing buyers pay to acquire something from willing sellers. The exchanges are made between independent parties and based on commercial considerations only and are sometimes called “at arm’s length” transactions. These transactions will generally be valued at the actual price agreed between the supplier and the consumer.

iv. **Time of recording of transactions**: The appropriate time for recording transactions in services is when they are delivered or received (the “accruals basis”). Some services, such as certain transport or hotel services are provided within a discrete period, in which case there is no problem in determining the time of recording. Other services are supplied or take place on a continuous basis, for example, construction, operating leasing and insurance services. When construction takes place with a prior contract of sale, the ownership of the structure is effectively transferred progressively as the work proceeds. When services are provided over a period of time (such as freight, insurance and construction), there may be advance payments or settlements at later dates for such services. The provision of services should be recorded on an accrual basis in each accounting period, that is to say it should be recorded when the service is rendered and not when the payment occurs.

v. Framework and scope: MSITS 2010 recommends that the Sixth Edition of the Balance of Payments and International Investment Position Manual (BPM6)⁸ recommendations on the principles of recording (regarding residence, valuation, time of recording, currency of recording and conversion) should be followed. The Extended Balance of Payments Services Classification (EBOPS) is a more detailed classification than that of BPM5 for international trade in services between residents and non-residents, by breaking down a number of the BPM5 service items. The main components of the EBOPS classification are presented in paragraph 7.vii below.

vi. Partner country: It is recommended that the breakdown by partner economy for services transactions between residents and non-residents be recorded, the aim being to report partner detail, first, at the level of services trade as a whole and, second, for each of the main types of services in EBOPS and (as a longer-term goal) for the more detailed EBOPS items. Partner country data for trade in services are not included in this publication, as most countries do not currently compile these data by partner country.

vii. Classification: In 1996, OECD and Eurostat, in consultation with IMF, developed for use by their members a more detailed classification than that presented in the IMF's Balance of Payments Manual (BPM5) for international trade in services between residents and non-residents, by breaking down a number of the BPM5 service items. This more detailed classification is termed the Extended Balance of Payments Services Classification (EBOPS). The EBOPS classification was published in 2002 in the MSITS 2002 and was subsequently revised to the EBOPS 2010 classification, as published in the MSITS 2010. The services data in this Yearbook follow the EBOPS 2002 classification (which corresponds to the BPM5 recommendations) due to the fact that most countries have not yet transitioned to the EBOPS 2010 classification (which corresponds to the BPM6 recommendations).

The 11 main EBOPS 2002 standard services components (as presented in the MSITS 2002) are:⁹

- a) Transportation: covers all transportation services that are performed by residents of one economy for those of another and that involve the carriage of passengers, the movement of goods (freight), rentals (charters) of carriers with crew, and related supporting and auxiliary services. Some related items that are excluded from transportation services are freight insurance (included in insurance services); goods procured in ports by non-resident carriers and repairs of transportation equipment (both are treated as goods, not services); repairs of railway facilities, harbours and airfield facilities (included in

construction services); and rentals or charters of carriers without crew (included in operational leasing services).

- b) Travel: covers primarily the goods and services acquired from an economy by travelers during visits of less than one year to that economy. Includes business and personal travel, which includes health-related expenditure (total expenditure by those travelling for medical reasons), education-related expenditure (i.e., total expenditure by students), and all other personal travel expenditure.
- c) Communications services: covers postal and courier services (which cover the pick-up, transport and delivery of letters, newspapers, periodicals, brochures, other printed matter, parcels and packages, including post office counter and mailbox rental services) and telecommunications services (which cover the transmission of sound, images or other information by telephone, telex, telegram, radio and television cable and broadcasting, satellite, electronic mail, facsimile services etc., including business network services, teleconferencing and support services). It does not include the value of the information transported. Also included are cellular telephone services, Internet backbone services and on-line access services, including provision of access to the Internet.
- d) Construction services: covers work performed on construction projects and installation by employees of an enterprise in locations outside the territory of an enterprise.
- e) Insurance services: covers the provision of various types of insurance to non-residents by resident insurance enterprises, and vice versa. These services are estimated or valued by the service charges included in total premiums rather than by the total value of the premiums.
- f) Financial services: covers financial intermediation and auxiliary services, except those of life insurance enterprises and pension funds (which are included in life insurance and pension funding) and other insurance services that are conducted between residents and non-residents. Such services may be provided by banks, stock exchanges, factoring enterprises, credit card enterprises and other enterprises.
- g) Computer and information services: covers hardware and software-related services and data-processing services; news agency services include the provision of news, photographs, and feature articles to the media; and database services and web search portals (search engine services that find internet addresses for clients who input keyword queries).
- h) Royalties and license fees: covers international payments and receipts of franchising fees and the royalties paid for the use of registered trademarks and international payments and receipts for the authorised use of intangible, non-produced, non-financial assets and proprietary rights (such as patents, copyrights and industrial processes and designs) and with the use, through licensing agreements, of produced originals or prototypes (such as manuscripts, computer programs, and cinematographic works and sound recordings).

- i) Other business services: covers merchanting, other trade-related services, operational leasing services, legal services, accounting, auditing, bookkeeping and tax consulting services, business and management consulting and public relations services, advertising, market research and public opinion polling, research and development, architectural, engineering and other technical services, waste treatment and de-pollution, agricultural, mining, and other on-site processing services, other business services, and services between related enterprises, not included elsewhere (n.i.e.).
- j) Personal, cultural, and recreational services: covers services and associated fees related to the production of motion pictures (on film or videotape), radio and television programmes (live or on tape) and musical recordings services, as well as those services associated with museums, libraries, archives and other cultural, sporting and recreational activities.
- k) Government services, not included elsewhere (n.i.e.): covers government transactions (including those of international organizations) not contained in the other components of EBOPS as defined above. Included are all transactions (in both goods and services) by embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies with residents of economies in which the embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies are located and all transactions with other economies. Excluded are transactions with residents of the home economies represented by the embassies, consulates, military units and defence agencies, and transactions in the commissaries, post exchanges and these embassies and consulates.

Description of world trade tables of part 1 (Tables A and D)

8. Table A: Total merchandise trade by regions and countries or areas in U.S. dollars: It provides a breakdown of merchandise imports, exports and trade balance for world, regional groupings, selected economic and/or trade groupings and individual countries or areas.

9. Table D: World merchandise exports by provenance and destination in U.S. dollars: In addition to total, table D also provides details by SITC sections or groupings of sections by regions and countries or areas (brief description of SITC sections can be found in the country profiles in Part 2).

10. The totals of imports and exports presented in table A on the one hand and table D and the country profiles on the other hand are not necessarily identical as IFS and UN Comtrade are based on different data collection systems with different aims, procedures, timetable and sources for update and maintenance. Nevertheless, discrepancies are in general minor and usually do not affect the overall comparability of information provided in these tables. A systematic comparison of the figures from both sources (which includes the description of known and relevant conceptual differences) is available at <http://unstats.un.org/unsd/trade/imts/annual%20totals.htm>. Overall, the discrepancy in the world total or world aggregate of exports in table A and table D is around 0.5 percent or less in average, which is minor, given the differences between the two sources.

11. A slightly different version of Table A containing quarterly and monthly data is published on a monthly basis as table 34 in the *United Nations Monthly Bulletin of Statistics*

(MBS). Updated, although different versions of Table D, are published as table 40, 41 and 42 in the July, September and November editions of the MBS. An updated version of these tables will be published in Volume 2 of the 2013 ITSY which will be produced later this year.

Description of tables and graphs of Country profiles in part 2

12. Part 2 contains detailed data for individual countries or areas. In addition, given the economic importance of the European Union (EU), separate pages have been included for the external trade of the EU (with its 28 members) as a whole.

13. Not all countries have data up to 2013 and not all countries have data for imports and exports for all years. The inclusion of a country (or area) in part 2 requires that at least some data are available for any year from 2009 onwards. Depending on the availability of data the following tables and graphs usually appear for each country or area:

14. Graph 1: Total merchandise trade, by value: This graph presents the trend of merchandise imports, exports and trade balance over the last 14 years.

15. Graph 2: Total services trade, by value: This graph presents the trend of services imports, exports and trade balance over the last 14 years.

16. Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category: This graph presents the shares of total exports of services accounted for by each service category for the latest year such data are available.

17. Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance by MDG Regions: This graph presents, in the most recent year for which information on exports and imports are available, the trade balance by regions according to the regional groups used in the Millennium Development Goal (MDG) Indicator Database (see paragraph 38).

18. Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade: This graph shows the partner concentration of imports and exports for the latest available year. Graph presents the top 25 partners which usually account for a very large share of exports or imports for most countries. On the horizontal axis from the center to the right are the cumulative percent of exports and from the center to the left the cumulative percent of imports. On the vertical axis is the cumulative number of partners ranked by total value of exports and imports in a decreasing order. So, on each side, the first bar represents share accounted for by the largest partner; second bar represents share accounted for by the largest two partners and so on.

19. Graph 5 also presents the Herfindahl-Hirschman (HH) Index for imports and exports which is a measure of concentration. In the case of exports (imports), the HH index is the sum of squares of the partner's share of total exports (imports):

$$HH\ Index = \sum_{i=1}^n \left(\frac{X_i}{X} \right)^2$$

20. n is the number of trading partners for exports (imports) and X_i is the value of exports (imports) to partner country i and X is the total value of exports (imports). The lower the HH index, the lower the partner concentration, and vice versa. If there is only one trading partner the HH index would equal 1.¹⁰

21. It should be noted that the HH index for a given country's exports (imports) depends on the distribution of share of exports (imports) among its partners. Hence a country with few major partners might have a lower HH index value, indicating low concentration, than a country with more partners if the former has its trade more evenly distributed among its partners than the latter.

22. Graph 6: Imports of services by EBOPS category: This graph presents the shares of total imports of services accounted for by each service category for the latest year such data are available.

23. Table 1 and table 4: Top 10 export and import commodities: These tables present the top 10 commodities in terms of 4-digit HS headings for exports and imports, respectively, using the aggregate of trade values for the last three reporting years as available. For countries which reported the last three years of data in HS 2007 the data in these tables follow HS 2007. For most other countries the data in these tables are presented in HS 2002 with data for some years converted from HS 2007 into HS 2002 as required (see paragraph 33). For a few countries the table contains data according to the HS 1996 or even HS 1992. For the convenience of users the last column shows the SITC group (3 digits) that corresponds to the HS heading. The SITC group is identified based on the correlation and conversion tables between HS and SITC, Rev 3.¹¹

24. In addition to trade values, the table 1 and table 4 also present unit values. Unit values are expressed in U.S. dollars (US\$) per unit (kg, unit, Megawatt-hours (Mwh), pair, litre, carat etc.). The calculation of unit values on the heading level requires the availability of value and quantity information for all of the underlying detailed data (6-digit subheadings). In some cases the quantity information for some sub-headings was estimated (see paragraph 32) and thus the unit value for the heading appears in italics. If quantity information appears incorrect it is not shown.

25. Table 2 and table 3: Merchandise Exports and Imports by SITC sections: These tables show the structure of exports and imports in 2013 (or the latest available year) by SITC sections in terms of value, share of the total, growth in respect to the previous year and annual average growth for the last four years which is calculated as the geometric mean.

¹⁰ For the application of HH index to measure partner concentration in merchandise trade, no thresholds are known to be established. Users might wish to define a specific limit of the HH index to indicate low concentration and a limit to indicate high concentration. Sources

26. Data on the total merchandise imports and exports of countries (or areas) presented in world table A are mainly taken from *International Financial Statistics* (IFS) published monthly by the International Monetary Fund (IMF). They are supplemented with data from other sources such as national publications and websites and the *United Nations Monthly Bulletin of Statistics Questionnaire* for the following countries: Andorra, Bermuda, Cayman Islands, Cuba, Gibraltar, Montenegro (beginning 2006), Niue, Russian Federation (beginning 1994), Serbia and Montenegro (before 2006), State of Palestine, Turkmenistan, Turks and Caicos, Tuvalu and Uzbekistan. Data on world merchandise exports by provenance and destination presented in world table D are derived from UN Comtrade data supplemented by estimated data for non-available countries and areas.

27. The data in the country profiles in part 2 of the publication (country trade profiles) are obtained from data directly submitted by countries to the United Nations Statistics Division (UNSD). All data published in the country profiles is available in UN Comtrade (<http://comtrade.un.org>) and UN ServiceTrade (<http://unstats.un.org/unsd/servicetrade>).

28. In some cases, original countries data are received via international and regional partner organizations, such as the Organization for Economic Co-operation and Development (OECD), the Food and Agriculture Organization of the United Nations (FAO), the International Monetary Fund (IMF), the International Trade Centre (ITC), the Caribbean Community (CARICOM) Secretariat, the Common Market of Eastern and Southern Africa (COMESA), the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) and the UN regional commissions such as the Economic Commission for Latin America and the Caribbean (ECLAC) and the Economic and Social Commission for Western Asia (ESCWA). Data for the European Union (EU-28) is received from the Statistical Office of the European Union (Eurostat).

29. Table A shows data as available by end of May 2014 and table D uses data as available on UN Comtrade by end of May 2014. The country tables and graphs contain data available in UN Comtrade and UN ServiceTrade by mid-June 2014.

Method of Estimation

30. Estimates for missing data in Table A are made in order to arrive at regional totals, but estimated data are not shown. The estimation process is automated using quarterly year-on-year growth rates for the extrapolation of missing quarterly data, unless quarterly data can be estimated using available monthly data within the quarter. Regional totals containing estimated data are printed in bold. Estimates are reviewed and adjusted where necessary.

31. Data for missing reporters in Table D are estimated either through the extrapolation of the data of the two adjacent years, or, if this is not possible, through the use of the data reported by the trading partners, that is, through mirror data. Mirror statistics are also used in case the partner distribution or confidential data make it necessary to adjust the reported data. All estimates are reviewed and adjusted where necessary.

32. For part 2, the country trade profiles, modifications to the received data are only made in cases where the provided data are obviously incomplete, in particular in the case of unreported petroleum oils exports in merchandise data. Quantity information that is missing or does not comply with the World Customs Organization's recommendations are estimated and flagged in UN Comtrade accordingly. For data processed before June 2009 some quantity information that were identified as 'extreme' – meaning far outside a pre-defined 'normal' range – were replaced in UN Comtrade with estimates. The estimation of quantities is either based on the country's own data or uses standard unit values (SUVs) which are derived from the available information for all countries in the previous year.

Conversion of classification

33. Conversion of classification for merchandise data: All countries follow recommendation to report their detailed merchandise trade data according to the Harmonized Commodity Description and Coding System (HS) (see paragraph 4.C.v). In order to provide comparable time series data in UN Comtrade for all countries, the data reported in the latest HS classification is converted into earlier versions of the HS, and to corresponding or earlier versions of the Standard International Trade Classification (SITC).¹² The latest edition of the HS classification was its fifth and was released in 2012. The commodities in this publication are mostly presented according to the one-digit sections of SITC, Rev.3 as the SITC sections provide a limited set of economically meaningful main categories.¹³ In addition, data according to SITC, Rev.3 is available for long time series. In two tables, commodities are presented in terms of four-digit headings of the HS, often according to the 2007 version of HS but in many cases also in earlier HS versions.¹⁴ The HS headings provide a meaningful description of traded commodities at a relatively detailed level and also allow the presentation of quantity information.

34. Conversion of classification for trade in services data: For services data, most countries are still compiling data according to the EBOPS 2002 classification and, therefore, all services data presented in this Yearbook are presented according to this classification. For the cases in which a country has transitioned to the EBOPS 2010 classification (as presented in MSTIS 2010) and did not provide UNSD with data based on EBOPS 2002, and for those countries for which the IMF is the only data source,¹⁵ the data were converted to the EBOPS 2002 classification in order to maintain consistency across countries. The conversion was based on the IMF's BPM5-to-BPM6 Conversion Matrix (available at <http://www.imf.org/external/pubs/ft/bop/2008/08->

10b.pdf). The World Trade Organization (WTO) performed most of the conversions and shared them with UNSD. The countries for which such conversions were made include: Angola, Armenia, Australia, Azerbaijan, Belarus, Canada, China, Fiji, India, Russian Federation, Samoa, Saudi Arabia, Singapore, and Vanuatu.

Currency conversion and Period

35. Currency conversion: For both merchandise and trade in services data in this publication, conversion of values from national currencies into United States dollars is done by means of currency conversion factors based on official exchange rates. Values in currencies subject to fluctuation are converted into United States dollars using weighted average exchange rates specially calculated for this purpose. The weighted average exchange rate for a given currency for a given year is the component monthly factors, furnished by the International Monetary Fund in its IFS publication, weighted by the value of the relevant trade in each month; a monthly factor is the exchange rate (or the simple average rate) in effect during that month. These factors are applied to total imports and exports and to the trade in individual commodities with individual countries. The conversion factors applied to the data presented in table A are published quarterly in the *UN Monthly Bulletin of Statistics* (<http://unstats.un.org/unsd/mbs/default.aspx>) and are also available at: <http://unstats.un.org/unsd/trade/imts/analyticaltradetables.htm>. For data published on UN Comtrade the applied conversion factors are available in a country's metadata on UN Comtrade.

36. Period: Generally, data refer to calendar years; however, for those countries which report according to some other reference year, the data are presented in the calendar year which covers the majority of the reference year used by the country.

Country Nomenclature and Country Grouping

37. Country nomenclature: The naming of countries (or areas) in this publication follows in general the *United Nations Standard Country or Area Codes for Statistical Use*.¹⁶ The names and composition of countries as reporter are changing over time. Also, countries rarely follow the identical nomenclature in the recording of partner information. For example when former geographical entities commonly referred to in national statistics have changed, countries may introduce the corresponding changes in their statistics at different times. In this publication, wherever possible, areas of the world have been designated the names they currently bear.

It should be noted that, in this publication:

- i. Data published for China exclude those for Taiwan Province of China. Data representing the trade with Taiwan Province, which may have been reported by any reporting country or area, are included in the grouping Asia, nes. For statistical purposes, data for China also do not include those for Hong Kong Special Administrative Region and Macao Special Administrative Region.

ii. Beginning 1 January 2000, Botswana, Lesotho, Namibia, South Africa and Swaziland provide their international trade statistics separately.

iii. On 4 February 2003, the official name of the Federal Republic of Yugoslavia has been changed to Serbia and Montenegro.

iv. On 3 June 2006, Serbia and Montenegro formally dissolved into two independent countries: Montenegro and Serbia.

v. On 10 October 2010 the federation of the Netherlands Antilles was formally dissolved. The former Dutch Caribbean dependency ceased to exist with a change of the five islands' constitutional status. Under the new political structure, Curaçao and Sint Maarten (Dutch part) have become autonomous countries within the Kingdom of the Netherlands, joining Aruba, which gained the status in 1986. The islands of the remaining territorial grouping, alternately known as Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba or the BES islands, are special municipalities and part of the country of the Netherlands and overseas territories of the European Union. For statistical purposes, the data for the Netherlands do not include the BES islands. Data referring to Netherlands Antilles (as a partner) prior to 2011 refer to the former territory which included Curaçao, Sint Maarten (Dutch part), Bonaire, Sint Eustatius and Saba.

vi. On 9 July 2011, Sudan formally dissolved into two independent countries: Sudan and South Sudan. Data provided for Sudan prior to 1 January 2012 refer to the former Sudan (including South Sudan). Data referring to Sudan (as a partner) for 2012 are attributed to Sudan excluding South Sudan.

38. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Afghanistan increased substantially by 14.1 percent to reach 428.9 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 2.9 percent to reach 6.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 5.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). Merchandise exports in Afghanistan were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Afghanistan decreased substantially by 12.1 percent, reaching 3.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 73.8 percent and reached 2.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 817.0 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 65.4, 17.0 and 12.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Pakistan, Areas nes and India, accounting for respectively 44.7, 31.0 and 17.2 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 1.5 bln US\$, followed by "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 762.3 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 342.9 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)







Imports Profile:

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 64.7, 24.5 and 5.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Areas nes, Uzbekistan and Pakistan, accounting for respectively 52.4, 15.4 and 13.3 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 1.1 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 674.3 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Albania increased substantially by 18.5 percent to reach 2.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports stagnated at 4.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 2.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -1.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Albania were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Albania increased moderately by 5.6 percent, reaching 2.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 12.0 percent and reached 2.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 188.2 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 31.0, 30.3 and 19.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Italy, Serbia and Spain, accounting for respectively 50.0, 8.5 and 7.7 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 1.6 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 311.6 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 189.9 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 21.7, 18.2 and 17.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Italy, Greece and China, accounting for respectively 31.8, 9.7 and 6.5 percent of total imports. 

Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Algeria decreased moderately by 8.2 percent to reach 66.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 9.0 percent to reach 54.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 11.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 14.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Algeria were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Algeria increased moderately by 6.8 percent, reaching 4.0 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 11.8 percent and reached 11.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 7.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 98.3, 0.7 and 0.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Italy and Spain, accounting for respectively 14.8, 14.7 and 12.0 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.1 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 732.5 mln US\$ and "Financial services" (EBOPS code 260) at 272.8 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 36.9, 17.3 and 17.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were France, China and Italy, accounting for respectively 13.0, 11.5 and 10.2 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Antigua and Barbuda decreased slightly by 0.1 percent to reach 29.0 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 28.0 percent to reach 339.5 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 310.5 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -170.9 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Antigua and Barbuda were diversified amongst partners; imports were highly concentrated. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Antigua and Barbuda increased slightly by 0.2 percent, reaching 482.5 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 3.2 percent and reached 204.1 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 278.4 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 41.4, 31.7 and 12.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "textile tarpaulin, sail, awning, tent, camping goods" (HS code 6306) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, the United Kingdom and Netherlands Antilles, accounting for respectively 30.0, 15.8 and 7.4 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 319.0 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 106.6 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 30.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Argentina decreased moderately by 5.3 percent to reach 76.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 7.5 percent to reach 73.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 3.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -5.9 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Argentina were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. "Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 41.4, 17.8 and 15.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "oil-cake and other solid residues" (HS code 2304) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Brazil, China and Chile, accounting for respectively 20.7, 6.9 and 5.7 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 5.1 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 4.9 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 30.9, 20.0 and 19.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, the Netherlands and Areas nes, accounting for respectively 47.9, 11.2 and 5.7 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 277.7 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 228.5 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 134.1 mln US\$ (see graph 6).


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Australia decreased slightly by 1.6 percent to reach 252.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 7.2 percent to reach 232.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 19.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at 55.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Australia were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Australia increased slightly by 2.8 percent, reaching 53.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 4.4 percent and reached 64.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 11.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 38.5, 25.9 and 11.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "iron ores and concentrates, including roasted iron pyrites" (HS code 2601) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Japan and the Republic of Korea, accounting for respectively 30.5, 17.1 and 8.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 31.8 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 8.3 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 5.3 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 38.1, 17.5 and 12.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the United States and Japan, accounting for respectively 18.7, 11.2 and 7.8 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 27.5 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 17.2 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 9.1 bln US\$ (see graph 6).


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Austria decreased moderately by 6.3 percent to reach 158.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 7.0 percent to reach 169.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 10.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -12.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Austria were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Austria decreased slightly by 1.0 percent, reaching 60.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 0.5 percent and reached 42.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 18.1 bln US\$.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 38.0, 21.7 and 11.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Italy and Switzerland, accounting for respectively 30.8, 7.3 and 5.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 18.9 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 18.5 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 13.8 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination



In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Azerbaijan increased slightly by 0.3 percent to reach 23.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 11.6 percent to reach 10.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 13.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 7.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Azerbaijan were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Azerbaijan increased substantially by 57.4 percent, reaching 4.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 26.1 percent and reached 7.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 2.9 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 93.0, 2.9 and 1.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Italy, France and Indonesia, accounting for respectively 28.1, 9.4 and 7.3 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "other aircraft (for example, helicopters, aeroplanes); spacecraft" (HS code 8802) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the Russian Federation, Turkey and Germany, accounting for respectively 15.0, 14.3 and 8.1 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 2.5 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 968.4 mln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 485.2 mln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of the Bahamas increased substantially by 14.0 percent to reach 828.7 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.9 percent to reach 3.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 2.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Bahamas were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Bahamas increased moderately by 5.2 percent, reaching 2.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 19.0 percent and reached 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 1.2 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 38.6, 34.0 and 10.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, France and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 78.9, 3.4 and 3.4 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.4 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 206.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 24.0, 18.9 and 15.6 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Trinidad and Tobago and Areas nes, accounting for respectively 87.8, 3.7 and 1.8 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of Bahrain increased substantially by 40.5 percent to reach 22.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 10.3 percent to reach 17.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 4.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -4.9 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Bahrain were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). (% share in 2009)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 32.6, 20.5 and 15.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Areas nes, Bunkers, ship stores and the United States, accounting for respectively 25.7, 25.5 and 19.7 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2010 at 390.1 mln US\$, followed by "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 52.0 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 37.6 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2010)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 27.3, 18.6 and 18.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Trinidad and Tobago and Suriname, accounting for respectively 32.0, 27.2 and 5.3 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2010 at 154.2 mln US\$, followed by "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 114.5 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 70.9 mln US\$ (see graph 6).


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Belarus decreased substantially by 18.5 percent to reach 37.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 7.4 percent to reach 42.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 5.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -2.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Belarus were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were highly concentrated. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Belarus increased substantially by 12.5 percent, reaching 5.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 15.3 percent and reached 3.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 2.3 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 33.0, 16.3 and 13.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Russian Federation, the Netherlands and Ukraine, accounting for respectively 37.8, 13.8 and 11.2 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 3.6 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 684.7 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 532.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 29.3, 24.0 and 15.5 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the Russian Federation, Germany and China, accounting for respectively 55.1, 6.2 and 5.4 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 1.5 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 622.2 mln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 615.1 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Belgium increased substantially by 14.5 percent to reach 511.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 11.5 percent to reach 488.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a surplus of 23.1 bln US\$, which is the largest surplus in the last decade (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 31.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). EU remains by far the largest trading partner, but the share of trade with EU dropped from 73.4% in 2008 to 68.3% in 2013. Merchandise exports in Belgium were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Belgium increased slightly by 3.4 percent, reaching 101.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 3.0 percent and reached 91.6 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 10.0 bln US\$, up slightly from 9.3 bln US\$ in 2011.

Exports Profile:

"Chemicals" (SITC section 5), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 28.6, 20.1 and 15.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). In 2013 there was strong growth in all SITC section, in particular in "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), which grew by 28.8%. From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, France and the Netherlands, accounting for respectively 17.5, 15.9 and 12.3 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 38.5 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 26.1 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 13.0 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Belize decreased substantially by 14.1 percent to reach 340.4 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.4 percent to reach 880.3 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 539.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at -232.4 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Belize were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Belize increased substantially by 21.4 percent, reaching 413.0 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 21.5 percent and reached 188.1 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 224.8 mln US\$.

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 68.6, 27.4 and 1.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 24.1, 18.0 and 16.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Curaçao and China, accounting for respectively 35.4, 15.3 and 12.3 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of Benin increased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 434.5 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 3.5 percent to reach 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -622.2 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Benin were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Benin decreased moderately by 6.8 percent, reaching 350.9 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 10.3 percent and reached 567.3 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 216.4 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2010 representing respectively 55.6, 29.7 and 8.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2008 to 2010, the largest export commodity was "cotton, not carded or combed" (HS code 5201) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Nigeria, China and India, accounting for respectively 36.6, 15.6 and 7.5 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 189.6 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 63.3 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 50.6 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2010)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Bermuda increased substantially by 125.5 percent to reach 21.7 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 14.7 percent to reach 994.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 972.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -799.6 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Bermuda were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. From 2012 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "other string musical instruments (for example, guitars, violins, harps)" (HS code 9202) (see table 1). (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the Plurinational State of Bolivia increased slightly by 3.5 percent to reach 12.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 25.4 percent to reach 10.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at 3.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Plurinational State of Bolivia were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Plurinational State of Bolivia increased moderately by 7.3 percent, reaching 944.2 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 11.0 percent and reached 2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 1.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 54.7, 22.8 and 10.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum gases and other gaseous hydrocarbons" (HS code 2711) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Brazil, Argentina and the United States, accounting for respectively 32.4, 17.1 and 11.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 531.7 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 167.4 mln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 95.5 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 37.7, 19.4 and 15.6 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Brazil, China and the United States, accounting for respectively 17.1, 13.0 and 12.0 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Bosnia and Herzegovina increased substantially by 10.2 percent to reach 5.7 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 2.8 percent to reach 10.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 4.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -1.9 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Bosnia and Herzegovina were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Bosnia and Herzegovina decreased moderately by 7.1 percent, reaching 1.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 10.3 percent and reached 514.4 mln US\$ (see graph 2). "Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 23.7, 23.6 and 13.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "seats (other than those of heading 94.02)" (HS code 9401) (see table 1). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade



In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Botswana increased slightly by 1.5 percent to reach 6.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 10.4 percent to reach 8.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 2.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Sub-Saharan Africa at -4.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). (% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 38.0, 19.1 and 18.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the United States and Argentina, accounting for respectively 15.1, 15.0 and 7.2 percent of total imports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 28.3 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 22.2 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 14.2 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Brunei Darussalam was 13.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports were 3.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 9.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed ASPAC at 7.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Brunei Darussalam was moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2009, the value of exports of services of Brunei Darussalam increased moderately by 5.5 percent, reaching 914.9 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 2.3 percent and reached 1.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 519.3 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 95.7, 1.9 and 1.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). In 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Japan, the Republic of Korea and India, accounting for respectively 44.1, 15.7 and 8.9 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2009 at 451.7 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 254.4 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 174.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2009)









**Imports Profile:**

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 29.1, 22.4 and 14.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). In 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Singapore, Malaysia and China, accounting for respectively 23.5, 19.9 and 11.4 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2009 at 477.1 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 444.7 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 248.8 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Bulgaria increased substantially by 10.5 percent to reach 29.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.8 percent to reach 34.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 4.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG CIS at -5.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Bulgaria were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Bulgaria decreased slightly by 0.9 percent, reaching 7.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 3.8 percent and reached 4.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 3.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 22.0, 17.6 and 14.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Turkey and Italy, accounting for respectively 11.5, 9.0 and 8.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 3.7 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.4 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 930.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the Russian Federation, Germany and Italy, accounting for respectively 19.0, 11.0 and 7.1 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of Burkina Faso increased substantially by 79.5 percent to reach 2.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased by 17.5 percent to reach 2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 94.0 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 991.4 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Burkina Faso were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Burkina Faso increased substantially by 30.2 percent, reaching 395.2 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 17.1 percent and reached 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 685.8 mln US\$.

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 77.4, 16.1 and 4.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2009 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Switzerland, South Africa and Singapore, accounting for respectively 65.0, 8.7 and 6.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 133.4 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 67.8 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 61.4 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 23.6, 21.6 and 16.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Côte d'Ivoire, France and China, accounting for respectively 13.5, 11.7 and 9.8 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 644.6 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 133.5 mln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 114.3 mln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Burundi increased substantially by 22.7 percent to reach 242.7 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 11.0 percent to reach 1.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 760.4 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -342.9 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Burundi were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Burundi decreased substantially by 17.2 percent, reaching 92.0 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 0.3 percent and reached 211.5 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 119.5 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 43.6, 35.7 and 9.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "coffee, whether or not roasted or decaffeinated" (HS code 0901) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Areas nes, the United Arab Emirates and Switzerland, accounting for respectively 50.1, 19.4 and 11.9 percent of total exports in the 3 year period. In 2012 exports were highly concentrated with Areas nes accounting for 76.9 percent of total exports. "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 76.1 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 18.1, 17.2 and 16.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Saudi Arabia, the United Republic of Tanzania and Belgium, accounting for respectively 14.0, 9.4 and 7.8 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 126.0 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 25.7 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 24.8 mln US\$ (see graph 6).



Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Cabo Verde increased substantially by 24.1 percent to reach 69.2 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 3.8 percent to reach 726.4 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 657.1 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -513.1 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Cabo Verde were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Cabo Verde increased substantially by 26.4 percent, reaching 577.9 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 5.4 percent and reached 318.8 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 259.1 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 86.1, 13.5 and 0.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "prepared or preserved fish; caviar" (HS code 1604) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Spain, Portugal and Germany, accounting for respectively 68.1, 15.7 and 4.5 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 367.9 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 150.1 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 30.1, 21.3 and 16.5 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Portugal, the Netherlands and Spain, accounting for respectively 39.7, 16.0 and 8.7 percent of total imports. 



In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Cambodia increased substantially by 16.9 percent to reach 7.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 15.0 percent to reach 7.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 775.5 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 2.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Cambodia were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2010, the value of exports of services of Cambodia increased moderately by 7.3 percent, reaching 1.7 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 6.2 percent and reached 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 662.7 mln US\$.

From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "unused postage, revenue or similar stamps of current or new issue" (HS code 4907) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China, Hong Kong SAR and Singapore, accounting for respectively 30.0, 21.2 and 7.7 percent of total exports. (% share in 2010)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 44.8, 19.1 and 13.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "other knitted or crocheted fabrics" (HS code 6006) (see table 4). 



In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Cameroon increased substantially by 99.1 percent to reach 4.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 28.4 percent to reach 6.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 2.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Sub-Saharan Africa at -1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Cameroon were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Cameroon decreased substantially by 12.4 percent, reaching 1.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 7.4 percent and reached 2.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 500.4 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 55.5, 16.9 and 16.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Netherlands, Spain and China, accounting for respectively 13.6, 12.4 and 11.3 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 536.9 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 391.6 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 349.5 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 30.4, 20.1 and 18.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were France, Nigeria and China, accounting for respectively 14.4, 12.6 and 11.6 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Canada increased slightly by 0.7 percent to reach 456.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 0.1 percent to reach 461.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 5.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 101.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Canada were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The United States and China accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Canada decreased slightly by 1.2 percent, reaching 79.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 0.4 percent and reached 106.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). The trade in services deficit grew to its highest point since 2000, at 27.0 bln US\$ in 2012.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 26.2, 25.3 and 11.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 74.6, 4.1 and 3.8 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 24.8 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 17.4 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 12.5 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 41.2, 11.9 and 11.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, China and Mexico, accounting for respectively 50.8, 11.0 and 5.5 percent of total imports. 
Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of the Central African Republic increased substantially by 15.7 percent to reach 103.9 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 2.3 percent to reach 214.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 110.8 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -57.2 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Central African Republic were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Central African Republic increased moderately by 6.3 percent, reaching 69.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 14.5 percent and reached 179.0 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 109.9 mln US\$.

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category



(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 36.3, 20.4 and 11.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, China and Brazil, accounting for respectively 21.1, 18.3 and 7.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 7.2 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 2.2 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 1.9 bln US\$ (see graph 6).


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

China is the top exporter of the world and in 2013 its value of export was 1.4 times the value of exports of USA, the second largest exporter. In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of China increased moderately by 7.8 percent to reach 2209.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 7.2 percent to reach 1950.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a surplus of 259.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 219.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in China were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 24 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of China increased slightly by 2.9 percent, reaching 191.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.5 percent and reached 281.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). The trade in services deficit grew to 89.8 bln US\$ from 61.6 bln US\$ in 2011.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 47.1, 26.2 and 16.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "automatic data processing machines and units thereof" (HS code 8471) (see table 1). Commodities in "nuclear reactors, boilers, machinery, etc" (HS code 84) and "electrical machinery and equipment" (HS code 85) together accounted for 42.8 percent of all exports. The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China, Hong Kong SAR and Japan, accounting for respectively 17.0, 15.9 and 7.3 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 66.6 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 50.0 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 38.9 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 36.4, 16.2 and 15.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Japan, the Republic of Korea and China (re-imports), accounting for respectively 9.7, 9.3 and 7.7 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 102.0 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 85.9 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 42.4 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of China, Hong Kong SAR increased moderately by 8.2 percent to reach 492.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 8.3 percent to reach 553.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade deficit grew to 60.6 bln US\$, up from the merchandise trade deficit in 2011 of 55.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at -38.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in China, Hong Kong SAR were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and the same number of partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of China, Hong Kong SAR increased by 12.0 percent, reaching 118.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased by 10.3 percent and reached 56.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 62.6 bln US\$, up from the trade in services surplus in 2011 of 55.2 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 55.5, 18.7 and 10.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "electronic integrated circuits" (HS code 8542), accounting for 12.1 percent of total merchandise exports by value in 2012 (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, the United States and Japan, accounting for respectively 54.9, 9.6 and 3.9 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 39.6 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 31.8 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 28.5 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 52.8, 16.3 and 9.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "electronic integrated circuits" (HS code 8542), accounting for 12.8 percent of total merchandise imports by value in 2012 (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Japan and Singapore, accounting for respectively 44.5, 8.4 and 6.5 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 19.0 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 16.6 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 10.7 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of China, Macao SAR increased substantially by 17.3 percent to reach 1.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 13.3 percent to reach 9.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 8.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -3.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in China, Macao SAR were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of China, Macao SAR increased substantially by 39.0 percent, reaching 39.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 41.1 percent and reached 10.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 29.5 bln US\$.

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 62.9, 19.2 and 13.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Areas nes, China, Hong Kong SAR and China, accounting for respectively 42.4, 30.4 and 9.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 38.6 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Colombia decreased slightly by 2.4 percent to reach 58.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 2.2 percent to reach 59.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 559.3 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -6.9 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports and imports in Colombia were diversified amongst partners. The top 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Colombia increased moderately by 8.4 percent, reaching 5.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.1 percent and reached 10.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 5.5 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 66.8, 8.4 and 6.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China and Panama, accounting for respectively 35.7, 5.9 and 4.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.4 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.5 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 742.5 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade


Overview:

In 2009, the value of merchandise exports of Comoros increased substantially by 132.2 percent to reach 12.6 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 11.4 percent to reach 181.5 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 169.0 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -57.0 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Comoros were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). From 2007 to 2009, the largest export commodity was "cloves (whole fruit, cloves and stems)" (HS code 0907) (see table 1). (% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance





In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of the Congo decreased substantially by 15.7 percent to reach 6.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 1.7 percent to reach 4.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). (% share in 2007)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2010)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 45.0, 21.2 and 14.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Costa Rica increased slightly by 2.0 percent to reach 11.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 1.2 percent to reach 18.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 6.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -4.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Costa Rica were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were highly concentrated. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Costa Rica increased substantially by 10.3 percent, reaching 5.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 12.5 percent and reached 2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 3.5 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 32.5, 29.3 and 17.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "electronic integrated circuits" (HS code 8542) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, the Netherlands and Panama, accounting for respectively 38.3, 7.2 and 5.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.3 bln US\$, followed by "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) at 1.8 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 806.1 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 36.0, 15.0 and 14.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, China and Mexico, accounting for respectively 49.1, 8.6 and 6.5 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Côte d'Ivoire decreased slightly by 1.7 percent to reach 10.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 45.4 percent to reach 9.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Côte d'Ivoire were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Côte d'Ivoire decreased substantially by 11.3 percent, reaching 926.4 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 5.3 percent and reached 2.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 1.7 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 41.1, 29.1 and 13.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "cocoa beans, whole or broken, raw or roasted" (HS code 1801) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Netherlands, the United States and Nigeria, accounting for respectively 11.5, 10.1 and 6.8 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 221.4 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 213.6 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 145.8 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





The top 23 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Cyprus decreased moderately by 8.9 percent, reaching 7.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 1.3 percent and reached 3.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 4.3 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 23.2, 21.6 and 20.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06)" (HS code 3004) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Greece, Bunkers, ship stores and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 20.1, 17.5 and 10.4 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.6 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 2.4 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 29.0, 19.6 and 14.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Greece, Israel and Italy, accounting for respectively 21.8, 11.6 and 7.8 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the Czech Republic increased slightly by 2.9 percent to reach 161.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.6 percent to reach 142.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 19.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 37.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Czech Republic were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Czech Republic decreased slightly by 4.7 percent, reaching 22.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 1.6 percent and reached 19.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 2.5 bln US\$.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 54.1, 17.4 and 11.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 6: Imports of services by EBOPS category




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Denmark increased slightly by 4.0 percent to reach 110.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.7 percent to reach 97.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





In 2009, the value of merchandise exports of Djibouti was 363.7 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports was 647.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). (% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2009)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2009 representing respectively 32.6, 27.9 and 11.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2007 to 2009, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were France, the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 30.5, 18.5 and 6.0 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 93.2 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 20.9 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 20.7 mln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Dominica amounted to 37.0 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports reached 211.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 174.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -81.2 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Dominica were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Dominica decreased substantially by 19.8 percent, reaching 124.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 2.6 percent and reached 67.6 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 56.5 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Chemicals" (SITC section 5), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 50.9, 14.6 and 11.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). In 2010 and 2012, the largest export commodity was "soap; organic surface-active products" (HS code 3401) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Jamaica, Trinidad and Tobago and Saint Kitts and Nevis, accounting for respectively 16.9, 16.3 and 16.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 78.6 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 26.2 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 13.5 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)



(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 22.5, 22.1 and 17.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). In 2010 and 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Trinidad and Tobago and Areas nes, accounting for respectively 39.4, 16.1 and 4.6 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Dominican Republic increased substantially by 12.9 percent to reach 6.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.8 percent to reach 19.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 12.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at -4.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Dominican Republic were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Dominican Republic increased slightly by 3.6 percent, reaching 5.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 2.1 percent and reached 2.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 3.1 bln US\$.

"Miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 34.8, 20.8 and 14.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "instruments and appliances used in medical, surgical, dental or veterinary" (HS code 9018) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Haiti and China, accounting for respectively 56.0, 15.8 and 4.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 4.4 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 440.3 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Ecuador increased slightly by 4.6 percent to reach 25.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 7.4 percent to reach 27.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 1.4 bln US\$.

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Egypt decreased slightly by 2.2 percent to reach 28.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 4.6 percent to reach 66.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 37.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -13.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Egypt were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 25 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Egypt increased substantially by 13.7 percent, reaching 21.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 16.9 percent and reached 16.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 5.3 bln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 26.1, 20.2 and 16.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Italy, India and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 8.6, 7.2 and 6.4 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of El Salvador increased slightly by 2.8 percent to reach 5.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.9 percent to reach 10.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 5.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -1.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in El Salvador were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade



Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 32.2, 20.5 and 17.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Saudi Arabia and India, accounting for respectively 21.6, 12.2 and 8.0 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 2.4 bln US\$, followed by "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 354.4 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 301.8 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2009, the value of merchandise exports of Faeroe Islands decreased by 10.6 percent to reach 761.7 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 20.7 percent to reach 783.4 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 21.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -76.7 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Faeroe Islands were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Faeroe Islands increased moderately by 8.4 percent, reaching 207.0 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 7.6 percent and reached 394.6 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 187.6 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2009 representing respectively 88.0, 6.3 and 2.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2007 to 2009, the largest export commodity was "fish fillets and other fish meat (whether or not minced)" (HS code 0304) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United Kingdom, Norway and Denmark, accounting for respectively 20.4, 12.6 and 12.0 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 80.8 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 44.4 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 41.3 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2009)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2009 representing respectively 29.7, 15.8 and 15.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2007 to 2009, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Denmark, Norway and Germany, accounting for respectively 30.3, 18.9 and 7.2 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 96.4 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 85.8 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 83.6 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Fiji increased substantially by 14.1 percent to reach 1.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.2 percent to reach 2.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 1.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at -827.5 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Fiji were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Fiji increased slightly by 4.4 percent, reaching 1.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 6.4 percent and reached 570.8 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 637.5 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 41.5, 26.9 and 7.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Australia, Bunkers, ship stores and the United States, accounting for respectively 17.6, 16.2 and 11.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 729.6 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 309.9 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 108.8 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 30.1, 19.8 and 18.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Singapore, Australia and New Zealand, accounting for respectively 31.9, 19.3 and 14.4 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Finland increased slightly by 1.9 percent to reach 74.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.7 percent to reach 77.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 3.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG CIS at -6.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Finland were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 20 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Finland decreased slightly by 3.0 percent, reaching 28.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 4.3 percent and reached 30.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 1.9 bln US\$.

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of France increased slightly by 1.9 percent to reach 566.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 0.8 percent to reach 668.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a deficit of 101.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1), a slight reduction of the deficit in 2012 of 106.7 bln US\$. The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -58.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4), but the share of trade with the EU has decreased in the last decade from 63.9 percent in 2000 to 58.6 percent in 2013. Merchandise exports in France were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 25 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of France decreased moderately by 8.1 percent, reaching 216.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 9.0 percent and reached 174.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a trade in services surplus of 41.9 bln US\$, slightly down from 43.8 bln US\$ in 2011.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 38.2, 17.9 and 12.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "other aircraft (for example, helicopters, aeroplanes); spacecraft" (HS code 8802) (see table 1). In this time period, France has been the world's largest exporter of this commodity. The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Italy and Belgium, accounting for respectively 16.5, 7.6 and 7.4 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268), although down 10.3 percent from 2011, accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 71.3 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 53.6 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 45.2 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 32.8, 16.5 and 13.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, China and Belgium, accounting for respectively 17.1, 8.0 and 7.7 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of French Polynesia increased moderately by 9.0 percent to reach 151.5 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.4 percent to reach 1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 1.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -673.8 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in French Polynesia were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of French Polynesia decreased slightly by 4.4 percent, reaching 861.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 15.6 percent and reached 504.5 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 356.6 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 58.6, 15.7 and 9.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "pearls, natural or cultured" (HS code 7101) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Hong Kong SAR, Japan and France, accounting for respectively 27.2, 26.0 and 16.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 343.7 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 257.0 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 157.6 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 25.7, 23.6 and 17.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2009, the value of merchandise exports of Gabon decreased substantially by 44.0 percent to reach 5.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 2.4 percent to reach 2.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 2.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 3.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). There was a large trade in services deficit of 1.1 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2009 representing respectively 83.1, 12.0 and 2.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2007 to 2009, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China and France, accounting for respectively 54.2, 10.8 and 7.2 percent of total exports. (% share in 2007)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2009)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade



In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of the Gambia increased substantially by 170.8 percent to reach 94.7 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 20.6 percent to reach 343.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 249.0 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -83.0 mln US\$ (see graph 4). The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of the Gambia increased substantially by 75.1 percent, reaching 153.8 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 4.6 percent and reached 68.4 mln US\$ (see graph 2). "Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 47.2, 27.3 and 13.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2009 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "woven fabric of artificial filament, monofilament yarn" (HS code 5408) (see table 1). (% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 27.0, 22.0 and 17.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "oils petroleum, bituminous, distillates, except crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Côte d'Ivoire, Brazil and China, accounting for respectively 18.5, 9.4 and 9.3 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 42.7 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 10.9 mln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 7.2 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Georgia increased substantially by 22.4 percent to reach 2.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 0.4 percent to reach 7.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 5.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -1.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Georgia were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Georgia increased substantially by 26.5 percent, reaching 2.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 14.4 percent and reached 1.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 1.1 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 30.4, 26.0 and 16.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Azerbaijan, Armenia and Turkey, accounting for respectively 23.6, 10.7 and 7.4 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 1.4 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 847.9 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(% share in 2012)





Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Germany increased slightly by 3.0 percent to reach 1458.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.8 percent to reach 1194.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). However, the value of exports was still short of its peak in 2011 at 1482.2 bln US\$. The merchandise trade balance recorded a surplus of 264.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 159.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Germany were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 23 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Germany decreased slightly by 1.2 percent, reaching 270.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 0.7 percent and reached 295.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a trade in services deficit of 25.3 bln US\$.

Graph 2: Total services trade, by value




Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 46.8, 14.9 and 12.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). Germany is the largest exporter of this commodity. The top three destinations for merchandise exports were France, the United States and the Netherlands, accounting for respectively 9.4, 7.6 and 6.4 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 92.0 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 57.9 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 38.1 bln US\$ (see graph 3). Germany was among the world's top exporters of "other business services" in 2012.



(% share in 2012)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2013)






Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Ghana decreased substantially by 17.0 percent to reach 15.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 28.5 percent to reach 10.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 5.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Southern Asia at 3.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Ghana were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Ghana increased substantially by 74.2 percent, reaching 3.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 15.5 percent and reached 4.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 977.0 mln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 34.6, 33.6 and 20.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were South Africa, Togo and the United Arab Emirates, accounting for respectively 20.0, 10.5 and 8.1 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 1.3 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 929.9 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 914.4 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 6: Imports of services by EBOPS category





In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Greece increased slightly by 3.1 percent to reach 36.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 1.9 percent to reach 61.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 24.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -12.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Greece were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 24 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Greece decreased substantially by 11.0 percent, reaching 35.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 18.1 percent and reached 15.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 19.5 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 39.9, 15.3 and 13.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Turkey, Italy and Germany, accounting for respectively 10.2, 8.6 and 6.8 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 17.1 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 13.4 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 1.9 bln US\$ (see graph 3).




Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 37.3, 15.1 and 13.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the Russian Federation, Germany and Italy, accounting for respectively 12.1, 9.8 and 8.2 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 8.1 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 2.4 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Greenland increased slightly by 2.8 percent to reach 490.1 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 3.9 percent to reach 822.1 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 332.1 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -305.8 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Greenland were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2006, the value of exports of services of Greenland decreased moderately by 9.8 percent, reaching 203.0 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 6.4 percent and reached 315.1 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 112.1 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 84.8, 12.8 and 1.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "crustaceans, molluscs and other aquatic invertebrates, prepared or preserved" (HS code 1605) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Denmark, Areas nes and Portugal, accounting for respectively 89.4, 5.4 and 3.7 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2006 at 169.0 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 13.5 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 11.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2008, the value of merchandise exports of Grenada was 30.5 mln US\$, while in 2009, its merchandise imports was 281.8 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). In 2008, the merchandise trade balance recorded a deficit of 338.8 mln US\$ (see graph 1). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2008)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 22.3, 19.1 and 18.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Mexico and China, accounting for respectively 38.1, 11.0 and 7.5 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 1.2 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 702.0 mln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 197.0 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Guyana increased slightly by 2.8 percent to reach 1.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 7.3 percent to reach 1.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 666.8 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at -382.8 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Guyana were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2010, the value of exports of services of Guyana increased substantially by 45.6 percent, reaching 248.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 26.2 percent and reached 343.8 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 95.8 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 47.9, 23.9 and 16.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Canada and the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, accounting for respectively 27.6, 11.7 and 11.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2010 at 80.5 mln US\$, followed by "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) at 46.9 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 44.3 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 27.4, 26.4 and 14.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Trinidad and Tobago and China, accounting for respectively 25.2, 16.6 and 8.7 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2010 at 105.3 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 73.4 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 69.9 mln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Honduras increased substantially by 41.7 percent to reach 5.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.2 percent to reach 8.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 3.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at -2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Honduras were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were also moderately concentrated. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Honduras increased moderately by 6.4 percent, reaching 1.0 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 4.6 percent and reached 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 465.5 mln US\$.

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 47.3, 15.0 and 10.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "coffee, whether or not roasted or decaffeinated" (HS code 0901) (see table 1). (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Hungary increased moderately by 5.1 percent to reach 108.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.0 percent to reach 99.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 9.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 9.1 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Hungary were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Hungary decreased moderately by 7.2 percent, reaching 20.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 9.0 percent and reached 16.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 4.4 bln US\$.

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(% share in 2012)







(% share in 2011)





(% share in 2011)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2013)




Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of India increased substantially by 16.2 percent to reach 336.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 4.7 percent to reach 466.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a deficit of 129.4 bln US\$ which was the smallest since 2009 (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -65.1 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in India were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 30 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 23 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of India increased moderately by 5.3 percent, reaching 146.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 3.3 percent and reached 128.8 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a trade in services surplus of 17.3 bln US\$, up from the trade in services surplus of 14.0 bln US\$ in 2011.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 24.7, 20.7 and 13.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, the United Arab Emirates and China, accounting for respectively 12.1, 11.5 and 5.2 percent of total exports. "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 49.3 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 45.9 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 18.0 bln US\$ (see graph 3). India was the largest exporter worldwide of "computer and information services" in 2012.

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 39.5, 16.3 and 12.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). Although much less than 2012, India was still the largest importer of "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 11.4, 7.5 and 6.9 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 60.4 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 29.9 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 12.3 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Indonesia decreased slightly by 3.9 percent to reach 182.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 2.6 percent to reach 186.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 4.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at -13.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Indonesia were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Indonesia increased substantially by 11.7 percent, reaching 23.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 1.8 percent and reached 30.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 7.6 bln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 31.4, 21.5 and 12.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "coal, briquettes, ovoids and similar solid fuels manufactured from coal" (HS code 2701) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Japan, China and Singapore, accounting for respectively 15.8, 11.7 and 9.1 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 8.3 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 7.7 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 3.8 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 30.3, 24.4 and 15.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Singapore and Japan, accounting for respectively 15.4, 14.0 and 11.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 12.0 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 6.8 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 4.5 bln US\$ (see graph 6).



Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of the Islamic Republic of Iran increased substantially by 55.8 percent to reach 130.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 24.9 percent to reach 68.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 62.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at 55.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Islamic Republic of Iran were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Islamic Republic of Iran decreased substantially by 22.4 percent, reaching 6.7 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 23.9 percent and reached 13.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 6.3 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 70.5, 11.3 and 7.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Other Asia nes, Rest of Europe nes and Areas nes, accounting for respectively 45.6, 18.9 and 5.9 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2006 at 2.3 bln US\$, followed by "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 1.5 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 791.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2006)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Ireland decreased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 115.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.3 percent to reach 66.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 49.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 27.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Ireland were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Ireland increased slightly by 2.5 percent, reaching 116.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 3.2 percent and reached 111.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 4.1 bln US\$, which is the first trade in services surplus record over the period from 2000 to 2012. In 2012, the value of exports of services almost equalled the value of exports of merchandise.


"Chemicals" (SITC section 5), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 57.9, 12.4 and 12.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06)" (HS code 3004) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, the United Kingdom and Belgium, accounting for respectively 21.6, 16.1 and 14.1 percent of total exports. "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 45.9 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 33.3 bln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 11.5 bln US\$ (see graph 3). Ireland was the second largest exporter of "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) in 2012.




Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 24.3, 21.8 and 13.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United Kingdom, the United States and Germany, accounting for respectively 33.9, 11.9 and 7.6 percent of total imports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 45.7 bln US\$, followed by "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) at 42.1 bln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 8.0 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Israel increased moderately by 5.8 percent to reach 66.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 1.5 percent to reach 72.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 5.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -9.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Israel were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Israel increased substantially by 12.7 percent, reaching 30.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 2.5 percent and reached 21.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 9.8 bln US\$.

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 33.4, 27.1 and 24.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "diamonds, whether or not worked, but not mounted or set" (HS code 7102) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China, Hong Kong SAR and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 27.6, 7.9 and 5.5 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 5.5 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 4.5 bln US\$ and "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) at 4.3 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 28.1, 22.3 and 20.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "diamonds, whether or not worked, but not mounted or set" (HS code 7102) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Areas nes, the United States and China, accounting for respectively 19.2, 12.0 and 7.5 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 6.4 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 3.8 bln US\$ (see graph 6).



Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Italy increased slightly by 2.4 percent to reach 513.7 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 2.6 percent to reach 476.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). Despite growth since 2009, the value of exports was still less than its peak in 2008 at 541.8 bln US\$. The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 37.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 25.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Italy were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 29 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 25 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Italy decreased slightly by 2.2 percent, reaching 105.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 8.1 percent and reached 106.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). The decrease in imports was mostly attributable to declines in "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205), "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 952.0 mln US\$, down substantially from its trade in services deficit of 7.9 bln US\$ in 2011.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 34.8, 18.6 and 17.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710); although in 2013, "medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06)" (HS code 3004) exceeded the former as the largest export commodity (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, France and the United States, accounting for respectively 12.7, 11.1 and 6.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 41.2 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 30.0 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 14.0 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 36.3, 15.8 and 14.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and Trinidad and Tobago, accounting for respectively 35.0, 14.8 and 12.3 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 986.7 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 414.2 mln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 193.0 mln US\$ (see graph 6).

Goods Imports: CIF, by origin


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Japan decreased substantially by 10.5 percent to reach 715.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 5.9 percent to reach 833.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). In spite of yen depreciation, Japan trade deficit hit \$112 billion in 2013 due lower exports in manufactured goods (see graph 1). This is the third straight year of deficit, and the largest deficit recorded. The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -126.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Japan were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Japan increased slightly by 0.1 percent, reaching 145.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 5.5 percent and reached 176.8 bln US\$ (see graph 2). Japan also recorded trade in services deficit of 31.2 bln US\$, the largest deficit in trade in services since 2004.

Graph 2: Total services trade, by value




Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 57.9, 13.2 and 10.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1), but export of this commodity dropped by 5.9% from 2012 to 2013, in particular due to a large drop in export to Russian Federation and Australia. The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, the United States and the Republic of Korea, accounting for respectively 18.6, 17.3 and 7.9 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 40.2 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 37.5 bln US\$ and "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) at 31.9 bln US\$ (see graph 3).



(% share in 2012)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2013)






Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Jordan increased slightly by 0.5 percent to reach 7.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.1 percent to reach 21.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 13.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -4.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Jordan were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Jordan decreased moderately by 8.2 percent, reaching 5.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 5.8 percent and reached 4.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 285.0 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Chemicals" (SITC section 5), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 32.9, 20.3 and 19.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "other garments, knitted or crocheted" (HS code 6114) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Iraq, the United States and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 16.1, 14.2 and 10.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 3.0 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.2 bln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 403.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Saudi Arabia, China and the United States, accounting for respectively 21.6, 9.9 and 6.3 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Kazakhstan decreased by 10.6 percent to reach 82.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 9.7 percent to reach 48.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 33.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 36.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Kazakhstan were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and the same number of partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Kazakhstan increased moderately by 6.0 percent, reaching 4.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 3.6 percent and reached 10.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 6.4 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 75.8, 10.0 and 5.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Italy and the Netherlands, accounting for respectively 17.9, 17.4 and 9.1 percent of total exports. (% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of Kenya increased substantially by 15.8 percent to reach 5.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 18.5 percent to reach 12.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 6.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Kenya were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Kenya increased substantially by 18.1 percent, reaching 4.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 11.3 percent and reached 2.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 2.4 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2010 representing respectively 44.3, 14.3 and 12.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2008 to 2010, the largest export commodity was "tea, whether or not flavoured" (HS code 0902) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Uganda, the United Kingdom and the United Republic of Tanzania, accounting for respectively 12.8, 10.6 and 8.4 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.1 bln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 965.8 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 920.3 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)





(% share in 2012)





"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2010 representing respectively 31.8, 22.1 and 14.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2008 to 2010, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United Arab Emirates, India and China, accounting for respectively 12.8, 11.0 and 10.2 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Kiribati decreased substantially by 32.4 percent to reach 5.8 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 18.3 percent to reach 108.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 102.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed ASPAC at -56.1 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Kiribati were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2009, the value of exports of services of Kiribati decreased moderately by 7.0 percent, reaching 4.8 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 14.2 percent and reached 50.0 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 45.2 mln US\$.

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 65.2, 22.7 and 4.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "coconut (copra), palm kernel or babassu oil" (HS code 1513) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Other Asia nes, Morocco and Australia, accounting for respectively 41.0, 32.8 and 11.5 percent of total exports. (% share in 2009)





(% share in 2009)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2012)






Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the Republic of Korea increased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 559.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 0.8 percent to reach 515.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance widened to a new high of 44.0 bln US\$ in 2013 as its exports grew at a steady rate while imports dwindled (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -90.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Republic of Korea increased substantially by 16.4 percent, reaching 110.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 7.0 percent and reached 108.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 2.7 bln US\$, which is the first trade in services surplus recorded from 2000 to 2012.


"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 54.6, 12.8 and 11.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, the United States and Japan, accounting for respectively 24.9, 10.7 and 6.8 percent of total exports. Export of goods to China and the United States continued to grow in 2013, while export to Japan and China, Hong Kong SAR dropped. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 40.7 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 22.9 bln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 21.9 bln US\$ (see graph 3). 


Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 35.0, 26.1 and 10.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Japan and the United States, accounting for respectively 16.0, 12.4 and 8.4 percent of total imports. 



(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 37.6, 18.8 and 16.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the United States and Japan, accounting for respectively 13.7, 11.0 and 7.2 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 9.0 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 4.8 bln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Kyrgyzstan decreased substantially by 14.9 percent to reach 1.7 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 26.1 percent to reach 5.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 3.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG CIS at -1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Kyrgyzstan were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were also moderately concentrated. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Kyrgyzstan increased substantially by 61.2 percent, reaching 1.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 23.1 percent and reached 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 20.9 mln US\$.

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 36.5, 13.2 and 12.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Switzerland, Kazakhstan and the Russian Federation, accounting for respectively 35.1, 17.0 and 14.8 percent of total exports. Services data by detailed EBOPS category is not available for exports.









In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Latvia increased slightly by 4.8 percent to reach 13.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.8 percent to reach 16.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 3.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -3.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). (Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Lebanon decreased substantially by 11.5 percent to reach 3.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 0.4 percent to reach 21.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 17.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -8.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Lebanon were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Lebanon increased substantially by 12.9 percent, reaching 22.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 5.0 percent and reached 12.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 9.9 bln US\$.

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 23.6, 20.5 and 14.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, China and Italy, accounting for respectively 9.4, 9.0 and 8.7 percent of total imports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 4.8 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 3.9 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.9 bln US\$ (see graph 6).


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2009, the value of merchandise exports of Lesotho increased substantially by 156.7 percent to reach 628.1 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased by 27.2 percent to reach 1.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 727.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Sub-Saharan Africa at -982.3 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Lesotho were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Lesotho increased substantially by 41.3 percent, reaching 63.5 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 6.1 percent and reached 174.9 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 111.4 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2009 representing respectively 62.6, 12.7 and 8.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2008 to 2009, the largest export commodity was "men's or boys' suits, jackets, trousers etc" (HS code 6203) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were South Africa, the United States and Canada, accounting for respectively 58.4, 27.0 and 11.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 46.2 mln US\$, followed by "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 6.2 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 5.6 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category





(% share in 2012)





"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2009 representing respectively 25.5, 20.3 and 16.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2008 to 2009, the largest import commodity was "commodities not elsewhere specified" (HS code 9999) (see table 4). The top partner for merchandise imports was South Africa accounting for 95.2 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 85.9 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 30.6 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 20.8 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of Libya increased substantially by 33.7 percent to reach 36.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 37.4 percent to reach 17.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 18.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 22.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Libya were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2010, the value of exports of services of Libya increased moderately by 6.5 percent, reaching 410.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 21.0 percent and reached 6.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 5.7 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) was the largest commodity group for exports in 2010 representing 97.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2008 to 2010, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Italy, France and China, accounting for respectively 41.2, 12.3 and 7.7 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2010 at 262.5 mln US\$, followed by "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 75.6 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 60.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2010)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2010)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2010 representing respectively 49.3, 21.4 and 10.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2008 to 2010, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Lithuania increased moderately by 10.0 percent to reach 32.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 9.2 percent to reach 35.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 2.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -1.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Lithuania were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Lithuania increased substantially by 13.4 percent, reaching 5.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.1 percent and reached 4.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 1.6 bln US\$.

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Luxembourg increased slightly by 0.4 percent to reach 13.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 23.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 9.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -8.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Luxembourg were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Luxembourg increased slightly by 0.6 percent, reaching 72.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 0.3 percent and reached 42.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 30.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 42.8, 22.7 and 9.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "angles, shapes and sections of iron or non-alloy steel" (HS code 7216) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, France and Belgium, accounting for respectively 27.6, 15.0 and 12.8 percent of total exports. "Financial services" (EBOPS code 260) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 40.1 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 11.6 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 4.6 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 30.1, 14.8 and 11.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Madagascar increased substantially by 50.1 percent to reach 1.8 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 16.0 percent to reach 3.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 1.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -841.6 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Madagascar were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Madagascar increased substantially by 23.2 percent, reaching 1.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 16.8 percent and reached 1.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 19.3 mln US\$.

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 28.7, 25.6 and 24.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "cloves (whole fruit, cloves and stems)" (HS code 0907) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were France, China and Germany, accounting for respectively 29.7, 7.2 and 5.9 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Malawi was 1.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports was 2.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 42.7, 16.2 and 13.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "electronic integrated circuits" (HS code 8542) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Singapore and Japan, accounting for respectively 15.0, 12.8 and 10.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 13.3 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 12.0 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 8.4 bln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Maldives increased substantially by 94.1 percent to reach 161.6 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased by 10.1 percent to reach 1.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 1.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -479.7 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Maldives were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2010, the value of exports of services of Maldives increased substantially by 16.5 percent, reaching 768.5 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 7.0 percent and reached 306.3 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 462.2 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) was the largest commodity group for exports in 2012 representing 98.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "fish, frozen, excluding fish fillets and other fish meat of heading 03.04" (HS code 0303) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Thailand, France and Sri Lanka, accounting for respectively 26.1, 15.5 and 11.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2010 at 713.6 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 39.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2010)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 31.3, 20.5 and 17.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United Arab Emirates, Singapore and India, accounting for respectively 24.1, 19.3 and 10.3 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2010 at 161.5 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 102.7 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 21.6 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Mali increased moderately by 9.9 percent to reach 2.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.3 percent to reach 3.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 852.3 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -264.8 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Mali were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Mali increased slightly by 4.5 percent, reaching 400.7 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 2.5 percent and reached 990.8 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 590.1 mln US\$.

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 65.6, 16.1 and 6.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were South Africa, Switzerland and China, accounting for respectively 55.0, 11.8 and 4.7 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 227.1 mln US\$, followed by "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 111.0 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 20.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)





(% share in 2011)





"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 28.7, 22.1 and 16.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Senegal, France and China, accounting for respectively 19.3, 11.7 and 10.4 percent of total imports. 



There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 1.8 bln US\$.

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(% share in 2012)






Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Mauritania decreased moderately by 6.1 percent to reach 2.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 33.9 percent to reach 4.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -1.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Mauritania were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Mauritania decreased substantially by 23.2 percent, reaching 161.0 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 34.5 percent and reached 1.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 863.1 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 64.9, 18.2 and 14.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2012 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "iron ores and concentrates, including roasted iron pyrites" (HS code 2601) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Switzerland and Italy, accounting for respectively 43.8, 12.6 and 7.8 percent of total exports. Services data by detailed EBOPS category is not available for exports.




Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 53.5, 20.1 and 9.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Mauritius increased slightly by 3.8 percent to reach 2.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 6.5 percent to reach 5.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 3.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Southern Asia at -1.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Mauritius were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Mauritius increased slightly by 3.8 percent, reaching 3.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 1.7 percent and reached 2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 1.1 bln US\$.

"Miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 40.6, 38.7 and 10.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "prepared or preserved fish; caviar" (HS code 1604) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United Kingdom, France and the United States, accounting for respectively 18.9, 16.0 and 10.2 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 21.7, 21.0 and 19.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). 

Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Mexico increased slightly by 2.6 percent to reach 380.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 2.8 percent to reach 381.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). Both export and import to the United States increased in 2013, but at rates far below average growth rates in recent years. Due to the high share of trade with the United States, weak economic growth and slow economic recovery in the United States have a great impact on Mexico's trade performance. The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 112.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Mexico were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Mexico increased slightly by 3.6 percent, reaching 16.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 0.9 percent and reached 30.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 14.3 bln US\$, despite a small reduction compared with 2012.


"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 55.9, 12.8 and 9.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). However, export of petroleum has fallen in the last two years, while export of manufactured goods such as motor cars (HS 8703) has increased. The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Canada and Spain, accounting for respectively 78.4, 2.9 and 1.7 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2010)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 6: Imports of services by EBOPS category

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 37.6, 25.6 and 16.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). In 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the Russian Federation and the United States, accounting for respectively 28.1, 24.6 and 8.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2010 at 285.1 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 265.3 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 139.2 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Montenegro increased moderately by 5.5 percent to reach 494.4 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 0.5 percent to reach 2.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 1.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -810.7 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Montenegro were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Montenegro increased slightly by 1.7 percent, reaching 1.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 11.9 percent and reached 494.5 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 787.1 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 29.0, 27.3 and 16.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "unwrought aluminium" (HS code 7601) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Serbia, Croatia and Hungary, accounting for respectively 24.8, 15.7 and 8.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 826.3 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 213.7 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 121.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 24.5, 19.6 and 14.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Serbia, Greece and Bosnia and Herzegovina, accounting for respectively 28.8, 8.4 and 7.2 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 160.2 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 144.4 mln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 46.0 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Montserrat increased substantially by 232.9 percent to reach 6.0 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased by 13.9 percent to reach 42.1 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 36.1 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -28.7 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Montserrat were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and the same number of partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Montserrat increased substantially by 11.2 percent, reaching 13.3 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 1.4 percent and reached 18.2 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 4.9 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 47.6, 28.4 and 18.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "natural sands of all kinds" (HS code 2505) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Dominica, the United States and Anguilla, accounting for respectively 41.0, 17.9 and 7.7 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 7.0 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 4.0 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.9 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 33.8, 21.0 and 16.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Trinidad and Tobago and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 71.2, 6.9 and 4.3 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Morocco decreased slightly by 1.1 percent to reach 21.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.2 percent to reach 44.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 23.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -8.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Morocco were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 20 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Morocco increased moderately by 6.2 percent, reaching 13.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 3.9 percent and reached 8.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 5.5 bln US\$.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 20.6, 20.3 and 17.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "insulated (including enamelled or anodised) wire, cable" (HS code 8544) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were France, Spain and India, accounting for respectively 21.7, 17.3 and 6.1 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Mozambique increased substantially by 16.0 percent to reach 4.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 63.5 percent to reach 10.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 6.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Sub-Saharan Africa at -2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Mozambique were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Mozambique increased substantially by 50.9 percent, reaching 1.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 92.7 percent and reached 4.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 3.1 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 33.5, 28.1 and 15.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "aluminium bars, rods and profiles" (HS code 7604) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Netherlands, South Africa and India, accounting for respectively 31.3, 19.4 and 8.3 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 362.7 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 305.3 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 88.9 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 29.4, 23.3 and 15.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were South Africa, the United Arab Emirates and the Netherlands, accounting for respectively 32.6, 7.6 and 7.4 percent of total imports. "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 2.0 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of Myanmar was 7.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports was 4.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 3.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at 1.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Myanmar were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were also moderately concentrated. Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2010 representing respectively 38.5, 25.3 and 18.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). In 2010, the largest export commodity was "petroleum gases and other gaseous hydrocarbons" (HS code 2711) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Thailand, China, Hong Kong SAR and India, accounting for respectively 41.7, 21.1 and 12.6 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 280.6 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 173.8 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 111.1 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2010)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Machinery and transport equipment (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2010 representing respectively 27.4, 26.9 and 22.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). In 2010, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Singapore and Thailand, accounting for respectively 27.1, 27.0 and 11.4 percent of total imports. 



In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Namibia increased substantially by 17.9 percent to reach 6.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.2 percent to reach 7.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). (% share in 2010)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of Nepal increased slightly by 3.8 percent to reach 907.6 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 15.6 percent to reach 5.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 5.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Southern Asia at -3.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). (% share in 2009)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 20.7, 20.6 and 18.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were India, China and the United Arab Emirates, accounting for respectively 61.8, 11.3 and 3.8 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of the Netherlands increased slightly by 4.1 percent to reach 552.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.6 percent to reach 500.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a surplus of 51.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 135.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Netherlands were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Netherlands decreased slightly by 3.6 percent, reaching 133.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 1.2 percent and reached 120.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 13.2 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 25.6, 16.0 and 14.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Belgium and France, accounting for respectively 24.3, 11.4 and 8.6 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 39.6 bln US\$, followed by "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) at 30.9 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 29.4 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of New Caledonia decreased substantially by 22.0 percent to reach 1.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 12.2 percent to reach 3.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -817.9 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in New Caledonia were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)







Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance






Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Nicaragua increased slightly by 1.0 percent to reach 4.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 8.8 percent to reach 5.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 904.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Nicaragua were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Nicaragua increased moderately by 7.4 percent, reaching 712.0 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 9.7 percent and reached 919.4 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 207.4 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 40.1, 28.3 and 13.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "coffee, whether or not roasted or decaffeinated" (HS code 0901) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Mexico and the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela, accounting for respectively 42.7, 10.3 and 9.9 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 421.5 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 87.2 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 82.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)





(% share in 2012)





"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 22.0, 18.8 and 16.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela and China, accounting for respectively 17.8, 10.3 and 10.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 448.0 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 239.8 mln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 82.6 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the Niger increased slightly by 2.3 percent to reach 1.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.7 percent to reach 1.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 376.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -334.7 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Niger were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of the Niger increased moderately by 8.7 percent, reaching 136.6 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 11.6 percent and reached 939.9 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 803.3 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 52.1, 30.2 and 6.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "uranium or thorium ores and concentrates" (HS code 2612) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were France, Nigeria and the United States, accounting for respectively 39.8, 10.2 and 7.5 percent of total exports. (% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 29.5, 26.8 and 16.5 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "rice" (HS code 1006) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, France and the United States, accounting for respectively 24.1, 11.4 and 6.1 percent of total imports. 



In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Nigeria increased substantially by 13.9 percent to reach 143.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 43.9 percent to reach 35.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 107.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 42.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Nigeria were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Nigeria decreased substantially by 29.1 percent, reaching 2.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 2.6 percent and reached 24.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 21.7 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 84.0, 7.7 and 5.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 42.5, 22.0 and 15.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the United States and Brazil, accounting for respectively 17.0, 16.9 and 5.5 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Norway decreased slightly by 4.8 percent to reach 153.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.1 percent to reach 90.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 63.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 67.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Norway were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2009, the value of exports of services of Norway decreased substantially by 14.8 percent, reaching 38.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 18.1 percent and reached 36.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 1.8 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 67.2, 8.7 and 7.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United Kingdom, the Netherlands and Germany, accounting for respectively 26.4, 12.3 and 11.8 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2009 at 15.6 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 12.1 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 4.1 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2009)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 38.9, 15.0 and 14.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Sweden, Germany and China, accounting for respectively 13.4, 12.2 and 9.2 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2009 at 12.4 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 9.6 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 9.5 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Oman increased substantially by 10.7 percent to reach 52.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 19.0 percent to reach 28.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 24.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -4.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Oman were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2010, the value of exports of services of Oman increased moderately by 8.7 percent, reaching 1.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 19.3 percent and reached 11.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 10.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 75.4, 7.7 and 6.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Areas nes, China and the United Arab Emirates, accounting for respectively 38.5, 18.1 and 7.1 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2010 at 775.0 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 634.6 mln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 140.4 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2010)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 23.5, 19.0 and 18.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United Arab Emirates, Areas nes and Japan, accounting for respectively 26.0, 13.6 and 9.6 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2010 at 2.7 bln US\$, followed by "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 1.1 bln US\$ and "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 715.2 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Pakistan increased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 25.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 0.1 percent to reach 43.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 18.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -13.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Pakistan were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 24 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Pakistan increased substantially by 28.0 percent, reaching 6.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 1.0 percent and reached 8.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 1.6 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 43.8, 24.1 and 19.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "bed linen, table linen, toilet linen and kitchen linen" (HS code 6302) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China and Afghanistan, accounting for respectively 15.0, 9.3 and 9.0 percent of total exports. "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 3.4 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.4 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 757.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 34.8, 18.5 and 14.6 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United Arab Emirates, China and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 16.6, 15.1 and 9.8 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Panama increased slightly by 2.7 percent to reach 843.9 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.2 percent to reach 13.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 12.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at -4.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). The top 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Panama increased substantially by 22.8 percent, reaching 8.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 14.1 percent and reached 3.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 30.0, 20.5 and 14.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, China and Panama, accounting for respectively 21.5, 15.9 and 15.4 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 1.9 bln US\$, followed by "Financial services" (EBOPS code 260) at 883.9 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 505.0 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Papua New Guinea decreased substantially by 17.9 percent to reach 4.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 36.6 percent to reach 8.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 3.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at -1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Papua New Guinea were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were also moderately concentrated. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 8 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2009, the value of exports of services of Papua New Guinea decreased substantially by 46.1 percent, reaching 195.6 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 11.1 percent and reached 1.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 1.7 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 41.3, 33.6 and 13.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "base metals, silver or gold, clad with platinum" (HS code 7111) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Australia, Japan and Germany, accounting for respectively 39.7, 9.1 and 6.6 percent of total exports. "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2009 at 42.6 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 36.8 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 26.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 42.4, 17.3 and 14.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Australia, Singapore and China, accounting for respectively 36.5, 12.9 and 7.0 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2009 at 467.1 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 449.9 mln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 233.5 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Paraguay increased substantially by 29.7 percent to reach 9.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.1 percent to reach 12.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 2.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -3.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Paraguay were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Paraguay increased moderately by 6.7 percent, reaching 166.5 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 19.1 percent and reached 296.0 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 129.5 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 35.7, 31.9 and 23.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "electrical energy" (HS code 2716) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Brazil, Argentina and the Russian Federation, accounting for respectively 33.5, 8.5 and 8.4 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 77.0 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 53.3 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 25.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 38.8, 16.0 and 14.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Brazil and Argentina, accounting for respectively 28.5, 25.5 and 14.9 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Peru decreased moderately by 8.9 percent to reach 41.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 2.6 percent to reach 43.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 4.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Peru were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and the same number of partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Peru increased substantially by 17.5 percent, reaching 5.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.7 percent and reached 7.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 2.3 bln US\$.

(% share in 2012)





(% share in 2012)









Merchandise exports in the Philippines were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 9 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Philippines increased moderately by 9.4 percent, reaching 18.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 16.4 percent and reached 14.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 3.7 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 54.6, 10.5 and 9.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "electronic integrated circuits and microassemblies" (HS code 8542) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Japan, the United States and China, accounting for respectively 19.6, 14.5 and 12.2 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 9.6 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 4.0 bln US\$ and "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) at 2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 42.8, 20.8 and 10.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "electronic integrated circuits and microassemblies" (HS code 8542) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Poland increased substantially by 11.2 percent to reach 199.7 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.4 percent to reach 201.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 2.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 30.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Poland were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Poland increased slightly by 1.0 percent, reaching 37.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 0.1 percent and reached 31.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 6.0 bln US\$.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 37.9, 20.2 and 12.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "parts and accessories of the motor vehicles of headings 87.01 to 87.05" (HS code 8708) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, the United Kingdom and the Czech Republic, accounting for respectively 25.2, 6.6 and 6.2 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 11.2 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 11.0 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 9.8 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 33.5, 17.2 and 14.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). 

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)









(% share in 2012)







Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance



**Imports Profile:**

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 36.6, 19.4 and 14.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). In 2010 and 2012, the largest import commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Areas nes, the United States and China, accounting for respectively 10.3, 10.2 and 8.5 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 9.9 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 5.6 bln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 6).

Goods Imports: CIF, by origin



Trade System: General

Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the Republic of Moldova increased substantially by 11.0 percent to reach 2.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 5.4 percent to reach 5.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 3.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -995.3 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Republic of Moldova were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Republic of Moldova increased moderately by 6.2 percent, reaching 936.3 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 8.3 percent and reached 957.4 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 21.1 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 32.3, 21.3 and 15.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "insulated (including enamelled or anodised) wire, cable" (HS code 8544) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Russian Federation, Romania and Italy, accounting for respectively 28.2, 16.9 and 8.9 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 363.1 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 212.5 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 140.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category







Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance



**Imports Profile:**

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 20.6, 18.2 and 14.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the Russian Federation, Romania and Ukraine, accounting for respectively 15.3, 12.1 and 11.9 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 381.5 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 331.5 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 69.5 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Romania increased substantially by 13.8 percent to reach 65.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.5 percent to reach 73.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 7.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -9.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Romania were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 20 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Romania increased moderately by 7.1 percent, reaching 10.8 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 2.8 percent and reached 9.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 1.5 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 41.1, 16.2 and 14.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "parts and accessories of the motor vehicles of headings 87.01 to 87.05" (HS code 8708) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Italy and France, accounting for respectively 18.6, 12.1 and 7.1 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 3.2 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 2.8 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 33.8, 20.2 and 13.6 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, Italy and Hungary, accounting for respectively 17.7, 11.1 and 8.6 percent of total imports. Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the Russian Federation increased slightly by 0.5 percent to reach 527.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 0.4 percent to reach 314.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a surplus of 212.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1), which was its largest ever. The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 109.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Russian Federation were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Russian Federation increased moderately by 7.0 percent, reaching 59.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 18.9 percent and reached 107.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a trade in services deficit of 48.0 bln US\$.


"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) was the largest commodity group for exports in 2013, representing 70.6 percent of exports. The others were "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) with respectively 10.2 and 4.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). Furthermore, "petroleum gases and other gaseous hydrocarbons" (HS code 2711) accounted for 14.2 percent of all exports in 2013. The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Netherlands, Areas nes and China, accounting for respectively 13.2, 12.9 and 6.8 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 19.0 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 17.1 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 10.8 bln US\$ (see graph 3).



(% share in 2012)





"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 44.9, 12.8 and 12.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703)(see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Germany and Ukraine, accounting for respectively 16.3, 12.1 and 5.7 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 42.8 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 20.1 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 16.4 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Rwanda increased substantially by 22.7 percent to reach 620.5 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.8 percent to reach 1.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -315.7 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Rwanda were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Rwanda decreased slightly by 1.2 percent, reaching 425.4 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 16.1 percent and reached 518.6 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 93.2 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 41.7, 37.7 and 8.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "niobium, tantalum, vanadium or zirconium ores and concentrates" (HS code 2615) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United Republic of Tanzania, Democratic Republic of the Congo and Kenya, accounting for respectively 27.3, 19.6 and 15.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 281.8 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 66.3 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 58.8 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 35.0, 20.3 and 13.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Uganda and Kenya, accounting for respectively 13.7, 13.3 and 7.9 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of Saint Kitts and Nevis increased substantially by 40.2 percent to reach 44.9 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 8.6 percent to reach 246.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 201.8 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -134.8 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Saint Kitts and Nevis were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Saint Kitts and Nevis increased substantially by 12.2 percent, reaching 194.3 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 3.7 percent and reached 119.6 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 74.7 mln US\$.






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Samoa decreased substantially by 18.4 percent to reach 62.1 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.1 percent to reach 366.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 304.5 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed ASPAC at -115.5 mln US\$ (see graph 4). There was a large trade in services surplus of 92.8 mln US\$.

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category



(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 6: Imports of services by EBOPS category





In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Saudi Arabia increased moderately by 6.5 percent to reach 388.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 18.2 percent to reach 155.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 232.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at 204.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Saudi Arabia were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Saudi Arabia decreased slightly by 3.8 percent, reaching 11.0 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 5.9 percent and reached 73.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 62.4 bln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 86.9, 8.6 and 1.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Other Asia nes, North and Central America, Caribbean nes and Areas nes, accounting for respectively 58.9, 14.5 and 11.7 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 7.4 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 2.3 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 43.2, 19.5 and 12.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, China and Germany, accounting for respectively 12.8, 12.5 and 7.1 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Senegal increased moderately by 5.3 percent to reach 2.7 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.5 percent to reach 6.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 4.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -2.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Senegal were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 18 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Senegal increased moderately by 6.2 percent, reaching 1.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 8.0 percent and reached 1.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 94.6 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 30.1, 17.5 and 14.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Mali, India and Switzerland, accounting for respectively 16.3, 10.7 and 10.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 484.1 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 189.0 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 165.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 29.2, 21.2 and 20.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Serbia increased substantially by 28.7 percent to reach 14.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 8.0 percent to reach 20.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 5.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -3.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). 




Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Singapore increased slightly by 0.5 percent to reach 410.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 1.8 percent to reach 373.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). Although the data show substantial exports and imports growth in 2009-2013 (see table 2 and table 3), trade in the last couple of years has overall stagnated with 0.1 percent exports growth and 1.0 percent imports growth annually since 2011. In 2013, the merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 37.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at 50.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Singapore were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Singapore increased slightly by 3.3 percent, reaching 112.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 2.8 percent and reached 117.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a trade in services deficit of 5.7 bln US\$, down slightly from the trade in services deficit of 6.1 bln US\$ in 2011.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 46.4, 17.4 and 12.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "electronic integrated circuits" (HS code 8542) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Malaysia, China, Hong Kong SAR and China, accounting for respectively 12.2, 11.1 and 11.0 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 41.6, 31.3 and 7.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Malaysia and the United States, accounting for respectively 10.8, 10.8 and 10.5 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 35.3 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 29.6 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 22.4 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Slovakia increased moderately by 7.0 percent to reach 85.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.0 percent to reach 81.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 4.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 19.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Slovakia were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and the same number of partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Slovakia increased moderately by 8.4 percent, reaching 7.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 5.0 percent and reached 6.8 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 394.8 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 57.2, 17.1 and 8.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, the Czech Republic and Poland, accounting for respectively 21.0, 13.9 and 7.9 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.3 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 2.0 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 1.5 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 42.4, 15.1 and 13.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "parts and accessories of the motor vehicles of headings 87.01 to 87.05" (HS code 8708) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, Rest of Europe nes and the Russian Federation, accounting for respectively 16.5, 11.7 and 10.4 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 2.1 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.9 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 901.9 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Slovenia increased moderately by 6.1 percent to reach 28.7 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.9 percent to reach 29.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 750.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Slovenia were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 16 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Slovenia decreased slightly by 1.3 percent, reaching 6.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 7.6 percent and reached 4.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 2.3 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 35.5, 20.9 and 18.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06)" (HS code 3004) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Italy and Austria, accounting for respectively 20.9, 11.6 and 8.1 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.7 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.7 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 1.1 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)






Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 29.0, 17.8 and 15.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, Italy and Austria, accounting for respectively 16.3, 16.1 and 8.0 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Solomon Islands decreased slightly by 0.5 percent to reach 489.2 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 17.6 percent to reach 580.2 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 91.0 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG South-eastern Asia at -206.2 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Solomon Islands were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Solomon Islands increased slightly by 2.6 percent, reaching 142.2 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 2.5 percent and reached 190.2 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 48.0 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 56.5, 40.5 and 2.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "wood in the rough or roughly squared" (HS code 4403) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Australia and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 43.7, 21.2 and 6.1 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 67.0 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 34.2 mln US\$ and "Personal, cultural, and recreational services" (EBOPS code 287) at 23.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade


Goods Exports: FOB, by last known destination


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of South Africa increased moderately by 9.8 percent to reach 95.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.8 percent to reach 103.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 8.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Sub-Saharan Africa at 14.7 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in South Africa were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 23 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 23 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of South Africa increased slightly by 2.0 percent, reaching 15.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 9.9 percent and reached 17.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 2.5 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 24.8, 18.8 and 18.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "platinum, unwrought or in semi-manufactured forms, or in powder form" (HS code 7110) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Areas nes and the United States, accounting for respectively 12.6, 8.5 and 8.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 10.0 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 3.4 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 1.7 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 34.3, 21.5 and 10.6 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Germany and the United States, accounting for respectively 14.7, 10.4 and 7.2 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 8.0 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 5.6 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 4.1 bln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Spain increased moderately by 8.8 percent to reach 311.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 2.0 percent to reach 332.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a deficit of 21.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1), which is the smallest deficit since 1997. The merchandise trade balance is approaching balance and if the growth in exports continues in 2014, Spain is set to record a trade surplus for the first time in decades. The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at 21.9 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Spain were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 24 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 26 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Spain decreased slightly by 4.0 percent, reaching 137.8 bln US\$ mainly due to a decline in "travel" (EBOPS 236), while its imports of services decreased moderately by 5.2 percent and reached 90.3 bln US\$ (see graph 2). As a result, the trade in services surplus decreased slightly to 47.5 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 32.3, 15.6 and 13.9 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were France, Germany and Portugal, accounting for respectively 16.7, 10.2 and 7.5 percent of total exports; in particular, exports to Portugal grew substantially by 18.4 percent in 2013. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 55.9 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 34.6 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 23.3 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 25.5, 22.8 and 14.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, France and China, accounting for respectively 11.2, 10.8 and 7.0 percent of total imports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 33.8 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 22.4 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 15.3 bln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Sri Lanka decreased moderately by 6.4 percent to reach 9.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 9.2 percent to reach 17.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 8.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Southern Asia at -3.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Sri Lanka were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 21 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Sri Lanka increased substantially by 24.7 percent, reaching 3.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 28.9 percent and reached 4.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 928.5 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 45.9, 25.7 and 16.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "tea, whether or not flavoured" (HS code 0902) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, the United Kingdom and Italy, accounting for respectively 21.8, 11.5 and 5.7 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 1.4 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 830.0 mln US\$ and "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) at 355.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)



(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)






Graph 6: Imports of services by EBOPS category

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 27.0, 22.4 and 21.4 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of the State of Palestine increased moderately by 8.7 percent to reach 782.4 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 11.3 percent to reach 4.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 3.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -3.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the State of Palestine were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the State of Palestine decreased slightly by 1.9 percent, reaching 936.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.1 percent and reached 1.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 260.4 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 32.4, 19.6 and 19.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "worked monumental or building stone (except slate) and articles thereof" (HS code 6802) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Israel, Jordan and the United Arab Emirates, accounting for respectively 84.0, 6.2 and 1.7 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 755.1 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 59.9 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 47.3 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category









**Imports Profile:**

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 30.6, 23.0 and 18.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Israel, Turkey and China, accounting for respectively 71.2, 4.9 and 4.4 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 696.3 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 117.9 mln US\$ and "Personal, cultural, and recreational services" (EBOPS code 287) at 117.7 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of the Sudan decreased substantially by 62.3 percent to reach 3.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased substantially by 31.1 percent to reach 6.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 3.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -1.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Sudan were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 3 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the Sudan increased substantially by 39.1 percent, reaching 1.2 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased moderately by 6.4 percent and reached 2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 848.1 mln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 64.1, 15.3 and 9.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, the United Arab Emirates and Areas nes, accounting for respectively 62.0, 17.0 and 5.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 879.6 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 198.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 28.5, 17.5 and 14.3 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the United Arab Emirates and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 19.2, 9.2 and 7.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 927.3 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 907.6 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 124.2 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of Suriname increased substantially by 21.8 percent to reach 2.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 17.2 percent to reach 1.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 829.0 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at 638.1 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Suriname were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Suriname decreased substantially by 16.8 percent, reaching 200.8 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 117.2 percent and reached 562.5 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 361.7 mln US\$.

"Not classified elsewhere in the SITC" (SITC section 9), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 82.1, 9.0 and 3.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2009 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "commodities not elsewhere specified" (HS code 9999) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Canada, the United Arab Emirates and Belgium, accounting for respectively 23.9, 17.5 and 11.5 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 82.0 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 60.9 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 21.5 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 25.1, 23.4 and 14.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "oils petroleum, bituminous, distillates, except crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United States, Trinidad and Tobago and the Netherlands, accounting for respectively 26.4, 23.1 and 17.4 percent of total imports. 



In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Sweden decreased slightly by 3.0 percent to reach 167.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 2.7 percent to reach 159.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 7.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -11.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Sweden were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Sweden increased slightly by 0.1 percent, reaching 71.0 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 0.2 percent and reached 54.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 16.6 bln US\$.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 36.9, 17.9 and 11.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 1). Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 34.6, 14.4 and 12.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, Norway and Denmark, accounting for respectively 17.7, 8.8 and 8.2 percent of total imports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 19.1 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 15.5 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 8.0 bln US\$ (see graph 6).



Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Switzerland increased slightly by 1.4 percent to reach 229.2 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.6 percent to reach 200.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 28.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -20.2 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Switzerland were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Switzerland increased substantially by 15.6 percent, reaching 96.7 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 23.9 percent and reached 45.2 bln US\$ (see graph 2). The increase in exports was mostly attributable to "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) and "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266). The increase in imports was mostly attributable to "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236). There was a large trade in services surplus of 51.4 bln US\$, which is the largest trade in services surplus recorded over the period from 2000 to 2011.


"Chemicals" (SITC section 5), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 37.8, 24.8 and 19.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06)" (HS code 3004) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, the United States and Italy, accounting for respectively 19.5, 11.0 and 7.3 percent of total exports. Switzerland is the world's largest exporter of "clocks and watches" (HS code 91) and China, Hong Kong SAR is the top destination for export of this product, representing 18.9% of the total export in 2013. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 25.7 bln US\$, followed by "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) at 19.6 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 17.6 bln US\$ (see graph 3).




Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 25.5, 23.2 and 21.1 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "medicaments (excluding goods of heading 30.02, 30.05 or 30.06)" (HS code 3004) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Germany, Italy and France, accounting for respectively 30.0, 10.2 and 8.5 percent of total imports. While imports from the main European partners stagnated, imports from China increased with 12.4% in 2013. "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 21.8 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 14.0 bln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 4.5 bln US\$ (see graph 6).



Overview:

In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of the Syrian Arab Republic increased substantially by 17.1 percent to reach 11.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 13.7 percent to reach 17.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 6.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -2.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Syrian Arab Republic were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2010, the value of exports of services of the Syrian Arab Republic increased substantially by 52.8 percent, reaching 7.3 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 23.2 percent and reached 3.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 3.8 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2010 representing respectively 49.9, 19.9 and 10.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2008 to 2010, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Iraq, Germany and Italy, accounting for respectively 21.4, 11.5 and 9.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2010 at 6.2 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 529.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category





(% share in 2010)









In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Thailand decreased slightly by 0.4 percent to reach 228.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.3 percent to reach 250.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 22.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Western Asia at -24.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Thailand were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 20 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Thailand increased substantially by 19.2 percent, reaching 49.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 1.8 percent and reached 53.1 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services deficit of 3.5 bln US\$.

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 41.7, 12.9 and 12.5 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "automatic data processing machines and units thereof" (HS code 8471) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, Japan and the United States, accounting for respectively 11.9, 10.2 and 9.9 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 34.5, 20.8 and 16.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Japan, China and the United Arab Emirates, accounting for respectively 18.3, 14.5 and 6.5 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 28.8 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 10.0 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 6.2 bln US\$ (see graph 6).



Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Togo increased substantially by 11.3 percent to reach 1.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 20.2 percent to reach 2.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 999.9 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -552.5 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Togo were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 10 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Togo increased substantially by 27.2 percent, reaching 407.1 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 26.3 percent and reached 502.3 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 95.2 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 29.4, 15.0 and 14.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "portland cement, aluminous cement, slag cement" (HS code 2523) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Burkina Faso, Benin and the Niger, accounting for respectively 15.9, 11.8 and 9.8 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 150.1 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 79.1 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 73.1 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 22.3, 21.7 and 19.6 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, France and the United States, accounting for respectively 15.6, 9.7 and 5.5 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Tonga increased moderately by 8.3 percent to reach 15.6 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.2 percent to reach 199.2 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 183.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed ASPAC at -73.6 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Tonga were diversified amongst partners; imports were moderately concentrated. The top 6 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2009, the value of exports of services of Tonga decreased slightly by 2.2 percent, reaching 34.8 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 13.2 percent and reached 47.0 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 12.1 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 67.6, 12.2 and 11.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "fish, fresh or chilled, excluding fish fillets" (HS code 0302) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were New Zealand, China, Hong Kong SAR and Japan, accounting for respectively 21.3, 21.3 and 15.7 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2009 at 16.0 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 6.8 mln US\$ and "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 5.3 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2009)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2010, the value of merchandise exports of Trinidad and Tobago increased substantially by 20.3 percent to reach 11.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 6.8 percent to reach 6.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate surplus of 4.5 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at 3.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Trinidad and Tobago were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 15 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 12 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Trinidad and Tobago decreased substantially by 11.6 percent, reaching 5.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 11.2 percent and reached 4.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a relatively small trade in services surplus of 425.2 mln US\$. See footnote*.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2010 representing respectively 60.9, 21.7 and 6.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2008 to 2010, the largest export commodity was "petroleum gases and other gaseous hydrocarbons" (HS code 2711) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Jamaica and Spain, accounting for respectively 48.6, 6.3 and 4.8 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 516.5 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 398.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2010)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 30.6, 19.1 and 17.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were France, Italy and Germany, accounting for respectively 17.7, 14.8 and 7.1 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 1.6 bln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 593.1 mln US\$ and "Construction services" (EBOPS code 249) at 321.7 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Turkey decreased slightly by 0.4 percent to reach 151.9 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.4 percent to reach 251.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 99.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -36.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Turkey were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 32 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 23 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of Turkey increased substantially by 11.4 percent, reaching 39.0 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 7.6 percent and reached 21.0 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 18.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 27.5, 27.0 and 17.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Germany, Iraq and the United Kingdom, accounting for respectively 9.3, 7.1 and 5.8 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 23.0 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 10.7 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(% share in 2011)





Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of the Turks and Caicos Islands increased substantially by 38.6 percent to reach 11.8 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 3.2 percent to reach 268.5 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 256.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed North America at -191.5 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Turks and Caicos Islands were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 1 partner accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). No trade in services data is available.








Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Uganda increased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 2.4 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 3.7 percent to reach 5.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 3.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Southern Asia at -1.6 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Uganda were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Uganda increased substantially by 11.4 percent, reaching 1.9 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 0.1 percent and reached 2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 508.7 mln US\$.

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 49.9, 15.5 and 10.0 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "coffee, whether or not roasted or decaffeinated" (HS code 0901) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Former Sudan, the Sudan and Kenya, accounting for respectively 14.3, 14.0 and 11.5 percent of total exports. Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Ukraine decreased moderately by 7.8 percent to reach 63.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased moderately by 9.1 percent to reach 77.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small deficit of 13.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -11.4 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Ukraine were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 27 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Ukraine decreased slightly by 1.4 percent, reaching 13.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 8.0 percent and reached 6.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 6.9 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 31.7, 18.3 and 18.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "semi-finished products of iron or non-alloy steel" (HS code 7207) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Russian Federation, Turkey and Poland, accounting for respectively 26.2, 5.6 and 4.0 percent of total exports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 8.5 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 1.5 bln US\$ and "Computer and information services" (EBOPS code 262) at 803.5 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category





(% share in 2012)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2013)






Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of the United Arab Emirates increased substantially by 27.3 percent to reach 252.6 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 16.7 percent to reach 210.9 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 41.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at 76.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the United Arab Emirates were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 5 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 17 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the United Arab Emirates increased substantially by 17.7 percent, reaching 15.1 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.1 percent and reached 63.9 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 48.9 bln US\$.

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 41.4, 31.4 and 10.8 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2009 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Other Asia nes, Areas nes and India, accounting for respectively 32.8, 31.2 and 9.4 percent of total exports. (% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the United Kingdom increased substantially by 14.1 percent to reach 549.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 4.9 percent to reach 655.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a deficit of 106.7 bln US\$ which was the smallest since 2002 (see graph 1). There was a trade in services surplus of 110.4 bln US\$.


"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 28.0, 20.3 and 13.3 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 1). However, in 2013, "gold (including gold plated with platinum)" (HS code 7108) was the largest export commodity with a huge 3318.0 percent increase from 2012 amounting to 79.1 bln US\$. 


Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade





(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 38.7, 22.3 and 14.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were India, Switzerland and China, accounting for respectively 13.4, 12.2 and 10.8 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2011 at 973.3 mln US\$, followed by "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 898.6 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the United States increased slightly by 2.1 percent to reach 1578.0 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 0.2 percent to reach 2328.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). Despite being overtaken by China in 2007 as the largest exporter of merchandise, the United States is still the world's largest importer. The merchandise trade balance recorded a deficit of 750.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -338.0 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the United States were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the United States increased moderately by 5.2 percent, reaching 651.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 3.0 percent and reached 444.7 bln US\$ (see graph 2). In recent years, the United States has been the world's largest exporter and importer of services. There was a trade in services surplus of 206.8 bln US\$, which is the largest trade in services surplus recorded over the period from 2000 to 2012.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "not classified elsewhere in the sitc" (SITC section 9) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 33.8, 13.2 and 11.6 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "commodities not specified according to kind" (HS code 9999) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Canada, Mexico and China, accounting for respectively 19.0, 13.9 and 7.3 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 160.7 bln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 134.2 bln US\$ and "Royalties and license fees" (EBOPS code 266) at 124.2 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 38.8, 16.7 and 14.9 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The United States is the largest importer of this commodity, despite a decrease in the value of import for a second consecutive year. The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, Canada and Mexico, accounting for respectively 19.1, 14.2 and 12.0 percent of total imports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 91.9 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 89.7 bln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 87.6 bln US\$ (see graph 6).


Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Uruguay increased slightly by 4.1 percent to reach 9.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 0.1 percent to reach 11.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 2.6 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at -1.3 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Uruguay were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 14 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Uruguay decreased moderately by 5.8 percent, reaching 3.4 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 13.7 percent and reached 2.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services surplus of 1.0 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 44.8, 30.4 and 8.2 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "soya beans, whether or not broken" (HS code 1201) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Brazil, Free zones and China, accounting for respectively 19.6, 15.0 and 10.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 2.1 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 588.5 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 333.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)





(% share in 2012)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2013)






Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of Vanuatu increased substantially by 37.6 percent to reach 63.5 mln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 1.7 percent to reach 280.6 mln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 217.1 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed ASPAC at -108.4 mln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Vanuatu were diversified amongst partners; imports were slightly more concentrated. The top 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and the same number of partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Vanuatu increased substantially by 12.5 percent, reaching 321.8 mln US\$, while its imports of services increased slightly by 0.7 percent and reached 145.9 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services surplus of 175.9 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 49.4, 40.3 and 5.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2009 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "coconut (copra), palm kernel or babassu oil" (HS code 1513) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the Philippines, Australia and Malaysia, accounting for respectively 14.8, 10.0 and 10.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 261.4 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 32.2 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Mln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2011)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2011 representing respectively 24.5, 18.9 and 18.2 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2009 to 2011, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were Australia, Singapore and New Zealand, accounting for respectively 30.0, 13.7 and 13.3 percent of total imports. 


Overview:

In 2011, the value of merchandise exports of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela increased substantially by 36.4 percent to reach 91.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 12.5 percent to reach 36.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large surplus of 55.0 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Latin America and the Caribbean at 16.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela were moderately concentrated amongst partners; imports were diversified. The top 4 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 13 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2011, the value of exports of services of the Bolivarian Republic of Venezuela increased moderately by 9.4 percent, reaching 2.0 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased substantially by 15.6 percent and reached 12.8 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 10.7 bln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) and "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2011 representing respectively 96.6, 1.5 and 0.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2009 to 2011, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were Areas nes, LAIA nes and North and Central America, Caribbean nes, accounting for respectively 36.4, 26.4 and 18.9 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2011 at 777.0 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 632.0 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 291.0 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2011)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(% share in 2011)






Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Viet Nam increased substantially by 18.2 percent to reach 114.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased moderately by 6.6 percent to reach 113.8 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively small surplus of 748.7 mln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at -29.9 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Viet Nam were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 19 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 11 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Viet Nam increased substantially by 10.5 percent, reaching 9.6 bln US\$, while its imports of services increased moderately by 5.6 percent and reached 12.5 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 2.9 bln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 28.3, 26.8 and 16.7 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "electrical apparatus for line telephony or line telegraphy" (HS code 8517) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, China and Japan, accounting for respectively 17.9, 11.3 and 11.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 6.8 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 2.1 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)





(% share in 2012)



(Cumulative share by ranked partners in 2012)






Overview:

In 2012, the value of merchandise exports of Yemen increased slightly by 1.6 percent to reach 7.1 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased substantially by 12.2 percent to reach 11.3 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a moderate deficit of 4.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -2.5 bln US\$ (see graph 4). There was a moderate trade in services deficit of 895.7 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2012 representing respectively 89.6, 6.2 and 2.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2010 to 2012, the largest export commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were China, India and Thailand, accounting for respectively 32.2, 19.2 and 14.0 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2009 at 899.0 mln US\$, followed by "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 152.6 mln US\$ and "Communications services" (EBOPS code 245) at 105.4 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2012)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

"Food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1), "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) and "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2012 representing respectively 29.9, 27.1 and 14.7 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2010 to 2012, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were the United Arab Emirates, China and Saudi Arabia, accounting for respectively 10.6, 7.3 and 6.8 percent of total imports. 



(% share in 2012)






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4) and "chemicals" (SITC section 5) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 33.0, 17.8 and 15.5 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "copper ores and concentrates" (HS code 2603) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were South Africa, Democratic Republic of the Congo and China, accounting for respectively 33.0, 17.0 and 9.7 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 735.1 mln US\$, followed by "Insurance services" (EBOPS code 253) at 160.8 mln US\$ and "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 127.7 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of Zimbabwe decreased moderately by 9.7 percent to reach 3.5 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports increased slightly by 4.6 percent to reach 7.7 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a relatively large deficit of 4.2 bln US\$ (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Developed Europe at -1.8 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in Zimbabwe were highly concentrated amongst partners; imports were also highly concentrated. The top 2 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 7 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of Zimbabwe decreased moderately by 7.8 percent, reaching 386.8 mln US\$, while its imports of services decreased substantially by 23.1 percent and reached 967.5 mln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a large trade in services deficit of 580.7 mln US\$.

Exports Profile:

"Crude materials + anim. & veg. oils" (SITC section 2+4), "food, animals + beverages, tobacco" (SITC section 0+1) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 32.8, 30.7 and 17.1 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "unmanufactured tobacco; tobacco refuse" (HS code 2401) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were South Africa, the United Arab Emirates and Mozambique, accounting for respectively 70.1, 8.4 and 7.2 percent of total exports. "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 178.7 mln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 146.7 mln US\$ and "Government services, n.i.e." (EBOPS code 291) at 27.7 mln US\$ (see graph 3).

(% share in 2012)





(% share in 2012)





Imports Profile:

"Chemicals" (SITC section 5), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 24.5, 23.2 and 21.0 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils, other than crude" (HS code 2710) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were South Africa, the United Kingdom and the United States, accounting for respectively 49.0, 12.1 and 5.6 percent of total imports. "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 765.1 mln US\$, followed by "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) at 101.8 mln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 59.7 mln US\$ (see graph 6).




Overview:

In 2013, the value of merchandise exports of the EU increased slightly by 3.4 percent to reach 2326.3 bln US\$, while its merchandise imports decreased slightly by 4.8 percent to reach 2243.4 bln US\$ (see graph 1, table 2 and table 3). The merchandise trade balance recorded a surplus of 82.9 bln US\$ compared to a deficit in 2012 (see graph 1). The largest merchandise trade balance was with MDG Eastern Asia at - 142.1 bln US\$ (see graph 4). Merchandise exports in the EU were diversified amongst partners; imports were also diversified. The top 24 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of exports and 22 partners accounted for 80 percent or more of imports (see graph 5). In 2012, the value of exports of services of the EU increased slightly by 0.5 percent, reaching 850.5 bln US\$, while its imports of services decreased slightly by 1.7 percent and reached 653.4 bln US\$ (see graph 2). There was a trade in services surplus of 197.1 bln US\$. See footnote*.

Exports Profile:

"Machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7), "chemicals" (SITC section 5) and "goods classified chiefly by material" (SITC section 6) were the largest commodity groups for exports in 2013 representing respectively 40.6, 15.0 and 11.4 percent of exported goods (see table 2). From 2011 to 2013, the largest export commodity was "motor cars and other motor vehicles principally designed for the transport" (HS code 8703) (see table 1). The top three destinations for merchandise exports were the United States, Switzerland and China, accounting for respectively 16.7, 8.5 and 8.5 percent of total exports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of exports of services in 2012 at 267.8 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 184.6 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 122.6 bln US\$ (see graph 3).

Graph 3: Exports of services by EBOPS category






Graph 4: Merchandise trade balance

(Bln US\$ by MDG Regions in 2013)




Graph 5: Partner concentration of merchandise trade

Imports Profile:

"Mineral fuels, lubricants" (SITC section 3), "machinery and transport equipment" (SITC section 7) and "miscellaneous manufactured articles" (SITC section 8) were the largest commodity groups for imports in 2013 representing respectively 27.7, 25.9 and 12.8 percent of imported goods (see table 3). From 2011 to 2013, the largest import commodity was "petroleum oils and oils obtained from bituminous minerals, crude" (HS code 2709) (see table 4). The top three partners for merchandise imports were China, the Russian Federation and the United States, accounting for respectively 16.6, 11.9 and 11.3 percent of total imports. "Other business services" (EBOPS code 268) accounted for the largest share of imports of services in 2012 at 185.9 bln US\$, followed by "Transportation" (EBOPS code 205) at 151.0 bln US\$ and "Travel" (EBOPS code 236) at 116.4 bln US\$ (see graph 6).
